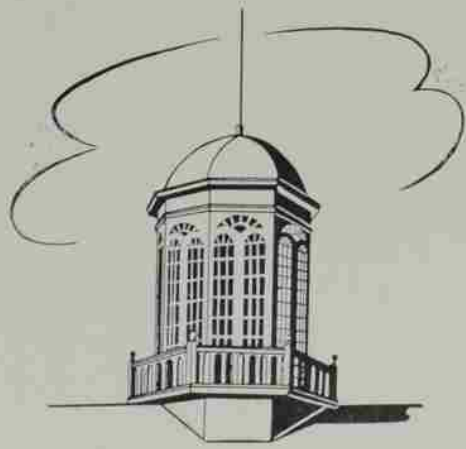

Sorority Houses to Be Built

Both Alpha Phi and Pi Beta Phi sororities are soon to have new residences on the Willamette campus.

These two organizations will initiate a program, authorized by the University's Board of Trustees in the spring of 1961, whereby use of University land and some financial assistance will be granted for such projects.

University Architect, James L. Payne prepared plans for each unit which have mutually been approved by the sororities and the University.

Bids were opened August 7 and construction is to start just as soon as pos-

sible with hope still held that they might be completed by the beginning of the second semester next February.

Each residence will house approximately 45 girls. Both units will be heated via a single central heating system, such as inaugurated two years ago in the new Lucy Anna Lee and Emily J. York women's dormitories.

The Alpha Phi residence will be on the corner of Mill and Winter Streets, facing Winter. The Pi Beta Phi house will be erected on the next lot east, facing Mill. Both will be directly across from the Lucy Anna Lee House.

This program is a continuation of a

pioneering project at Willamette begun several years ago and now finding all University social fraternities housed on campus property.

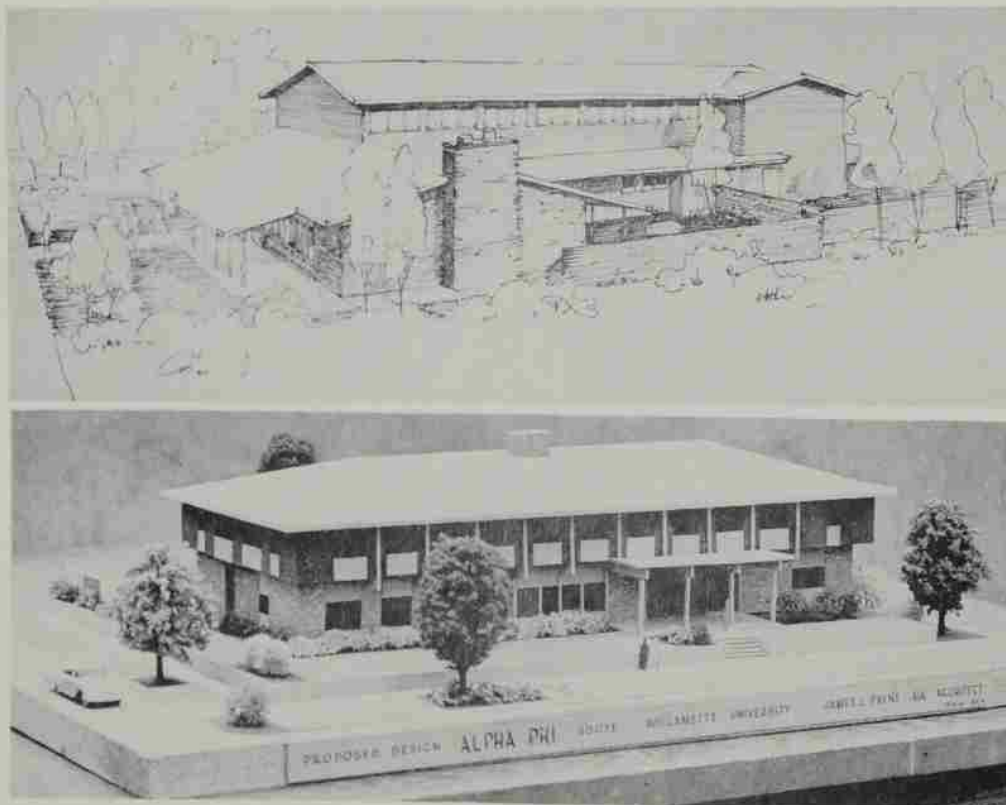
Percy Speaks at Commencement

At Willamette University's 120th annual graduation exercises, June 3, the University awarded degrees to 219 graduates. Receiving honorary degrees of Doctor of Divinity and Doctor of Humanities, respectively, were Rev. Meredith A. Groves, Executive Secretary of the Coordinating Council of the Oregon Methodist Conference, and Mr. Charles H. Percy, chairman of the board of the Bell and Howell Company.

Mr. Percy, commencement speaker, spoke on "The Challenge of a Revolutionary Age."

He recounted the six revolutions he felt this country and its oncoming generation were facing in these, "the most revolutionary times in the history of the human race." In order he listed . . . "a fantastic population explosion; a revolution in scientific discovery; a revolution in military technology; a political revolution of rising expectations among two-thirds of the people of the world in the underdeveloped areas; a reactionary, anti-libertarian, anti-humanistic revolutionary movement, Communism; an economic and political revolution in the ancient cradle of western civilization, Europe; and the beginning of a new period of social, cultural, economic, technological and possibly political change in our own country."

At one point in his speech, he cited the revolution of youth, in which young people are taking over positions of leadership. Mr. Percy is an excellent example. He was elected to the Board of Directors of Bell and Howell at the age of 23, elected president at age 29, and became Chairman of the Board at age 40!

1962 Football Team to Hawaii

Hawaii, here we come!

This might well be the battlecry of the 1962 Willamette football team as it has just been announced that they will wind up their season with a trip to the Islands to meet the University of Hawaii on November 24.

The University of British Columbia, no newcomer to the Bearcats, will visit Salem on October 27 while the 'Cats will tackle a new foe in Central Washington College of Education at Ellensburg, Washington on November 17. The last time that the Central Washington College of Education met the Jasons was in a 1959 clash in Salem, won by Willamette, 37-26. An annual national small college pigskin powerhouse, Humboldt State, will again be played in a September 29 contest at Arcata, California.

The only home afternoon game this fall will pit the 'Cats against arch-rival Linfield College, in the traditional Homecoming contest, on November 3. Parents' Weekend will find Willamette hosting another Northwest Conference foe, College of Idaho, on October 20. As usual all five conference foes will be met during the season but only the two mentioned above are at Salem.

Willamette and the University of Hawaii have met four times previously with the Bearcats never having beaten the Rainbows, and two clashes ending in a tie. They first met in Hawaii in December 1941, as the Jasons lost 20-6. The lone 'Cat touchdown in that game was scored by halfback Ted Ogdahl, current Willamette head coach. Being there at the time of Pearl Harbor, the squad served on beach guard-duty for two weeks before returning home. Ogdahl joined the U.S. Marines there and eventually rose to the rank of Captain.

After two straight ties . . . 21-21 at Salem in 1950 and 7-7 at Honolulu in 1952 . . . the Rainbows won 27-0 at Honolulu in 1957, the last meeting to date of these two clubs. Their clashes have always sparked keen rivalry due to the large number of Islanders, and especially Honolulu boys who have played football for Willamette over the years.

Final details for the Hawaii trip are yet to be completed, but present plans call for the team to fly over on the Wednesday preceding the game and return on Sunday.

Graduates Earn Scholarships

Willamette's 1962 graduates certainly did themselves proud in obtaining their share of honors for those going on to graduate schools. They had received 26 graduate scholarships and assistantships prior to June 3.

Financially, Stanley C. Urbigkeit, Portland, and Nan-Hua Chi led the field. Mr. Urbigkeit, a graduate with honors from the Willamette College of Law, received a \$5000 scholarship for the 1962-63 academic year to study taxation at New York University.

Mr. Chi is returning to his hometown of Pittsburgh to attend Carnegie Tech on a three-year \$6,600 scholarship to earn his Doctor of Philosophy Degree in physics. A physics major at Willamette with a 3.83 point average, Chi also received two scholarships for studies this summer. The first was granted by the National Science Foundation through their undergraduate research program. He worked under Dr. Robert Purbrick, head of Willamette's Physics Department, on a research project already underway. Later in the summer Chi used his second scholarship to study at Columbia University's Summer Institute in Space Physics.

One of the nationally coveted Fulbright International Scholarships went to Miss Marianna Koch of Oregon City. Miss Koch will have all her expenses paid for a year's study at the University of Air-Marseille in southern France. She will study the French language through an intensified study of French literature and history. Miss Koch graduated from Willamette with an outstanding 3.89 grade average.

William S. Junor, Salt Lake City, Utah, received a \$3000 scholarship as a University Fellow in the Faculty of the Political Science Department of Columbia University for the 1962-63 academic year. As a senior at Willamette last year, he was senior scholar in the Political Science Department and was captain of Willamette's "GE College Bowl" team.

Miss Georgia Ferguson, Molalla, was the recipient of a West German Government Study Grant for the 1962-63 year with all tuition, transportation and living expenses paid. She will study the German language, her major at Willamette, and literature at Gottengen University.

Miss Marion Hauke, Astoria, received the Rotary Foundation Fellowship for International Study for the 1962-63 year. She will study political science at the Central University of Caracas, Caracas, Venezuela. All expenses including some

educational travel within Venezuela will be paid for by Rotary International.

Other graduates received scholarships or assistantships in . . . English, business and public administration, mathematics, philosophy, physical oceanography and geophysics, government, law, Asian studies, finance and economics, organic and analytical chemistry, systematic theology and clinical psychology.



Miss Cornelia Otis Skinner

Famed actress and authoress Cornelia Otis Skinner will open the 1962-63 Distinguished Artists Series on the Willamette campus, Wednesday, October 24.

Following her in the Series will be mezzo-soprano Carolyn Stanford on Thursday, December 6; the Komitas String Quartet, Wednesday, January 16; and the Cleveland Playhouse, Thursday, February 28.

The Series will vary its format for the first time this season from its past straight musical fare by presenting two programs of a dramatic nature on the four-production agenda.

Miss Skinner's opening performance will feature an evening of short improvisations. Armenian classical music will be offered by the Komitas Quartet, which will be making its first American tour. The Cleveland Players will present Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest," a time-honored satire poking fun at high British society.

All four programs, sponsored annually by the Associated Students of Willamette University, will start at 8:15 P.M. in the Fine Arts Auditorium. Season tickets go on sale in September and will be available at Stevens and Sons Jewelers in Salem.

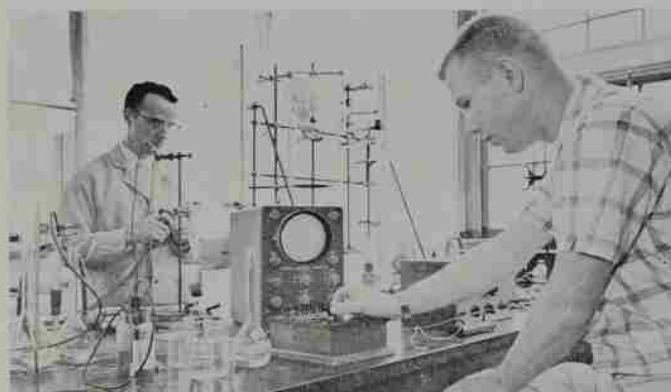
WU and SCIENCE

Telling the age of field mice, studying the inner goings on of molecules and, most of all, turning out good students for the new scientific age have helped put Willamette's science department in a new position of prominence.

The most apparent sign of science's rising star at Willamette will be a new \$200,000 wing adding 40 per cent more space to Collins Hall. Construction began this summer and the addition should be in use by next year.

The fact is underlined as well, however, in less obvious ways: in many thousands of dollars in grants to the university and department from the government, corporations and individuals; in the advent of special Willamette-sponsored science courses during the summer; in nationally recognized faculty research projects; and in the rising number of science majors and in the record they have made in graduate schools and in the world of science.

The coming months will see the addition of more equipment, more faculty members and more

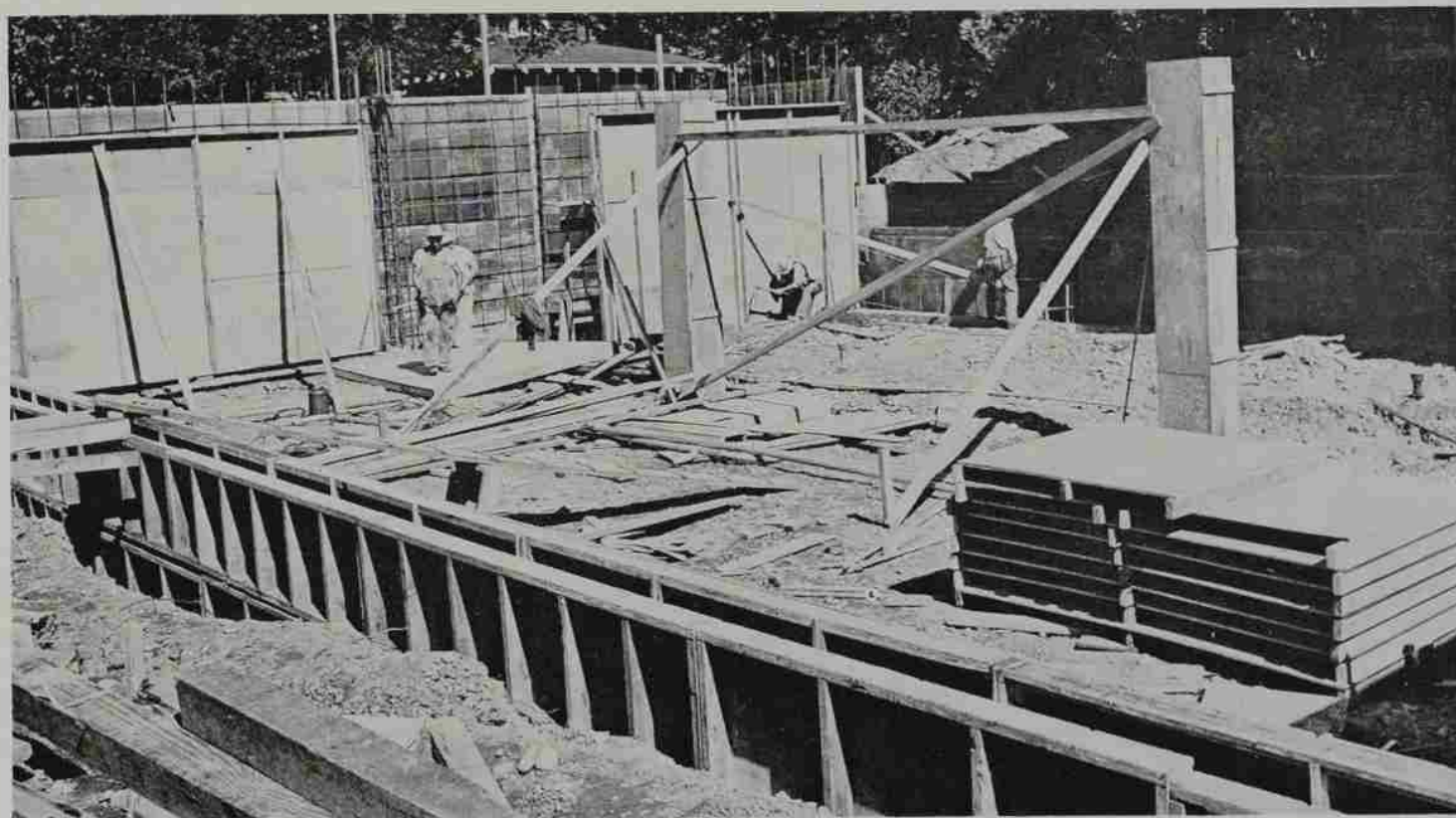


Dr. Paul M. Duell, head of the Chemistry Department, supervises student Bruce Birrell in an experiment using an oscilloscope.

money to help train better science and mathematics students.

Willamette Growing

Some of the expansion has been part of the natural growth of Willamette itself. Part of it has been force-fed by the competition for world science leadership that loosened federal purse strings and set research and training programs in action. Since 1941, when Collins Hall opened, the number

of science majors and the size of the science faculty have doubled.

Sure scientific progress is based on basic research, and a share of this is being provided by Dr. Donald Breakey, under a National Science Foundation grant, in his study of the behavior of Microtine rodents. Dr. Breakey's job is to find a simple way of telling the age of the lowly but abundant field mouse. The solution rates importance because it will provide the key to understanding the strange life cycles of certain rodents which at times become so plentiful they ravage the countryside and strip thousands of acres of farm land. Knowing how to tell the ages of a cross-section of field-trapped Microtines will tell biologists what stage the cycle is in and help them learn more about the imbalance in nature.

Dr. Breakey's first task is to raise a colony of field mice as a control group of known ages.

Molecules Studied

Physics professor Dr. Robert Purbrick, under a \$15,000 National Science Foundation grant (which he has held in previous years, too) is studying the structure of certain molecules. Light given off from molecules of certain elements, such as lithium and sodium (which are seldom found in natural states on earth) are studied through a spectrograph. Analysis of the refracted light tells an interesting story of a strange universe in minia-

ture. It reveals the stresses within the molecule, certain movements and revolutions, relative positions and in a general way a picture of what the molecule looks like.

Such projects, which involve students as well as individual faculty members, will be housed in more elegant and spacious quarters when the Collins science wing is completed.

Willamette's board of trustees gave the go-ahead in January to the addition of a three-story wing on the southwest side of "T" shaped Collins Hall. Planned for use by the second semester this year, the wing ran into construction delays and will be ready probably by the first of next school year.

Rooms Added

The addition will add an animal room, computer room, office-laboratories for faculty use, shops for construction of equipment, additional student laboratories and classrooms, a larger science library and a new seminar room.

Science teachers like to experiment on their own research as well as teach. So the office-labs are needed to provide the kind of working facilities that will attract the best of professors. Students and faculty often make their own equipment as they go. So the metal and wood working shops were included. Dr. Purbrick, for one, designed and made a "bed rack" several years ago for atomic

study experiments. On the market such equipment would cost more than the department could afford.

Funds for more than half of the \$200,000 addition were raised quickly in six months with little fuss. Tektronix Foundation, Portland, provided \$36,000, the biggest of the initial gifts. A gift of \$12,000 came from the will of the late Mrs. Maria C. Jackson, widow of the founder of the Journal Publishing Co. in Portland.

'Causes' Backed

The public loves a good cause and the job of "selling" them on this project was made easier by two things, awareness of the need for more scientific training in the United States, especially that provided along with sound liberal arts education, and the knowledge of the record of science graduates at Willamette.

Among these, one helped develop the solar energy battery, and another was part of the team that discovered anti-proton. Other graduates have made equally good use of their background in science at Willamette as scientists, technicians or engineers, and in medical fields.

Willamette ranks considerably above average in the nation in the number of its students who go on to graduate work. Between 1955-60 graduates in chemistry, physics and mathematics did advanced work in 29 different graduate schools, and this provides a means of comparing Willamette with other schools, a pleasing comparison on Willamette's part. A Columbia University dean was prompted to write Willamette last spring a thank you note because of three students. "... We would like to have a school full of boys like these. Our congratulations to Willamette for the excellent job it is doing in preparing these men for professional work for us."

WU Ranks High

In a recent study of college production of scientists, Willamette ranked fourth on the West Coast in percentage of its students who went on to earn doctorates in science. Between 1950-59, Willamette had 33 former students who obtained medical degrees, placing it second on the coast in production of doctors.

Faculty research is a prestige item in the science fraternity, as it is in liberal arts fields. And in science at Willamette, research does double duty.

It yields useful scientific data and trains students in practical science work.

In addition to projects by Dr. Purbrick and Dr. Breakey, several others on the faculty are in special experiments. Dr. Cecil Monk, head of the Biology Department, is working on a comparative physiology project with a Faculty Research Grant from the National Science Foundation through the Zoology Department at the University of Washington.

Dr. Paul M. Duell, head of the Chemistry Department, has done work in spectrophotometry, among other things, under the National Science Foundation, before coming to Willamette.

Coinciding with Dr. Purbrick's project, a \$5,000 Science Foundation grant pays six outstanding physics students for summer work on his project, thus giving them more time to develop their talents.

Other Grants Given

Other grants have been given for various purposes.

One grant of \$20,000 from the Research Corporation of New York went to the Chemistry Department for expansion of the department and for curriculum review. Some of the expected results:

Addition of a third professor specializing in physical chemistry.

New spectrophotometry equipment for inves-

tigating materials in infra-red, visible and ultra-violet light (this will serve mostly for research projects, but will be used in instruction also).

Separate laboratories for analytical, organic and physical chemistry.

Research stipends for select undergraduates for summer research.

Review of course offerings with an eye to updating and expanding content.

And other new equipment.

Atomic Grant Given

The Physics Department received an Atomic Energy grant of \$2,300, a General Electric grant (received last year and renewed for 1962-63) and another National Science Foundation grant of \$5,100 (the second such received by the department). Other gifts have come from such corporations as Esso, Texaco, Shell (which gave \$500 to the Chemistry Department) and Carnation.

Willamette's science department made itself available this summer in bringing valuable science training to two important outside groups.

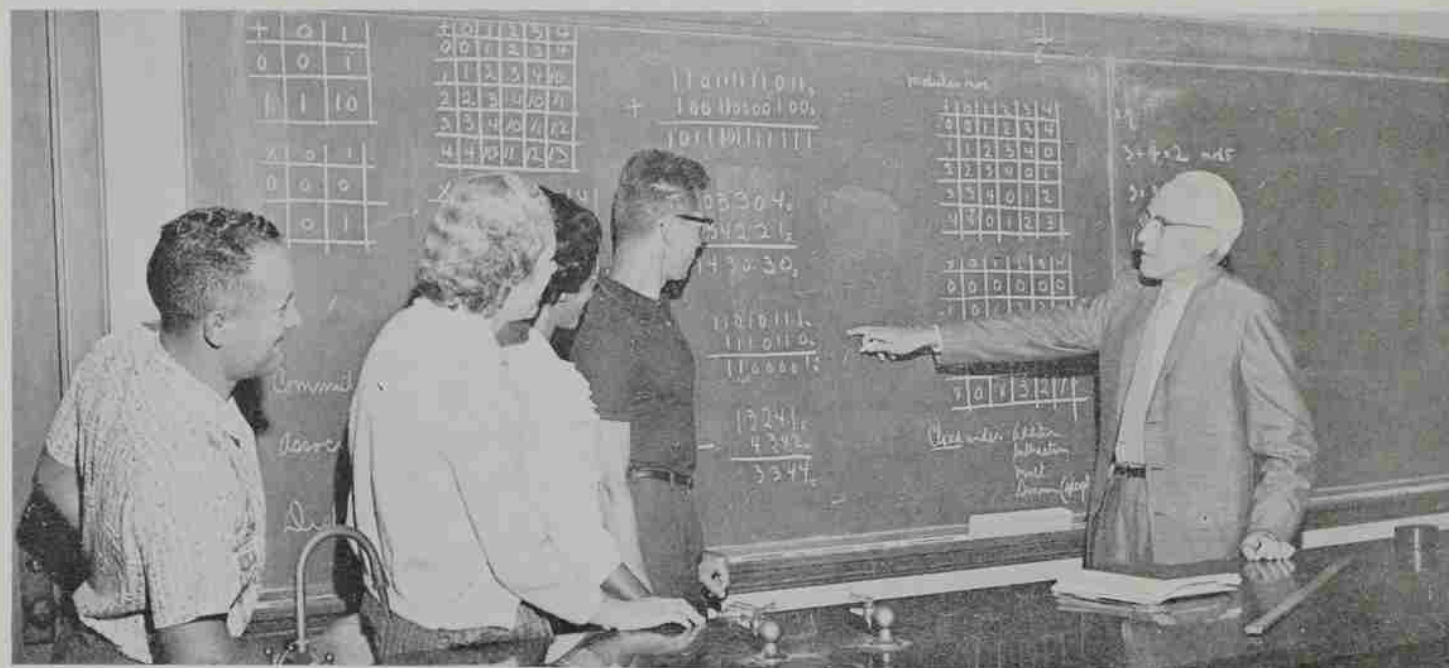
For the second consecutive summer, the University was host to the Junior Engineers' and Scientists' Summer Institute, providing two weeks of science training to 167 top ranking high school girls from six states. Immersed in such courses as zoology, mathematics, astronomy and chemistry,

the girls got a taste of college life that may turn many of them to important science careers.

Institute Held

Of more widespread effect was the National Science Foundation's Summer Institute in general science for junior high school teachers of science and mathematics. The government paid Willamette \$47,000 to prepare a refresher course for teachers, and the University chose to invite junior high teachers. Picked from 400 applicants nationwide were 53 whose science training needed updating to help them keep their students abreast of modern scientific developments.

The future of science at Willamette appears to hold more growth to meet the ever increasing demands of national defense and of industry. Experience has taught the need for more advanced courses in theoretical physics, chemistry and mathematics. Basic research in heredity and life processes will require new approaches in biology. Survey courses in physical science are being displaced by geology and physical geography sequences in earth science. Entirely new approaches are being devised for teaching elementary and advanced courses in each of the sciences. Teaching machines, television, new demonstration techniques, scale models, new instruments, all will make material contributions to improving science teaching and to developing the highest potential of each student.

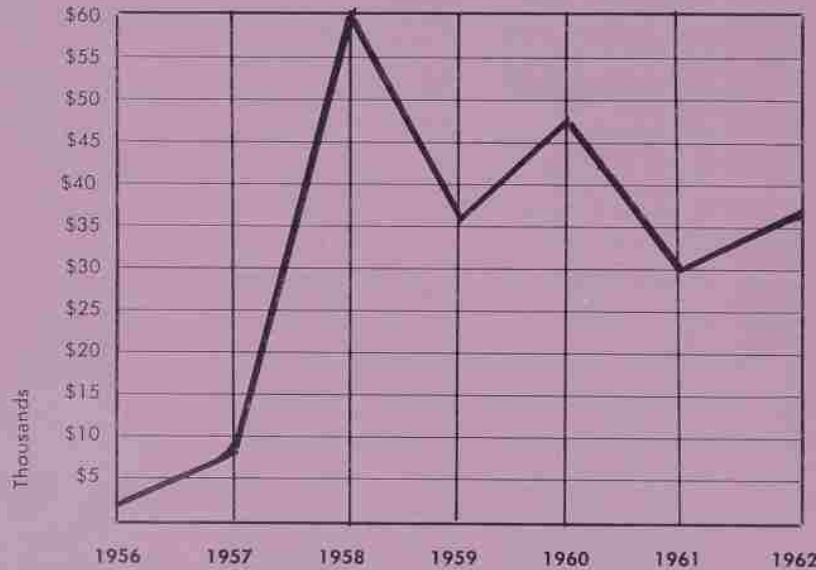

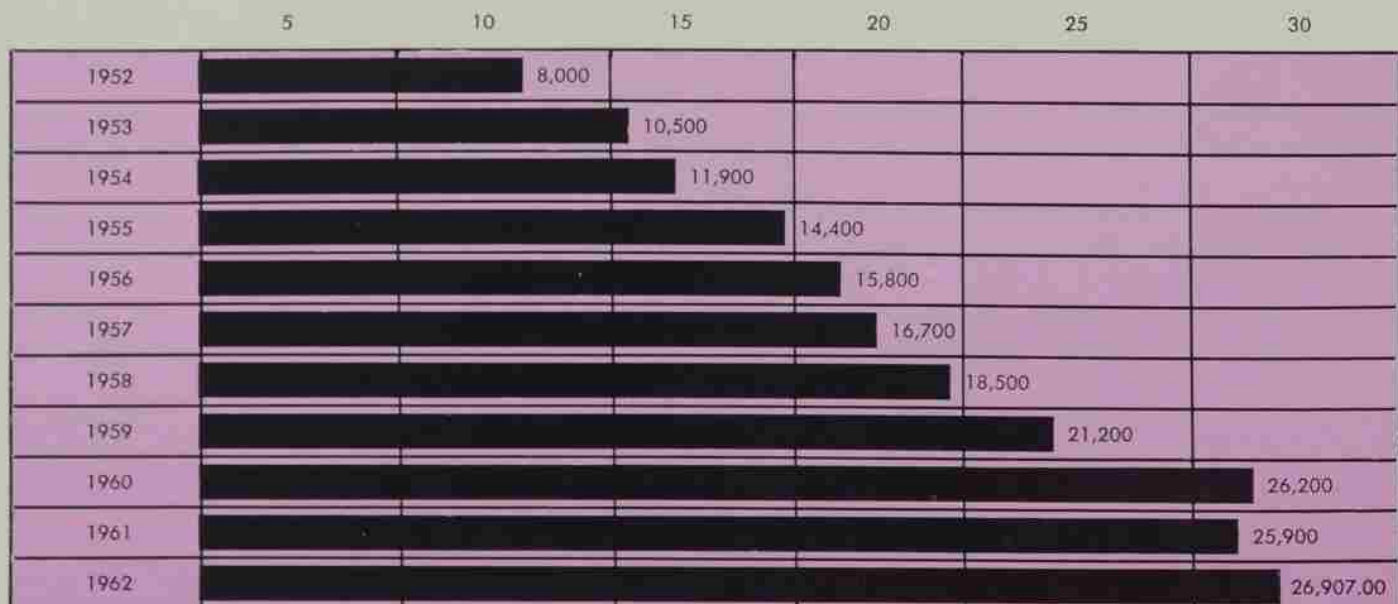
