FOR DEFENSE

JOHN HARDING NOT GULITY
OF "RIOT" SAYS JURY

Dean McNary of Law College Declares That Work in Moot Court is Required,

Charged by the "grand jury" with the crime of "riot" by the breaking up of a dance at the Geo. Rose hopyard September 11, 1910, John Harding, with cwo others whose real nąme were not known to the "grand jury" was tried Tuesday night in the county court room and vas given a verdict of "not guilty," as charged, after the jury had been out but a few minutes. The case was very ineresting and closely argued by both the state and the defend ant. Much entertainment and at times, laughable testimony was introduced, while the arguments of McKnight, defense and Chamberlain, state, were exceptionally brilliant.
Charles McNary presided over the deliberations of the
moot court and, in speaking of he absence of the two seniors rom the trial, to which they had been assigned, he said that attendance at these trials would enceforth be a requirement of he willamette university col lege of Law, and that the work in court would have influhe stude college stanaing of ot been absolutly that stud lo io the ork; but, as that department has been so highly recommend d by young lawyers as giving hem a correct knowledge of court procedure in the shortest ime, it has been determined to nake the work compulsory.

 NORTH HEAD LIGHTHOUSE. Laura Heist. On a high rocky bluff over looking the great waters of the
Pacific, is the North Head Pacific, is the North Head
Lighthouse. For many years it has stood a silent night sentinel guarding and warning the belated seaman of the southern Washington coast.
In size, in appearance, and in advantage of position it is prominent among Western lighthouses. It is a four story cylindrical building of about fifteen feet in diameter, with solid concrete walls substantially built immovable windows are closely fitted into the walls.
