

The student, while pursuing these branches, has access to all the other departments of the University. Commercial pupils should duly appreciate this privilege. Merchants should be men of culture. NORMAL.

During the Winter Term, those who desire to prepare themselves for teachers, receive special instruction in the theory and practice of teaching.

PRIZES.

Rhetorical prizes will be awarded on the following conditions: There must be eight competitors, two from the Hesperian and two from the Concordia, two from the Alka and two from the Athenæum Literary Society, chosen by the members of each Society respectively. Of the eight thus chosen, the one proving the best in Declamation or Recitation at a Rhetorical Contest during Commencement Week, shall receive a gold medal, and the next in excellence shall receive a silver medal.

Prizes will also be awarded to those students who shall write the best letters. Topics, items of news, &c., will be suggested at the time. Composition, penmanship, spelling, neatness, folding, date and address, will all be taken into consideration by the judges.

MERIT AND DEMERIT.

A daily record is kept of the scholarship, attendance and conduct of each student, an abstract of which is read publicly at the close of each Term and sent to parents and guardians when requested. One receiving lower than 70 per cent. cannot advance with the class. In making up the standing, no allowance is made for absences except such as are recorded after the Teachers have been duly notified of the sickness of a student.

In the record of demerits, ten subject the student to public reproof, and twelve to suspension. An unexcused absence from recitation counts one demerit.

ATTENDANCE.

The interest of the Institution require that every student shuld be scrupulously punctual in his attendance at recitation, chapel and all daily school duties as well as at church on Sabbath. Whenever a student enters the Institution, he is regarded as subject to its laws until his connection therewith is closed either by graduation, honorable dismission or the enforcement of discipline.

ADMISSION.

Certificates of honorable dismission are required from those who have been members of other Colleges.

DEGREES.

Students completing the Classical Course, receive the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and those completing the Scientific Course, the degree of Bachelor of Science. Ladies are admitted to either course and receive the same degrees. The degree of Master of Arts may be conferred in course upon every Bachelor of Arts of three years' standing, who, during the interval, has sustained a good moral character. Degrees will be conferred only upon those who apply to the Secretary of the Board of Tustees at least two weeks before commencement, advancing the usual fee of five dollars.

APPARATUS.

During the past year, Mr. J. E. Strong, an accomplished electrician and thorough workman, has put the apparatus in good repair and added several new pieces. We now have an excellent Philosophical apparatus.

LIBRARY.

The Library numbers over 2,000 volumes. It is rich in old and standard authors and contains also many new works.

TUITION.

Tuition is required in advance. Students, whose tuition remains unpaid one week after date of entrance, will not be permitted to recite. All bills must close with the Term. In case of protracted sickness, credit will be given on a following Term. Money will not be refunded in any case. Those who suspect they cannot finish a Term and pass the examinations, should not enter the School. The President is pledged to execute these regulations.



ANNUAL ANNOUNCEMENT.

SESSION OF 1873~'74.

The Eighth Regular Course of Lectures will commence with the Public Address on the evening of the Fourth day of November, 1873.

Six Lectures will be given daily, with the exception of Saturdays, and the Session will continue for the space of four months.

A Preliminary Course of Lectures will commence on Monday, the sixth day of October, and continue until the opening of the regular session. This Course embraces one Lecture and Recitation daily upon special and practical subjects. No charge will be made to Matriculants. Anatomical material supplied as needed.

The Department of Instruction in Medicine connected with the University, has steadily increased in usefulness and strength, and under the care of the Board of Trustees and members of its Faculty, has perfected a permanent organization.

In order to further the interests of the College by advancement with the progress of Medical Science, and also to carry out the wishes of the American Medical Association, as expressed in a resolution adopted at their annual meeting in San Francisco in May, 1871, whereby they "recommend a Chair of Hygiene, Independent of Physiology, to be established in all our medical schools, and constituted a requisite curriculum, preliminary to that diploma which confers one of the highest honors of the profession," the Faculty have, in concurrence with the Trustees, created the Chair of Hygiene, and elected Dr. O. P. S. Plummer as its Professor.

We have also added the Chair of Opthalmology and Otology, which will be filled by Dr. J. B. Pilkington, of Portland.

CHANGE OF LOCATION.

The Faculty of the Department of Medicine and Surgery, finding that the appartments allotted them in the University were insufficient to meet their requirements, and also that by being so far from the business center of the city it

was inconvenient both to the Lecturers and the Patients who avail themselves of the Dispensary, have secured and fitted a suit of rooms in Moores' large brick block on Commercial street, where every convenience can be obtained. This arrangement will afford a large increase of clinical instruction.

Medical Clinics three times a week in the Dispensary adjoining the Lecture Rooms; also every second Wednesday at the State Penitentiary.

Surgical Clinics every Saturday from 11 to 12 A. M. Also, in addition to the above named facilities for clinical instruction, there will be a general clinic once a week at the Oregon Home for the Relief of the Sick, which institution is now being constructed and will be large enough to accommodate 50 patients, with all the modern appliances for the successful management of all classes of disease (except contagious.) This institution will be under the especial charge of Professors of Surgery, Obstetrics and Anatomy.

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION.

The candidate must be twenty-one years of age, and must present proper testimonials of a good moral character, and satisfactory evidence of having studied medicine three years (lectures included) with a reputable practitioner of medicine.

He must have attended two full courses of Lectures, the last of which shall be in this institution.

He must submit to the Faculty an acceptable thesis on some medical subject and pass a satisfactory examination.

For an ad eundem degree, a Diploma from a regular Medical College, and a satisfactory examination in the practical branches, with the usual fee.

The fee for a full course of Lectures, is \$110 00. Matriculation fee (paid but once) \$5 00. Graduation fee, \$30 00. Demonstrator's ticket, \$10 00.

Students on arrival, are requested to call on the Dean, who will provide for their accommodation, and furnish any information required.

Letters addressed to the Dean will receive prompt attention.


