Song Groups To Compete Tomorrow at 10

Well-trained voices under the direction of watchful song-leaders will vie for men's and women's All-School Sing trophies tomorrow at 10 a.m. in the gym.

EXCITEMENT is already high for the mid-morning songfest at which well-drilled living groups try to sing their way into the hearts of judges. Passing judgment on the best and next-best women's and men's group tomorrow will be Dr. William Swettman, director of Music, Salem public schools; Stanley Glaren, Lewis and Clark college; Virginia Ward Elliot, Lewis and Clark college and C. Robert Zimmerman of the Portland Symphonic Choir.

Arrangements for the judges and the song contest have been made through Bill Wheat.

SONG LEADERS will be cautioning their charges about what to eat and drink tomorrow morning. About an hour before starting time for the contest, groups will begin warming up.

Winners will be announced during coronation ceremonies tomorrow afternoon, when first place organizations will be singing their songs.

Series Deficit Estimated at \$1700

Sponsoring a concert series cost Willamette students about \$1700 for the recently completed season. This is the approximate loss estimated by Chuck Seagraves, Student Body treasurer, for The Collegian this week.

TOTAL LOSS for the last two years was listed at about \$2500 by Seagraves. During the last two years, the concert series dropped from a surplus of \$395 to this figure.

The deficit will probably be written off the Student Body books to eventually come from capital investment funds. Still, there is a hint that the debt might have to be paid off by future series.

As Seagraves said, "We would like to see the concert series start next year with a clean financial slate. However, past experiences should not be too quickly forgotten. It is possible that the council could provide that future profits of the concert series be applied to account. This in itself might be a reminder enough."

SEAGRAVES pointed out that when the series was initiated four years ago it was

not anticipated that Student Body money would have to be spent to make up any losses. By vote of the Student Council, the series was underwritten, but no money was set aside to write off the series.

Seagraves said that funds to make up the loss could prob-

ably be taken from reserve funds such as capital outlay including expenses for the new student union.

The matter of where the funds are to come from would ultimately have to be decided by the Student Council or the Finance Board, said Seagraves.

Four-Way Race Develops For Top Student Body Job

A four-way race has developed for Student Body president with final petitions due today by 4 p.m. George Bleile, Dave Finlay, Chet Daniels and Dale Patton have all indicated their intention to run for the office.

Candidates for all offices will be introduced in convocation Tuesday and primaries will begin next Friday and run until Monday. The run-off elections will be held May 17-18.

Dale Greenlee had earlier indicated he would be a candidate for president of the Student Body but decided to switch his candidacy to the office of second vice-president.

Greenlee said he felt his aspirations in football next season would take too much time to make it possible to hold the time-consuming job of president. He said he felt he could do a better job if elected second vice-president.

In the race for first vice-president in charge of activities are Neil Causbie and Bill Wheat. John Bone was in the race at one time but withdrew his name. Running for second

vice-president in charge of elections will be Benny Lee, Pat Farley and Greenlee.

Candidates for the secretary post are Joan Lawson and Jo Ann Benard. Treasurer nominees listed at Collegian press time were Marian Rutledge, Lewis Beatty and Don Klindworth.

Candidates for yell and song leaders will perform today at 12:20 for the Rally Commission in Waller Hall. The commission will narrow the field to appear before the student body Tuesday.

Candidates for yell king listed so far are Doug Houser, Bill Weaver and Larry Lister. Song queen candidates who have indicated they will be in the race are Ann Denman, Marian Higley, Sharon Bates, Maureen Day, Anita Eichmann, Joyce Hill, Annette Carson, Jerry Brackins, Janet Roscoe, Pat McGregor, Shirley Riegel, Ann Yoder, Susie Carter, Marie DeFreese, Sharon Allen, Ivonete Shdo and Lucy Myers.

Education Majors Petition Honorary

A petition by Willamette education majors has been completed and sent to the national headquarters of Kappa Delta Pi, honor society in education, for establishment of a chapter at Willamette.

According to Dr. Kenneth Lottick, action should be taken on the petition so that the chapter can be installed at Willamette next fall, depending upon the national's acceptance.

The purpose of Kappa Delta Pi is to encourage high professional, intellectual, and personal standards and to recognize outstanding contributions to education.

Kappa Delta Pi was founded June 8, 1911, as an outgrowth of the Illinois Education Club at the University of Illinois. Since then the honorary has spread to 193 campuses, located in 45 states.

Eight chapters of the honorary are present on the Pacific coast. The only other Oregon chapter is at Oregon State College, which was established in 1938.

Roll Out the Carpet

This weekend Willamette rolls out its cardinal and gold carpet for a fine group of high school seniors. Some have made up their minds they want to come back next fall and begin their college careers. Others are just looking the place over, trying to decide whether or not they want to attend college, and if so, where.

May Weekend activities are certainly directed at both these groups. The weekend is geared to display a wide assortment of extra-curricular activities. Today are the parade, barbecue entertainment and tonight's play. Tomorrow is the sing, a baseball game, a tennis match and the Coronation Ball. On Sunday, the Queen's breakfast is scheduled.

However, seniors or their Willamette hosts will not want to overlook the study side of life in viewing the campus or explaining it. Although we temper our philosophy with football and our science with social functions, May Weekend is a highly concentrated dose of activities not to be confused with everyday life.

Pillars, Once Coronation Scene, Now Serve to Arouse Curiosity

The seven Grecian pillars transplanted to the Willamette campus in 1936 once served as the setting for the coronation of the May Queen.

When the old Capitol building burned in 1935, President Bruce Baxter negotiated for the University to receive some of its pillars. According to The Collegian of April 16, 1936, the exterior brick pillars were not salvageable so pillars from the interior were obtained, and were carted to the rear of the music hall, where they spent the next year.

In April 1936 the head of the campus art department drew up the arrangement of the pillars into a Grecian Theater, a "fit setting for the coronation ceremony." They were placed on the east end of the campus, on the present site of Baxter Hall, by campus laborers, with the aid of a small crane. Dr. Robert Gatke supervised the landscaping.

The May Queen for 1936 was crowned with appropriate ceremony on a grass-carpeted stage erected within the circle of pillars. The Theater was the site of the coronation until 1945, when the pillars were removed to their present position to make room for Baxter Hall.

Since that time, according to Collegian files, the ceremony has been held "on the campus," "on the lawn," and also in the gym, in McCulloch

stadium, and in Waller (because of rain).

Salvaged from the ruins of the Capitol only to be abandoned as a setting for the May Queen's coronation, the pillars survive only to arouse curiosity in passersby.

Once upon a time there was a king and a queen, who reigned together over Willamette University's May Weekend festivities. But since that year of 1909, the campus kingdom has honored a single monarch and has added to her subjects each year a guest list of several hundred prospective freshmen.

TWO GENERATIONS of students have attended Willamette since Queen Hattie, now Mrs. G. C. Bellinger of Salem, was chosen the first May Queen.

On Saturday afternoon of that first weekend of May, 1909, the diminutive 95-pound queen was crowned with a heavy diadem of flowers as she sat on a stage near Waller Hall. Beside her sat King Harry Caine, a substantial monarch of 250 pounds.

The student charged with the responsibility of crowning the newly-elected royalty was James Crawford, who later studied law at Willamette and is now a circuit court judge in Portland.

Back in 1909 the Queen's Breakfast was one of the major events of the day. "The girls did all the work, securing donations from merchants weeks ahead of time," Mrs. Bellinger remembers. The waffle break-

fast was served out-of-doors, and townspeople were in the habit of attending.

TWO THINGS Mrs. Bellinger vividly remembers from her reign are the elaborate red velvet robe with a silk lining that she wore over her white dress and the speech she had to give after her coronation.

Speaking of the robe, Mrs. Bellinger said, "I don't know where we got it, but I'm sure it was rented."

Then as now, a track meet followed the coronation ceremonies. However, the meet was held on Sweetland field, present site of Willamette's new building program. According to Mrs. Bellinger there was no May Weekend play since there was no drama department as such at that time.

May Weekend festivities a generation later, in 1931, are of special interest in 1955 because one of the princesses, Grace Henderson DeHarpport, is the mother of this year's Queen Marie.

IN THAT year, according to an anonymous Collegian reporter and a typographical error, Willamette had a "Weekend" that wasn't at all novel—there was rain. Only a little fell, however, "probably," said the reporter, "because all the

crowd had an umbrella or a Collegian for shelter."

The Friday afternoon baseball game was cause for general rejoicing, for the varsity team defeated the University of Oregon nine. That evening the Men's Glee club demonstrated its talents at the Willamette Night program presented at the Elsinore Theater.

In addition to the coronation Saturday afternoon, May dances adapted from "Midsummer Night's Dream" were presented in the area where Baxter Hall now stands. Speaking parts were directed by Dr. Kohler. Saturday night entertainment was the junior class play, "A Scrap of Paper."

Now, in the year of 1955, another queen will be crowned and another reign will be added to the royal succession since 1909.

May they all live happily ever after.

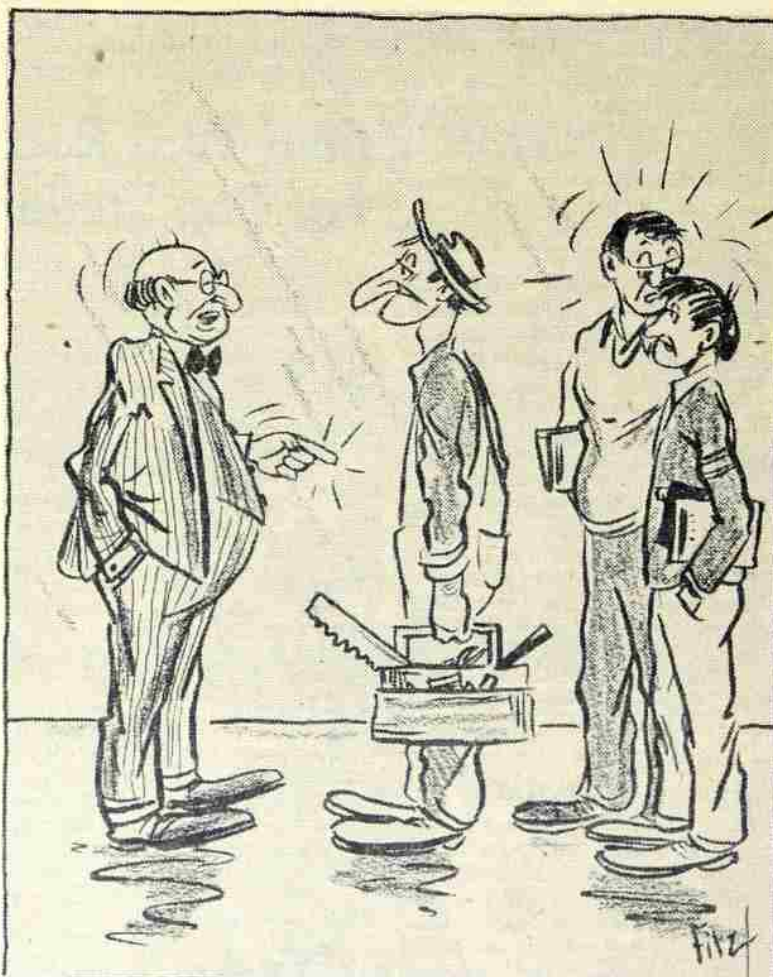

Council Okehs Revisions; Orientation Head Named

Student council recommended Student Body approval of three proposed Constitutional changes Wednesday and elected Diane Wickstrom manager for Orientation week.

RECOMMENDED changes deal with electing the rally squad in February, selecting the members of the rally squad and naming non-voting members to Student Council.

Constitution Changes

Constitutional amendments to be submitted to the students at the general election:

No. 1. Art. IV, Sec. 1—First sentence rearranged.

Except for the rally squad, elections will be held at least one month before the close of the second semester, the date to be set by the Student Council. The Rally Squad will be elected in February.

No. 2. Art. IV, Sec. 7—Old section deleted.

Membership of the Rally Squad will consist of four women serving as a song team and three men as a yell squad, to be selected in February of each year, serving for the next school year.

The Student Body will vote on the candidates and individuals, voting for as many candidates as there are positions to be filled. The four women and three men receiving the highest number of votes will comprise the rally squad. The two women and two men receiving the highest number of votes will then be voted upon in a new election. The woman and man winning a majority will become song queen and yell king.

No. 3. Art. VIII, Sec. 1, Para. 2—New non-voting members of Student Council determined.

Student members without a vote: Editor of the Collegian, chairman of student delegations to joint student-faculty committees and those managers of special activities which shall be asked to attend at the discretion of the Student Body president.

Elected as manager for next fall's Freshman Orientation week was Diane Wickstrom, freshman, who advocated eliminating the activities carnival from the week and expanding it to two convocations after school is under way. The convocations would be held the two succeeding Tuesdays after Orientation week and concern (1) campus organizations and (2) campus special events.

Miss Wickstrom was chosen by Council over Mac Baker and the campus YMCA group.

THE SECTION in the Constitution to be changed deals with the date for elections. Student Body officers elections will remain the same date as presently provided in the Constitution, one month before the close of school. Elections for song and yell leader will be held in February if the change is ratified by the students.

The second change would specify that the rally squad consist of a song team of four women and a yell squad of three men. The top candidates in the primary election would comprise the rally squad. The leaders would be elected in the run-off election by polling majority votes.

In other action, Council elected Bill McKinney as Rotarian for May. McKinney was cited for his work as Wallulah editor.

Willamette Hosts Four-Game Test; Pioneers Today; Whitman Next

With two defeats tagged on the Willamette Bearcats this past weekend, Coach John Lewis and his band of baseballers will be out to avenge themselves when they tangle with Lewis and Clark this afternoon and then take on the Whitman Missionaries tomorrow in the May Weekend special.

TWO MORE games are slated for the Bearcats at McCulloch Stadium this Monday and Tuesday, when they face the Pacific Badgers and College of Idaho squads in single afternoon games.

For the Bearcats, this weekend is a must win, as they find themselves with one more loss than the loop leading Whitman Missionaries, and a chance to even the record book.

TICKETED to go against the Lewis and Clark Pioneers is veteran pitching ace Dave Gray, the work horse of the WU mound staff, with Brad Lucas getting the nod for tomorrow's game against the Missionaries to climax the May Weekend festivities.

Mentor Lewis has named either Alva Brown or Pete Reed to play first base, with Bill Nelson at second base and Gary Burdick in reserve, with Terry Ziegelman at shortstop and Harv Neffendorf at third base.

IN THE OUTFIELD, veterans Jerry McCallister and Gary Shugarts, with either Ed Lipscomb or Wes Malcom patrolling the field area. Catching assignment will go to Dale Patton and Vic Backlund.

For the Pioneers, Coach Warren Smith has a capable crew that is headlined by pitching ace Ray Hyde and fielders Ron Lewis, Bill Martell and Gary Jackson.

HYDE IS a three-year letterman with two All-Conference selections to his credit, was a member of this year's team in the Pan-American games in Mexico City. Last season Hyde set a new strikeout record, by whiffing 105 while receiving credit for all seven L-C conference wins.

In the infield Lewis, who will be stationed at first base, is the owner of a .375 hitting average last year, will be combined with Martell at third base, who was All-Conference shortstop and hit .333, plus the added strength of returning veteran Dick Toney at short.

THE PIONEERS outfield will be comprised of Jackson,

a .354 hitter and home run king last year, Dean Soule, an Oregon State transfer, and Don Carrier, a sophomore letterman.

The Whits have a variety of talent that could cause no end of trouble for the Bearcats, with no less than five seasoned pitchers to count upon for mound service.

LEADING THE hurler staff is last year's ace Noel Aronson, who has proven very capable thus far in NWC action, with Gene LePage and Dick Mobley giving creditable service. Tim Anson and Tim Hanson are two reliable reserves for the Missionaries.

In the hitting and fielding departments, Bob Becker and Del Clicker are the leading stick and glove men with Bob Russ and Dean Lodmel giving able power to the Whitman crew.

Cindermen Travel to Whitman, To Miss May Weekend Fete

Willamette will be out to further their unbeaten track record this weekend as they take on the Missionaries from Whitman in their third conference go of the season. The meet is scheduled for Walla Walla Saturday afternoon.

AS USUAL Bearcat coach Ted Ogdahl will be counting heavily on his veteran stars Dean Benson and Larry Thompson. Benson seems to improve with each meet and Thompson has been a steady point producer in the field events.

Ogdahl should also be happy over the showing of his freshman performers. Dale Hartman who has been a consistent winner in the 880, has now turned to the 440 where it appears as though he will be just as consistent.

TOM VOIGT and Lowell Nichols, two other first year men, have also been placing in the field events. Voigt, Portland's all-city high jump and

broad jump champ, has recently returned to full strength after injuries had kept him sidelined for a while.

Jim Person, another first year man, has been a plager in the shot-put and veterans Volney Sigmund and Claris Poppert have been steady point getters in the pole vault.

WHITMANS chief worry is in the field events in general. In the running events they are unusually strong. Coach Bill Martin feels that he has the next NAIA mile champion in his 1955 track captain Hal Parrott.

Dave Wheeler is also a big threat in that he is two-time conference champ in the 220. Both Parrott and Wheeler are seniors and three year lettermen.

GARY FOWLER and Sid Tate are two members of Whitmans record breaking mile relay team, are back again this year as is Ed Parrott, Hal's little brother, the defending two-mile champ.

Things in General . . . Looks as if each track meet brings new and added laurels to one Dean Benson, the amazing hurdle hope for Coach Ted Ogdahl's Willamette cinder squad.

First, Benson was the much sought after trackster out of high school when he ran the high hurdles in :15 flat for the Bend Lava Bears in 1952 to win the state high school event hands down. After a successful freshman year, Benson sat out most of last year with mononucleosis, but since then has shown no signs of the blood disease, and has proven faster and stronger than ever before.

STARTING OUT THE YEAR with a win in the Washington State Invitational Indoor track meet in the high hurdles, Benson went on to turn in a :14.6 time on the wind swept and rain soaked track in the Willamette Relays to set a new relay record and stadium time. Next came the :14.4 against Pacific University last Saturday for another stadium and school record.

Benson's fetes contrasted with some of the other times turned in here in the Northwest section of the country, show just how well the WU hurdler could do in bigger college circles. For instance, Lewis and Clark showed a :15.7 by Clarence Duke of the Pioneers last week in a track meet with Linfield, which is considerably slower by far than numerous other NWC high hurdle marks. Al Torgenson of Washington State turned in a :14.8 last week against Oregon and Ron Lund of Washington came in with a slower time of :15.4 against Oregon State.

THEN AGAIN OTHER notable times in different sections of the country lists Willard Thompson of Illinois with a :14.4 in the recent Drake Relays, a time Benson has equalled. Perhaps the fastest time to date was the :14.1 by Joel Shankle of Duke in the 16th annual Penn Relays.

Added all together, with the rain and wind thrown in for good measure, Benson, if given a fast and dry track to run on could eventually lower his own time in the high hurdles, and will probably have that chance when the District 2 NAIA meet comes along later this month at Lewis and Clark College, and then a shot at the faster tracks down in Abilene, Texas, where the NAIA finals will be held in June 3-4.

FIRST NO-NO of the season in the Northwest Conference baseball action goes to one Ron Barndse of Pacific University, when he beat the ailing College of Idaho Coyotes 7-0 in the last game of a doubleheader. Barndse missed his perfect game by walking three Coyotes, but managed to hold them on first base and in the course of the game add seven strikeouts to his credit to chalk up his first no-hit no-run.

Baseball trick or strategy of the young season so far, goes to New York Giants outfielder Don Mueller, as he reached across the plate and slapped a single in the 16th inning against Cincinnati last Sunday, as the Reds' pitcher was throwing the final intentional fourth ball only to have the amazing outfielder just reach out and poke the ball into left field, catching everyone by surprise, including Whitey Lockman who was standing on second base so completely unaware that he just did manage to make it to third base.

THE NEW RULE states the catcher must remain in his restricted area until the ball has left the pitcher's hand. This means the pitcher must throw closer to the plate than previous years, when the catcher just stepped out of the box to take four straight balls for the intentional walk. And that's the way it was in Mueller's case as the pitcher came a little too close on the fourth ball and he just inched closer to the plate and lowered his hands down on the bat to reach further to poke the ball for a single. Fast thinking like that is what makes the major league players.

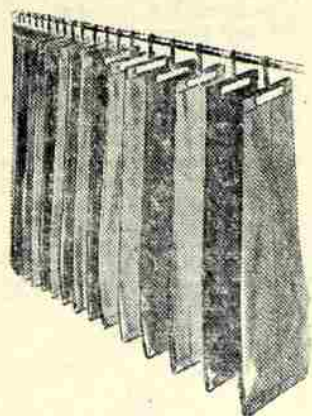

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Famed Mathematician George Polya To Begin Series of Lectures Monday

Internationally known mathematician George Polya will be on campus for three days beginning Monday to deliver a series of lectures designed to appeal not only to mathematicians but to all students and faculty.

"THE LECTURES are of interest outside the field of math because they will have a good deal to do with teaching methods and the psychology and philosophy of teaching," said Dr. Chester Luther, head of the mathematics department.

Polya, professor emeritus at Stanford, has been retired from the Stanford department

of mathematics for two years. He was active on the staff there for ten years and before that was professor of mathematics at the Federal Institute of Technology in Zurich, Switzerland.

IN HIS early books, Professor Polya stresses the technical aspects of mathematics, but more recently he has been emphasizing the philosophy of teaching. A display of Professor Polya's books will be arranged in one of the show cases in Collins Hall.

The present tour of about 20 western colleges and universities is the first one of its

kind that Professor Polya has conducted. However, since his retirement, he has returned to Switzerland to teach, has lectured at Washington University in St. Louis, Mo., and two summers ago he lectured at a math conference at the University of Colorado.

MONDAY Prof. Polya will deliver two lectures. The first will be in room 203 in Collins Hall at 8 a.m. His subject will be "Maxima and Minima Without Calculus." The second lecture will be in Collins 124 at 4 p.m. at which time he will speak on "Mathematics and Plausible Reasoning."

At 3 o'clock there will be a tea, also in Collins 124, for the faculty and guests to meet Prof. Polya.

ON TUESDAY one lecture, "Let Us Learn Guessing"—the inductive-experimental approach in the classroom and in mathematical discovery—will be presented in Collins 124 at 9 a.m.

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'Lo and Behold' Dialogue, Acting Wins Praise; May Weekend Production Concludes Tonight

For those who enjoy plays in which love is made to triumph over the most adverse conditions, "Lo and Behold," the drama department's May Weekend production, fills the requirements nicely. (Final performance of the three-day run will be tonight at 8:15.)

THOSE LOOKING for a stronger theme and fewer adverse conditions will still be rewarded, in this performance, by clever dialogue and some very good acting on the part of the cast.

The fine acting is in evidence from the first scene; we are introduced to Richard Geer and Bruce Fountain, who together managed to prod into motion a rather sluggish first act. Geer returns after a two-year absence from Willamette's theater.

Despite the fact that the first act holds little more than a hypochondriac's monologue for him, he does a consistently fine job from the beginning to the end of the play. Fountain, a more familiar member of the cast, gives a slick, polished, and believable performance.

THE PUNGENT dialogue and eccentric characters come so thick and fast in this play that the stodgy seriousness of the first scene rapidly gives way to a riot of ribaldry in the second. With the advent of three only-too-tangible ghosts, the play begins to gain momentum.

Never has the stereotyped conception of the "redskin" been blasted more decisively than in the person of one Minnetonka Smallflower, played with Indian inscrutability by Tanya Kudriavcev. Mac Baker contributes a little musical

madness to the scene as "ghost" writer.

Mary Mills, as a daughter of the old South, proves herself to be a comedienne with a fine sense of timing, clear diction, and a fresh stage-presence. Miss Mills, more than any other member of the cast—with the exception of Geer—seemed to me to put forth the fullest possibilities of her role.

BARBARA RUHLE, as a blithe spirit of the non-ghost variety, has a good many subtle character-changes to handle, and this she does quite competently. Through Miss Ruhle's performance, Daisy Durdle becomes a provocative mixture of sophistication, naivete, shrewdness, and ingenuousness.

The group plans to leave here June 19. The TV program will be on June 26, Saturday night, from 8 to 9 Pacific time.

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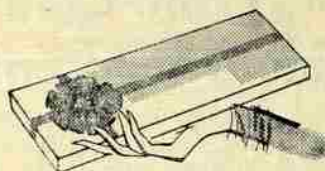
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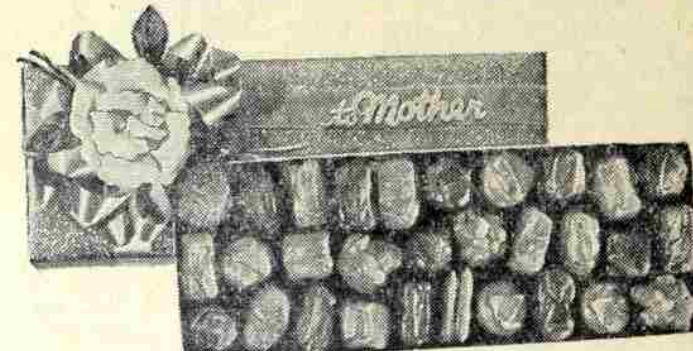
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
