## KICKERS SET RECORDS

The men's soccer team kicked their way to a successful season, at one point ranking fourteenth in the nation. Their season ended with an impressive 12.5-2 record and an array of school records, individual and team.

The Bearcats only allowed 18 goals, bettering the previous record of 19 set in 1982. Jim Gress finished his senior year having played in every game since his freshman year, bringing his total to 73 games played and swept away the previous record of 65. Goalie Russ Sovde posted six shutouts, bettering the previous record of five set in 1984 and forward Greg Marshall scored three goals in a single game, tying a previous record.

Five players, senior back Jim Gress, junior midfield Salvador Reyes, junior midfield Derick Wangaard, sophomore back Mike Hmura, and sophomore goalie Russ Sovde, were selected to both the all-conference and all-district teams. Gress was elected M.V.P. Other award winners included top defender-Hmura, top Fresh-man-back Brian Miller, and forward David Humes as leading scorer and top offensive player. Coach Brad Victor summed up the season by saying. "We had a good season, almost a great one."



## WOMEN'S SOCCER

Who will be this year's NAIA District Women's Soccer Champion? was a question many people asked themselves this year. It came down to two teams: Willamette and Pacific. The victory was difficult, but the lady Bear-
cat's prevailed, and gained the District title. The District Champions traveled to the NAIA Regional playoffs in Washington, where they battled with tough teams. The season was a definite success in the eyes of many.






## VOLLEYBALL

The women's volleyball team improved drastically this year. They completed the season with a $10-21$ record. As a team, they grew and learned to play well together, as well as dealing with a new coach, Ken Hise. Stephanie Payne was selected most valuable player, and both she and Cary Mooney made the Northwest Conference's Honorable Mention list. The team gained a lot of experience this year and intend to come on strong next year.




## STRONG MEN PLACE HIGH

The men's cross country team led by senior Dave Gilroy, worked hard and showed off their strength by placing high in most of the meets of the season.

The Bearcat harriers suffered some injuries at the beginning of the season, but came back and eight out of the ten members lettered. It was basically a young team, five out of the ten were freshmen, but they ran hard and were a team to contend with

This year marked the first year that
the team was in the NCAA Division III, and they placed seventh out of 13 teams at the regional meet in San Francisco. Gilroy, who was also a conference all-star, placed seventh individually making him a regional all-star. He was followed by junior Amar Kamadoli at 21st and treshman Kevin Adkisson at 23rd. "This year was a building year," commented Gilroy, "the course in San Francisco was the most difficult I have ever run on. I think in the future we will be better prepared."





## WOMENS CROSS COUNTRY

"Runners to your mark . . . go!" The lady Bearcat harriers ran a respectable season, considering a variety of injuries many of the team members contracted at the beginning of the season. The women ran strongly and individual members achieved personal bests consistently throughout the season.

This marked the first year the cross country team competed in the NCAA Division III and they attended the regional meet in San Francisco on November 14 . They placed sixth out of 13 teams predominately from the California area. Senior Tracy Reisinger was a conference all-star and she also placed highest in the regional meet at 11th
out of a field of 85 runners. Second for Willamette was junior Kelli Cammack who placed 19th. Reisinger said of the season "The new district was really tough, but after a few years' experience behind us we should be doing well."

## INDIVIDUALS PERFORM WELL

The Bearcat gridders came out of a difficult start to finish their 87 ' season on a good note tying Pacific and beating Lewis and Clark 27-17 in the final game.

Individual players performed quite well and earned special honors. Junior quarterback Todd Greenough broke seven school records and ranked no. 1 in passing and total offense in the Columbia Football League, and fourth and fifth respectively in those categories nationally. Greenough, senior center Jim Kramer and senior linebacker Brett Sullivan were selected for the first team all-CFL Southern Division. Sullivan was also twice named as CFL "Defense Player of the Week." Sophomore wide receiver Les Powers was named CFL S.D. "Offensive Player of the Week" and senior cornerback Shawn Spain was named NAIA Division II "Defensive Player of the Week."

The players kept high academic standing and four players, Pete Smith, Steve Farnes, Brett Sullivan and Jim Kramer were nominated for academic All-American. Also, Roger Budge and Greg Preite received the G. Herbert Smith Scholarship.

## BASKETBALL

"It's up . . . and it's good!" So went the year for the men's basketball team, ending with a final record of 18 10. This was the first time in five years that the Bearcats finished the season with more wins that losses. The team was led first by senior forward Dan Yates, then, after Yates suffered an injury, by junior forward Scott Marshall who returned from a semester in Japan. Senior point guard Rick Ash led the conference in assists and steals. Also, senior guard Mike Shepard shot the highest scoring average at 14.8 per game for the season. The future looks bright for the team as two of the
starters were freshmen: Erik Clarkson and Ted Harris. Clarksen, $6^{\prime} 3^{\prime \prime}$, averaged 13.5 points per game and Harris led the team in 3 point percentage and placed second to Ash in assists. The awards of the year went to: first year coach Gordie James as NAIA Dist. 11 Coach of the Year; Ash and Shepard were selected for first team All-Conference and first team NAIA Dist. 11 Western Division (Ash was also chosen for first team NAIA Dist. 11); Marshall and Clarkson were chosen for the second team All Conference. Finally, this year was the first time Willamette won the Northwest Conference since 1960.

## WOMENS BASKETBALL

The Willamette women's basketball team consisted of players from a variety of areas including three returning starters, two junior college transfers, and two players off both the volleyball and soccer teams. The team played well defeating SOSC, PLU, and for the first time in six years, WOSC.

Senior center Donna Kalama was the leading scorer with 347 points, averaging 12.9 points per game. She was followed by senior guard Tracy Thom who shot for a total of 340 points and a 12.6 average per game. Kalama also led rebounding with an average of 10 per game and sophomore guard Kathy Kelso led in assists with 105 total for the season. Both Thom and Kalama were nominated to NCIC all-conference and Kalama was named NAIA scholar athlete. Head Coach Cheryl Brown said "The Lady Bearcats were a bit inconsistent this year, but performed well for a team that had seven new faces."
