In previous years, specific issues have dominated the candidate's forum and campaign. But this year, a significant issue that seems to permeate nearly every conversation is whether or not the Associated

Students of Willamette University is effective at accomplishing a goal. Before my tenure on the College of Liberal Arts Board of Trustees Committee, I expected to witness self-examination and self-criticism. But during my tenure on the committee, I saw self-affirmations and no improvements. Unfortunately, I can see a similar apathetic attitude develop-

ing within Senate. In order to prevent the growth of this apathy any further, we need to develop and implement the restructuring of Senate through a Constitutional revision which would increase efficiency and accountability. The restructuring of Senate will not only facilitate effectiveness, but it will also give us an effective means for channelling concerns and taking advantage of unutilized resources. But throughout this process, I firmly believe that accessibility through critically engaging conversation is necessary. All this means is that I want

know me, I am the type of guy who wears a baseball hat to class. I don't own an iron. Politically correct? Ha Ha!!! I don't have a 4.0. I don't

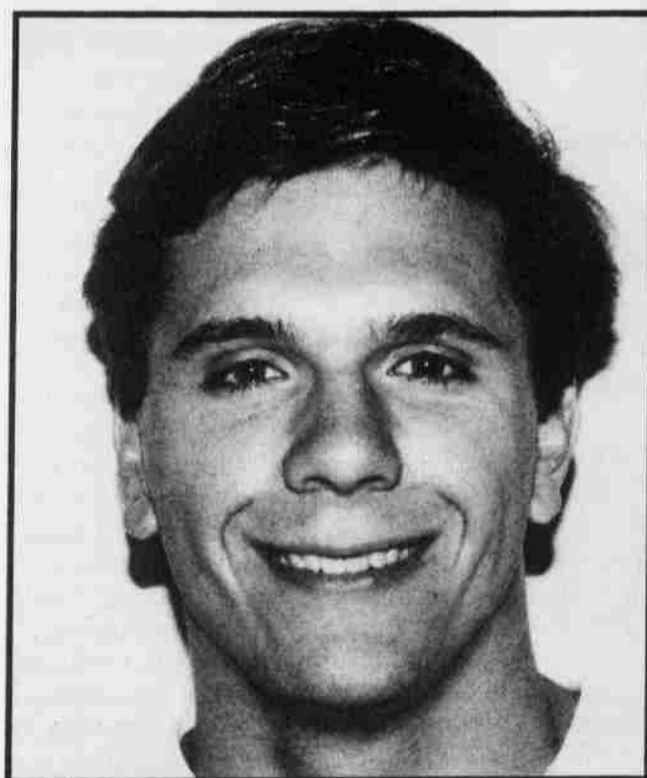

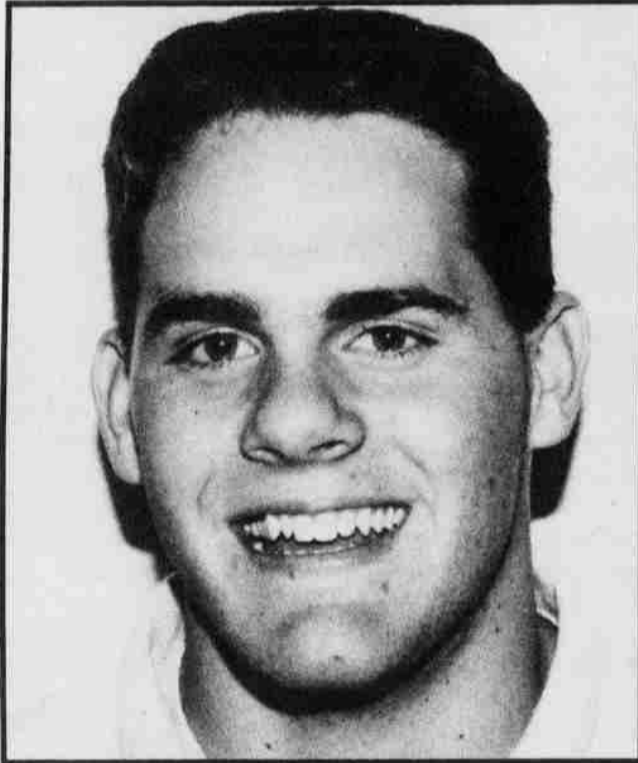
