BETTING—Grew out of Freshman Glee. Paid chapel time, on Monday following Glee. Compulsory swim of unsuccessful class in Mill stream. Glee bets paid in front of grandstand.

FLUNKING—Junior-Senior flunk days latter part of the school year. Juniors, Seniors plan respective days for beach trips without knowledge of Freshmen, Sophomores.

KANGAROO KOURT—Just ask any Sophomore, Junior, or Senior. But comes Friday and you'll know.

Traditional Times

HOMECOMING—First held 1921. Honors alums of Willamette. Events include alumni banquet, football game, Home-

coming Play, Sign Contest and Noise parade entered by living organizations.

FRESHMAN GLEE—Begun 1909. Thirty-four-year-old tradition; held in March. Freshmen challenge three classes in song tournament; members of each class compose words, music. Freshmen manage whole affair.

SPRING AND FALL FORMALS—

MAY WEEK END—36 years old. Willamette night, party and dance on Friday. Saturday, YMCA May morning breakfast. Later, Frosh-Soph Tug of War and athletic contests. May Queen coronation and parade Saturday afternoon. Also May Pole dance. Saturday evening is the play.

Campus Activities

STUDENT HANDBOOK—Rookie Bible to you. Now 48 issues old, was begun in 1894. Purpose to acquaint new students with University and its tradition.

STUDENT DIRECTORY—Commonly known as "Fusser's Guide," gives name, address and phone number of each student.

WILLAMETTE SONGBOOK—Grows bigger each year as Freshman Glee gives new songs.

BAND—Creates pep and spirit at games. Plays for many campus functions. Cardinal and Gold uniforms add color.

A CAPPELLA CHOIR—Organized 1939. Under direction of Dean Milvin Geist. Gives annual Christmas Vesper Service, Spring Concert Tour (tire rationing seriously threatens this); appears on chapel programs and at local functions.

CARNEGIE LIBRARY—Gift of record collection from Carnegie foundation. Music students take charge. Special hours for students to listen.

Forensics

Professor Rahe in charge since 1929. Contests and tourneys. Many awards and trophies offered. Students awarded many honors outside state. Several WU students winners in 1941-42 contests.

High school forensic tournament sponsored for last nine years. High school speakers with Willamette student judges. Debate, extempore, oratory, humorous and serious interpretation. Held in Waller Hall, Chresto Cottage, Eaton, Collins, Lausanne Hall and Library.

HIGH SCHOOL FORENSIC TOURNAMENT

Held in March. Now nine years old. Various Oregon high schools send speakers. WU student judges. Debating, oratory, extempore, humorous and serious interpretation. Dr. Rahe, director.

ATHLETICS

Willamette belongs to the Northwest Conference, composed of the following schools: Whitman College, College of Idaho, College of Puget Sound, and Pacific University. It is the purpose of this Conference, as far as possible, to foster participation by all members of the Conference in contests of football, basketball, baseball, tennis, and track.

INTRAMURAL ACTIVITIES

Intramural activities are maintained under the personal supervision of the Director of Physical Education and the chairman of the Interclass Rivalry Committee.

The program extends over the entire school year, and is composed of the following activities: cross country, scrimmage ball, basketball, boxing, wrestling, physical ability tests, track, baseball, and tennis.

Sorority Rush Rules

1. Women planning to graduate from Willamette will be given first consideration in "rushing."
2. Women registered for less than twelve semester hours will not be eligible for pledging.

3. Women on probation will not be "rushed."
4. Independent or fraternity men must not assist in sorority "rushing."
5. Coeds shall not indulge in unfriendly conversation about sorority groups.
6. "Rush week" will be held the second week of October.
7. Pledge services will be held the Sunday following preferential dinners.
8. The day on which sorority bids are submitted will be a day of silence for both "rushees" and active members.
9. No favors will be given to guests at the buffet suppers.
10. Alumnae of the sorority must observe all "rush" regulations.
11. Sorority members may not invite new women to stay in their homes.
12. Women may get acquainted with each other in a normal manner such as studying together, going to church together and double dating.
13. Cost of preferential banquet must not exceed fifty dollars including favors, decorations, food, etc.
14. Each sorority must submit an itemized account of "rushing" expenditures to the Dean of Women.

15. Violation of any "rush rule" will be subject to punishment; namely, the forfeiture of the winter social function of the sorority.

INTER-FRATERNITY RUSHING
PROCEDURE

Subsequent to registration, a time set by Inter-Fraternity Council, each new registering man shall be given opportunity to signify choice of fraternities, which shall be written, filed in Dean of Men's office. Each fraternity shall present to the Dean a list of new men whom it wishes to pledge. Official notification shall issue from the Dean's office to each fraternity respectively of the names which correspond to the list it has handed in:

TIME OF PLEDGING: No man shall be offered the opportunity to pledge any fraternity until the time of pledging set by the INTER-FRATERNITY COUNCIL and until he shall have completed registration. Completion of registration means the making of final arrangements with the business office in regard to the payment of tuition. Any violation of this provision on the part of any fraternity shall mean the forfeiture of the right to pledge the man in question for a period of thirty days. Bids for preferences to houses shall be turned in to the Dean of Men's office by four o'clock Friday of Freshman Week.
