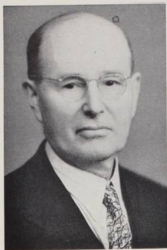
MISS OLIVE M. DAHL

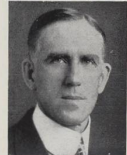

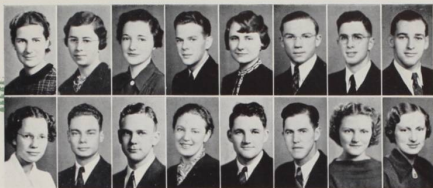

The largest registration in Willamette history clearly indicated the growing fame of this university as one of the key institutions of higher learning in the west.

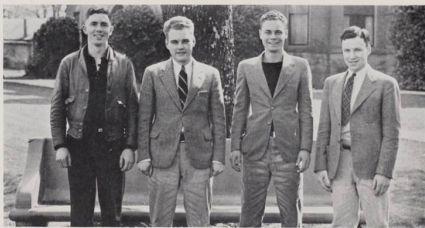

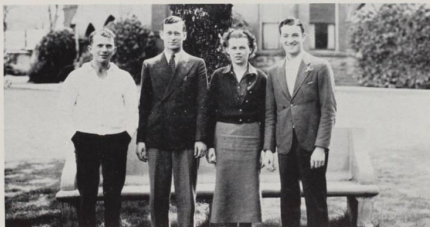

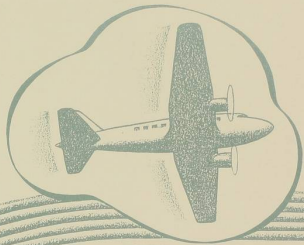
Wallulah Advisory Board

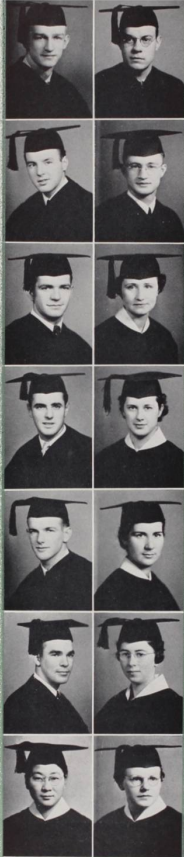

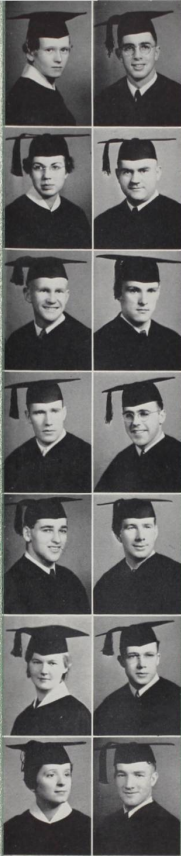

College of Law

The Willamette University college of law has continued its record of steady achievement toward a goal of high intellectual attainment and practical training for membership in the legal profession. Located in the capital city the student body enjoys the privilege of using both the school and supreme court library and may attend sessions of the justice, municipal, county, circuit, and supreme courts.

The college of law was established in 1883, the second oldest law school on the Pacific Coast, and since 1927 has been a professional college of the university and a full-time day school.

The faculty of the law school consists of three full time members and five men who are specialists in their particular courses. Each member of the faculty has a background of practical experience.

The classrooms of the college are located in Waller Hall and including the Moot Court room where trials are held each Thursday morning with Professor Inman presiding as judge. The law library is located in the basement of the building and consists of 5 rooms two of which are "conversation" rooms with accommodations for typewriters, each of which is equipped with the Oregon Reports, as is the reading room. During the past year 3,000 volumes have been added to the library, with a similar amount the year before. Next year the library expects to find new quarters which have been occupied in the past by the university library and which will furnish more ample quarters.

The law school expects to be recognized as standardized by the American Bar Association before the fall semester begins, which will materially increase enrollment. Applicants for the fall semester will meet with a severe check upon their intelligence, character, and qualifications before being allowed admittance.

The total enrollment for the past year numbered fifty regular students exclusive of those registered as special students. The freshman class had twenty-one students, and the graduating class numbers ten. During the past two years Willamette has had one hundred per cent success in the bar examinations given yearly.

Before graduation students have opportunity to serve in all capacities from members of the jury to counsels for the parties involved in the fictitious cases. The testimony of the witnesses occasionally lends amusement to proceedings. Next year inaugurates a new advisory system, members of the local bar having lent their cooperation to the plan by which each senior will be expected to spend twenty-five hours a semester in the office of a local lawyer who will give them practical training in the preparation of legal briefs, the management of an office, the preparation for pleading a case in court and assistance in actual court room cases.

During the past year Ladd and Bush Trust Company offered thirty dollars in two prizes to the junior or senior student who would prepare the best will. This prize was added to several others offered yearly.

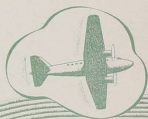

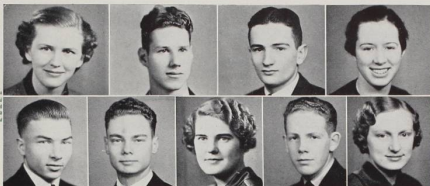

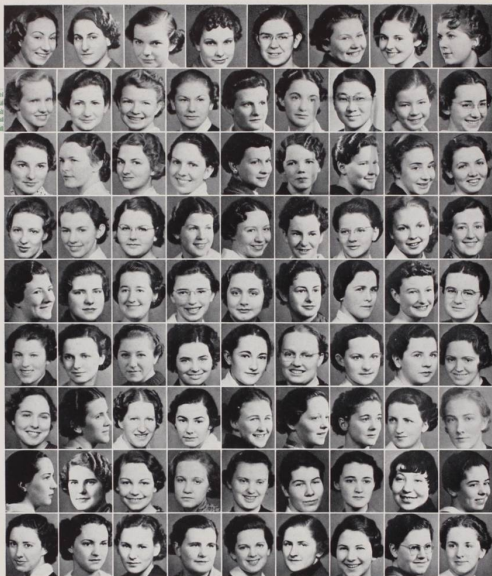
Coffee House

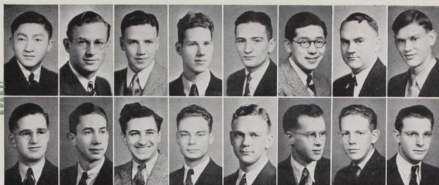

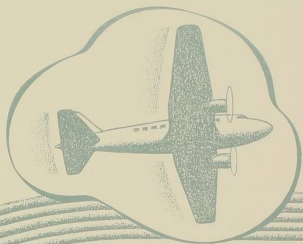
Tacks

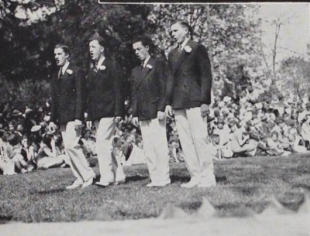

Forensics

Willamette's forensic squad this year continued the remarkable record of success which it has had under the leadership of Professor Rahe during the last few years.

The first main event of the forensic year was the Western States Debate Tournament held in Pasadena, California, during Thanksgiving vacation, in which Willamette placed first in men's debate and third in women's debate. This tournament was the largest field of forensic competition on the Pacific Coast, with

ninety-seven teams representing fifty-two western colleges. Willamette's representatives were Marjorie Thorne and Helen Mae Beal in the women's division and two teams of men, Laurence Morley and Randall Kester, tournament winners, and Aldus Smith and Albert Klassen.

Immediately on their return from Pasadena, Morley and Kester began grooming for a three weeks transcontinental debating tour which covered about eight thousand miles with sixteen speaking engagements. As West Coast champions, they met St. Louis University, Washington University, University of Arizona, Depauw University, Pittsburgh University, University of Maine, Bates College, Boston University, and New York University, winning every one of the decision contests. Professor Rahe accompanied the debaters as far as St. Louis where he attended two national speech conventions.

At the Linfield tournament, during the latter part of February, four Willamette teams reached the final rounds of debate—Marjorie Thorne and Helen Mae Beal undefeated, and three men's teams with only one defeat, Morley and Kester, Talbot Bennett and George McLeod, and Aldus Smith and Charles Gleiser. Wallace Turner and Waldo Hiebert reached the finals in extempore speaking and Bill Clemes placed third in oratory.

In the state contests in individual speaking during the year, Willamette's representatives were: Bill Clemes and Josephine Gilstrap in Old Line Oratory, Clemes placing second; Ed Minneman in the Peace Oratory Contest, placing third; Wallace Turner and Verna Vosper in Extempore speaking; and Bill McAdam in After-Dinner speaking, placing first.

Forensic Squad

The peak of the forensic year was reached during the second week in April when the annual conference of the Pacific Forensic League was held on the Willamette campus, under the leadership of Professor Rahe who was president of the League during the year. Willamette's representatives were: George McLeod in oratory, winning second place; Randall Kester in extempore spaking, placing fourth; Howard Teeple in after-dinner speaking; Aldus Smith and Waldo Hiebert in symposium debating; and Morley and Kester in regular rebate, being defeated for the Pacific Coast championship only by the University of Southern California.

A complete list of those participating in intercollegiate forensics this year follows: Marjorie Thorne, Helen Mae Beal, Kathryn Ringe, Margaret Savage, Maxine Beagle, Laurence Morley, Randall Kester, George McLeod, Aldus Smith, Charles Gleiser, Albert Klassen, Waldo Hiebert, Lando Hiebert, John Lienhart, Bob Campbell, Bill McAdam, Bill Clemes, Ed Minneman, Talbot Bennett, Wallace Turner.

Of this number, four have completed their forensic competition, having played an important part in building Willamette's reputation in public speaking. Marjorie Thorne has engaged in varsity debate for three years with an outstanding record.

George McLeod has represented Willamette in the oratory section of the Pacific Forensic League for three successive years, winning two second places.

Laurence Morley and Randall Kester, working together as a debate team for four years have established a remarkable record of over a hundred intercollegiate debates with about eighty-five per cent wins.



Homecoming Play

The curtain rose on the Willamette dramatic season with the raucous, satirical "Torch Bearers" by George Kelly. The side-splitting comedy of a play-within-a-play began with the dress rehearsal at the home of a wealthy art patroness. Amidst the confusion of telephone calls, clashing personalities, and the unexpected homecoming of a mere husband (A. J. Kempenaar), the heroic determination that the "show must go on" never faltered. The second act glimpsed the back-stage uproar, during the actual performance, topping the evening's hilarity. The play actually stopped several times because of the laughter of the audience over the antics; especially Martha Jane Hottel's pantomime as Nelly Fell and David Stahl's characterization of the Mr. Spindler.

The great problem in this play was to select the right person for each of the twelve parts—eight of which were taken by beginners in the field. Mrs. Oppen very skillfully chose the best plastic material and moulded them into their characters without curbing the student's own creative spirit. Martha Warren proved a capable assistant director, taking complete charge of rehearsals for three days.

Casting the role of the frivolous, light-headed Paula Ritter was a difficulty which disappeared when Dorothy Lipps consented to try her hand at comedy. Constance Smart, as the booming director Pampenilli, dominated her flock of ham actors with the buxom poise of a prima donna.

With the contrast of Ed Minneman's high pitched voice as Mr. Twiller and Art Lamka's roaring basso for Mr. Hossefrasse, plus the tremelo of Ariss Jones the rehearsal play went forward with many melodramatic flourishes. Billy Utley's fainting and Lulu Benson's hysterics kept the comedy at high pitch. Beatrice Gillette as the maid and Wilmer Willis as the stage manager received their quota of laughs.



"Twelfth Night"

Such a finished production as *Twelfth Night*, given March 12th and 13th, justified the long hours spent in rehearsal and the choice of this Shakespearian drama. Salem critics as well as Willamette hailed it as the best production of Willamette for years.

Much tribute was paid to Mrs. Oppen for her dynamic ability in producing it, and keeping the gay rollicking humor and lovely poetry intact.

The play moved with a good pace and the characters were well drawn. Staging this large play in the chapel made it necessary to simplify the many scene changes down to five. Miss Fowler proved that art could also be practical and her fairy-tale set answered the problem very cleverly by the use of scalloped trees and a formalized back drop of vari-colored sky and water.

Lloyd Riehl, living the part of Sir Toby the prince of scamps, Morrell Cray as the nitwit Sir Andrew, and Mary Elizabeth Kells playing a very arch Mira, formed a triumvirate of merry pranksters, which kept the audience in the very best of humor. Fests, William Utley, added much to the revels with his singing and pantomime. Josie Acklin reached dramatic heights in her playing of Viola with true feeling and imagination seldom touched by amateurs. Her scene with the sea captain, Donald Green, and the scene in the Duke's, Leonard Schmurr, palace showed overtones of a potential artist. Melba Riopelles the wealthy countess added a quiet richness to the play by her calm loveliness and stately beauty. Forest Mills left his library post long enough to be the staid love-sick stuard of Olivia and played it with a spontaniety that surprised everyone. Harlan Sheldon, Sebastian, was especially convincing in the reconciliation scene of the last act, and Stan Eland as the traveling companion of Sebastian was a strong Antonio.

Olivia's court ladies proved to be all blondes and added much to Miss Fowler's set with their costumes and lovely head dresses: They were Betty Howe, Jane Andrews, Helen Peterson, and Elizabeth James. The men in waiting to the Duke showed noble bearing. They were Baine Cater, Melvin Holt, and Donal Green.

As an all-around manager Ed Minneman should be mentioned, for his part consisted of jumping from stage manager to electrician to publicity man and to peace maker.

Twelfth Night brought a new quality of performance and production to the campus and plans are that it will be repeated next year.



May Day Play

The annual May Week End play presented by this year's Junior class produced the largest audience of any Junior play previously given.

The romantic fantasy, "Mrs. Moonlight," was a delightful story of a woman, who, by wishing with a magic necklace, never grew older or less beautiful than she was at the prime of life. Mrs. Moonlight was the wife of a staunch British middle class Victorian. Not wishing to become an embarrassment to her husband and child, by never growing older, she leaves them, to return, disguised as a cousin twenty years later. She finds her husband married to her sister, and her daughter grown. She stays only long enough to keep her daughter from making an unhappy marriage, and then goes back to Paris. She returns again, thirty years later, and finds her husband old and feeble, living only in his memories. The last scene is dramatically beautiful with the death of both Mr. and Mrs. Moonlight.

This play, presented in the new Leslie Junior High School Auditorium, was a great success. It was commended highly by critics, and was given a special editorial in one of the city's newspapers.

Most of the credit for the success of this presentation went rightfully to the characters. Mary Elizabeth Kells made a beautiful picture in her portrayal of Sarah Moonlight; Ed. Minneman, as Tom Moonlight, was dignity personified both as a young and old man; Minnie, the faithful maid, was well played by Lorene Tompkins; Margaret Ayers played her part as Jane Moonlight excellently; and Bill McAdam made a typical good-for-nothing in his presentation of Willie Ragg. Margaret Hauser is to be commended on her acting ability as Edith Jones, and Peter and Percy Middling were played well by Verne Rierson and Bob Nelson respectively.

Credit should go to Mrs. Oppen for her splendid coaching, and to the production staff for stage management, costumes, and make-up.

School of Music

With Professor Cameron Marshall at its head, Willamette's School of Music this year far exceeded the work of any previous season. The Songmen, a group of forty male voices, the Treble Clef Club, the Male Quartet, and Earl Potter, Katherine Smullin, Burtis Preston, soloists, all under the personal supervision of the diligent Professor Marshall, were instrumental in raising the quality of the university's music to new heights.

The Songmen, composed of boys from eleven states, sang in every important city in Oregon, and were well received at each concert. The outstanding event of the season came with a broadcast over a coast-wide network in the Sperry Glee Competition in January.

The Treble Clef club, composed of forty women singers, came into existence four years ago for the purpose of encouraging the development of ensemble and choral work among the women of Willamette. Viewing the success which the group met during the past year the club seems to be capably attaining that goal.

The Male Quartet, composed of Ross Gladden, Burtis Preston, Earl Potter, and Cloyd Riffe, made various appearances during the year and was well received. The crowning point of the quartet's activity came in the May Day ceremonies when the four singers acted as heralds for Queen Gwen I.

Miss Kathryn Smullin, as soloist for the Songmen, Burtis Preston, who received laudatory letters from over the entire Pacific Coast for his rendition of the "Lord's Prayer" on a Willamette-Methodist church radio broadcast, and Earl Potter, who sang several solos during the Freshman Glee program, deserve a great deal of credit.

The fine work of the individuals and groups named above was due, without doubt, to the excellent tutoring of Professor Marshall, one of the finest instructors in the Northwest.

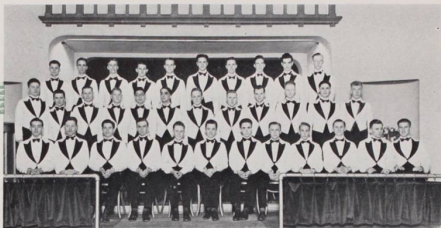

Treble Clef

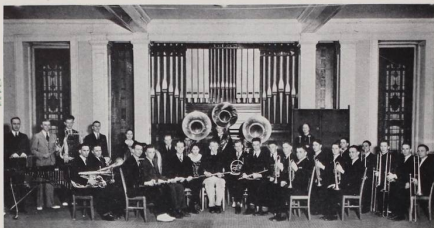

Novelty was the theme and Willamette's historical "Cannibal King," reigned over the decorations and scenery.

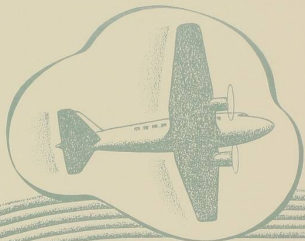

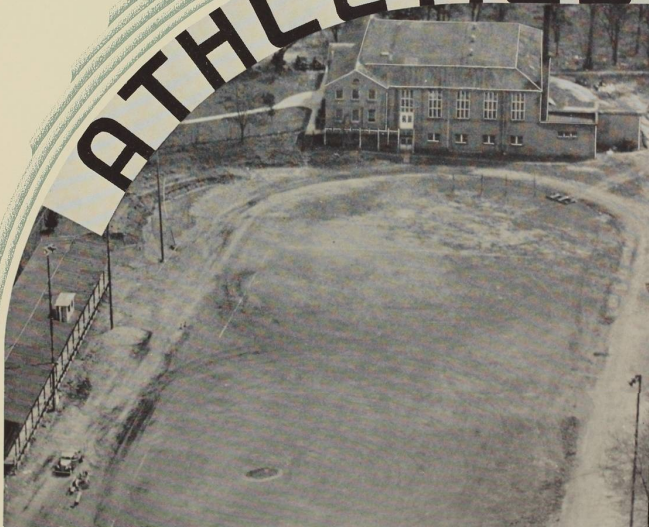

Willamette athletics entered their 11th year under the competent guiding hands of Coach Roy Servais "Spec" Keene in this, the 1936-37 season.

And, as this year's book goes to press, "Spec's" Bearcats are marking the first year of his second decade at Willamette with what may be another clean sweep of the Pacific Northwest Conference's three major sports championships.

Already the football and basketball titles hang in Willamette's trophy case, and what promises to be another great baseball team is ready to launch its conference schedule, with an exceptionally fine opportunity to bring home the coveted loop diamond pennant.

Only once before in the history of the conference has any school romped off with all three championships—in the 1929-30 season—the era of "Spec" Keene's famous "unbeatables."

Thus, a clean sweep will be nothing new to Willamette and her veteran mentor. But the 11 years with the former Oregon State college star at the helm of Bearcat athletics, has seen Willamette rise from the lower division of Pacific Northwest sports ranking to the uppermost position on the ladder.

The year-and-a-decade of his grid tutelage has produced four conference championships, including an unbroken string of three in a row, and a record of 39 conference victories, including the present consecutive 19-game winning streak, against only 12 defeats.

Nor has Willamette's football success been limited to conference gridirons. Against all opponents, the Bearcats have chalked up 53 victories, as compared to one tie and 33 losses. Eighteen of these latter set-back, however, have come at the hands of Pacific Coast Conference teams, namely, Oregon, Oregon State, Washington and Washington State.

Eleven basketball teams coached by "Spec" have brought Willamette five championships, one co-championship and one runner-up position. Further, no Willamette team has ever finished below fifth place in the final standings, and only two have lost more conference games than they have won. Eighty victories against 24 defeats is the 11-year

Ten years of baseball, with a final season position of never less than third place, is "Spec's" diamond record. Two champions, four runners-up, and four third place clubs have worn his colors, producing 53 conference victories against 21 defeats.

Eleven champions in 11 years of coaching, plus one co-champion and eight runners-up; 172 conference victories against 57 defeats. A proven member of the nation's All-American coaches' team—Willamette's Roy Servais "Spec" Keene.

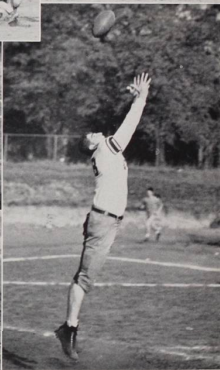
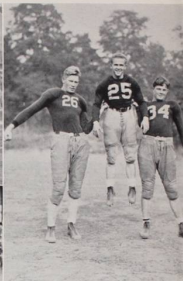

FOOTBALL

A brilliant 21 to 9 victory over the University of Nevada, in a game termed by sports writers the most interesting one played on the Pacific coast all year, and a third straight Pacific Northwest conference championship, high-lighted one of Willamette's most successful of all football seasons—1936.

Coach "Spec" Keene's gridsters rolled up seven victories, fought an up-hill battle to gain one tie, and lost two hard tilts during the year.

When the final gun ended Willamette's successful conquest of her traditional athletic rival—Whitman college—on Thanksgiving Day, "Spec's" grid aggregation had posted its 19th consecutive conference win, the 22nd consecutive game in which the Bearcats have not been defeated on their home field, the ninth in a row in which conference rivals have not scored against them, and the fifth straight victory over the Missionaries.

The season got under way as the crimson-clad Bearcats smothered Albany college, 42 to 0, rolling up 380 yards from scrimmage and 18 first downs.

Oregon State barely nosed out the Bearcats, 13 to 0. Two blocked punts, one in the closing minutes of the ball game, provided the bitterly-contested Beaver victory. Willamette drove to Oregon State's nine-yard line in the third period, but failed on their best scoring chance of the game.

Back in top form, the big Bearcats dedicated their new Sweetland Stadium grandstand against the highly-touted Nevada Wolves with a 21 to 9 victory. Weisgerber and "Bunny" Bennett, 142-pound freshman halfback, were the big guns of the intersectional win.

College of Idaho proved no match for the heavier Salem collegians, and bowed to Keene's grid machine, 47 to 0.

Linfield gave the Bearcats one of their toughest scraps of the year, going down by the narrow margin of 3 to 0. Willamette's points were from the gifted toe of Dick Weisgerber, on a field goal from a difficult angle on the 12-yard line.

Driving over a stubborn Logger defense for two touchdowns, the Bearcats kept their record unscathed in the conference by downing College of Puget Sound, 13 to 0. A brilliant defensive play by Norm Hogensen and powerful running plays, featuring Beard and Weisgerber, proved the major victory factors.

Heading south for a ten-day two-game invasion, Willamette hit burning hot California weather, the first tie game since Coach Keene took over the coaching reins, and the first intersectional defeat in "Spec's" tenure as head Bearcat mentor.

Fresno State's tricky Bulldogs rolled up two first-half touchdowns on forward-double lateral passes, only to have Willamette come back for a score in the third period on a 33-yard run by Tackle Darrell Newhouse with Weisgerber's lateral pass, and tie it up in the final quarter on the big fullback's off-packle smash.

A speedy, shifty Whittier halfback, named Elvin Hutchinson, proved too big a gun for the Bearcats to spike, and his pair of touchdowns and a touchdown-producing forward pass gave the Poets a 21 to 18 upset win.

Home again to cooler climes, the Bearcats produced their next victory, 19 to 0, over Pacific university, after 60 minutes of the foggiest football ever seen in the western hemisphere. Billy Beard's 50-yard touchdown with a Pacific punt highlighted the wraith-like football tilt.

The final game of the season saw Willamette clearly demonstrate her right to the conference title with a smashing 18 to 0 win over Whitman. Completely fooling the Missionaries, Mentor Keene sent his club into the air, and a perfectly-clicking passing attack netted three touchdowns and 180 yards gained.

Believe it or not—the road to the Pacific Northwest conference championship is just 537 yards longer than the trail to the Pacific Coast conference title, if figures don't lie.

The Huskies of Washington traveled 2135 yards through air and on land to cinch the gonfalon in the bigger loop, but Willamette's Bearcats had to go 2672 yards—1.52 miles—to claim the title honors in the powerful northwest entente.

Statistics for Coach "Spec" Keene's eleven's ten games reveal that the big Bearcat backs made 2047 yards from scrimmage during 1936, and 625 yards from passes. Opponents tallied less than half that much—777 yards from scrimmage and 509 from passes, for a net of 1286 yards.

The season produced several out-standing Bearcat players. Dick Weisgerber, 210-pound fullback, won Little All-American honors—the third straight Willamette man in three years to be accorded that singular honor—and also capped second place in the national scoring race, with 98 points.

Weisgerber, as well as Billy Beard, sophomore halfback; Chuck Versteeg, end; Darrell Newhouse, tackle, and Elliott Becken, guard, rated all-conference honors. Weisgerber was third-string all-star fullback, and Hogensen a member of the first Pacific Northwest all-star football team for forgotten men.

Ace individual performers for the Bearcats were the two who make up the new "touchdown twin" combination—big Dick Weisgerber, fullback, and flashy Bill Beard, sophomore halfback.

Weisgerber hit the line for 844 yards gain on 162 plays, an average of 5.21 a play; scored 98 points to finish second high in the nation; punted 19 times for an average kick from the line of scrimmage of 40.47 yards; kicked off 31 times, with a 51.19-yard average; returned one kickoff 16 yards; ran 35 yards with two intercepted passes; completed five passes of his own for 75 yards, and caught three passes from his mates for 18 yards more.

Beard did just about everything his Little All-American fullback mate didn't. He gained 609 yards on 125 plays for an average of 4.87 per play; scored 42 points on seven touchdowns, to rank third high in the conference; punted 63 times for a 40.62 average; kicked off twice for an even 55-yard average; returned eight kickoffs 222 yards, averaging 27.75 each time; returned 32 punts 345 yards, averaging 10.78 per return; ran 40 yards with four intercepted passes; threw 60 passes of his own, completing 26 for 296 yards, and moved an additional 107 yards with nine passes thrown to him.

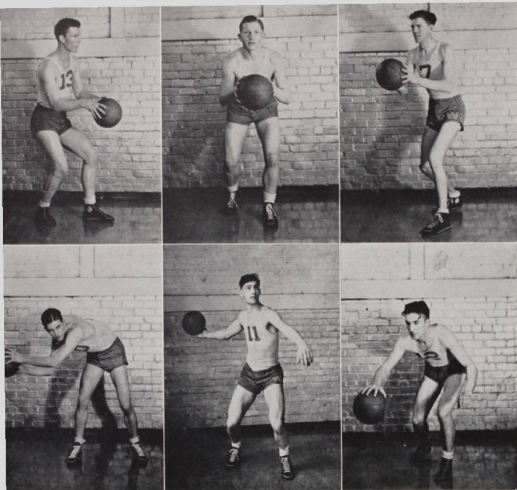

A smartly-trained sophomore quintet brought Willamette its first Pacific Northwest conference basketball championship in four years during the 1936-37 casaba season.

All told, the cardinal and gold hoopers came through their 28-game season with 21 victories. In addition to their conference title, they snapped Oregon State's seven-year basketball domination and reached the semi-finals of the state A.A.U. championship tournament.

As aforementioned, the 31 to 28 victory over Oregon State and a pair of convincing victories over University of Portland, high-lighted the non-conference portion of the Bearcat schedule, in which ten games were won and five lost.

The sensationally successful league slate opened with two easy wins over College of Idaho, 34 to 11 and 34 to 26, in which the Bearcats had little reason to extend themselves.

College of Puget Sound was next on the conference slate, and the Loggers provided Keene's maple court performers with plenty of action on the Washington college's floor. The two hard-fought clashes produced 35 to 32 and 48 to 28 Willamette victories.

The winning streak was extended to six straight tilts, as both Albany college and Pacific university bowed to Willamette's smooth-working machine, by 44 to 26 and 36 to 18 scores, respectively.

Despite Whitman's first defeat in 21 games over a three-year period, at the hands of Puget Sound, just before the Missionaries' Salem invasion, the loop title was at stake until the outcome of the second night's game.

The initial clash was a frenzied galloping contest between a pair of keyed-up teams, in which both were jittery and great by turns. The Bearcats clung to a slim second-half lead long enough to nose out a 32 to 26 victory.

The second night produced an even more fiercely fought court battle, Willamette galloping off with a 38 to 34 victory and the conference title. The lead changed no less than eight times in a wild last half that saw the combined scoring efforts of the two fast-breaking quintets account for 41 points.

Fearful of a let-down in the after-climax to the great Whitman games, "Spec" watched his colorful champions whip through to an undefeated conference season by downing both Albany and Pacific in return games on the Willamette floor, 31 to 16 and 39 to 27, respectively.

Three members of the great championship quintet gained additional honor by winning berths on the all-conference team—Bill Anton, lanky sophomore center; Walt Weaver, sophomore guard, and Captain Chuck Versteeg, veteran guard.

In addition, Bill Anton wound up the year with runner-up honors in the conference individual scoring race, trailing Otto Smith of Puget Sound, the leader, by only eight points.

Anton was the team's high scorer, with 224 points in the 28 games—the result of 89 field goals and 46 free throws—but likewise its "bad boy," with 64 personal fouls called against him.

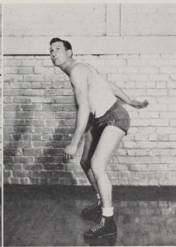

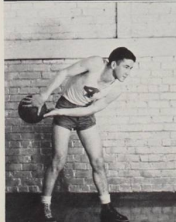

Freshman Basketball Team

Coach Lestle Spark's Bearkittens, although off to a bad start, kept their mentor's record of never having tutored a frosh hoop team that lost more games than it won intact this year, by finishing a 35-game season with 20 victories against 15 defeats.

The frosh quint was well into mid-season before it hit a smooth and consistent winning stride, but then it posted nine straight wins before closing the year with losses at the hands of the state champion Bellfountain crew and McMinnville's well-trained preppers.

Cecil Quesseth, former Salem high forward, sparked the Bearkittens in virtually every tilt, piling up 252 points for the season on 104 field goals and 44 free throws. In addition, the diminutive frosh star was the only member of his team to rate a berth on the annual Salem city league all-star quintet.

Unable to function as smoothly against veteran rivals as did last year's Bearkitten five, the 1937 club won only four of its ten city loop tilts, winding up the year in fourth place. Out-standing wins over prep opponents were over Tillamook twice, Salem high, Silverton and Woodburn.

Bill Wagner, another former capital city pepper, finished second to Quesseth in points scored, with 158. Buzz Hagedorn, Portland rook, trailed Wagner in the scoring column with 130 counters, and likewise copped the team's "bad boy" honors, with 55 personals called against him.

Steve Staynor, big guard, and Tom Hagar, who held down the center berth from mid-season on, were the only other Bearkittens to tally more than 50 points, Staynor getting 92 and Hagar 74.

Other members of the squad included Jones, Catherwood, McKibbon, Shinn, Petrie, Williamson, Kyle, Carey, Ransom and Moses.

One of the greatest of all Willamette baseball teams—the slugging 1937 Bearcats, winners in 18 of their initial 22 games this season—is ready to head for Walla Walla and the Pacific Northwest conference championship series with Whitman college, as this year's Wallulah goes to press.

The Bearcats and the Missionaries, under the guidance of the loop's two veteran mentors, Roy "Spec" Keene and R. V. "Nig" Borleske, respectively, have dominated the conference championship race in virtually every one of its previous 11 runnings.

Last year Willamette relinquished its hold on the western division to College of Puget Sound, as the Loggers took the championship with a 3 to 2 12-inning victory, and then went on to trounce Whitman in the title series and rule the loop for the first time in Puget Sound diamond history.

But the hard-hitting Bearcat crew gained sweet revenge for their pennant-depriving defeat by C.P.S. last year in the four-game series here May 14 and 15; the series that concluded the western division schedule and gave Willamette the chance to clash with Whitman.

Paced by "Iron Man" Walt Weaver and the northwest collegiate circles' own "murderers' row"—Dwight Aden, Bill Beard, Derb Southard and Gordy Williamson—Coach "Spec" Keene's crew rolled up the two victories necessary for the championship over the titled Loggers.

Added to the four successive wins compiled the week before in the Pacific university series, it gave the Bearcats a record of six conference wins and two losses to take with them to Walla Walla.

Coach Keene will bring his "one of the greatest" home for one final Salem appearance before the curtain is rung down on Willamette's 1937 diamond

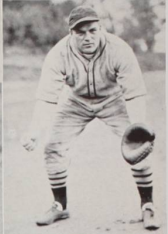

season—a double-header with the University of Oregon and its great pitching star, Bill Sayles, on Sweetland stadium, May 24.

The season opened none too auspiciously for Willamette, as Coach Keene faced the difficult problem of replacing two regular pitchers, his hard-hitting first baseman, two regular outfielders and a brilliantly-fielding shortstop.

Left over as a nucleus for this year's pitching corps were Jerry Gastineau, the slow-curve artist from Missouri, and Walt Weaver, big fireball throwing Wisconsinian. Both were sophomores and lettermen in the 1936 season.

To this formidable pair Keene added Larry Nunnenkamp, slim Tigard junior who saw some action as a relief hurler last year, and Jack "Lefty" Criswell, another curve-tosser and freshman from Portland. These four worked as the season's regulars, aided by "rookies" Tom Hagar, lanky Nevada freshman, and Bill Anton, 6' 4" Portland sophomore.

Dick Weisgerber, big New Jersey football star, and Hal Moe, Silverton junior, returned for another season of catching duties. Moe, however, suffered a broken wrist in intramural basketball, necessitating the shifting of Billy Beard, veteran third baseman, to catcher for the early part of the season. Moe got back in the game in late season.

Rex Pierce, big Portland sophomore who alternated at third and second last year, was converted into a first baseman to fill the graduated Ken Manning's shoes.

Billy Sutton, one of the team's only two seniors, started at the keystone sack. Gordy Williamson, hard-hitting rook from Portland, alternated at second as well as at other infield positions, and Steve Stone, freshman up from Salem high, was a third second base possibility.

At shortstop Coach Keene came up with a find in Lee Shinn, a freshman from Baker, who is hitting the ball at a hard clip. Third base was well taken care of by Beard and Roy Orren, stocky Silverton sophomore.

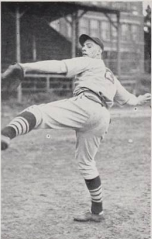
Heading the list of five outfielders was Dwight Aden, slugging senior from Oregon City, and Verdell Ragsdale, both lettermen. Buzz Hagedorn, rook from Portland, won the right field position by his hard-hitting, although pushed hard by Dwight Catherwood, Mill City freshman. Derb Southard, another Baker first-year man, completes the squad's roster.

As aforementioned, the season opened none too auspiciously, for the Beavers were five times rained out of their scheduled opener. Yet, as the team now heads for Whitman, it carries along 18 victories, posted as follows:

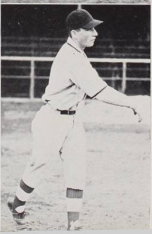
Three wins over Oregon State college (extending Willamette's winning streak over the Beavers to 11 straight games in four years), 5-0, 9-2, 5-4; one over the University of Oregon, 4-0; one over Oregon Normal, 19-5; one over Mt. Angel college, 15-5; four over Albany college, 12-2, 20-1, 23-0, 20-1; two over University of Portland, 7-4, 11-4; four over Pacific university, 13-4, 9-2, 17-3, 4-1; and two over College of Puget Sound, 5-0, 12-2.

Statistical totals for the initial 22 games found Willamette's slugging crew pounding the ball at a team average of .313; with 216 runs to its credit, counted on 238 hits, including 45 doubles, 13 triples and 11 home runs. Leading individual hitters were Dwight Aden with a .398 mark; Bill Beard at .381; Derb Southard at .359; Gordy Williamson at .318; Verdell Ragsdale at .314; Lee Shinn at .303, and Rex Pierce and Roy Orren at .297.

Ace chuckers were Walt Weaver, with five wins and one loss, Jerry Gastineau with four victories and two defeats, Jack Criswell with three wins and no losses, and Larry Nunnenkamp with three victories and one defeat.

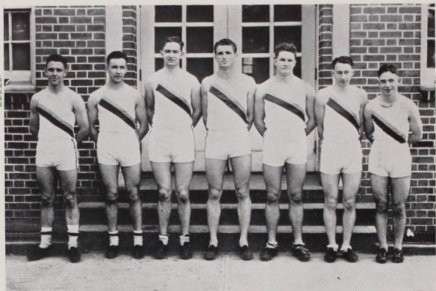

Track Squad

Track, although one of the four major sports at Willamette, failed to "get in line" with the championship mode in its three rival fields this season. Hampered by virtually every possible jinx and restriction, Coach Les Sparks has never-the-less turned out a creditable cinder path squad.

The outlook for the season was dimmed at the start when only two lettermen, John Kelly and Dexter Russell, both sophomore sprinters, reported for the initial drills. Five other competitors who saw some action in the 1936 spring season were available.

Rain produced the first hindrance to varsity hopes, as all Oregon schools saw the usual month-long training session washed out by the heaviest spring rain-fall in many years. For the first time in more than six seasons, Willamette's track men did not stage their traditional inter-class meet; again because of the inclement weather conditions.

The second major hindrance was the condition of the Sweetland Stadium oval. With its south straight-away virtually destroyed by erection of the new grandstand, repairs to the cinder path were delayed, pending completion of minor improvements to the grid-iron.

Third and most common of all coaching jinxes to befall the Bearcat squad was the injury one. Justin Weakley, ace javelin thrower and pole vaulter, injured his arm in the initial meet of the season and is still below usual form. Jim Johnson, promising rookie quarter-miler, and Bob Brown, Salem sophomore distance man, suffered leg injuries that slowed up the squad in its second and third meets. The final track competition of the season before this year's book went to press saw the injury jinx climaxed as Bob Hawk, veteran sprinter, pulled a tendon in the Portland relays, an injury that may force him out for the rest of the season.

The first dual competition of the year, against the strong College of Puget Sound team, saw the Bearcat runners take an expected drubbing, 100 to 31. Weakley, tossing the javelin well over 170 feet, copped Willamette's only first place.

The loss of Johnson was particularly hard-felt as Coach Lestle Sparks' crew dropped their second dual meet, 66 to 64, to Pacific university. Johnson's entry would have made a much-stronger mile relay team possible.

Despite the handicaps, the Cardinal and Gold track and field artists copped six first places. Big Bill McAdam, husky Californian, took "iron man" honors by placing in four events and piling up 14 points.

McAdam won the shot-put and the high hurdles, placed second in the low hurdles and third in the discus. Other Bearcat firsts were taken by Kelly in the 100-yard dash, Varnes in the discus, Weakley in the javelin and Jones in the low hurdles.

Third competition of the year saw the Bearcats finish fourth in the annual University of Portland relays, a notch higher in the point columns than in the year previous. Willamette accounted for 12½ counters and established one new meet record—by Chet Varnes, Salem rook discus tosser.

Varnes' record discus throw of 129 feet, 7 inches, brought Willamette its only first place in the relays, although the Bearcats held a commanding lead in the third lap of the sprint relay until Hawk pulled the tendon in his leg.

The squad showed great improvement in its fourth meet of the season, although Whitman college, perennial conference track champion, took a convincing 86 to 45 victory.

Bearcat firsts were taken by Kelly in the 100-yard dash, Russell in the 220, Weakley in the javelin, Schmidt in a two-way tie for first in the high jump, and Weakley in a three-way tie for first honors in the pole vault.

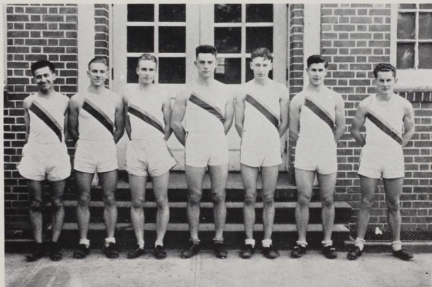
Still improving, Coach Sparks' track ace broke into the win column for the first time, by dropping Oregon Normal's strong team in a dual meet, 70 to 61. Victory in the mile relay produced the season's initial win.

Keuscher in the mile, Weakley in the pole vault, Schmidt in the half-mile, Weakley in the javelin, Brown in the two-mile, Russell in the broad jump and Brainard, McAdam, Schmidt and Hogensen in the mile relay took Willamette firsts.

As the book goes to press, the Bearcats have a five-way meet at the University of Portland on May 22, and the annual conference track and field championships at Walla Walla on the night of May 28, left on their schedule.

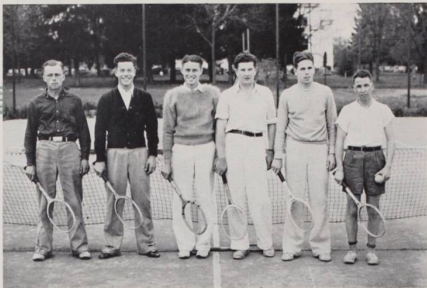

Tennis Team

A varsity tennis squad that probably rates stronger all-the-way-around than any in the past three years has carried the Bearcat colors to victory in six of the initial nine matches of the season thus far played.

Booming toward copping either the coveted conference team title or Willamette's share of the individual conference championships, the Cardinal and Gold net varsity has already trounced two important Pacific Northwest conference rivals in team competition this year.

Only the undefeated University of Oregon's hard-court aggregation and Oregon State college's racqueteers hold wins over Willamette this year. Oregon took 6-1 and 7-0 victories, while the Beavers' margin was 9-0.

Against these two defeats the Bearcats hold two wins over Oregon Normal, 4-0 and 3-0, in a pair of matches cut short each time by rain; one over Pacific university, 4-0; one over Reed college of Portland, 6-1, one over Albany college, 4-0, and one over College of Puget Sound, 5-2.

Rained out of all usual early-season ladder tournaments and practice sessions, the Bearcats started the year with only two holdover lettermen from the 1936 season—Joe Harvey, Portland senior, and Bill Clemes, Portland sophomore.

Two transfer lettermen from other conference schools—Herman Estes, law student from Tacoma's College of Puget Sound, and Francis Sherwood, from Linfield college—gave Coach Lestle Sparks another pair of veterans, and hopes were considerably brightened for a successful season when Don Saunders, Salem letterman of two years ago, returned to school.

Aris Sherwood, sophomore from Newberg who saw some action last year, won the last team berth over two promising freshmen contenders—Steve Staynor of Salem and Warren Bertelson of Salem.

Thus far this season Clemes, Estes and Saunders have proved Willamette's most consistent winners, in that order. Doubles combinations have found Harvey and Estes teaming, and Aris Sherwood and Clemes.

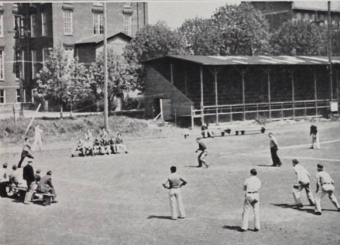

SOFTBALL

Alpha Psi Delta, winning three play-off games, captured the annual University Softball Championship, to account for its second major title of the year. The strong fraternity nine whipped the Sigma Tau's, 13-4, and the Physical Education Staff, 6-3 to win its way into the finals. The championship game saw the Alpha Psi's win out 9-8, in the last inning as Guerin tripled and Keuscher singled. According to figures compiled by Hal Cattley, Alpha Psi manager, John Kelly and Frank Guerin of Alpha Psi, and Les Sparks of the P. E. Staff were the league's leading hitters. Dan Moses and Bob Keuscher, Alpha Psi pitchers, went through the regular season with undefeated and one defeat records, respectively, while Don Stockwell, P. E. Staff, had the third best record with only two defeats.

The first all-star team was composed of Harry Mosher, Alpha Psi, catcher; Don Stockwell, P. E. Staff, and Bob Keuscher, Alpha Psi, pitchers; Frank Guerin, Alpha Psi, first base; Cecil Quesseth, Alpha Psi, second base; John Kelly, Alpha Psi, shortstop; and Joe Harvey, Sigma Tau, third base. In the outfield were Joe Blanchard, P. E. Staff; Norris Joyce, P. E. Staff, and Jimmy Barnett, Kappas. Teams entered in the league this year were the Independents, Kappa Gamma Rho, Sigma Tau, Alpha Psi Delta, Law School, and the P. E. Staff.

TENNIS

Intramural tennis started in the middle of May and lasted until the close of school in June. However, due to the lateness of the schedule, no information on the competitors and winners can be given. Les Sparks is planning on having both singles and doubles divisions, with medals for the winners.

BASKETBALL

Winning three straight games in the playoffs, after finishing first in the regular schedule, the Independent A team won its first intramural basketball title. Led by Jim Pyke, Gene Hibbard and Dale Crabtree, the Independents defeated the Swishers, 21 to 19, and the Fish Chokers twice, 23 to 18, and 27 to 14, in the playoffs, to win the championship. Jim Pike of the Independent A's was leading scorer in the playoffs with a total of 26 points in three games, and Norris Joyce of the Fish Chokers was second with 25 points in four games.

Since several of the players have played college basketball, a separate "Colossal's" All-Star quintet was selected. On this team were Les Sparks, P. E. Staff, and Joe Harvey, Sigma Tau, forwards; Bob Vagt, Law School, center; and Lee Canessa, Fish Chokers, and George Erickson, P. E. Staff, guards. On the regular first intramural all-star team were Jim Pyke, Independent A's, and Bob Keuscher, Freshman B's, forwards; Dale Crabtree, Independent A's, center; and Norris Joyce, Fish Chokers, and Dick Weisgerber, P. Like Jack the Giant Killer of mythical fame, Bellfountain swept through the 18th annual state high school basketball tournament. And when the big prep hoop classic was over, fans generally conceded that it had been just a breeze for the little 19-boy school somewhere in Benton county.

The Bells, coached by Bill Lemmon, former Willamette star, had little trouble in collecting the majority of the silverware. They easily captured the state "B" school crown by taking Amity and Chiloquin in stride with 43 to 28 and 39 to 21 victories, respectively.

In the semi-finals the smooth-working preppers eliminated Franklin high of Portland's strong entry, 39 to 13, and then climaxed the brilliant tournament performance with an equally impressive 35 to 21 win over Lincoln of Portland in the final clash.

Third place went to Franklin, fourth to Salem, fifth to Astoria, sixth to McLoughlin, seventh to Eugene—the tournament's biggest disappointment—and eighth to La Grande.

Two scoring records went by the boards in this, the 18th tournament, with Astoria breaking both of them. Earl Sandness, elongated Fishermen center, set a new individual tournament scoring mark of 68 points, breaking both the four-game record of 59—set last year by Ted Sarpola, Astoria—and the five-game record of 65, set in 1929 by Ed Lewis, of Washington.

The Fishermen, meanwhile, set a new team scoring mark of 180 points, 17 more than Corvallis' record of last year, and one more than Washington's five-game record in 1929.

The annual all-state team saw the champion Bells again "clean up" in traditional champion style. Dick Kessler, Bell center, and Harrison Wallace, Bell guard, rated first string honors, along with Lee Sitton, Lincoln forward; Don Mabee, McMinnville forward, and Jiggs Fisk, brilliant McLoughlin guard.

Women's Sports

Facilities and equipment for seven women's sports were provided for in the 1936-37 school year, under the capable direction of Mrs. E. Gail Royer, University of Minnesota graduate, who filled in as head of Bearcat feminine athletics while Miss Alida Currey was on a year's leave of absence. Mrs. Royer was assisted by her senior scholar, Anna May Unrath, and other senior physical education majors—Anoka Coates, Rachael Yocom and Rosemary Huffman.

Soccer, basketball, volleyball, softball, archery, tennis and swimming were concluded in their respective seasons by tournaments which allowed every girl to participate. In addition, inter-gym competition was held in basketball, volleyball and track. Feature of the department's other year's activities was the presentation of the May Day dances and "Toyland" theme, under the direction of Frances Faber, junior physical education major.

This year, for the initial time, a new course entitled "History of Nursing" was added to the curriculum, in addition to those in Kinesiology, Corrective Physical Education, History of Physical Education, and Physiology of Exercise. Of added interest in the physical education department this year was an invitation to attend the annual convention of the Athletic Federation of College Women.
