## JOHN HARDING NOT GUILTY OF "RIOT" SAYS JURY

That Work in Moot Court is Required,

Charged by the "grand jury" with the crime of "riot" by the breaking up of a dance at the Geo. Rose hopyard September 11, 1910, John Harding, with cwo others whose real names were not known to the "grand jury" was tried Tuesday night in the county court room and was given a verdict of "not guilty," as charged, after the jury had been out but a few minutes. The case was very interesting and closely argued by both the state and the defendant. Much entertainment and, at times, laughable testimony was introduced, while the arguments of McKnight, defense, and Chamberlain, state, were exceptionally brilliant.

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


