IN ORDER to begin renovation of Willamette's old gymnasium in June, theatre faculty and majors pitched in as a moving crew and temporarily stored costumes and sets in Lausanne's basement. Since mid-May, a crew has been removing interior walls in preparation for the major construction work. The completion date has been set for Oct. 15, 1978.



Old gymnasium converted into two theatres

The old gymnasium on the Willamette University campus has seen a lot of changes since it was built in 1923. And now there is going to be one more.

This summer the inside of the building is being renovated to convert the space into two modern performance areas—a 280-seat thrust theatre and an experimental theatre called the black box.

The main floor of the building will house the two theatres and adjoining set construction area, lobby, box office, film screening/classroom area, and theatre department offices. Communication department offices will be on the second floor as well as other classrooms. The costume construction lab, physical plant, dance studio and storage areas will be on the basement level with dressing rooms, a make-up lab and the green room.

Since mid-May, a crew has been removing interior walls in preparation for the major construction work. Jensen-Ritchie, Inc., Salem, was awarded a \$448,519 construction contract for the renovation. The contract was signed June 19 and calls for completion on October 15, 1978.

Generous support from individuals and foundations in and out of Oregon is financing the \$586,747 project. The Kresge Foundation, Troy, Michigan, led the way by offering a \$150,000 challenge grant. The University raised the remaining \$436,747

to meet the Kresge challenge. Of these funds, \$24,000 came from individuals and the remainder from foundations. Oregon foundations contributing to the renovation were the Autzen Foundation, Jackson Foundation, Collins Foundation, A. J. Frank Family Foundation, Oregon Community Foundation, Adams Foundation, Ralph and Adolph Jacobs Foundation and the William E. Walton Charitable Trust. Included among out-of-state foundations funding the project was the Frank E. Gannett Newspaper Foundation, Rochester, New York, which gave the University \$30,393.

The remodeled building will open March 3 with a production of "Ah Wilderness" by Eugene O'Neill. Fall semester productions—"The Inspector General" and "An Evening of One-Acts"—will be staged in Waller Hall Auditorium.

A growing theatre department took over the gymnasium four years ago when athletics and physical education classes were moved to the newly-built Sparks Center. Basketball hoops and gym lockers were traded for stage lights and grease-paint. The department made do with the converted space and named the building The Playhouse.

Bob Peffers, chairman of the theatre department, is naturally excited about the renovation. "I think it will represent the most effective use of theatre space in the region," he said. Peffers compares the flexibility of the thrust theatre with that of the Angus Bowmer Theater at the Oregon Shakespearean Festival in Ashland.

Peffers left recently for a sabbatical leave in England. He plans to return in December. D. Scott Glasser will be acting department head.

Howard Grimms, of the Salem architectural firm of Chrisman and Grimms, designed the theatre after consultation with Landry & Hunt, San Francisco theatre consultants, and Horace Robinson of the University of Oregon. Landry & Hunt designed the Lewis and Clark Playhouse and the Lane Community College theater.

Grimms said there "won't be a bad seat in the house" because of the amphitheater style of seating. Tiers of seats will be grouped around three sides of the stage. Grimms said the intent is to have no one sitting directly behind another person. Entry to the theatre and to The Playhouse building will be by ramps to allow easy access for handicapped persons.

The black box theatre, named for its square shape and black walls and ceiling, will not have a fixed seating plan, a feature that will make the space adaptable to experimental productions. Both the black box and thrust theatre will be used extensively in teaching.

Willamette is the only liberal arts university of its size that offers a professional theatre degree, a program that was started two years ago. This past year some 250 students took theatre courses. Peffers expects the number of students enrolled in theatre arts classes to steadily increase.

The remodeling of The Playhouse will complete Phase II of the University's renovation project. Phase I revamped the east wing of the Fine Arts Building and the Art Building. The final stage of the project will be renovation of or building a new library.

PRESIDENTIAL EVALUATION

A time for personal and professional growth

Willamette University is one of the few institutions of higher education in the country to initiate a program for administrator evaluation and renewal. The program was implemented this year and is designed to benefit both the University and its staff.

The formal program was approved by the Board of Trustees in May of 1976. A campus committee spent more than a year developing the document prior to presenting it to the Board for approval.

Some of the benefits to administrators and to the University include a more productive administrative team and improved information for decisions on promotion, salary and retention. Other advantages are

the development of closer relationships between institutional policy and action, and acquisition of new knowledge and techniques.

Under the program, all full-time, contracted administrators of the University are evaluated once every three years. The primary objective is the continued improvement of the administrator's performance.

The administrator's supervisor coordinates the evaluation, which is based on shared expectations of performance as explained in the individual's job description and Annual Priority Planning Report, which is a type of work plan for each academic year. Evaluators are chosen from among on and off-campus persons the administrator

works with in the course of his or her job.

This year, 11 administrators were evaluated under the new program.

Renewal leaves up to two months for every four years of service are part of the evaluation program. Both aspects have personal and professional growth as their common goal, which are important to the University. The program provides a specific means by which this growth can be planned and achieved.

The program has special provisions for the evaluation and renewal of the President of the University. The procedures are much the same for the President as they are for other administrators.

Robert Paul Lisensky, the 19th President of Willamette University, is the first President of Willamette to be formally evaluated on his performance in office.

Thirty-two persons, representing University and off-campus constituencies, gave the President an overall rating between "successful and excellent."

There were five broad areas of evaluation: decision-making, planning, problem solving, communication and relationship to others and the community.

The year-long evaluation process was completed this spring under the guidance of an Ad Hoc Committee of the Board of Trustees with Don Grant as chairman. Other members were Louise McGilvra, Loren Winterscheid, Bishop Jack Tuell and Warne Nunn, chairman of the Board.

Evaluators were selected for their ability to comment on the broad scope of Dr. Lisensky's responsibilities: overseer of academic programs and objectives; executive officer of the Board of Trustees; Chief Administrative Officer; and community relations and fund raising.

The evaluators completed evaluation questionnaires and returned them to the committee. Responses remained confidential; however, a summary of all the completed forms was shared with the President. Dr. Larry Large, Vice President for Administration, and liaison to the Committee, prepared the 20-page summary report.

The 32 persons, who served as evaluators, came from the following groups: three faculty members each from the College of Liberal Arts, College of Law and Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration; three, alumni; four, University administration; three, Board of Trustees; three, United Methodist Church; eight students; and two from the community at large.

The 42-question evaluation form, which was the same used to evaluate other administrators, allowed the evaluator to rate the President's performance on a numerical scale from one to five. One denoted ineffective performance, two adequate, three successful and four an excellent performance. The rating of five de-

noted either that the question was not applicable or that the evaluator lacked sufficient information to make an accurate judgment.

The evaluation committee reviewed the summary with Dr. Lisensky and reported to the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees. The full Board accepted the Committee's evaluation report as presented by Trustee Grant at its May 12 meeting on campus.

Commenting on the evaluation at the Board meeting, Dr. Lisensky said the process had been helpful to him in better understanding his strengths and weaknesses, and assisted him in gaining a new awareness in his role of President. The evaluation also offered the opportunity for others to respond to the goals he had set for himself, he said.

The President is subject to periodic evaluations, as are other administrators of the University. The next evaluation of the President should take place in three to five years.

Many of the evaluators gained a broader understanding of the multiple roles of the President and an appreciation for the complexity of his responsibilities, Dr. Large said.

As part of the evaluation procedure, Dr. Lisensky prepared a detailed self-evaluation statement which analyzes the goals, objectives, problem areas and successes of his first five years in the presidency. The Ad Hoc Committee reviewed in depth the President's statement as part of the evaluation process.

Dr. Lisensky has completed his fifth year as President. Have these five years been successful?

The President says, "Yes." Some of the accomplishments are the enrichment of academic programs at the three colleges and the introduction of interdisciplinary freshman programs.

A three-year grant from the Lilly Endowment enabled Willamette to fund new curricular programs such as The Quality of Life, Alternative Futures and Semester Freshman Seminars. Faculty, students, administrators and members of the Board of Trustees participated with other college

representatives in discussions about the place of values in liberal education at the Lilly Continuing Conference on Liberal Arts Education.

The Murdock Foundation grant, which Willamette received recently, is making it possible for the Geo. H. Atkinson School of Administration to enhance its role with government and business communities through the establishment of the Center for Business Government Studies. The grant also provides for full implementation of continuing education programs.

The Cheney Foundation grant in the College of Law provided more study space for the library and enriched the first-year program of Research and Writing. This grant assured the University that funds were available for program development in law.

The autonomous nature of each of the colleges is strong but there have been some successes at integration, Dr. Lisensky said. There is a College of Law course, Contemporary Ethics and Law, taught by a professor in the law school, which is open to select undergraduates. An undergraduate course on Management is being taught by the faculty of the Atkinson School and a professor in Economics has taught a course with enrollment from both the Atkinson School and the undergraduate college.

The joint degree program between the Geo. H. Atkinson School and College of Law saw its first graduates in May. The 3-2 program established by the College of Liberal Arts and Atkinson School has been successfully established. It enables students to earn two degrees.

There also has been generous funding from external agencies. Most recently, Willamette received a \$98,353 planning grant from Northwest Area Foundation to refine academic goals and develop strategies for making changes in academic programs in the College of Liberal Arts.

Tuition waiver policy adopted for faculty

This fall, full-time faculty members may apply for tuition remission to enroll for academic credit in the colleges of the University.

The tuition waiver policy was adopted May 12 by the Willamette University Board of Trustees. Waivers of tuition are intended to assist the personal and professional development of faculty members consistent with faculty responsibilities and contributions in the college.

Willamette President Robert Lisensky, after consultation with the appropriate dean and faculty committee, will recommend those persons wishing to participate in the program to the Board of Trustees for their approval.

Two guidelines of the program are: a faculty member may apply for a one-semester tuition waiver to assume full-time academic status in conjunction with a

New and continuing grants bring excitement and promise to enhance academic programs

Some new grants and continuing grants have been bringing excitement to the campus community the last two months and promise to enhance Willamette's academic programs for years to come.

The Northwest Area Foundation has committed \$98,353 to a two-year planning grant to refine Willamette's academic goals and develop strategies for making desired changes in academic programs in the College of Liberal Arts. In addition, the funding will permit some studies of academic support areas as part of the extensive university planning effort already underway; support areas include library, course scheduling and admissions.

Meanwhile, the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems (NCHEMS) has offered the services of senior staff associate Frank Armijo to assist the University in strategy planning; his first two weeks on campus are this month. Both Northwest and NCHEMS support were triggered by the long-range planning progress already made by Willamette. In making its commitment, Northwest Area Foundation expressed confidence that Willamette University will be a vital educational institution in the decades to come.

sabbatical leave proposal and a tuition waiver will be granted to any faculty member to register for a single course in any given semester, provided the course serves as an opportunity for the personal and professional development of the faculty member and will have no adverse effects upon fulfillment of faculty responsibilities.

The Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration has launched into various academic efforts made possible through the \$350,000 grant from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust for a business-government center (see Atkinson School story in this issue).

Commitments of \$50,000 and \$25,000 by Tektronix Foundation directly support our entire science program. Tektronix agreed to help the University with its three-year program of updating science equipment by granting \$50,000 for Year I and \$25,000 for Year II. Willamette has purchased \$66,000 in equipment for the first year, matching the Tektronix gift with \$16,000 of University funds.

Lilly Endowment came through with an additional \$38,675 to continue the Alternative Futures Project a third year. The AFP, a study of the value implications of a steady-state society, will continue to sponsor values-oriented programs and bring outstanding visitors to campus.

Not to be overlooked in funding is the University's participation in cooperative programs also founded by Lilly Endowment. President Robert Lisensky, Dean Jerry Berberet and faculty members Paul Duell, Roger Hull and Carol Long all attended a Lilly Endowment Workshop on the Liberal Arts in Colorado Springs June 19 through July 5. Faculty members Sam Hall, Sue Leeson and Jerry Bowers attended a June workshop of the Associated Schools of the Pacific Northwest (ASPN), a four-college consortium which recently received a \$47,000 grant from Lilly for faculty development.

Other activities of the President include election to the Board of Directors of the National Commission on Higher Education Management Systems, the presidency for two years of the Oregon Independent Colleges Association, the appointment as the representative of the independent sector to a "blue ribbon" committee to develop a master plan for higher education in Oregon, the vice presidency of the National Association of Schools and Colleges of the United Methodist Church and the chairmanship of its Committee on Mission, Goals and Priorities.

Recent years also have seen the enhancement of Willamette's relationship with the Oregon-Idaho Conference of the United Methodist Church by an attempt to share in the activities of the Conference and its churches. To improve the University's involvement with the Salem community, the Salem Community Advisory Council has been established.

"For what it's worth, I think we have been successful," Dr. Lisensky said about the completion of his first five years at Willamette. "We have learned to be loving critics; we are debating critical issues; and we are asking more of ourselves in our relationship with others and in our own performances. We will need these qualities as we approach the next five years."

And in the opinion of the President, the next five years in higher education will be at least as difficult as the last five: enrollments are expected to decline, inflation will continue to cause concern, government

regulations will increase, and many universities will develop new programs without resources to support them.

The one area which will be more critical in the years ahead than it has been in the past, Dr. Lisensky believes, is that of assuring a place for independent higher education in state master plans. As resources become more limited, the call for state planning and less duplication of services will become a central issue, he said.

The President also said it is important to develop overall institutional strategies based on a realistic understanding of this period of "no growth" and persistently rising costs. The challenge must be to find more creative uses of limited resources and to keep the academic programs vital without increasing costs or the size of the faculty.

Dr. Lisensky developed specific major goals for the next five years which will enable Willamette to continue as a vital institution of higher learning. They are:

Developing a Strategy for the Future:

It seems ridiculous to suggest that planning is a vital need, but planning has not been a part of higher education's managerial style. The task of the University Planning Committee was to analyze the last five years in order to understand better who we are today. Our next step is to develop a five-year plan to guide, not force, our decisions. It will be the task of the administrators to see that the programs suggested are implemented.

Clarifying and Reaffirming our Mission:

At the undergraduate level, the cafeteria style of education must be replaced by a more structured curriculum in which students are given the opportunity to pursue a coherent program. Liberal arts colleges must shift their purposes toward a more general education for the activities of life. Within the graduate programs, we must engage in a learning process "which involves a respect for ideas and cultures, and the goal of intelligent, sensitive insights into the human situation."

Strengthening the Decision-Making Process:

Shared authority carried to its extremes introduces a high degree of bureaucratic structure which operates best when it protects the status quo. The future strategy of academic leadership must be an information strategy. There must be widespread consultation and effective communication.

Dr. Lisensky will examine these goals and some of the issues that will bear on the challenges to Willamette and independent higher education during a three-month study and renewal leave. The leave begins August 1.

The rationale used in the development of the administrative renewal program is applicable also to the person serving as the President of Willamette University. (Please see page 6.)

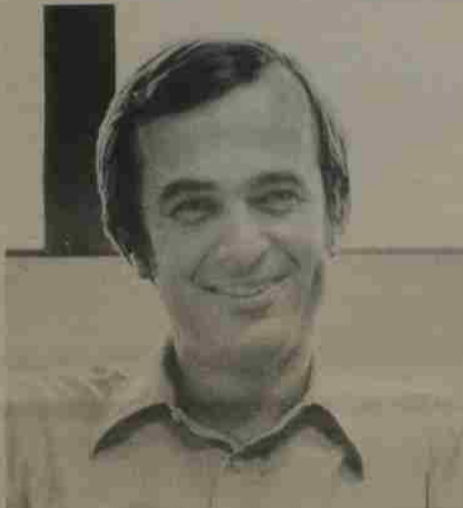

New administrators join Willamette ranks

Nine new names will be appearing on administrative letterhead this fall as personnel move to other communities and newcomers arrive to replace them. Several others also changed titles and moved up into the ranks.

Assuming his new position as law dean on August 1 will be **Lee J. Tornquist**, who was appointed by President Robert Lisensky in March after a year-long search. Tornquist was the first choice of the law faculty.

Tornquist is a member of the faculty at Loyola University of Chicago Law School where he has served as associate dean and director of the trial advocacy program. This past year he has been a visiting professor of law at McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento teaching civil procedure and trial advocacy.

Tornquist received his J.D. from Northwestern University School of Law in Evanston, Illinois. He practiced law for five years in Chicago before joining the Loyola faculty.

Tornquist succeeds Professor Carlton Snow, who left his teaching and research to serve as dean of the college for the past year. Snow, who was not an applicant for the permanent position as dean, will now return to teaching at the College of Law, where he has been a member of the faculty for the past eight years.

Roy A. Ruffner, financial officer of a private men's college in Missouri, will also join Willamette August 1 as Vice President for Financial Affairs.

Ruffner, 43, is Vice President for Fiscal Affairs at Westminster College, Fulton, Missouri. He has held the position for 12 years.

Ruffner was professor and chairman of the Department of Economics and Business Administration at Westminster prior to his appointment to the vice presidency.

The new Center for Business-Government Studies of the Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration has two new administrators: **Gene S. Leonardson**, Director of Continuing Education, and **Barbara M. Karmel**, research director.

Leonardson began his service as Director of Continuing Education last month. Until he joined the Center, he was an assistant professor in the Department of Political Science and an associate of Institute of Manpower Studies at Oregon State University.

Meanwhile, the campus community is awaiting the August 1 arrival of Center research director Barbara M. Karmel. Karmel comes from the Graduate School of Business at the University of Wisconsin where, as a visiting professor, she has been director of professional master of business administration programs and the only woman on the faculty of that graduate school.

In addition to their duties at the Center, both Karmel and Leonardson will be in the classroom.

Purdue University graduate **James Cadena**, 31, comes to the campus in August as the new Assistant Dean for Career/Minority Counseling. He succeeds Jacqueline Loville, who is

PRESIDENTIAL RENEWAL

New program offers 'a better alternative'

Often, the only way you can refresh or review yourself in a college presidency is to find a new position at another college.

Willamette University is breaking that tradition by offering a better alternative—a renewal leave.

Renewal leaves for the President and for University administrators came into being this academic year through the Program for Administrative Evaluation and Renewal. The Board of Trustees approved the program in May of 1976 as a method of providing opportunities which would mutually benefit the individual and the University.

Robert P. Lisensky, the 19th President of Willamette, is the first President of the University to participate in the program. This spring he was formally evaluated on his performance in office (see page 3).

Dr. Lisensky, who has completed five years as President of Willamette University, is taking a leave from August 1 to November 1. Two months of the leave are being devoted to study at the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems (NCHEMS), Boulder, Colorado, and at the Division of Higher Education of the United Methodist Church, Nashville, Tennessee.

Under the provisions of the Administrative Evaluation and Renewal Program, the President is encouraged to take a minimum of two to six months leave every five years. If such leaves are not taken, the Board requires that the President take a mandatory leave the sixth year in office.

The leave will be the first time since 1962, the year he stopped teaching, that

Dr. Lisensky has had a significant amount of time for reflection and study. He said he is as much looking forward to this experience as he is to returning to campus in November.

Few persons have a clear perspective of the duties of the president of a university or understand the pressures of the position with its psychological and physical demands and its impingement on private life, said Dr. Larry Large, Vice President for Administration. He added that it is easily forgotten in daily encounters with the "President" that he is a person who is as much interested in growth as faculty and students.

Personal and professional growth are two of the principle aims of the Program for Administrative Evaluation and Renewal. The program also reaffirms the belief that the University is an environment which provides young people a place to grow and to develop new ideas. The President, administrative staff and faculty are role models for these young people and as such seek to remain fresh, vital and growing individuals.

Stephen K. Bailey, scholar and nationally recognized leader in higher education, makes the point clear with a story he tells about a Martian visiting a college campus. The Martian asks a Dean if the college helps non-young people to grow. The Dean says he does not understand. The Martian replies, "How can people who have stopped growing themselves possibly help others to grow or help ideas to be born?"

For Dr. Lisensky, personal and profes-

sional growth is the motivation behind his decision to spend the bulk of his renewal leave at NCHEMS and at the Division of Higher Education of the United Methodist Church. He will be involved with persons at both organizations who are committed to higher education, but who are not associated with specific institutions.

Dr. Lisensky will serve as both learner and teacher. "I go into an environment where I bring an expertise. It is an expertise because of experience in higher education not in their particular fields of endeavor."

The Board of Directors of NCHEMS invited the President to spend the month of September as a guest consultant. Areas Dr. Lisensky will be examining include the Center's institutional planning efforts, management forums and methods of implementing future research topics.

The President will spend the following month in Nashville where he will be the first person from a university invited by the Division of Higher Education of the United Methodist Church to participate in its daily functions. One of the questions he will be researching at Nashville is the church's support to higher education and church-related colleges, which is a critical issue for the 1980 General Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Dr. Lisensky sees certain benefits for the University as a result of the leave, one of these benefits being a renewed executive officer. It also permits the President to prepare for the next five years in the presidency.

Another advantage of the leave is the opportunity it creates for Dr. Lisensky to gain new insights about issues facing Willamette and higher education in the years ahead: planning, reaffirming the University mission and strengthening the decision-making process. "I will be able to reflect on those issues in a much more meaningful way because I will be able to review how others are facing these challenges," he said.

This will be the first leave Dr. Lisensky has taken in his more than 20 years of teaching and administration. He was granted a sabbatical as a faculty member of MacMurray College, but instead, he accepted the vice presidency of Albion College.

His thoughts about the leave . . . "I'm looking forward to the leave. I think that it is coming at a perfect time. I would like to believe that I will return feeling more positive about what has been achieved in the last five years and what might be achieved. I haven't had a chance to look objectively at Willamette. There is nothing worse than trying to analyze a situation while being inside it. You need to step out of your role and then observe."

Many people have asked if the President will check in with the University from time to time or return to give the Opening Days address. The answer is "no" because if he agreed to return periodically to campus for special student and faculty activities he would be placing himself in a situation in which he was not gone at all.

"I really have to separate myself from the campus if I'm going to enrich my understanding of the University and find how I can return a stronger person and thus better serve the University," he said.

Dr. Large will be responsible for the day-to-day business and activities of the University in the absence of Dr. Lisensky.

Ron Cartmell, a 1978 graduate of Willamette, joins the admissions staff this fall as admissions counselor for 1978-80. A psychology/sociology major, Cartmell comes from Colorado Springs.

Wallace E. (Ray) Rabold joined Willamette June 15 as Director of Plant after 10 years as physical plant manager at the penitentiary, a job which included supervision of plant operations at the Women's Correctional Center, the Penitentiary Farm Annex and the Penitentiary Forest Camp at Tillamook.

Rabold, 55, brings to Willamette 38 years of experience in facilities maintenance and construction. His background includes engineering and plant maintenance for the U.S. Navy. He also was the building materials warehouse manager for U.S. Plywood Corporation, Salem.

All of the events were free and open to the public and were held on the Willamette University campus and at the Mission Mill Museum, located directly across 12th Street from Matthews Hall.

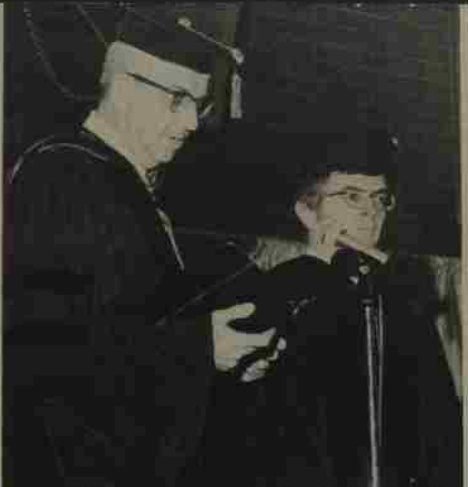
Robert Theobald, an economist and editor of Futures Conditional, opened the conference with a talk on "Choosing a Route into the Future: Complex and Contradictory Options."

He was elected to the Alumni Association Board of Directors in 1973 and re-elected in 1976. He recently served as chairperson of the Nominating/Records and Achievements Committee. Prior to joining the Portland Development Commission, Alkire was Administrative Assistant to the Director of Urban Renewal for the City of Salem.

Ray N. Atkinson, Group Vice President, Guy F. Atkinson Company, San Francisco. He is Vice President and Director of the Atkinson Foundation, and a member of the University's Atkinson Fund Committee. In other business, the Board approved:

- a supplemental retirement program for all presently retired Willamette faculty, administrators and surviving spouses. The program went into effect June 1 and provides a two percent per year increase for each year of benefits from the University since retirement. The increases will be calculated on actual monthly retirement received from programs in effect April of this year. The number of years since retirement will be determined by counting those years beginning June 1 of the first year of retirement through May 31, 1978. The supplemental retirement increase benefit is not to provide automatically for any increase of this benefit beyond its initiation or any adjustment in the two percent calculation at a future time.

- a plan that will provide all emeritus faculty, staff and administrators retiring on or after June 1, 1977, supplemental Medicare coverage such as Blue Cross Coverage 65.

- a recommendation from the Academic Affairs Committee to discontinue the Russian language major effective Sept. 1, 1979. Students who declared a Russian major and filed program agreements by March 1, 1978, will be provided instructional support through 1978-79 to complete their major requirements. Elementary and intermediate Russian will continue to be offered in a manner that will meet the foreign language proficiency requirement for the B.A. degree.

- a \$10,046,937 budget for the 1978-79 academic year.

- a recommendation from the Committee on Organization to establish The Willamette Associates, a group composed of selected alumni and friends joined together by an active interest in the University and a desire to help advance its educational programs. The purpose of the Willamette Associates is to promote the advancement of the academic and cultural programs at Willamette by serving as ambassadors of the University within the community at large and encouraging gifts and bequests to the University.

A Special Letter

(Editor's Note: Maurice '42 and Lois Persons retired as missionaries of the United Methodist Church in Africa several years ago and moved back to the United States. The Persons went back to Africa last year by invitation of the government and will end their two-year mission next summer.)

Lubumbashi, Rep. of Zaire
June 9, 1978

Dear Friends:

We want you to get this letter as quickly as possible, as we know that many have been concerned because of the news coming out of Zaire, and have been anxious about our safety.

Here we are, still alive and well in Lubumbashi, and very thankful to God for His protecting care during these past days. Four weeks ago tomorrow the rebel forces made an attack on Kolwezi, a town 175 miles to the north of us. It was so

unexpected and sudden that no one was able to leave the city. Six United Methodist missionaries were trapped there. They were able to let us know at 8:00 a.m. on the Mission radio net that they were surrounded, but by 10 o'clock the Kolwezi radios had been confiscated. This was followed for us by a week of constant monitoring of the Mission radio, hoping and praying that some word would come from our friends—but silence. You can imagine our joy when a week later the town was liberated by French and Belgian paratroops and our missionaries were able to leave, having gone through a week of terror and danger, but unhurt. We know that many of you were praying, and we want you to join with us in thanksgiving for God's goodness. The World Division of the Board of Global Ministries organized a round-the-clock prayer vigil. We felt sustained by the prayer support of our friends both here in Africa and at home.

Our apartment immediately became a "refugee" center. Bishop Ngoy advised the missionaries on the other stations to come to Lubumbashi as it was feared that rebel activity would spread. When we arrived in Zaire last October we were put into a very large apartment and we wondered why two people needed so much space. Now we know! We counted it a privilege to be able to receive our colleagues from other places. In spite of our spacious accommodations some had to sleep on the floor, but we were all happy and thankful to be safe and together. Most of our time in these past days has been spent trying to keep up with getting meals and beds for all concerned, trying to maintain radio contacts, running the treasurer's office, as well as the ordinary routine coordinating of the 970 United Methodist teachers and 23,000 students.

Now it seems that the tension is easing. Our visitors have either left for the States or returned

to their work, and we are trying to go about our lives in a normal way. It is hard to feel completely normal in a town that is under military rule, with a 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. curfew that is strictly enforced. Soldiers are everywhere—Zairian, Moroccan, Belgian and French, and we understand that others are coming.

What of the future? We plan to stay right here unless further trouble breaks out. The African church needs our cooperation and help as much, or more, than ever. In this whole war-torn area sorrow, poverty, looting, fear and bribery are rampant, but the church is continuing strong in its witness. Hundreds of civilians lost their lives during these past four weeks, but the Christians have been shining examples of courage in the face of danger and death.

Thanks for being with us in thought and prayer.

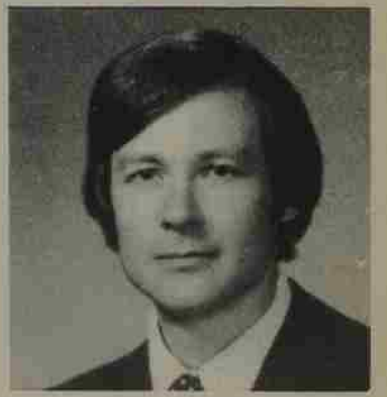
