## PROF. DUNN HERE.

*"Oregon" Instructor Speaks in Chapel.*

Prof. F. S. Dunn, head professor in the department of Latin and Greek at the University of Oregon, addressed the students at chapel service last week. Prof. Dunn conducted the Rhodes Scholarship examination, held in Eaton Hall October 19 and 20.

Eleven years ago Mr. Dunn was associated with our own faculty, and the many happy reminiscences of that time, recounted for the edification of our students in the gentleman's own inimitable manner, entertained us all during the chapel period. Many of the old formalities formerly observed at Willamette were recalled, such as the chapel march, and the custom pursued every April Fool's Day, when in place of leaving chapel for the class rooms, through some misunderstanding the students all marched out onto the campus, and there lingered until the faculty, smitten with a sense of humor and a desire to go fishing, and actuated per chance through lack of students, excused all classes for the day. The time Clarence Bishop stole the bell clapper when Prof. Dunn was holding the bell was also mentioned, but nothing was said about putting an old rheumatic cow in chapel, there to browse about the tree of knowledge and ruminate the long night through. Nor when a biped bicycle, the property of one secretary of the Board of Trustees, was transported from the lower floor to the highest elevation and was there annexed to the flagpole, to be discovered in the rosy hues of early morning floating in the breeze. We enjoyed having Prof. Dunn with us. His address concerned a phase of student life that should never be entirely eliminated.

## W. U. vs. "OREGON" SATURDAY.

*'Varsity Squad Will be Stronger than in Contest with Multnomah.*

On Saturday next Coach Sweetland's bunch of athletes will contest for supremacy with the team from the University of Oregon. The Oregon team is one of the heaviest on the coast, averaging 180 pounds each, while the line will average close to 200 pounds. Our team will probably not go over 155 pounds per man, but can be depended upon to put up a lightning article of ball. The team is materially strengthened with the addition of McKnight, and with the experience of the M. A. A. C. game to work on, will be heard from next Saturday. The lineup follows: Low, left end; Wesley or McKnight, left tackle; Belknap, left guard; Blackwell or Winslow, center; Reeves, right guard; Hamilton, right tackle; Sullivan or Euster, right end; Booth, quarter; McMackin, right half; Cummins or Gibson, left half; Rader, full-back.

### OREGON AND UTAH TO DEBATE FOR CHAMPIONSHIP.

*Will Try Conclusions Either in Eugene or Portland—Rivalry Begun Three Years Ago by Victory of Veach and Galloway to be Settled.*

Oregon and Utah will hold their third annual debate this year in either Eugene or Portland.

This decision was made by the committee on oratory and debate last Monday afternoon, when Manager C. A. Steele read a communication from the University of Utah requesting that third debate be held to decide the championship. The first contest was won by Oregon; the second, by Utah.

On both the former occasions, Oregon felt unable to finance a debate from such a distance, but this year it has been decided to make the attempt. It is even very possible that the contest will be held in Portland, in which case it would attract metropolitan attention as the first inter-state 'varsity debate ever held there.

The question will be the same as that for the triangular league debate, but it is not yet determined just when to hold it. In former years it has been a post-season contest, the team being chosen from the two regular teams.

This year Coach Buchen is in favor of holding the Utah debate first, but the matter was left for subsequent action. In the latter case the team will be chosen in a special tryout.

The challenge for a debate with O. A. C. was declined, it being the opinion of all present that the 'varsity teams would have their hands full without entering any new contests.—Ex.
