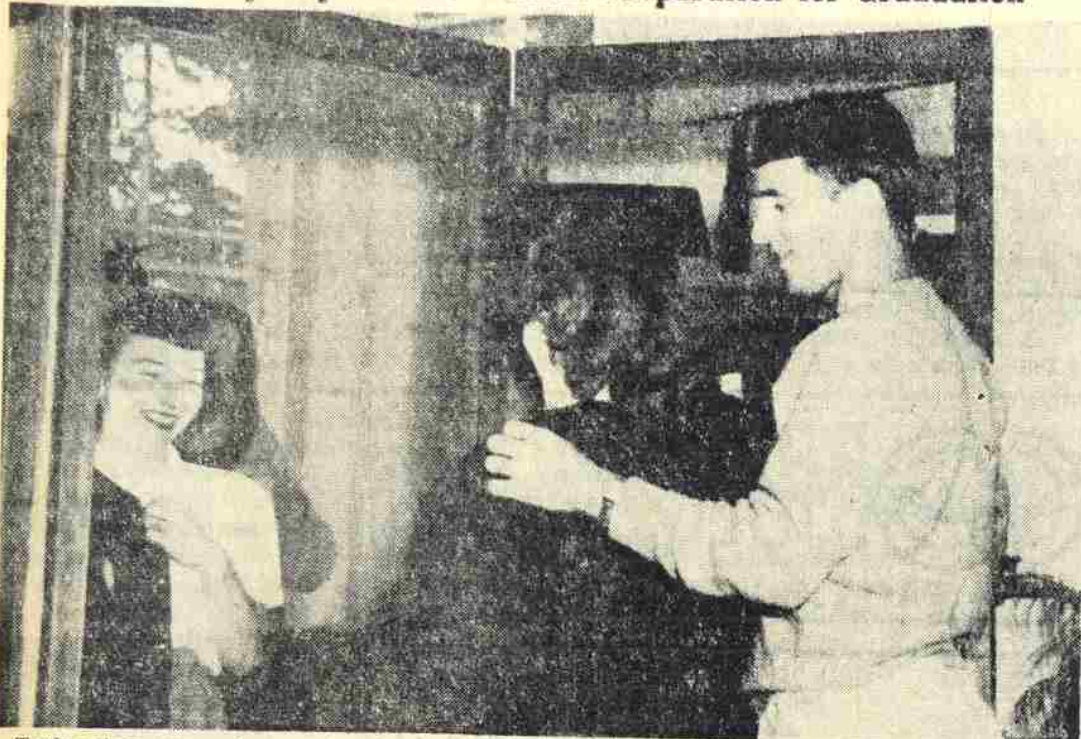


Largest Senior Class Ready For Graduation

Church Baccalaureate Sunday; Commencement Set June 12

With the close of dead week today and the new ruling exempting seniors from final examinations, seniors will be free next week to put the final touches on their marching for commencement ceremonies. The largest graduating class in the history of Willamette, the class of '49 will enter the gymnasium Sunday, June 12, at 3 p.m. to the strains of "Pomp and Circum-

stance" and take their seats on the main floor.

The class of approximately 180 graduates will hear Dr. John L. Knight, former Willamette religion counselor and assistant to the president, give the commencement address. Knight, now Chancellor of Nebraska Wesleyan, will assume the presidency of Baldwin Wallace university this fall.

Edith Fairham will sing the traditional "Farewell to Willamette" at the close of the commencement exercises.

Harrison Speaks Sunday

Baccalaureate services are scheduled at the First Methodist church at 3 p.m. Sunday, with the Reverend Charles E. Harrison speaking on "Lengthening Shadows." Harrison, Methodist minister from Columbus, Ohio, is a Willamette graduate.

Alumni activities will be held on the campus Saturday, June 11, with the annual alumni convocation to be held at 4 p.m., in Waller hall. The alumni banquet in honor of the seniors and their families will be held in Baxter hall at 6 p.m., followed by a reception in Lausanne hall at 8 p.m. Faculty, alumni and friends are invited to attend the reception.

Tickets for commencement have been distributed to seniors and alumni. No tickets are necessary for admission to the baccalaureate services.

Over 200 Students Want to Attend Summer Session

More than 200 persons have expressed an intention to attend summer session at Willamette starting June 20, Registrar Harold Jory announced this week.

After the summer session catalog was issued an adjustment of courses offered by the English department was found necessary. The president's office indicated that because of the lack of demand for English composition, it will not be offered, and in its place Dr. Egbert S. Oliver will offer a course in Great American Writers.

This is a three hour course for upper division students and is a study of the major American authors of the nineteenth century, among them Poe, Hawthorne and Mark Twain.

Rahe Tragedy In California Stuns Campus

The campus was shocked this week to learn of the death of Dr. Herbert Rahe who left Willamette last fall to become head of the dramatics department at Chico State college.

Rahe had led winning forensics teams for 19 years as head of Willamette's speech department. He and his wife were active in the Methodist church while in Salem.

The tragedy occurred last Saturday when his fishing boat capsized in the swift Sacramento river near Chico. He was fishing with Lloyd Jones who was rescued by other fishermen. Jones was professor of drama on the campus last year and is now teaching at Chico State.

College of Music Faculty to Teach, Study in Summer

While the larger part of the student body will forget studies for three months this summer, a few of the members of the faculty of the college of Music will remain on the job during the vacation period.

In addition to setting up next year's program for the College of Music and caring for administrative details, Dean Melvin Geist will teach a limited number of voice students. He plans to interview and advise students who intend to enter the College of Music next term. He will attend a joint meeting of the Music Teachers National Association and the National Association of Teachers of Music in San Francisco commencing August 17.

Band director Maurice Brennan will be directing the Salem Municipal band during July and August with twelve concerts planned by the group. These will be presented on the steps of the capitol building beginning July 7.

Prof. Bennet Ludden will present a special course in the musical literature of Wagner along with other courses here during the summer session while Elwood Ball, instructor in organ, is planning to attend summer school in Michigan. Prof. Ralph Dobbs tentatively plans several concerts throughout the state and will also teach summer students here at the University.

Seniors' Gowns Ready

Seniors are reminded to pick up their caps and gowns in Willamette's bookstore today. A five dollar deposit will be required for the graduation garb but the money will be returned the Sunday of graduation when the caps and gowns are turned in, it was announced by Mrs. Larson, bookstore manager.

Keep Your Heads Up High, Seniors Things Aren't So Tough—Yet

As weary students pack their bags for home after the gruelling week of finals; as struggling professors stagger off the campus with armloads of test papers; and as Schneebies and Toni ready their summer supplies of bones, a little-remembered group of students enter the last week of their college career.

Clad in caps and gowns and armed with diplomas to show prospective employers, the class of 1949 will take its leave of the campus June 12. Facing a slackened employment situation, a still rising cost of living, and for many, their first real crack at the world, they may well wonder about their future.

A look at the past shows some of the events that were rocking the campus in bygone years. In 1938, the library was in first stages of construction, the first of a series of buildings to alter

the campus. As the former Salem post office slowly rolled down the street toward Willamette, Kimball hall was seeing its last days as it was torn down to make room for the new law school.

Graduating seniors of that year were looking forward to a better immediate business cycle, as increased production and a lively farm trade replaced the hard times of the 1929 depression.

No Jobs in '33

From the editorial columns of the Collegian of 1933, came this pessimistic comment. "Out from the sheltering walls of academic 'artificiality'—into what men of experience call world 'reality'; and no jobs. Is that the next step?"

One out of every eight could expect to find a position within two months in that depression year. Though the Wall Street Journal predicts a definitely slackened pace for job-seekers, chances are still heartily in favor of college graduates obtaining work of some kind . . . even though it may be only slightly more than ditch digging.

Service Jobs in '42

An entirely different career awaited the graduates of the class of 1942, especially for the male members. Another Collegian editorial had this to say: "Most of all we're going to miss the last class of normal size and activities to leave WU before the Willamette student body enters the radically different situation, created by all-out war, which will prevail until a time when conditions may once more assume a semblance of normality."

So, dear seniors, things could be worse. At least it isn't as bad as the outlook taken by a columnist one year who wrote, "In a little less than a week, many of us will be members of the largest group in the United States . . . the unemployed."

Things aren't too tough all over—yet!

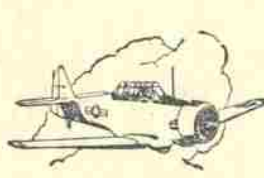
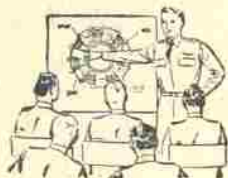
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
