## Mission and Funding of the Oregon Economic Development Department

The Oregon Economic Development Department was created in 1973 as a cabinet-level agency directly accountable to the Governor. Its mission is to help create more and better jobs for Oregonians. It does this by supporting the development initiatives of Oregon's 12 economic regions (a county or group of counties) and 13 key industries—aerospace, agriculture, biotechnology, environmental, film and video, fisheries, forest products, high technology, metals, plastics, professional services, software, and tourism.

The department is overseen by the five-member, bipartisan Economic Development Commission. The commission was established by the Legislature in 1993 to ensure an integrated approach and continuous policy direction that could transcend changes in executive and legislative leadership. Commissioners, appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Senate, serve staggered four-year terms.

The department's investments and services are funded by Oregon Lottery proceeds, federal funds, bond proceeds, and repayments on revolving loans. State lottery funds first were dedicated to economic development in 1984 by a constitutional amendment adopted by voters and expanded to include education in 1995. At year-end 1994 the department had 158 employees organized in five divisions.

## **Oregon Lottery Allocation**

\$768.4 Million 1995-97 Legislatively Approved


Of the total lottery allocation, only \$74.7 million is earmarked directly for economic development.

The balance is divided as follows:
\$572.5 million for education,
\$54.7 million for human resources,
\$23.4 million for natural resources
\$21.2 million for transportation,
\$13.1 million for administration,
\$7.3 million for employment, housing & community development, and
\$1.5 million for public safety.

The percentage of lottery funds allocated to the department by the Legislature for 1995-97 was 9.7%; it is 11% in the budget proposed by the governor for 1997-99. However, the total lottery funds are projected to decrease from \$768.4 million to \$563.7 million; therefore, despite the percentage increase, the department's funding would drop to \$64 million.



The department's actual investments in the Oregon economy—after excluding the Job Training Partnership Act, bonds, the Film & Video Office, and central and field operations—amount to \$110.1 million. Of these, \$36.4 million (33%) go to business and \$73.7 million (67%) go to local governments.
