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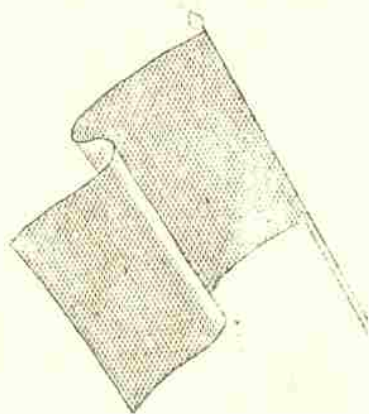

who are classified USN or USN-1, shall include the statement requesting their discharge for the purpose of re-enlistment as A/S, class V-12, USNR and subsequent release to inactive duty.

Second on the option list is a transfer to general enlisted duty. Men taking this option and who have completed recruit training will be transferred to the nearest receiving station in their previous classification and rating for general duty. Those who have not completed recruit training will be transferred in their present classification and rating to USNRC, Great Lakes, Ill., for reclassification and assignment to general duty.

New assignments for the men being transferred to NROTC have not arrived as yet.

Certificates Given Navy Men

Navy certificates will be presented to all navy men who have successfully completed one semester's work at Willamette at a chapel at 11:35 on Friday, October 12. An address will be given by Lt. Kee, and Dean Luther will present the certificates in the presence of Pres. Smith. The music, to be presented by a choral group, will

be under the direction of Dean Geist.

Tomorrow evening will mark the last social event of the summer term, when the traditional "Anchors Aweigh" dance, held each semester in honor of the departing men of the V-12 unit, gets under way.

Guests will come aboard through the bow of an LSS and dance to the melody and rhythm of a five piece Portland orchestra.

Chaperones for the dance will be Dr. and Mr. A. Lovell, Prof. and Mrs. M. Ringnald and Lt. and Mrs. Kee.

Admission will be by program only. These will be distributed in the Collegian office Saturday morning.

The dance will be financed by money from the welfare recreational fund.

Coca-Cola will be available at the club during the dancing.

The affair will be semi-formal and flowers are optional.

Before this semester, certificates were presented only to those completing two or more semesters with a grade point average of 2.0 or above, but with the conclusion of the V-12 program, those men who have satisfactorily completed one semester's work will receive them.

Jim Palmer believes in letting nature take her course. If something good comes along, O.K. He never puts faith in the well laid plans.

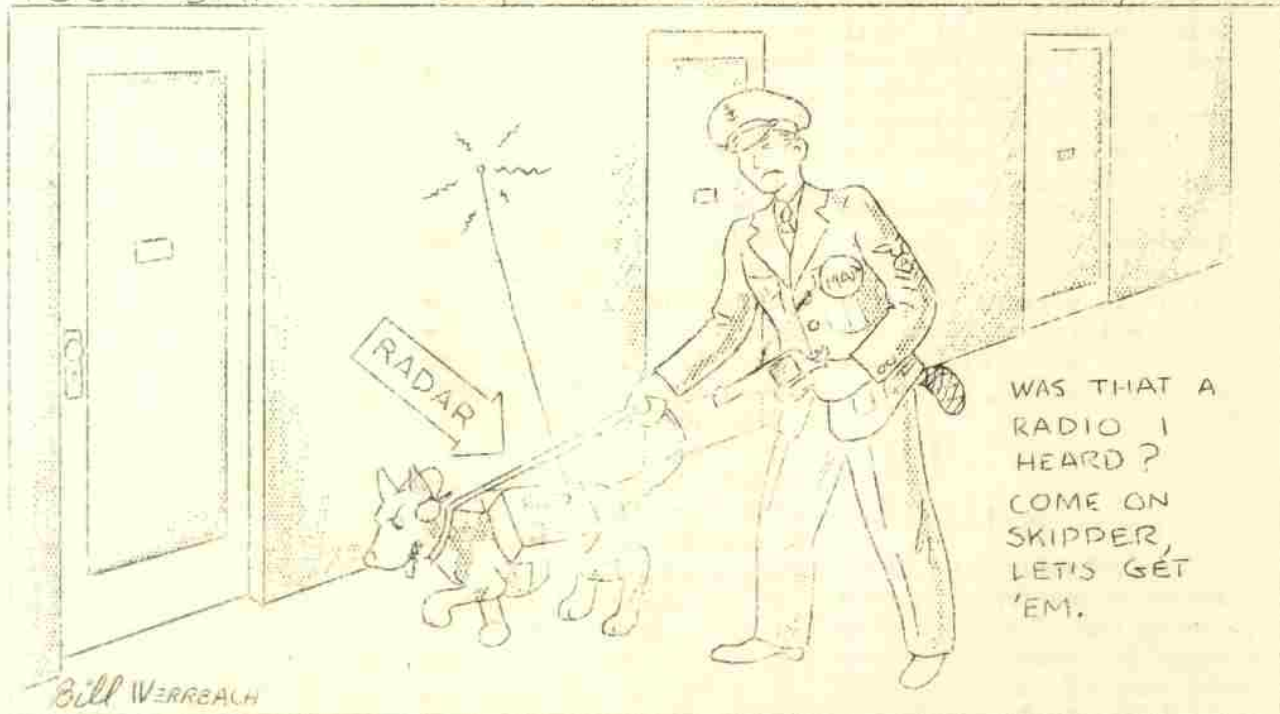
Gerry Litz is planning to stay close to Salem for a few days, then go on to Los Angeles for a stag party, after which he will fly low to his home in Beverly Hills.

OVERTIME PERIOD GIVES B-2 38-37 WIN SEAWOLF LEADS "B" LEAGUE

Showing the true fighting spirit of the Navy B-2 battled A-2 through four fast quarters of rough and tumble basketball Thursday afternoon only to find the score all tied up as the final whistle sounded. The game then went into a five minute overtime period.

Trailing by a slim four point margin throughout most of the contest, A-2 found the range in the final quarter and held the advantage until the closing seconds of play. Jim Cline staged a repeat performance of his last second thrill shot and kept B-2 in the running.

The overtime period was all but over when a disastrous committed by A-2 gave Cline two free tosses at the bucket. The score once more evened up and it was a tense moment as the first shot bounced harmlessly off the backboard.

It was B-2's day though and the heart dropped out of every A-2 player as the second try swished neatly through the net to end the

game. Each team for the contest was led by Jim Cline, with 13 points for B-2 and 12 for A-2 respectively.

Two other teams to fall by the wayside this week at the hands of B-2's team were A-1 and B-1. Saturday morning was the fatal date for A-1, as they watched the score steadily mount until it reached the 53 to 24 mark. B-1 battled their buddies of the second platoon Tuesday afternoon through the scheduled time to a 43-34 score.

A-2 Wins First Round

Ending the first round with a perfect score, A-2 walked off with top honors and a seat on the final playoff for the championship in the inter-collegiate basketball tournament.

Their chances so far have been comparatively good, but as the tourney progresses the competition for the sharpshooters is becoming keener.

Should A-2 win the last round, they will become the tourney champs without a playoff. Currently favored to win the second round is the strong B-2 club. They have only one obstacle marring their path before their hold on the lead spot can be definite. The obstacle is in the form of the fighting little A-1 group.

As the second week of the class "B" basketball tourney ended, we examined the score book and found that the boys from A-2, under the name of USS Sea Wolf, have a good grip on first place. They have won six encounters and lost none. Close behind, however, are the boys from B-1 with one win and no losses to their credit.

Play the past week started out slow as the Sea Wolf Thursday evening defeated the faculty-ship's company team to the tune of 17-15.

Highlight of the contest came when Mr. Brennan became so rattled that he made a very neat shot for two points. The only thing wrong with his shot was that it slipped through the A-2 basket.

Scoring honors went to Chief Steve Kiefer, who swished the net three times for a total of six points.

The game Wednesday night was a slaughter as the A-2 boys won their second game by defeating the B-2 boys of the USS Idaho 40-9. Scoring honors went to Barney Sellers who gathered in 16 points for himself.

Thursday saw the B-2 team get revenge for their beating of the night before by defeating the Oregon team 19-6. Walleston of the winners took scoring honors by collecting three field goals and three foul shots for a total of nine points.
