Dr. Riggs, who has had considerable experience in child psychology at the Johns Hopkins Child Guidance center, will take over the advanced courses, while Dr. Lantz, who has had wide experience in the psychology field also, will teach the elementary psychology classes.

The big Gold team wasted no time in showing their opponents who was to be the victor of the contest, and scored their lone counter in the first period.

A tricky reverse on the kickoff backfired in the faces of the Cardinals and forced them to kick after three attempts through the line. The Gold team immediately went to work with their power plays and advanced the ball to the Cardinal 11 yard line. Hulbert, fullback for the Golds, then plunged through the center for the touchdown. Cline split the uprights for the extra point.

Defending their slim 7 point lead proved to be quite a task for the Golds during the second half as the Cardinals continually threatened to score. Three successful goal line stands by the Golds in the third quarter kept the crowd on its feet, but disaster struck in the fourth period when Dave Bush was hauled down in the end zone by "Rocky" Palmer as he attempted an end run.

Longest run of the day was turned in by Jim Cline when he returned Ed Michael's punt all the way from his own four to the Cardinal 30 yard stripe.

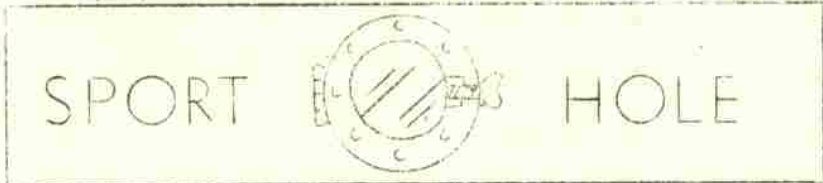
DOUBT CLOUDS B-2 VICTORY
