The Salem Indian School is unique in its history in that, there are many notable happenings that have been recorded and we cuote from writings by historians. The general impression is that the work Chemawa deals exclusively with the present location of the Chemawa and so school, but before going into history of the present location it might be well for us to begin at the beginning which takes us back about 10 years before the school at Chem transferred from Forest Grove, Oregon to its present location. It is found in the introduction of the Salem directory of 1871 and 1872, written by L. H. Judson and signed by his

initials, these words: "Thus year by year, slowly, yet surely, the little isolated settlement of hardy pioneers increased in wealth and numbers while the Mission settlement at Chemeketa. with its mills, and its farms at Chemewa, opposite to the place now called Wheatland, giving employment to many who, but for such an opportunity to earn the necessarys of life must have found much preater difficulty to improve a claim or make a settlement and was a nucleus around which were gathering the elements of an embry-o town which has grown to be the city of Salem, the capitol of the state of Oregon----first in educational and political influence in this young and vigorous state.

"Its form at Chemewa" meant the original Jason Lee mission site, of course. The spelling of Mr. Judson of the name Chemawa was C-h-e-m-e-w-a

at the time of the establishment of the school in 1885 and the place named Chemawa, Reverend J. L. Parrish said that it was appropriate, for it was not far from the original Chemawa, place of the gravel on the river. Thr original pronunciation of the name Chemawa was Chem-a-way and the Ch, meaning place, was made with the guttral sound from the throat like the blowing of the breath. The Name with Chemeketa, Indian name for the site of Salem, meaning place of meeting.

Historians have variously surmised that the meaning of the word Chemawa was "True Talk", or "Old Home", "Gravelly Soil", etc. We at Chemawa have accepted the meaning of the word Chemawa to be "Happy Home".

Here was started and organized

at old Chemawa (the place opposite
Wheatland) the first Indian School
west of the Rockies and north of the
Californis line.

The first Protestent Sunday
School in the same territory was
organized there, still in existence
as the Sunday School of the first
Methodist Church of Salem. The
beginnings of that church were made
at the mission when it was still in
Old Chemawa.

Many important things were started there, among them being the civil common wealth of Oregon, beginning with the provisional government authorized and set in motion there February 18, 1841.

The provisional government was written there, in the mission grainery and hospital.

Missionaries societies to the
Indians were organized there, and temperance societies.

Indian slavery in the Oregon country was abolished there. The first medical physician began his practice there.

The first white women and child buried in Oregon country soil had

interment there, -----later removed to Lee Mission Cemetery, Salem.

Sufficient has been said to indicate the honorable and historically high setting of the name Chemawa.

The question has been asked who named the place Chemana? Dr. H. J.

Ninthorn, uncle to Ex-president

Herbert Hoover, is said to have given the name Chemawa. Herbert Hoover,
