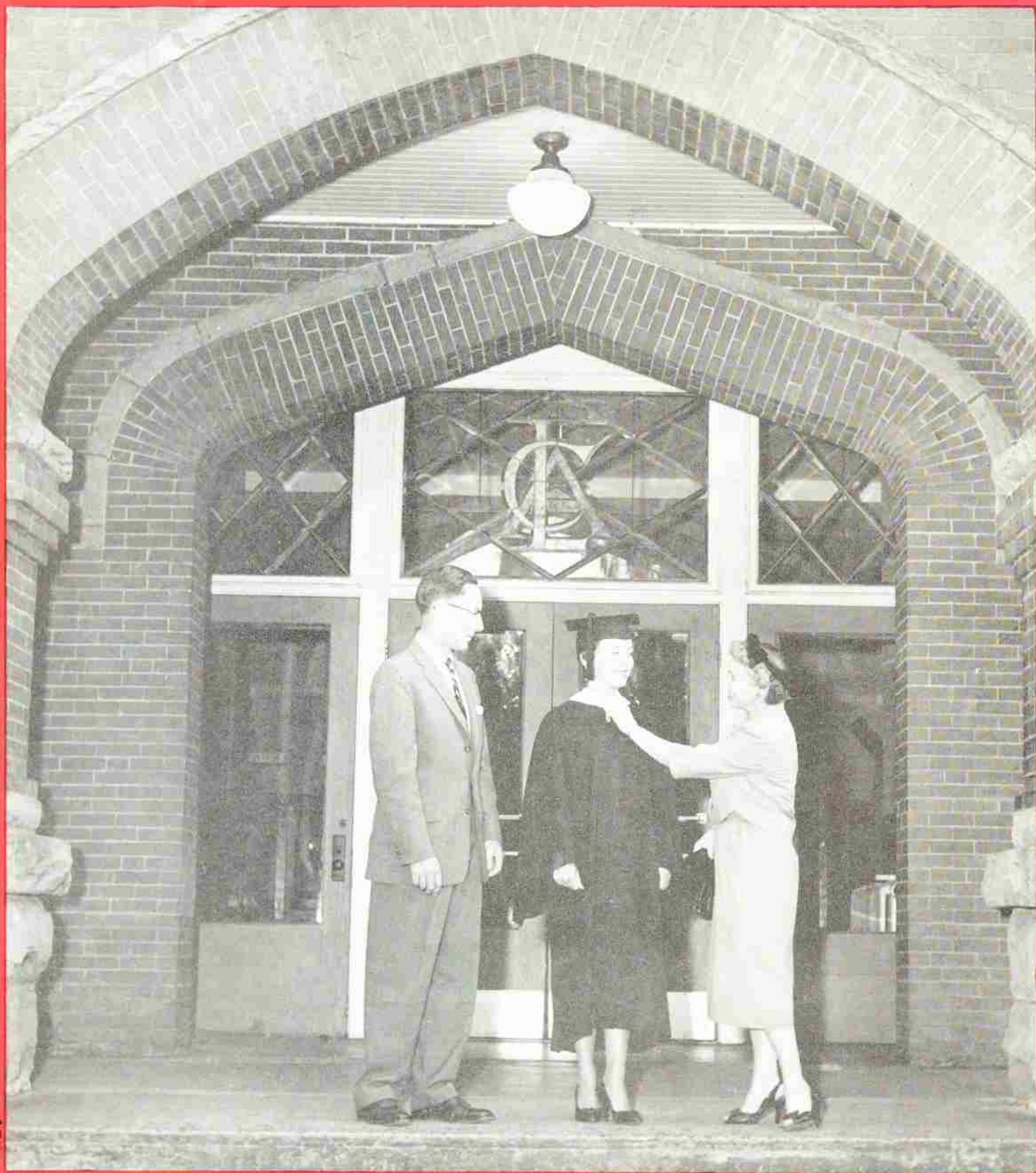

CHARTER GIVEN TO FIFTH SORORITY

Gamma Tau Chapter of Alpha Phi international fraternity for women was formally installed this spring.

The university's fifth sorority came officially into existence at an evening banquet when Chapter Pres. Marietta Lind, junior from Portland, was presented the charter by International Alpha Phi Pres. Mrs. Noel Keyes, Berkeley, Calif.

Mrs. Mark O. Hatfield is alumnae adviser for the newly-formed group.

This brings the number of sororities on campus to five. The last established at Willamette was Chi Omega, which founded a chapter here in 1945. Delta Gamma preceded it the same year and Alpha Chi Omega and Pi Beta Phi chapters were organized in 1944.

WORKERS WITH BLIND GATHERED FOR COURSE

Workers with the blind from all parts of the nation gathered at Willamette this summer for the first Western Institute for houseparents of Visually Handicapped Children.

The two-week session, June 30 to July 11, was under the sponsorship of the American Association of Instructors of the Blind and the American Foundation for the Blind. Last summer's session was held at St. Louis.

Directing the Institute was Dr. John A. Rademaker, professor of sociology, and Everett E. Wilcox, Superintendent of the Oregon State School for the Blind in Salem.

Guiding the sessions were top leaders in the field of education of the blind from all over the country.

MORTAR BOARD CHAPTER INSTALLED

The 101st chapter of Mortar Board, national honor society for senior college women, was installed at Willamette University on April 27.

The announcement culminates a number of years of effort on the part of Cap and Gown, campus, honorary for women, to gain national affiliation with Mortar Board.

199 Receive Degrees at Commencement

Former Students Given Honorary Degrees

One hundred and ninety-nine seniors received degrees at Willamette's 116th commencement exercises, Sunday, June 8, at McCulloch stadium.

Three former students were awarded honorary doctor of laws degrees at the exercises. They are Pyo Wook Han, now Korean minister to the U. S., Secretary of State Mark O. Hatfield and Dr. Helen Pearce, retired WU English professor.

Dr. Pearce was the first woman graduate of Willamette to obtain a doctor of Philosophy degree. She was an English professor at Willamette for 35 years and president of Zonta International in 1938-40.

Mr. Hatfield, Republican nominee for governor, was dean of students at Willamette, resigning in 1956 to run for his present office.

Mr. Han represented his country in the United Nations and the U.N. General Assembly before becoming minister in 1954. He came to the U.S. to attend Willamette in 1939, attended Syracuse university and received his master's degree at Harvard in 1946.

Korean Diplomat Gives Address

Delivering the commencement address, "No Choice But to Choose," was Pyo Wook Han, Korean minister to the United States and former student at Willamette.

Han based his talk on some advice given him 19 years ago, when he was en route to the U.S. to study at Willamette, by Dr. Syngman Rhee, now president of Korea. It was, "Do not avoid problems. Do not try

to escape from them, for problems that are ignored or pushed into the background multiply in the darkness and grow increasingly worse.

When problems arise, you have no choice but to choose."

"To preserve liberty," Han said, "the free world has no choice but to resist."

"To be anti-Communist is essential," he added, "but it is not enough. What is also required is a positive, affirmative program for solving the problems which provide a fertile soil for Communist propaganda, infiltration and subversion."

DR. KOHLER LEAVES WILLAMETTE



Dr. Henry C. Kohler, professor of English literature, retired in June, but those who know him realize that the influence of a man who, during his 32 years on the faculty, has sought to bring out the creative in his students, will never end.

Dr. Kohler came to Willamette in 1926 from Ohio State University where he taught history, the philosophy of education and English. His career has included travel to England, France, Switzerland and Germany and a great interest in painting, sculpture, music and hiking.

His first teaching love has been Elizabethan literature, drama and poetry, but he has also taught comparative literature and a wide range of American and European literatures.

Although in retirement, former students are sure to find a warm welcome and encouraging interest in the great world of literature.

Special recognition was given Dr. Kohler at the Alumni Day banquet when he was presented a scrapbook filled with letters from former students.

FRINGE BENEFITS PROGRAM DEVELOPED FOR FACULTY

Beginning in September, 1958, the Willamette faculty will be protected by three new forms of insurance that will supplement the present annuity and social security programs. This was provided by action of the Willamette Board of Trustees at their February meeting. These additional fringe benefits put Willamette among the few institutions which at present have as broad and generous coverage. A recent survey of opinions of 100 college presidents concludes, "The most difficult problem for both public and private colleges will be faculty supply."

Dr. Chester F. Luther, professor of mathematics, who headed the committee in working out this new fringe benefits program, states, "The new insurance program will help greatly in keeping Willamette a good place to work, in holding the present staff and in attracting strong additions."

Specifically the new program includes: (1) life insurance, (2) major medical expense insurance, and (3) total disability insurance. These three, like the present annuity, are

Faculty . . .

Dr. Cecil R. Monk, professor of biology and head of that department, was awarded a grant to attend a Zoological Institute at Williams College in Williamstown, Mass., this summer. The grant covers living and travel expenses for the Monk family at an institute sponsored by the American Society of Zoologists and the National Science Foundation.

One of the top recognitions a scientist can receive went to Dr. Monk who recently was named a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. The appointment as a fellow entitles Dr. Monk to vote on the governing body of the AAAS, the official organization of scientific bodies in the United States.

Another honor coming to Dr. Monk recently was his election to the presidency of the Oregon Academy of Science. During 1957 he served as vice-president.

Dr. and Mrs. Theodore Shay left July 10 for New Delhi where they plan to stay 12 to 18 months traveling over India. Dr. Shay will be gathering material for a book on Contemporary Indian Politics. He is on a two year leave of absence from Willamette where he is assistant professor of political science.

Attending the Danforth Foundation's Campus Community Workshop during the summer at Colorado Springs were Robert D. Gregg, dean, College of Liberal Arts; Howard W. Runkel, professor of speech and drama; Noel Kaestner, associate professor of psychology and Richard Gillis, associate professor of economics. They joined four-man teams from 24 other church-related colleges and universities from all parts of the country to discuss a number of educational problems.

PROGRAM FOR SUPERIOR STUDENTS DEVELOPED

An honors program to develop the best talents of superior students has been announced after nearly a year of planning.

Fifteen sophomores have been selected as the pioneer class in this educational innovation to begin study next fall. Next year they will meet in special seminars to consider the background of problems in contemporary civilization. Each will prepare a special report, participate in panel discussions and read in special areas.

Dr. Cecil Monk, head of the biology department, is head of the honors steering committee which consists of Dr. Kaiser, Dr. Huffman, Stanley Butler, and Dean Robert Gregg.

As seniors each will prepare a comprehensive research paper relating to his major field.

Three hours credit per semester will be given for the program. Six hours in the senior year may be applied to major field credits.

funded in the Teacher's Insurance and Annuity Association, founded in 1918 by the Carnegie Foundation to provide annuities and insurance at cost to college and university faculties in the U.S. and Canada, now totaling over 800. Recent grants to TIAA from the Ford Foundation have made possible group medical expense and disability insurance at relatively low cost.

In brief, the amount of life insurance depends upon the faculty salary, with decreasing coverage from age 54 to 69. The major medical expense insurance covers 80% of medical expenses in excess of benefits received from Blue Cross plus \$100 deductible, to a limit of \$15,000. The total disability insurance provides one totally disabled more than 6 months on income of half one's salary, but not to exceed \$250 per month, to age 65. A waiver of annuity premiums assures the anticipated annuity payments to begin at age 65.

The faculty has expressed appreciation for the added security that is being provided beginning with the fall semester.

Dr. Norman A. Huffman, professor of religion and Greek scholar, will assist in preparing a new edition of the Greek New Testament. He has been appointed a member of the advisory committee of a project sponsored by the American Bible Society, the National Bible Society of Scotland and the Wurtemberg Bible Society of Germany to prepare a new edition based on the findings of twentieth century scholarship. Dr. Huffman spent a year in Italy on a Fulbright grant collecting data for the new edition. This and other evidence gathered by scholars will be used in the preparation of the new edition.

Dr. O. W. Frost, assistant professor of English, has been appointed by the National Council of Teachers of English to serve as one of four judges in Oregon in a new program of awarding college scholarships to top high school students. Titled the NCET Achievement Awards program, the new plan is an attempt to recognize and encourage exceptional students in the field of language arts.

Dr. Gale Currey, professor of physical education for women, is spending the summer in Britain with such special high-lights as an international festival of folk singing and dancing in North Wales, a course in Scottish country dancing at St. Andrews University, a walking tour in the English Lake District, and a cycling trip in the Cotswolds.

Prof. Charles A. Jens of the College of Law has been appointed visiting professor of law at the University of Washington for the 1958-59 school year. Jens will take a one-year leave of absence in order to begin his duties in Seattle. Director of the Legal Aid Clinic for a number of years, Mr. Jens received his AB and LLB from the University of Michigan and later did graduate work at Harvard and Boston universities.

Man Is Not Primarily a Fact

WE HAVE come a long way since the elder Huxley charged us to sit down before the simple facts—and learn! There is something congenial and comforting about sitting to learn, and especially sitting before the kind of facts millions of Americans do week after week. Perhaps this is the clue to the popularity of the rash of quiz shows, challenges, and \$64,000 questions that provide tidbits for distracted minds in the sitting rooms of America. The facts before which we sit are so painless, so personally irrelevant, so disconnected with each other and the living issues of our time, so flat, formal, and void of value, that the appropriate posture before them is to sit.

Though millions may sit on the edge of their seats before this kind of fact, we may presume it is not because of the facts remembered and rehearsed, but rather because of the vicarious human thrill at this most recent competitive sport. Many, of course, rejoice at this turn in our national interest from football and fighting to the facts. Even educators point to a new prestige for learning, halos for eggheads. They insist this creates a new climate of encouragement for the gifted, a new emphasis on the discipline of memory, prestige for the fact-laden mind.

Few would doubt there is some truth to these observations, and some small gain in competitive sport. But there is something sinister in our excitement over this kind of untroubling fact, and our willingness to turn our sitting into sleep before the facts that are painfully pertinent and personally relevant to human survival and significance. One has but to recall the amazing complacency before the facts of social revolution of the exploited and underdeveloped peoples of the world in recent years, mounting tensions in the South, the rapid erosion of integrity and character in family and public life, and the swift successes of the Soviet Union in economy, technology, and diplomacy, to realize how little we learn from our present posture, and how trifling are the facts before which we do sit.

For those interested in a more athletic attitude toward learning, there is some consolation to be taken in the way the space sputtering of a Sputnik has brought us to our feet. At least the posture is more prophetic. What is deeply troubling in this new desire to speed up our learning, however, is the kind of fact to which we are now invited to turn almost desperately. Ironically, it is the same kind of fact constrained by the same kind of fear and desire for power that Sputnik symbolized in the possession of the Soviets. These are the so-called "neutral facts" of physical nature,

her processes and powers, constrained by abstract mathematical forms and the conversion of both into power. Before such facts the mood of man is bent on mastery, exploitation, and control.

No one in his right mind would want to minimize the importance of this range of fact and its human significance in lifting loads from the backs of burdened men and translating the goods of nature into materials for the good life. What is deeply troubling is the way in which preoccupation with this kind of scientific fact serves increasingly as a tool for power and perverts means into ends, education into a tool for tyranny.

Memory of this trend and temptation in Nazi Germany is too vivid to permit cheap and easy forgetfulness in the name of urgency. There we saw learning become the ready handmaid of an ideology which placed high priority on scientific and technical training and the discipline of the mind. It is still part of the uncomfortable irony of our spastic response over Sputnik that both Russia and the United States intermittently claim and curse the German genius as pioneering in this field.

Germans achieved competence in the handling of this kind of fact, but at the neglect of an educated conscience. They demonstrated the nonsense of "scientific neutrality" in both the motives of men and the meaning of the facts in a scientific culture. They called attention through the inversion of human values to the wider range of fact within which science is set, interpreted, and ultimately summed up. The tragedy is they left this wider setting concerning the motives and meaning of man's existence to arbitrary and irrational political choice. Through appeal to myth about Nordic man they veiled the use of naked power placed in their hands by mastery of neutral nature. And therein lies the peril in our present preoccupation.

We too readily forget that no fact, however scientifically simon-pure, is sufficient in itself to provide meaning or motivation for men. Its meaning is given not as we sit before it, memorize, record, or reproduce it; but as we see it related, interpreted, and evaluated in relation to other facts and systems of meaning. Facts become pertinent to motivation when their meaning engages decisive human concern, whether for survival, power, curiosity, or service. The meaning may be manufactured more by dogma than discovery, and the motivation by fear or force than free choice, but both reveal the poverty of scientific facts alone to illumine—much less save—the human situation.

FAILURE to understand this deeper



significance of the system of meaning and motivation of the scientist makes our response to present Soviet scientific success almost pathetic. Our current effort to match the Russians through a scientific crash program, even with pious footnotes about the humanities, illustrates we have not begun to understand the secret of their power and have forgotten our own. We have been led into thinking with Mr. Huxley that the facts are simple and sufficient. We have lost sight of the soil in which their meaning grows. We have naively thought that the secret to sudden Soviet power in science is science itself. Nothing could be further from the truth. Yet, like mad, we rush to mimic our mistaken notion of their methods, thereby perverting the opportunity to understand the secret of their power or of perfecting our own.

What we forget at our peril is that the secret of scientific power lies not with the facts, but with the fertility of their setting in the principles and perspectives that give them meaning, and the motivation of the men who see and set them in order. Both have to do not only with man's posture but with basic human realities discovered in philosophy and faith as he formulates the meaning and motives for his human existence. Here lies the Soviet vitality: the sharp clarity with which they embrace their sustaining philosophy, and the dedication of faith that supports their value system and scientific success.

Sports ROUNDUP

THE FOOTBALL season was a great success, despite the fact the NWC title was snared by Linfield in the last game of the season. Highlighting the year was the trip to Hawaii, along with the selection of Vic Backlund, Bill Long and Gary Raid to the NWC All-Star first team.

THE BASEBALL season was hampered by the lack of experience. However, the young Bearcat squad gave high hopes of future success in the diamond next year. Backlund, Frank Caruso, and Speer made the All-Star team.

LES SPARKS brought home the trophy, as he guided a very green tennis team to the Northwest Conference title. Coach Jerry Long's golf squad completely overshadowed all other conference competition as they walked off with the NWC championship. Named to the NWC All-Star golf team were Jan Aaseth, Rusty Beaton, and Joe Karmos. Aaseth was NWC medalist.

TOOLS OF HIS TRADE

Much can be learned from this without mimicry or exaltation of the photographic mentality of a quix-show genius. It should send us scurrying to a re-examination of the philosophy and faith that sustain our own scientific endeavor and to a more earnest moral appraisal of our motivation and estimate of the human significance of the ends of science. It should require that we enlarge the range of facts before which we sit or spring to include the facts of human nature as well as the facts of physical nature. It should reveal our need for a new kind of man, with a clearer philosophy and a deeper dedication that mastery and power can give. But will the present projection of a scientific crash program produce him?

The best of our scientists know it will not. They know their mathematical disci-

pline is rooted in response to the mystery of rational order and the power of the finite symbol transcending space and time. They know their fact-finding is nurtured by philosophy (philosophia, love of wisdom) and fulfilled in faith. They know their mastery of nature is not a conquering but a surrender, not a single human power but a humble cosmic-human partnership. They know the mood and methods of their seeking, set in freedom, are fed by vision, disciplined in ordered thought, and universalized in knowledge that sets men free. This is the growing edge of their thought, the parentheses around the facts that give them meaning.

Is it not time to awaken to the need and conditions of this richer learning that turns knowledge into virtue, information into insight, and facts into coherent meaning and moral motivation? Is it not time to complement our present preoccupation with the

facts of nature with a study of the facts of human nature and the values of significant human life in the community of man in a shrinking and hostile world, mobilizing all available tools to teach us?

Is it not time to rediscover that man is not primarily a "fact" or his chief posture for learning "sitting," but that he is primarily an act, creative, illusive, responsible, and free? That to understand him, his acts, or scientific successes, one must come to terms with his interior, the meaning that sustains his life, and the motivation that informs his work. To see this is to see the wonderfully complex human equation as a clue not only to Soviet science, its success and peril, but to the fading frontier of our present education. It should be more! It should provide clues to the learning we desperately need. It should shock us from our sitting—the elder Huxley notwithstanding.

As you know, more than 2000 alumni rallied to the support of the University to contribute almost \$20,000, enabling Willamette to receive the \$15,000 Challenge Gift and \$29,000 from the fund available based upon the percentage of increase in the number of alumni contributing to the Loyalty Fund. The entire amount contributed by the alumni, \$19,800, has gone into the budget for faculty salaries for the college year 1958-59. The balance from the Challenge Gifts has been budgeted over a three-year period, one third of the amount to be used each year. It is anticipated that during this three-year period the level of giving by alumni may come up to the point that there will have to be no reduction in the budgets after the Challenge monies have been appropriated and used.

As a result of the Loyalty Fund and the money from the Challenge Gifts, every regular faculty member has had another increase in salary for the coming year. For the first time in recent history, total gifts for current expenses of the University, including the support from the alumni, the gifts from business through the Oregon Colleges Foundation, and the support of the Methodist Church have almost equaled the income provided by Willamette's endowment fund which has been built up over a period of a century. This gives an indication of the importance of living endowment through current gifts to maintain the effective program of Willamette.

Again I want to express my thanks to the many alumni who worked to make this result possible, and to all who have contributed to the support of their Alma Mater. The Loyalty Fund of 1958 is indeed a great accomplishment.

THE COMMON SENSE OF ANNUAL GIVING

The plight of faculty salaries was given nation-wide attention two years ago by the substantial gifts which private colleges and universities received from the Ford Foundation.

Willamette, like the other recipients, complied with the two restrictions placed on these grants. Willamette's gift of \$253,500 was invested for a minimum of ten years, and the interest earned is used specifically for improving faculty salaries.

As essential as the Ford gift is, the Willamette Alumni last year contributed with their annual gifts, an even larger amount (\$19,800 in Alumni gifts versus \$12,500 income from the Ford grant) for faculty support.

The law of annual giving demands that no alumnus should ever underestimate the role of his annual gift — whatever its size, it is important in itself and encourages the gifts of others.

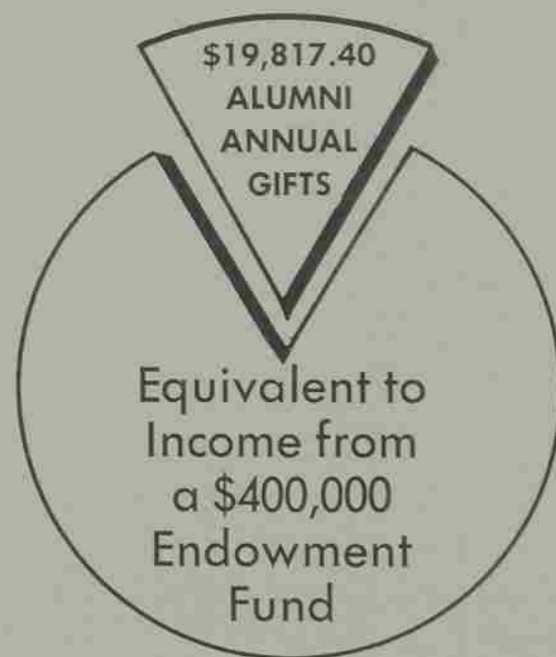
