

Old Willamette how we cherish All thy legends and thy lore,




The result of this separate organization produced real results, for the Underclassmen not only rivalled and surpassed the Upperclassmen in volume produced, but even introduced some new yells as well.



The negative team, consisting of Elaine Clower and Elizabeth Fairchild, debated the University of Oregon at Eugene, while the affirmative was upheld by Hazel Newhouse and Caroline Tallman debating Oregon Agricultural College at Salem. Willamette lost both debates by a two to one decision.

The second debate was held on March 10 with the question changed to read: "Resolved, that the Japanese immigrants should be admitted to the United States on the quota basis." The same negative team met Albany on her platform, while the affirmative met Linfield at Salem. Both debates were of the Open Forum, no decision type.

Willamette attempted her heaviest debate schedule with this year's record of five home debates and seven debates on a trip extending through eight different states. The question used in all the debates was: "Resolved, that Congress should be empowered by a two-thirds vote to overrule decisions of the Supreme Court declaring acts of Congress unconstitutional."

The season began with a debate with the University of West Virginia on the home platform, February 7. Charles Redding and Joel Berreman, upholding the negative, won the decision of the single expert judge. This was one of the two decisions


lost by West Virginia, who used the Open Forum much of the time.

On February 24 the negative team, composed of Joel Berreman and James Mc-Clintock, lost to Oregon Agricultural College by the decision of the same expert judge.

The team handling the home debates while the others were on the trip was composed of Rawson Chapin and James McClintock. On March 21 they debated Albany College at Albany, upholding the affirmative in an open forum contest. On March 31 they upheld the affirmative in an open forum debate with Linfield College at Linfield. On April 4 the home team took the negative against College of Puget Sound at Tacoma.

Joel Berreman and Charles Redding left on March 17 for the trip. First they met the College of the Pacific at Stockton, Willamette defending the negative. They changed to the affirmative when they debated the University of Southern California on March 24. On the 25th they met the affirmative team of University of Redlands. The next debate was at Denver with Willamette opposing the negative team of the University of Denver in an open forum contest. They again upheld the negative against University of Wyoming on March 30. Next to Caldwell where they clashed with the College of Idaho, Willamette taking the negative. From the dual debate with C. P. S. the team came directly home in time to debate Lawrence College of Appleton, Wisconsin.


The expert judge system used in all save two of the debates was found satisfactory.



The 1924 season started out in great style. Coach Rathbun had fine material to work with and early games looked good. However, numerous losses through ineligibility, coupled with poor team work and lack of field generalship lost several close games for Willamette. The Bearcats deserve credit for the fight that they showed rather than for their record in games won and lost.

Nine lettermen, several seasoned substitutes and numerous new men, some of whom were quite experienced, turned out for the first practice. So good were the new men that several lettermen temporarily sat on the bench. A powerful, heavy team was developed and showed signs of strength in a close game with the Alumni.

In their first conference game the fighting Bearcats upset the dope and outplayed mighty Oregon throughout the contest. Several chances to score were lost by fumbles and other breaks. Once a fumble lost the ball on Oregon's one-yard line; at another time a Willamette dropkick fell just too short; finally came Carter's sixty-yard run for a touchdown only to have it ruled out because of a technical foul made after the ball was across the line. However, although the score was 0 to 0, the game was generally conceded to be a moral victory for Willamette. It was well-earned, and the new men, particularly Carter and Hemphill, showed well for the Cardinal and Gold as did Cramer and Fasnacht among the veterans.







THE TEAM

Basketball

After last season's promising showing much was expected of Willamette in basketball this year—both in fight and in victories won. In fight the team came through as expected, but all of the expected wins did not materialize. Nevertheless, considering the difficulties that were encountered and met, the Bearcats have nothing to feel ashamed of, and can only look with determination toward the future.

Coach Rathbun had six lettermen, four of whom played last year, and several capable reserves to start the season. All looked bright, and, in preliminary games, victories over Pacific College, Monmouth Normal, and City of Portland were chalked up. During Christmas vacation the Bearcats took a barnstorming trip, playing the Columbia Club of Astoria, and Longview, Washington. Then in their first real game Multnomah Club was taken into camp, 32 to 27, by a powerful yet clever offense. Fasnacht, Robertson and Steincipher showed especially well in this game.

However, just before the first conference games, eligibility rulings cut all but eight men from the squad, those lost including Steincipher and Mast who had both been counted on as regulars. Accordingly Rathbun had to build a new team, but, with less than two full quintets to work with, the going was hard. The clever team-

play that characterized the Multnomah game was gone, and although they fought determinedly, only at intervals did the Bearcats display the dash that featured their play in 1924.

The conference season was opened at Eugene with a lopsided defeat by Oregon, featured only by the guarding of Emmel.

Injuries had weakened the Bearcats, and the next week the varsity lost the first game of their northern trip to University of Washington by a high score. However, fighting hard, they came back the next night and whipped C. P. S. 40 to 24. The following night Washington State Normal was defeated by a twelve-point margin. The next night came Whitman, but although they fought hard the Bearcats came out on the short end of a 27 to 24 score.

In their next home start the varsity lost a fast game to Oregon, featured by their spectacular guarding. Whitman again trimmed the Bearcats in a close struggle. Washington ran away from the Cardinal and Gold in the first half of the next game, but in the second period the Willamette team played real basketball and made 15 points to U. of W.'s 10. They could not overcome the Huskies' early lead, however.

A fast game featured by Emmel's shooting was dropped to O. A. C. as were also games to Idaho, Washington State and Gonzaga. The Bearcats rallied, however, and broke into the conference win-column with a 31 to 20 victory over Pacific. This was followed by a second victory over C. P. S., a close hard-fought defeat by the champion O. A. C. Beavers, and a second victory over Pacific. The Bearcats closed their season by losing a heartbreaking game to University of Southern California by a 33 to 36 score. Later, the championship Oregon-O. A. C. game was staged in the Willamette gymnasium.

Although the team made no extraordinary record in winning games, the men individually played a high brand of basketball. No captain was elected, but Emmel, being a senior, acted in this capacity in most of the games. Ted was not counted

on as a regular when the season started, but after being shifted from forward to guard, made good immediately. In fact, his fast, fierce guarding and accurate shooting featured the Bearcats' play all season.

Fasnacht, Willamette's left forward, played his usual aggressive game, and accounted for a large share of the team's scores. Dee Robertson, another veteran, was shifted from guard to forward and his clever floor work added much to the varsity's team-play. "Beany" Erickson, playing his second year at guard, showed much improvement, and his steady, dependable work saved several games for the Cardinal and Gold. Another veteran, "Hank" Hartley, performed very creditably at center, and gives promise of developing into a real star in his two remaining years of play. Two other men, Herrman and Poling, played in several games. Poling graduates, but Herrman who was not in school the first semester, looked like a real varsity material in the few games he played. Other men who give promise for next season are Haines and Stolzheise. Mast and Steincipher, before becoming ineligible, were regulars and their return next season will greatly strengthen the Bearcats.

As to next year's prospects, Coach Rathbun is silent. However, only Emmel and Poling graduate, and this year's squad, with the addition of several promising freshmen, will speak for itself.







Bill Vinson, another veteran, made his third letter in the hurdles and pole vault. Stolzheise again made his letter in the broad jump and weight events, while Fletcher earned his first award in the middle distances.

Logan, Bill Vinson and Satchwell have graduated and will be hard to replace. However, several Freshmen with good high school records have entered school, prospects are fairly bright, and Coach Sparks hopes to regain the Bearcats' old position in the win column.






Tennis, hockey, canoeing and hiking are the outdoor sports which go to complete the women's program. All in all Willamette women enjoy a satisfactory physical education program.






Inter-Fraternity Athletics



Willamette University College of Law

The College of Law was established, as a department of the University, in 1883. Its purpose is to provide a thorough legal education for students who are fitted by their maturity and previous academic training to pursue professional study under university methods of instruction. The curriculum covers three academic years and is calculated to afford an adequate preparation for the practice of law in any jurisdiction of the United States. Special attention is paid to problems of local law in the State of Oregon.

This school is fully accredited by the State and Federal authorities for the payment of benefits to those entitled to them under the returned soldiers, sailors and marines educational aid and vocational training acts.

The College of Law of Willamette University stands high in the estimation of the Supreme Court of Oregon as evidenced by the following extract from a letter written by the Supreme Court to the President of the University:

"In our examination of applicants to practice law in Oregon, we have always found the graduates of the Willamette Law School as fully and well prepared as the graduates from any of the law schools, including the leading colleges of the United States, and graduates of the Willamette Law School have repeatedly taken first honors in such examinations. We have also observed that many of the alumni of the Willamette Law School have taken high rank in the practice of their profession, and are among the prominent and useful citizens of the Pacific Northwest, thus reflecting credit not only on the law school, but on the Willamette University, which they regard as their alma mater."

The College of Law has several special advantages. It is located in the capital city where the Supreme Court is almost constantly in session. The Law Department has exceptional facilities in its nearness to the State Library which contains more than 40,000 volumes, to which the law students have free access.


The law classes are held in Eaton Hall which is centrally located upon the college campus, directly across from the State Capitol. Law students are members of the Student Body of the University and have the opportunity of engaging in the various student enterprises and activities.

Requirements for admission

Applicants for admission to the Freshman year must be at least 18 years of age and of good moral character. Each applicant must have satisfactorily completed a four years' high school course or its equivalent and one year's work amounting to 30 hours credit in the College of Arts and Science of Willamette University or its equivalent.
