# Prof. Clark Named Alumni President

*Alums Elect Clark, Blatchford, Downs, Pollock in Heaviest Balloting Since 1947*

Prof. W. W. Herman Clark, '14, was elected president of the Willamette Alumni Association this month, in the heaviest balloting by alumni since 1947. The president-elect, who succeeds Walter E. Erickson, will assume his duties in June for a two-year period.

Prof. Clark received both his B.A. and M.A. degrees from Willamette and later did graduate work at the Universities of California and Washington.

Prior to his appointment on the university faculty in 1923, Prof. Clark held teaching positions in the Astoria and Salem high schools. For six years he was assistant principal at Salem high.

Originator of Freshman Week on campus, Prof. Clark is perhaps best known to thousands of alumni as the gentleman who annually awards the coveted Freshman Glee banner. His delivery of the honor has become as much a part of Willamette as has the unique contest itself.

In June, the newly-elected alumni president will retire as professor of physical science after 29 years service at Willamette.

Alumni voting also named Dr. R. C. Blatchford, '27, to serve on the executive committee for a term of three years. He replaces W. W. Herman Clark.

Two new members elected to the board of trustees are Mrs. Chester Downs, '23 and Dean Pollock, '22. They will serve a three-year term, ending in 1955. This will be Pollock's second term on the university board.

## Dr. Poling to Deliver Baccalaureate

Dr. Paul N. Poling, '25, of whom it is said is a member of one of the nation's most famous families of ministers, will address the baccalaureate service on Sunday, June 1, in the First Presbyterian church.

Dr. Poling was unanimously chosen pastor of the Salem First Presbyterian church beginning February 1.

Dr. Poling trained for the ministry at Princeton Theological seminary and has held pastorates in New Jersey and El Paso, Texas. He received his doctorate at Trinity college in San Antonio.

Dr. and Mrs. Poling (nee Olive Tomlinson '25) are the parents of three sons.

## Newly Designed 'Alum Day' Set for May 31st

A newly designed Alumni Day for 1952 will be introduced on Saturday, May 31. Innovation in this year's day for alums will include an Alumni University special course for grads; abolition of the regular business meeting; a campus open house; and a fully planned banquet program which will incorporate new business.

Registration will begin at 9 a. m. in Lausanne Hall. First period in the Alumni University will be held at 10 a. m., with Prof. Herman Clark, professor of physical science, speaking on "Oregon—Geological Wonderland."

Dr. R. Ivan Lovell, head of the history department, will offer a lecture on "The British Problem" at 11 a. m. An author, lecturer and historian, Dr. Lovell was born in London and did undergraduate work at the University of London before studying at the University of Michigan and Harvard.

Dr. Cameron Paulin, professor of art, will present the third period in the special course for grads. He will conduct an informal discussion on "Art and Its Relationship to Liberal Arts" at 2 p. m. A special all-campus student show will be on display in the art building.

Fourth lecture in the series will be handled by Dr. Robert Purbrick, specialist in nuclear physics, who will speak on "Exploding Atoms" at 3 p. m. Dr. Purbrick recently completed construction of a \$2,000 spectrograph at Willamette to be used in the search of undiscovered molecules. The instrument is one of the largest in the country.

All classes will be held in Collins Hall, with the exception of the art lecture by Dr. Paulin which will be conducted in the art building.

Individual class reunion luncheons have been scheduled at 12:30 p. m. The class of '27, celebrating its 25th anniversary, will meet in the Camellia room of the Senator hotel, at 12:30 p. m.

All buildings on campus will be open from 4 to 5 p. m. for inspection by alums and friends.

The annual Alumni Day banquet will start at 6 o'clock in Baxter Hall, with Alumni President Walter E. Erickson presiding. Appearing on the program will be Dr. G. Herbert Smith, Prof. W. W. Herman Clark, the faculty string trio and Betty Jean Mullin. New business and presentation of the Matthew Medallions will be made at this time. Willamette's color movie will be shown following the banquet.

## Five Awards to Be Given AFROTC

Five annual awards will be granted for the first time to AFROTC cadets during the Presidential Review on May 27, according to Maj. Norman W. Campion, head of the Willamette unit.

An Air Force Association Outstanding Achievement Medal will be awarded to one of 243 cadets. The award is presented annually to the outstanding cadet at more than 100 colleges and universities throughout the country.

Outstanding member of the rifle team will be presented an award by American Legion Capital Post No. 9. The post has elected to sponsor an annual award for the rifle team member who has contributed the most for the advancement of the Willamette team, to be selected by the American Legion.

Governor Douglas McKay will present a Governor's Pennant to the outstanding squadron of the Willamette AFROTC. Two pennants will be presented to the winning group; one will show the state's colors of blue and gold and the other will fly university colors of cardinal and gold.

Squadrons will be judged on the neatness, smartness and military drill formations during the drill hour on May 20. The award is to be placed on the guidon of the chosen squadron and remain in place until the competition is renewed next year.

An award will be presented to the most outstanding drill team member by the Salem Elks organization. The award will go to the drill team member who has contributed the most for the advancement of the Willamette AFROTC drill teams.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars, Marion Post No. 661 is sponsoring an annual award for the most outstanding Air Science basic student. Selection of the recipient will be based on academic grades, air science grades and leadership.

## Music Scholarships Established This Month

A new four year music scholarship, the Helena Willete Wallace scholarship, and a new university award, the Mrs. Walter A. Denton Memorial Award in Music, were established this month.

The Helena Willete Wallace scholarship, founded by Paul B. Wallace, will be awarded annually and offer the recipient full tuition. Established in honor of his late wife, Helena Willete Wallace, Paul Wallace also founded the Nancy Black Wallace music scholarship in memory of his mother, in 1945.

Mrs. Wallace was associated with many social and educational affairs at Willamette. She took an active interest in the establishment of the university chapter of Pi Beta Phi sorority and became a member of the chapter.

The Mrs. Walter A. Denton Memorial Award in Music has been established by the Salem Federated Music clubs and will be presented annually to a piano major at the end of the junior year. In establishing the memorial award to Mrs. Denton, the Salem Federated Music club is paying special recognition of her loyalty to Willamette, her interest in students of music and her devotion to music as an art.

## "Around the Campus"

**Dr. Robert L. Purbrick**, '42, associate professor of physics, has been elected president of the Oregon section of the American Association of Physics Teachers, which includes members from both Oregon and Washington. Dr. Purbrick addressed the conference, which met in late April, on "An Electrical Method for Solving the Lens Equation," which has been accepted for national publication in the September, 1952, issue of the "American Journal of Physics" . . . **Dr. Arthur H. Maynard**, acting assistant professor of religion, is serving as dean of the Leadership Training School sponsored by the Salem Ministerial Association. Approximately 150 are enrolled in the school which is accredited by the Commission on General Christian Education.

**Fifty-three students** composed the touring Willamette a cappella choir during spring vacation. The 13-day trip took the group as far south as Redwood City, Calif. . . . **Bohus Benes**, nephew of the ex-president of Czechoslovakia, has been signed as a visiting instructor during the summer session. This will be the third summer that the ex-newspaper correspondent and member of the diplomatic corps of Czechoslovakia has been on campus . . . Four eminent artists, **Marian Anderson, Jan Peerce, Joseph Szigeti and Ana Maria's Spanish Ballett** will appear on the University's Distinguished Artist Concert series for 1952,53, it has been announced by Phil Ringle, student manager.

More than \$3,000 was realized from a public auction sponsored by the Salem Rotary Club with proceeds to be used for the **Rotary Scholarship Fund** at Willamette. The fund provides tuition for six students . . . An article, "Middle of the Road," by **Dean Seward P. Reese** of the law school, was selected for April publication in the national bi-monthly, "Vital Speeches." Dean Reese's speech, which was delivered at a meeting of the Women's Republican Club of Marion County, was carried as lead article. Content was concerned with Dwight D. Eisenhower, Presidential Candidate, stressing a middle of the road philosophy toward government and economics.

**Freshman Glee**, under the managership of Reuben Menashe, was broadcast to a coast-to-coast audience this year, through the facilities of the Liberty Broadcasting System. The hour program, "Highlights of Freshman Glee," was taped and edited by KOCO program manager, **Carl Ritchie**, '49 . . . **Dr. Edward C. Kollmann**, associate professor of philosophy, has been named to serve on the committee for the Pacific Conference on Teaching Philosophy . . . **Prof. Lestle Sparks** attended the National Convention of the American Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation in Los Angeles, in mid-April.

Five members of the Law faculty traveled to Berkeley for the Conference of Western Law Schools, April 25 and 26. Attending the meeting were **Edwin Butler, Charles Jens, Roy Lockenour, John Paulus** and **Dean Seward Reese**. Dean Reese and Prof. Paulus both appeared on the program . . . A new course in personnel management for air force reservists is being offered by Willamette. **Prof. A. Freeman Holmer** is teaching the special six months subject. Willamette is one of three colleges in Oregon to be selected by the Air Force to offer the course.

Making it a trio of civic organization presidents from Willamette, **Dr. Robert D. Gregg**, dean of the liberal arts college, was named president of the Salem Rotary club in April. **Dr. Robert Fenix** and **Maurice Cohn** are head executives of the Salem Chamber of Commerce and the Salem Jayvees, respectively.

Final scores of **AFROTC teams** entered in the 31st annual William Randolph Hearst ROTC rifle competition revealed that Willamette, which entered two rifle teams, placed in the 112th and 158th slots. The WU teams, which had only two months training before entering the matches, led veteran rifle teams from New York university, Universities of Idaho, California, Duke and Harvard. There were 220 college teams entered from 146 AROTC units throughout the country . . . **Dean Graunke**, instructor in drama, has been appointed to the summer staff of the Manhattan Theatre Colony operated in conjunction with the famous Ogunquit Playhouse in Ogunquit, Maine. Graunke was named to the position by John Lane, director of the unit for the 10 week summer session.

**Bob Batchelder**, sophomore, and **George Buland**, junior, have been chosen to usher at the national Republican convention in Chicago, July 7 . . . **Paul G. Hoffman**, chairman of the advisory board of the Citizens' Committee for Eisenhower, addressed the Willamette student body at May 13 convocation. He spoke on "Youth in Politics."

Gaining national recognition as a novelist is Mrs. Martha Ferguson McKeown, '23, who has authored three best sellers . . . "The Trail Led North," "Them Was the Days" and "Alaska Silver."

A further tribute to Mrs. McKeown's writing ability was the selection of her "The Trail Led North" by the Library of Congress for publication in braille. The three books concern the life of her Uncle Mont Hawthorne, and his fabulous adventures in the wilds of the untamed west and Alaska.

Head of the San Francisco bureau of the New York Times is Lawrence E. Davies, '21. He began his career on the Portland Telegram . . . then to Paris and a job with the illustrious Paris Herald . . . returning a few years later, he joined the staff of the New York Times, stationed at Philadelphia. He has been west coast representative for the renowned New York newspaper since 1941 . . . in his position Davies directs all news gathering activities from San Jose, Calif., to British Columbia.

Literally born to the print is Fred Lockley, whose father was a journalist and a newspaper publisher. The younger Lockley began his illustrious journalistic career at the bottom of the ladder, carrying a route for the Butte Inter-Mountain . . . the Lockleys later moved to Kansas where his father purchased the Arkansas City Traveler and the younger Lockley "became a printer's devil, sporting the good type in the 'hell box,' and learned to 'kick the Gordon jobber' and feed a flat-bed press."

When 21, Lockley became manager of the Capital Journal in Salem . . . later he was employed as field editor of the Pacific Homestead . . . in this capacity he traveled all over western Oregon on a line-back buckskin horse, interviewing farmers and pioneers.

He worked on the Oregon Statesman before entering Willamette, graduating in 1895 . . . in 1900 Lockley was in Nome, Alaska, where he worked with the Nome Nugget . . . and was also correspondent with the Spokesman Review . . . in 1901 he purchased a quarter interest in the Pendleton East Oregonian . . . four years later he sold his interest to become general manager of the Pacific Monthly . . . when the Pacific was sold to Sunset, Lockley transferred his activities to the Oregon Journal where he authored a daily column on the editorial page. The column, "Fred Lockley's Impressions," has continued until today, appearing in the Sunday Journal.

One of Willamette university's greatest contributions to the field of journalism was Ralph Barnes, '22... who was killed in an airplane crash in Yugoslavia on November 18, 1940, while on the job as a foreign correspondent.

Among his outstanding assignments were the Gertrude Ederle channel swim and Lindbergh's Paris arrival in 1927... when employed with the Paris Herald. In the book, "Paris Herald: The Incredible Newspaper," Barnes, to whom the publication was dedicated, was described by the author Al Laney, as the most vivid personality among newspapermen of the World War II period. Laney adds that he was one of the greatest reporters that ever lived.

Holding one of the high positions in newspaper advertising in this country today is Barney Cameron, '34, who was recently appointed circulation director of both the United States and foreign service of the New York Herald-Tribune.

Cameron began his career in Los Angeles, where he was named to reorganize the circulation system of the Examiner... three years later he was called back to Portland to manage distribution for the News-Telegram... a few years later he became circulation manager of the Seattle Star... from there he was named circulation manager for the Pittsburgh Post Gazette... then to his recent appointment on the Herald-Tribune.

## Mock Conclave Makes West Coast History

### Twelve Oregon Colleges and Universities Name Eisenhower as Republican Nominee In Two-Day Fiery Political Convention

The Willamette campus was ablaze with political fire, May 9 and 10, as representatives from 12 Oregon colleges and universities gathered in Salem for the Willamette Mock Republican convention, first of its kind to be held on the west coast.

The highly successful conclave resulted in naming General Dwight D. Eisenhower as Republican nominee for the presidency of the United States, with Harold E. Stassen, vice presidential nominee.

The Willamette mock convention, which was voted into existence by the entire student body last October, marked the first step in a new experiment in the educational history of the west coast. Under the able chairmanship of Bob Small, senior in political science at the university, it was patterned after the 92-year-old Oberlin mock convention in Ohio.

Participating students voted to make this year's Willamette conference Republican, as next year will be a crucial period for the GOP. Also, an "out" party convention offers the greatest latitude for interest. The convocation, however, was not affiliated with Republican groups within the state, but was the cooperative effort of the stu-

dent body associations of the various participating universities and colleges.

The 280 delegates and alternates represented states and territories rather than candidates. Instructions were sent from the central committees of each state and territory, in an attempt to make the result of the Willamette meeting as near as possible to that of the national nominating convention to be held in July.

Harold E. Stassen, candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, opened the two-day convention with a talk Friday afternoon in the gymnasium.

Among the dignitaries present for the Saturday meeting were Senator Frank Carlson, Kansas, who was guest speaker at the Saturday evening banquet; Senator Wayne Morse, Oregon, who served as keynote speaker and honorary chairman at the nominating session, and Governor Douglas McKay, Oregon.

General Eisenhower won the nomination at 1 a. m. Sunday morning on the fifth ballot with an unofficial total of 693 votes to California Governor Earl Warren's 465. Harold E. Stassen won the nomination for vice-president on the second ballot an hour later.

## *Sports*

At this writing the annual Northwest conference track championships had not yet been held (they are set May 17 at Walla Walla), but even disregarding the title prospects, Willamette's Bearcats can call this one of the most successful cinder seasons in their history.

In Coach Chester Stackhouse's final season at the helm, the Methodists have cracked three all-time records in addition to tying another mark twice. The 'Cat squad, spiced with veterans and promising freshmen, sailed through its first dual meets unbeaten, the string including wins over Linfield, Pacific, Portland university and Whitman.

At this stage of the campaign Stackhouse's men and the Lewis and Clark Pioneers are considered the ones to beat in the conference meet at Walla Walla. These two potent squads were to collide in the season's final dual meet at McCulloch stadium Saturday, May 10.

New Willamette marks in the javelin, mile and pole vault have been established this season and Bill Van Horn twice ran the 100 in 10 flat to tie the standard held by Ted Mertz and Brazier Small.

Stan Neperud set a new record in the javelin early in the season as he tossed the spear 206 feet, 4 inches to better the former mark of 203 feet 8 inches made by teammate Bob Hall last season.

ran a 4:30.1 mile against Whitman Saturday, May 3, to surpass the old standard of 4:31 set by Claude Cook back in 1932. The other freshman record-smasher is Ray Fretheim of Medford, who soared 12 feet 6 3/8 inches against Whitman to topple the previous mark of 12 feet 6 inches held by Rex Putnam (1941) and Jack and Bill Vincent (1926).

## Bearcat Baseball Title Hopes Dim

An ill-fated road trip into eastern Washington and Idaho, that cost Coach John Lewis' Willamette tossers three defeats in four starts, severely damaged the Bearcats' title hopes in the 1952 Northwest conference campaign.

The Methodists went east with a 2-1 mark in the conference standings and split a pair of games with the College of Idaho Coyotes but dropped both ends of a twinbill with Whitman's Missionaries.

On their return the Willamettes notched a 10-2 victory over Pacific Badgers to make their conference record 4-4 at this writing.

Lewis' one pitching veteran this season is Righthander Mike Glenn. The remainder of his hill staff is comprised entirely of freshmen, headed by Andy George, big righthander from New Jersey, who is regarded as a real comer. Other members of the staff are Benny Holt of Hawaii, Dave Gray, West Linn, and George Connelly of Portland.

The Bearcat mentor has fielded an all-lettermen infield most of the year with Alva Brown at first base, Cliff Girod at second, Millard Bates at short and Dave Perlman at third base. Girod has turned in an exceptionally fine performance at the keystone slot all season long. In the latter stages Lewis has made use of Elmer Haugen, Salem freshman, at the shortstop position.

The first-line outfield lineup has included Vets Dick Brouwer and John Markoskie in left and right respectively, with Yearling Denny Elsasser, Portland, performing in center. All three have proved capable stickmen.

## Golfers Threaten Crown

Paced by Bill Wittenberg, the Portland junior rated as one of the outstanding young players in the entire Northwest, Willamette's '52 golf team has compiled a sparkling season's record under the mentorship of Sam Vokes.

The Bearcat divoters won seven of their

initial eight tests of the schedule, much of it against Northwest conference schools. On their record, the Willamettes can be considered one of the foremost crown threats in the conference meet at Walla Walla on May 16.

Besides Wittenberg, medalist in the majority of meets this season, the 'Cat links crew includes Kent Myers, the No. 2 man; Church, Baines, Dan Callaghan, Ellis Von Eschen and Warde Sligh.

## Tennis Squad Excels

The 1952 Willamette university tennis team, under the tutelage of veteran Lestle Sparks, is enjoying one of the best Bearcat tennis campaigns in some time. The Sparks squad won seven of its first eight matches of the season, the only loss being a close 3-4 setback at the hands of the Oregon State Jayvees.

The Bearcats must be regarded as a strong contender in the annual Northwest conference championship tourney at Walla Walla on May 16.

The team's personnel includes Charles Carter, George Watts, Dave Wisnom, John Ambler and Jim Morgali.
