## Chuck Lewis Out on Bail; Trial on Charges Pending

Chuck Lewis, one of the two University men arrested last Thursday on charges of violating the narcotics laws, was out on bail Tuesday while the other, Charles Naone, was expected to be out shortly.

Dean Mark Hatfield reported that Lewis was freed on bail through arrangements by his parents but that both he and Naone must remain in the state until the trial, which has tentatively been set in about three months.

The two athletes were picked up by plain-clothes officers at the YMCA early Thursday morning of last week after Naone had sold 10 marijuana cigarettes to them. They were taken to the Salem jail immediately, charged with possession and sale of marijuana and later to Portland for action by federal authorities. In Portland U. S. Commissioner Robert A. Leedy set bond at \$1,000 each.

As soon as the news of the arrest broke over the campus on Thursday, student body officers swung into action and issued a statement cautioning students against the "spreading and distorting malicious details" dealing with the case. The statement was read in part over local station KOCO by S. B. president Jim Hitchman.

Dean Hatfield later reported to the Oregon Statesman that the narcotics agent had authorized him to say that he had reported no signs of other University students being involved in the case.

Charles E. McCulloch, president of the board of trustees, has sought legal help for the men, according to Dean Hatfield.

## Tests, Eviction Face Students

A dark lull settled over the campus today as students prepare for the first in a battery of final exams which begin tomorrow.

Lausanne and Baxter hall residents will have until Saturday noon following final week to pack their belongings as high school girls from all over the state prepare to invade both premises Sunday for a week-long Girls' State convention.

Boys' State will take over the campus immediately following the girls' exit, and summer school opens June 15.

During summer vacation, painting and redecorating of several campus buildings and classrooms is planned. Plans call for painting of the exterior of Baxter hall, remodeling of the lavatories at Lausanne, room redecorating in both of the dormitories, and exterior painting of the band annex, art building, and the infirmary.

This publication of the Collegian is the final edition for the year. The next Collegian to be printed will be distributed September 11, during Orientation Week.

## Registration Day Set June 15 For Summer School Session

Registration for Willamette's summer session will be held in the library from 9 a. m. to 12 noon on Monday, June 15.

Registrar Harold B. Jory announced that students will be allowed a load of eight semester hours, the class periods running for one hour as usual. However, three-hour courses will meet for five hours a week, while the two-hour classes will meet for four.

By starting with this session a student may finish his work in three years and four summers and therefore is especially valuable for men subject to the draft.

A feature of the session will be a new offering in the area of the language arts. Drama, forensics, journalism, and literature courses are available, the intent being to inform the student of the basic procedures in one or

more of the fields and to emphasize the problem approach to a study of one of them.

A 24-day study tour via station wagon to Mexico under the auspices of the Salem YMCA will be conducted by trained sociologists this summer with credit offered by Willamette in the field of sociology. Interested persons should contact Gus Moore, general secretary of the YMCA.

In addition to having the services of many of Willamette's present teaching staff, the summer session will welcome as a permanent faculty member Donald Gleckler, who will teach music education, choral literature, and music in society.

Among the visiting faculty will be Dr. Cairns K. Smith, professor of history at Oregon State; Dr. A. Weston Niemela, director of special education and pupil personnel in the Salem public schools; and Dr. Gerald W. Boicourt, supervisor of plant facilities in the Iowa State Department of Public Instruction.

Dr. Myron H. Umbreit, well-known lecturer and author in the field of economics and director of the Chicago division of Northwestern university's school of commerce, will offer three courses during the summer session.

In all, the University will present courses in chemistry, economics, education, English, history, political science, speech and drama, and music.

## Late Wallulah To Be Mailed

A holdup in printing will delay 1953 Wallulahs until the second week in June, necessitating their mailing to students, it was disclosed this week by Jane Notson, editor.

The delay causes a 25 cent mailing fee to be charged each student who will not be on campus that week to pick up his book.

Town students not living in Salem this summer may sign up this week and next week in the bookstore for their yearbooks to be sent to them. Local town students will be able to pick them up in the bookstore in the second week of June, editor Notson said.

Persons living in campus living organizations may sign up for the books through their representative posted in each group.

The 25 cent charge will cover all mailing and handling costs and students will be assured of their Wallulahs if they have listed their addresses correctly and paid the fee.

As part of Willamette's commencement activities, Saturday has been designated Alumni day and will begin with registration of alumni at Lausanne hall at 9 a. m.

Class reunion luncheons will be held at noon, and the Mirror room of the Marion hotel has been reserved for the Alumni day banquet at 6 p. m.

Tickets for commencement will be available to alumni through the alumni office and the president's office. A section has been reserved for the friends and families of seniors and for faculty and trustees, and tickets for it have already been distributed.

According to Pres. Smith, it is hoped that there will be an unreserved section to take care of people who wish to attend at the last minute and who do not have tickets.

## What a Crisis Can Do

Willamette suddenly found herself on the ropes last week—put there by two students, who, in addition to attending this school, employed the touchy business of dope peddling as an occasional sideline. Chuck Lewis and Charlie Naone, students noted chiefly for their athletic prowess, were caught with marijuana by Federal authorities. As a result, we are now faced with the uncomfortable problem of taking stock of ourselves.

If we are to admit that Lewis and Naone have dealt us a blow, just how far does that blow extend, and what is its significance? The two men have made a great error in judgment. Just to what extent each was responsible is unknown, though we suspect, seemingly like everyone else, Naone was far the more innocent of the two. But that does not free either one; we cannot wipe away the reality of their deed. Aside from the fact that two families will suffer infinitely more than the wrongdoers themselves, is it not true, in the face of their act, that they have innocently opened a gash in the side of Willamette university? And does not that gash cut right into the heart of Willamette—the 1000-odd students who attend here?

We are now face to face with ourselves. That can sometimes be a difficult thing. For many, that seems to be the case. How well, then, can Willamette stand up under the blow it has just received?

It is too bad, but often the only way we many times find that we were not born for ourselves alone is when something evil is done. Facing ourselves, we must realize that we each have an individual responsibility to Willamette. Willamette is not the board of trustees, it is not the faculty or administration, it is not the alumni association, but we are Willamette. We can easily cast the blame on any of these other groups, for they are the ones who seem to condone Willamette's high-gear athletic policy with the most enthusiasm. But if any or all of them have been shortsighted and unrealistic by placing too great an emphasis on athletics, why have we not said something before? Why have we not insisted that our athletes, even though they may be athletes only, also uphold the Christian ideals which we solemnly profess to guide us?

Good and evil will always be two opposites. On earth, one must dominate the other, but because of the human element, neither will ever do so completely. If evil has overcome the good we profess to be embodied in the Willamette spirit, as it undoubtedly has in the case of Lewis and Naone, then there are some fences to mend—approximately 1000 fences to mend. And further, the reality of Christian idealism can become unrealistic as the very dickens if we think that the mere profession of its principles as our guide will automatically lift the blame from ourselves. An apologetic attitude or a deliberate suppression of the facts on our part would reveal only too clearly a fundamental weakness beneath the facade of Willamette's lofty ideals. The ideals are there in abstract form; their realization in a practical realm depends upon our actions. Mere words are too often hypo-crisis.

This is clearly a matter for the students of Willamette to deal with. It has become an individual matter for each of us, and if we are to face reality, we and only we can be responsible—by merely mouthing the high standards as we have so often done in the past, or by putting them into action? The success of Willamette in the future may well depend on our answer.

## Another Swan Song

We found a little space in the editorial section of this last Collegian of the year, the second by the new staff, and we would like to fill it by wishing everyone a happy summer. We'll be back at the old stand next fall with the first issue out the Friday of orientation week. To the seniors who are leaving we say goodbye and good luck, and to the returnees, we join with you in looking forward to what may be the best year ever.

## Letter to the Editor

To the Editor:

With all due respect to our student body president, Jim Hitchman, we can not agree with the attitude expressed in his letter to the student body. We do not believe that the approach to the problem as stated is valid: that this situation, involving Naone and Lewis, is concluded and that what is left to us is merely to preserve our "good name and that of Willamette university."

Rather than to attempt to absolve ourselves and the University of responsibility, we feel that this incident is deserving of far more critical (and less emotive) consideration. We feel it

would be of greater relevance to consider some of the underlying and predisposing factors operative in a situation such as this.

Rather than to be concerned about maintaining our so called "good names" it would be more constructive to question some of the attitudes implicit in our campus social structure and policies maintained by the administration.

We hardly feel that the stated approach constitutes a basis for an understanding of and subsequently a change in the attitude structure so well illustrated in this letter to the student body.
