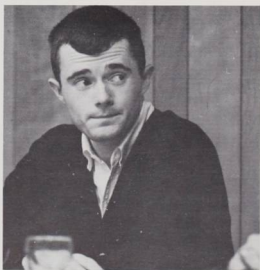




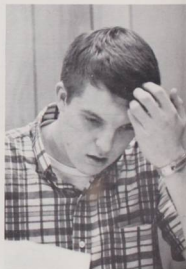
## student government, organizational responsibility

Basically student government at Willamette is a needed and effective organization.

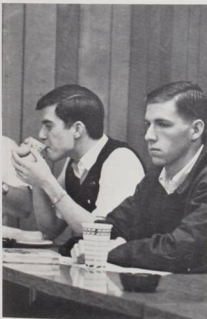

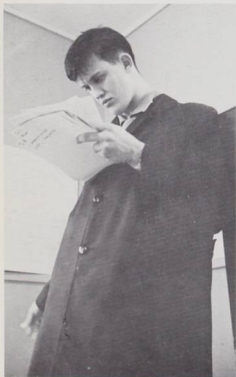

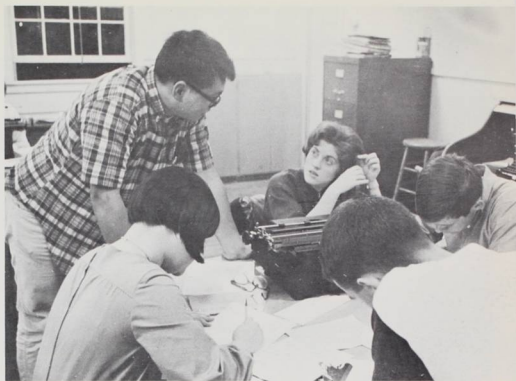

Kawana's "Krew" frequently published issues of up to twelve pages for certain campus events as Homecoming and Freshman Glee.





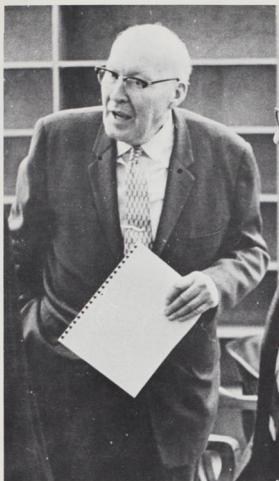

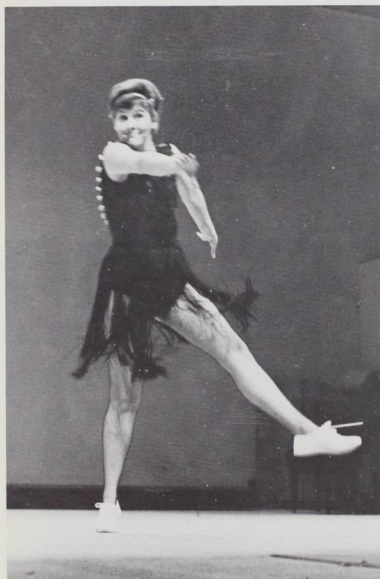
The afternoon brought good weather and a 20-0 shellacking of Pacific.

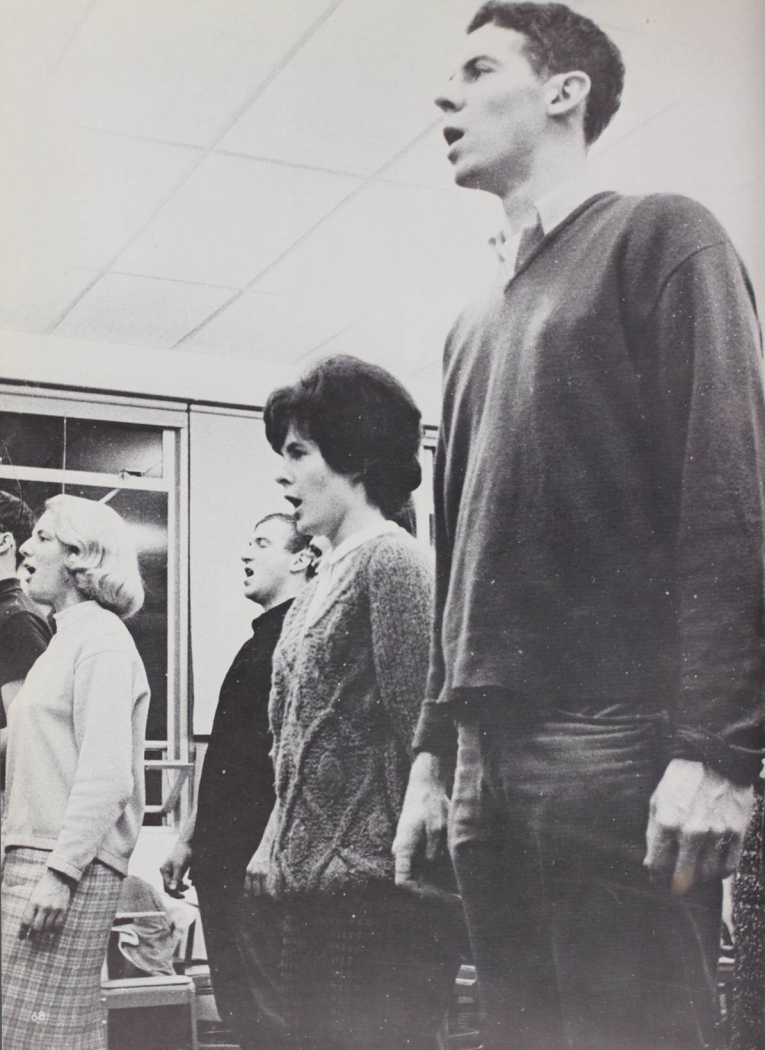

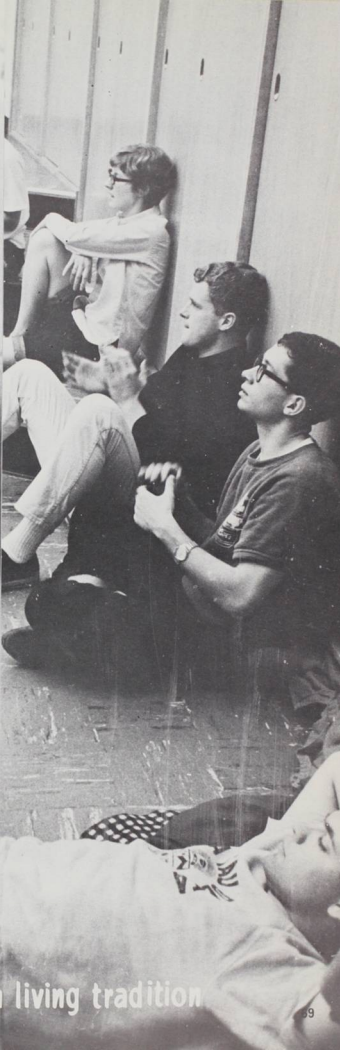

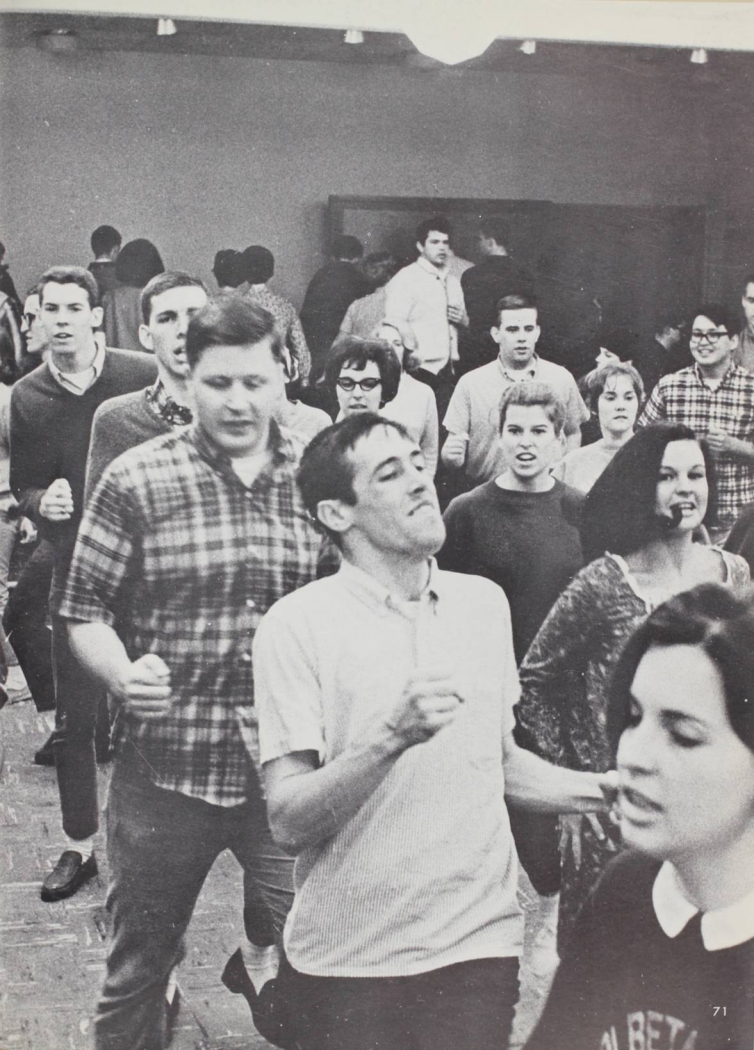


## endless preparation

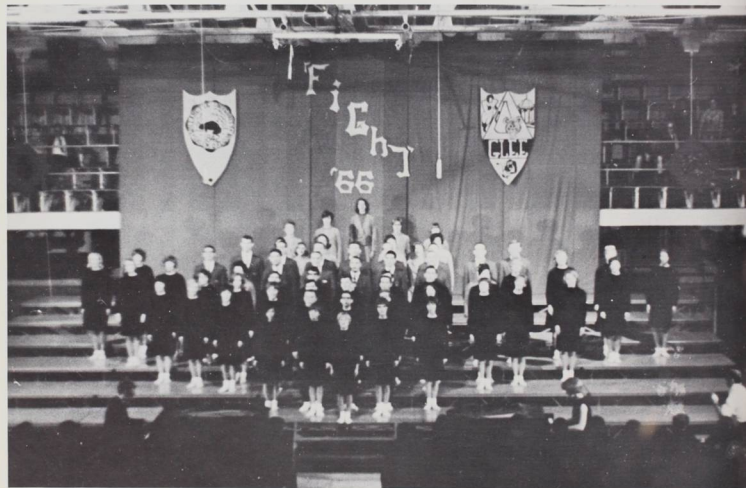
## one night —

The '66 Glee was dedicated to the retiring Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, Dean Robert Gregg, who served Willamette for 18 years.



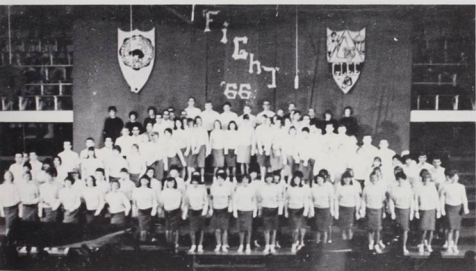

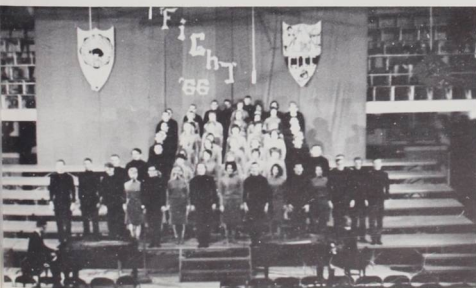

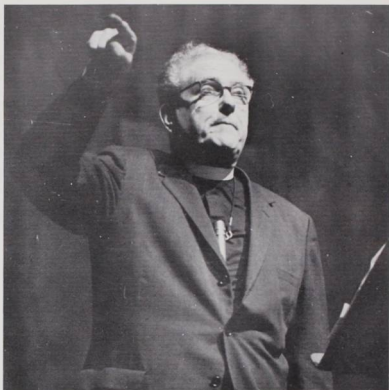
Dr. Erik von Kuehnelt-Leddihn spoke on

The boys gave their show to a sell-out crowd of over 1200.

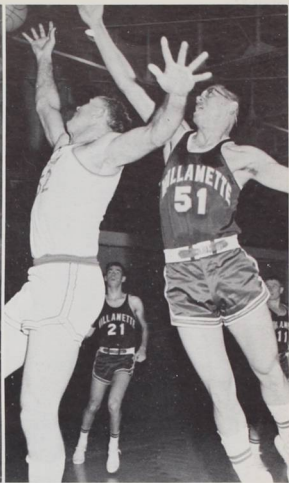
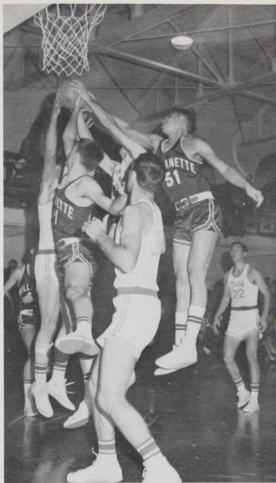

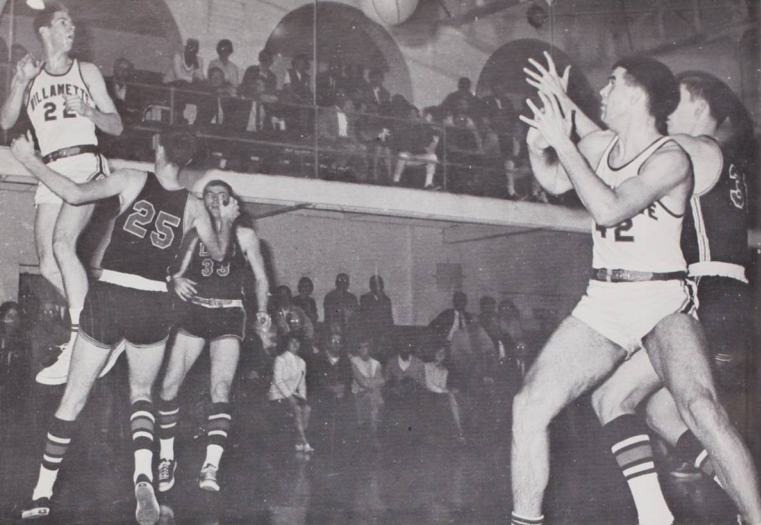


## cross country

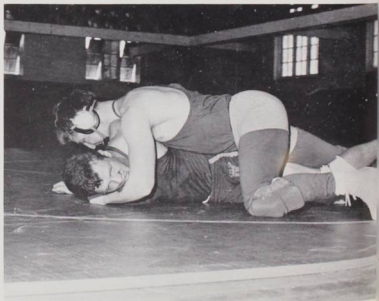




## wrestling

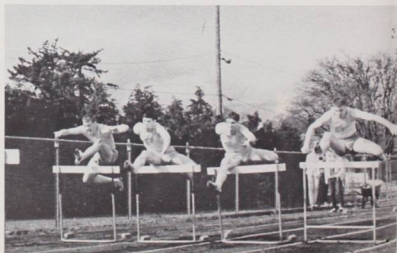
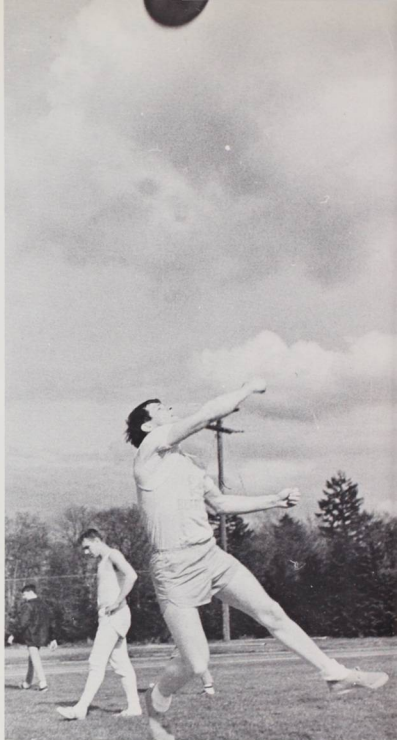
# swimmers take second place in district

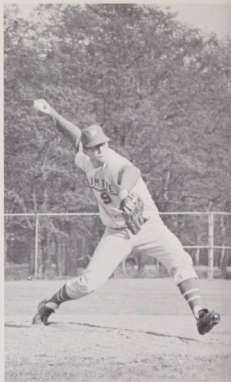

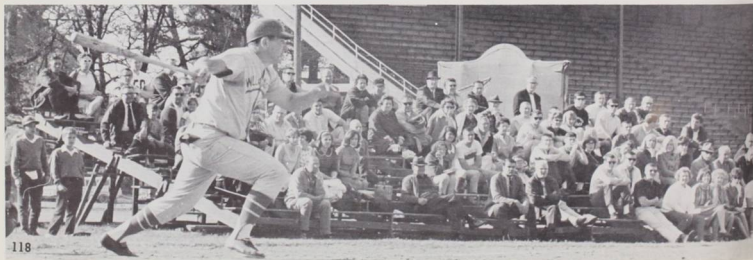
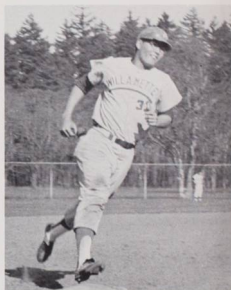
# baseball

Junior Loren Whittaker was the top man on the mound with a 7-1 record and 1.86 earned run average.



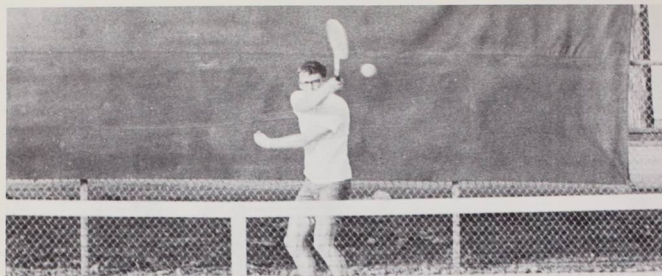

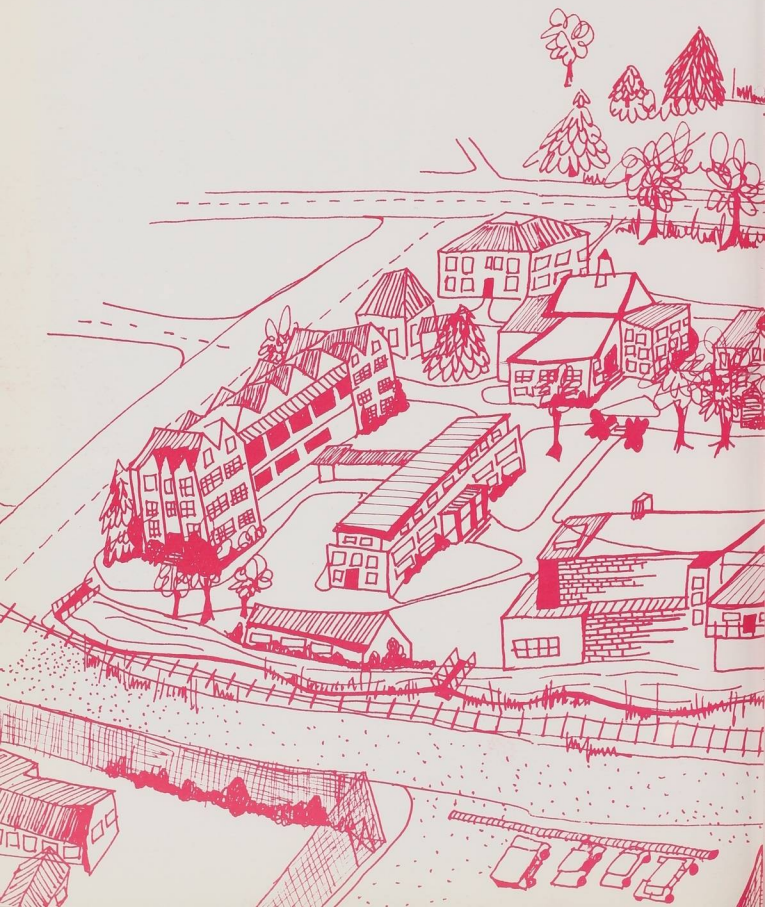


## intramurals—house laurels

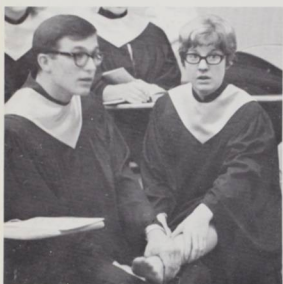
Like the other groups, the chamber orchestra also made a tour. This group comprises the core of the Salem Community Symphony which presented a series of entertaining concerts throughout the year.

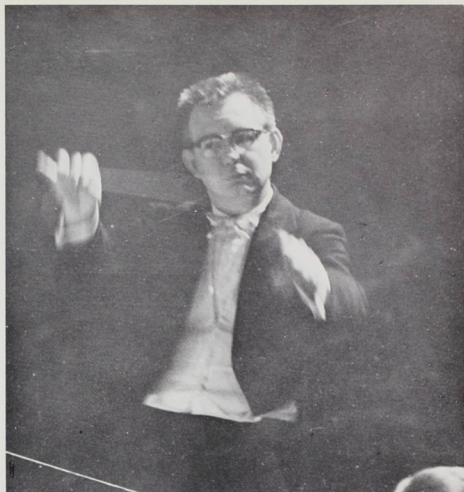
