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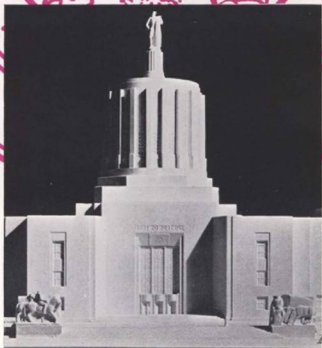
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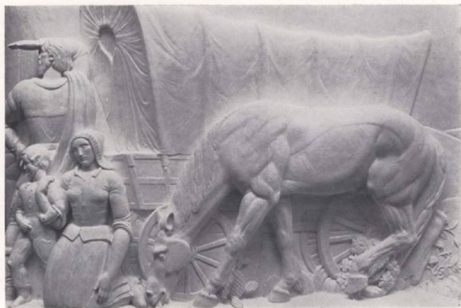
# FOREWORD

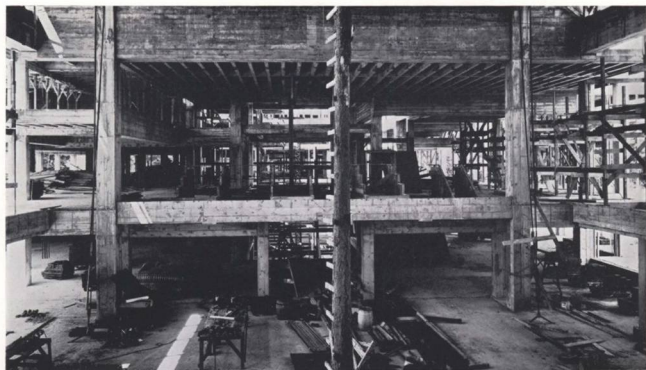

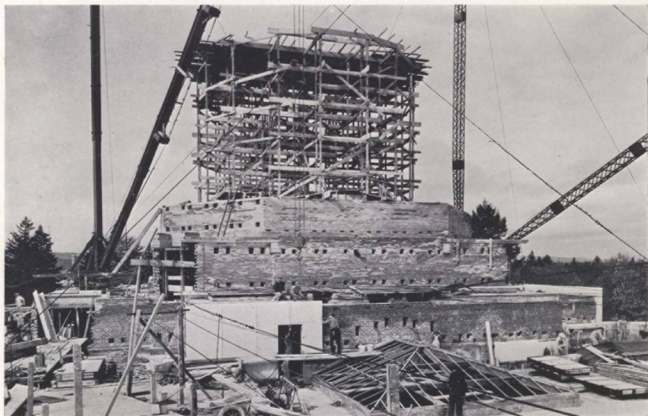






## Reconstruction Oregon State Capitol

ON APRIL 25, 1935, the Oregon Capitol was destroyed by fire, necessitating the construction of a new building. A commission was created by act of the Oregon legislative assembly, composed of nine members, three appointed by the governor, three by the president of the senate, and three by the speaker of the house. At an early meeting of the Commission it was voted to select an architect for the capitol building by means of a nation-wide competition. One hundred and twenty-six designs were submitted from architects in eighteen states of the Union and the District of Columbia. The winner was Trowbridge & Livingston, New York City. On the pages that follow, this prize-winning design takes shape.





## Reconstruction Oregon State Capitol

WORK on the building started on December 4, 1936, one year from the date of the organization of the Reconstruction Commission. The total cost now stands at approximately \$2,100,000. \$176,000 of this total is allotted to the decoration of the building. Statuary and mural paintings are to include the following:

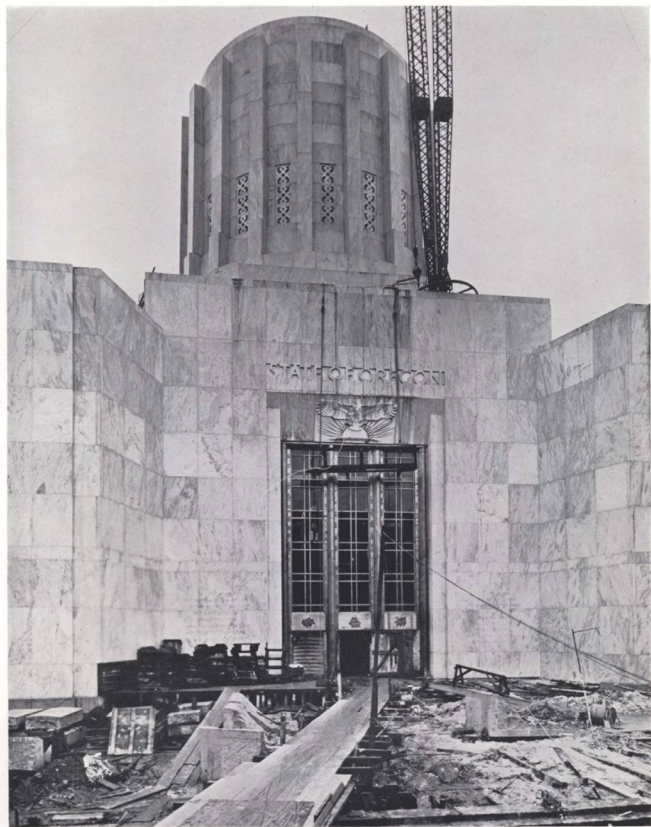
Statuary, statue of a pioneer surmounting the building; in front of the building, two great block sculptures, one representing Lewis and Clark and Sacajawea, and the other The Covered Wagon. On the back of the first block will be a map showing the Lewis and Clark routes and on the back of the other a map of the Old Oregon Trail. A carving of the great seal of the state will be over the front entrance and there will be other carvings over the end doors. The bronze doors at the main entrance will have relief decorations.

## Reconstruction Oregon State Capitol

THERE will be decorative painting in the rotunda and over the stairs, and murals in the rotunda, on the stair walls, over the entrances to the two chambers, back of the rostrums in each chamber, and over the fireplace in the governor's reception room.

Throughout the building, the history of Oregon will be the theme of decoration, making the new capitol one of historic as well as artistic significance.

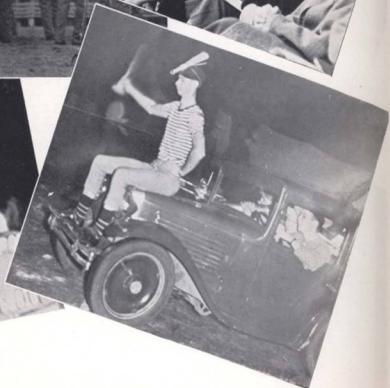
Another highlight in the activities of the Physical Education Club this year, was an exhibition demonstrating the method and value of community singing and play as a recreational activity.

## Athletic Administration

The guiding hand of genial Coach Roy "Spec" Keene, competently guided Willamette athletics through this, the 1937-38 season, as Bearcat sports entered their 12th year under the ex-Oregon State star.

This year also saw the addition to the athletic administration of a new full-time mentor, Howard Maple, who led the hoop squad to a co-championship of the Pacific Northwest conference. Graduated from Oregon State in 1929, after gaining All-American quarterback honors in 1928 and capturing the baseball team in 1929, "Mapes" entered professional football on the roster of the Chicago Cardinals, competing in the 1929 and 1930 seasons.

As for Keene's record, it stands unchallenged. 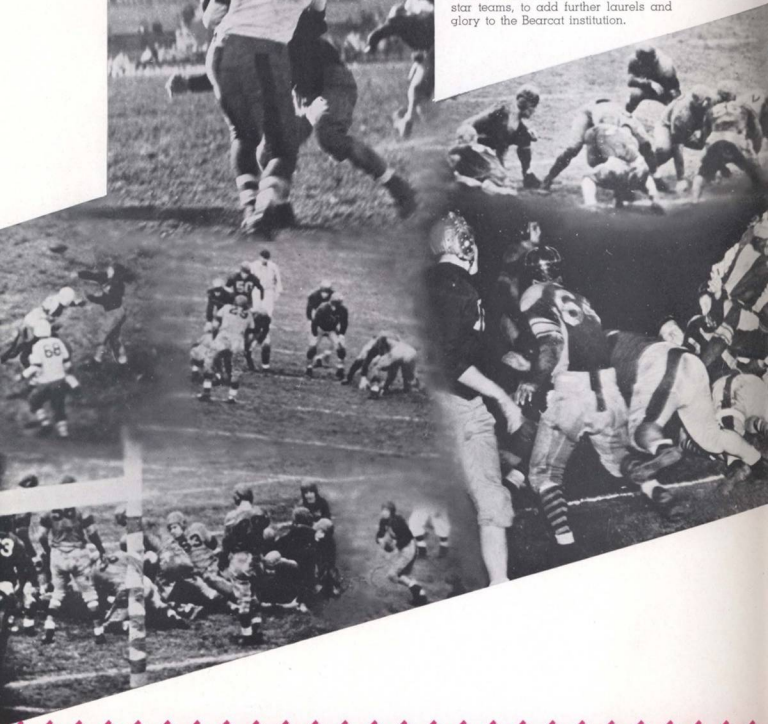
## Pep Staff

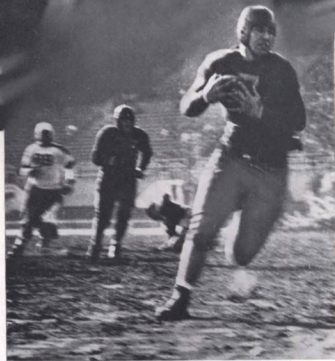

Six victories in nine starts and the Bearcats' fourth consecutive Pacific Northwest conference championship is the impressive record compiled by Coach Spec Keene's Willamette football team in its 1937 season.

Victorious over University of Portland, Whittier College, Pacific University, College of Puget Sound, Whitman College, and the University of Nevada, Keene's eleven pushed over 17 touchdowns to run up 114 points to 77 for rivals.

"State" schools proved to be the nemesis of the Salem Collegians, with San Jose State, Fresno State, and Oregon State all administering drubbings to the big red-shirted 'Cats.

Captain Ken Gleason intercepted Billy Beard's forward pass with four minutes of the game remaining, tucked it securely under his arm, and raced 42 yards down the sideline to give Fresno State College the only touchdown of the game and a 7 to 0 victory over Keene's men in their season debut before local fans.

Undaunted by a defeat in their first game, the Bearcats came back the next week-end to score a decisive 20 to 0 upset victory over University of Portland's Pilots at Multnomah Civic stadium in Portland. Dick Weiserber, the "Jersey Juggernaut," and Neil Shaffer combined forces to batter the Pilot forward ball into submission and then punch across three touchdowns and two conversions, Willamette meanwhile holding the losers scoreless.

San Jose's Spartans, displaying a smooth, highly-gearred attack, rolled to a 31 to 7 victory over the game but outclassed Oregonians in their next game. Played at San Jose, the game featured the accurate passing of McPherson, San Jose fullback, who kept the traveling invaders in hot water all afternoon with his spot tosses.

Billy Beard was both hero and goat of the 13 to 6 Homecoming victory over a stubborn Whittier College eleven. At the start of the game Beard handed Whittier three scoring chances on two fumbles

and a 12-yard punt, but redeemed himself by intercepting a pass in the closing minutes and galloping 46 yards with the pigskin to give Willamette its 11th consecutive homecoming victory.

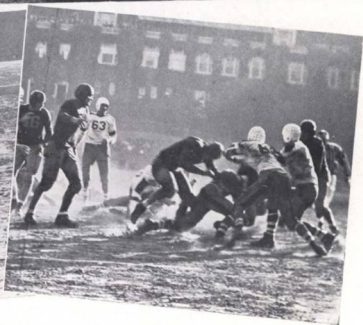
College of Puget Sound's Loggers next felt the power of the Bearcat attack, as they went down to a 7 to 0 defeat at Tacoma. A 60-yard march late in the third period, culminating in a touchdown pass from Beard to Weisgerber, furnished the margin of victory for the Bearcats, and started them toward their conference championship.

Oregon State's Beavers, after having a real scare thrown into them in the third period, came back to run up a 20 to 0 victory over the smaller Bearcats in Willamette's next game, played at Corvallis. Walt Weaver's interception of Johnny Alexander's pass gave the Keene-men a first down on the Beaver 4-yard line, but four attempts to penetrate the line fell inches short, and from there on it was all Oregon State.

The victory bell pealed out again following the next game, as the locals marched 76 yards in the first quarter for a touchdown and then rested on their laurels as they took a 6 to 0 win from Pacific's Badgers. Five seniors, playing their last home game, were presented with huge bouquets just before the second half. Dick Weisgerber, Norm Hogensen, Tots Yada, Bill Stone and Elliott Becken, received the flowers.

All Whitman was able to do against the Bearcats was break their streak of shut-out wins from conference opponents, going down to a 20 to 6 defeat. Previous to the Whitman game, played at Walla Walla, the 'Cats had not been scored upon by conference opponents in 13 consecutive games.

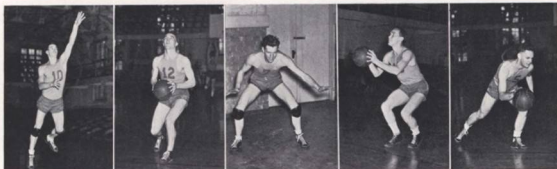

With an amazing record of having beaten every opponent except three in a grueling 31-game schedule, Willamette's varsity basketball team, for the first time under the tutelage of Howard Maple, enjoyed one of the most successful campaigns in Bearcat history in this, the 1937-38 season.

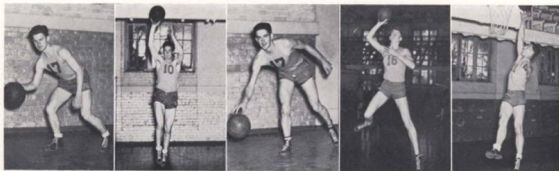
Although defeated eight times, leaving a total of 23 tilts won, the 'Cats managed to earn wins in return clashes with all but three of the fives to whom they dropped decisions. Only University of Oregon's towering Northern division champs, Jesse Owen's dusky Olympian All-Stars, and Eastern Oregon Normal were able to boast a 1.000 percentage of victories over Maple's charges, and the latter two teams met the 'Cats only once.

Essentially not a high-scoring quintet, the Bearcats did, however, compile a total of 1174 points for the season, for an average of 37.8 counters per game. Meanwhile, opponents were hitting the charmed hoop for 1057 points, or 34.09 per game.

Oregon's Ducks did the most damage to the Willamette statistical record, handing the Maple-men 57 to 38 and 78 to 34 trouncings in the two teams' home-and-home series early in the season. Howard Hobson's crew accounted for well over ten per cent of the total points scored by all opponents during the season.

A co-championship of the Pacific Northwest conference, with only two defeats scored by loop opponents, and the runner-up spot in the first annual Oregon State Intercollegiate hoop tourney were the pair of titles acquired during the season by the Salem collegians.

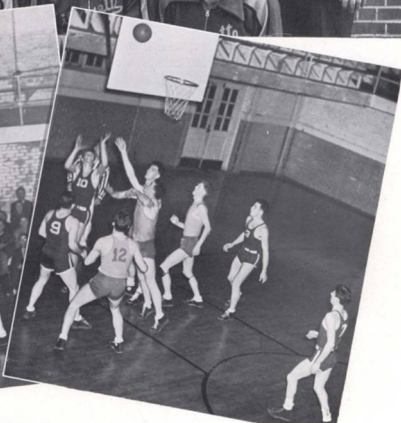

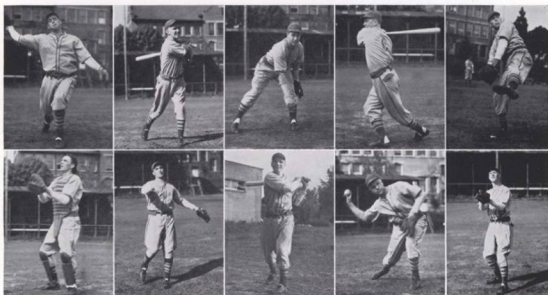

Weakest-hitting nine in recent Bearcat baseball history was this year's edition of Spec Keene-coached Willamette diamond teams, yet the 1938 Salem collegians finished the season in a tie for the second place spot in the Pacific Northwest conference championship race.

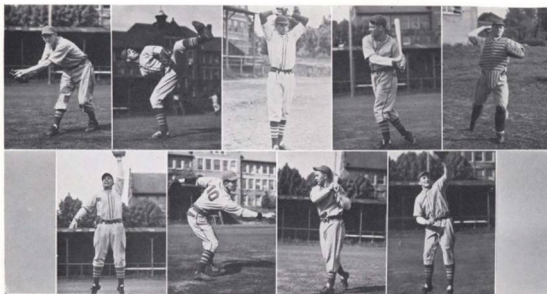
Superior pitching, backed by a tight defensive infield and outfield, enabled Spec's men to finish the season with an unusual record of games won and lost. The 'Cats evenly split their 24-game schedule, winning 12 tussles and losing an equal number, meanwhile hitting the ball at only a weak .281 clip for the season. However, the Bearcats did out-score their opponents, pounding out 147 runs to 125 for teams played.

University of Oregon's strong Coast conference Ducks, winning three tussles out of a four-game series, broke a jinx which Keene's teams have held over the Eugene school for three years previous to this season. Scores were 5-3, Oregon, 9-5, Oregon, 6-0, Oregon, and 9-5, Willamette. This series opened the season for the Bearcats.

First victory of the season was scored over Oregon Normal school following the first two Oregon encounters, when hard-hitting Johnny Kolb pounded out a triple, a double, and a single in 5 times at bat to lead his mates to a 8 to 3 victory. Other scores of the three-game series with the Wolves were 21 to 5, Willamette, and 12 to 6, Willamette.

Bellingham's Chinooks of the professional Western International League pounded four Willamette hurlers for 17 hits and 18 runs to hand the Bearcats their worst defeat of the season, 18 to 3.

Portland University, arch-rival of the Keene-Cats in all athletics, dropped the deciding game of a series of three to Willamette at Vaughn Street, Coast League park in Portland, after the two teams had split their first two games. Scores were 5 to 4, Willamette, 4 to 3, Portland, and 7 to 5, Willamette.

Behind the three-hit pitching of Luke Crosswhite, the State Penitentiary Mavericks scored a 4 to 2 victory over the Bearcats on the "Pen" diamond.

Conference play opened against Linfield college, with Willamette winning the first game 3 to 0 but losing the second, 6 to 8. However, the 'Cats won both halves of the other double-header with the Badgers by scores of 5 to 0 and 12 to 6.

Spec's men did not fare as well with Linfield, splitting a four-game series, and sending the Western division of the conference into a deadlock. Willamette lost the first game 9 to 2, rallied to win the second 13 to 2, won the first half of the other double-header, played at Sweetland, 7 to 1, but dropped the final game 4 to 3 after an 11-inning battle.

A three-way championship tournament, with Willamette, Linfield, and Whitman as participants, was held at Walla Walla to end the season. The tournament replaced the regular play-off between the winners of the Western and Eastern divisions of the conference for the first time in history, and was necessitated by the fact that Willamette and Linfield ended the season in a tie for first place of the Western circuit.

Whitman's powerful Missionaries battled their way undefeated through the three-day event to annex their second consecutive championship, with Willamette and Linfield once more deadlocked, this time for the runner-up spot.

Willamette drew the double-header assignment for the first day's play, losing both games. Linfield edged out a 6 to 4 decision over the Bearcats, and Whitman shut them out, 4 to 0.

The next game proved to be the thriller of the tourney, as the Salemites smashed out a 7-run rally in the ninth inning, after two were out, to defeat Linfield, 12 to 8. Final game of the meet saw the championship Whitman nine nose out a tight 3 to 2 victory over Keene's tossers.

Under the coaching of Lestle Sparks and his assistant Howard Maple, the 1938 Willamette track team, though off to a poor start in early season, showed consistent steady improvement until, at this writing, it appears that this year's cinder team will be the best in recent years for Bearcat followers, after a number of poor seasons.

Bolstered by the return of six lettermen—John Kelly in the sprints, discus, and shotput; Dexter Russell in the sprints, and broad jump; Norman Hogensen in the 440, high and broad jumps; Justin Weckley in the javelin, pole vault, and low hurdles; Harlan Sheldon in the 880; and Bill "Iron man" McAdam in the high and low hurdles, high jump, shot put, and discus—Coach Sparks' cindermen were blessed with a nucleus to build around. In addition, Karl Kahle in the weights and Bob Keuscher, Henry Frantz, Dan Moses, and Wayne Brainard in the distances, members of last year's squad, and a number of promising freshmen materially strengthened the team.

Ten of the freshmen who turned out won varsity berths and were mainstays of the team throughout the season. Of these the best point-getters were Jack Hill of Medford, in the 440, pole vault, high and low hurdles, and broad jump; George McGlenn of St. Helens in the javelin, pole vault, and broad jump; Ed Maerz of Salem, 1937 state high school champion in the high hurdles; Don Pruess of Grants Pass in the shot put, sprints, broad jump, and discus; Ardo Stocks of Medford in the 880 and mile; Errol Harris

of Hood River in the mile and two mile; Richard Jewett of Central point and Bob Layne of Vancouver, Wash., in the sprints and broad jump; Richard Grabenhorst of Salem in the high jump; and Merrill Van Cleave of Aumsville in the 880. Jack Christopher of Camas, Wash., sophomore transfer from Washington State, was a consistent point winner in the javelin and discus throws.

In the first meet of the year, the Hill Military relays, the Bearcat team placed fifth in the mile relay in the intercollegiate division. The following Friday, April 9, the Willamette trackmen placed fourth in the University of Portland Relays, just one point back of Pacific, with Justin Weakley getting Willamette's only first in the javelin. On April 22, in their first dual meet of the year, the Bearcats swamped Oregon Normal's Wolves, 97 to 32, with freshman Jack Hill taking 13 points. Dexter had 10 points, while John Kelly garnered nine. On April 29, the Bearcats lost a close dual meet to Pacific, 66½ to 64¼, with Harlan Sheldon and Bill McAdam virtually certain point-getters, unable to compete. George McGlenn with 11 points was high man, while Jack Hill and Dexter Russell each garnered 9 for the Bearcats.

As this book went to press, the W. U. tracksteers still had four meets scheduled—triangular with Pacific and College of Puget Sound, May 6; a five way meet at Portland with Portland, W. U., Pacific, Oregon Normal, and Linfield on May 14; the Oregon Intercollegiate Association meet at University of Portland on May 21; and the Northwest Conference meet at Walla Walla on May 27, the final event.

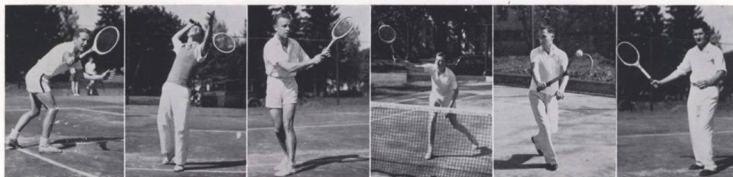

Under the guidance of their playing-coach, and number one man, Talbot Bennett, the 1938 Willamette men's tennis team at this writing was well on its way to its second consecutive Pacific Northwest conference tennis championship.

The 1938 Bearcat netmen auspiciously started the season off with a 6 to 1 win over Gonzaga's highly touted racquet wielders. Then followed victories over Oregon Normal, Linfield, Albany, and Pacific, and a loss to the powerful University of Oregon Webfoots.


Though rained out of early season practice sessions, this year's team, bolstered by a number of promising freshmen, three veterans, and a holdover from last year again appear to be the best bet for the Northwest conference title series, to be played this year on the Willamette courts, May 21.

Captain Talbot Bennett, conference champion for two seasons, who did not compete last year, is playing his fourth and final season for the Bearcats, while Bill Clemes, member of last year's conference doubles championship team, and Herman Estes, also a letterman, have returned for action.

However, freshmen Bud Gilmore and George Gutekunst, proved consistent winners, playing the number two and three positions, respectively. Gilmore, member of the 1937 Grants Pass Oregon State High school championship doubles team, besides playing his number two position, teamed up with Bennett for Willamette's ace doubles combination. Gutekunst, ex-Salem high Viking star, teamed up with Estes for the second Bearcat doubles team.

Bill Clemes, two-year letterman, due to his public speaking activities, did not join the team until mid-season, but he rapidly rounded into condition to bolster the W. U. racquet wielders in their drive for the conference title, alternating with Estes for the number four position. Warren Bertelson, sophomore holdover from last year and ex-Salem high veteran, was the final member of the six-man Willamette squad. Wally Turner and Bill Lewis of Portland's Washington and Franklin high schools, respectively, and Otto Bahlburg of Salem, were the others on the squad ladder. Bahlburg and Lewis were freshmen, while Turner was a sophomore.

Last year, Willamette's doubles team of Bill Clemes and Aris Sherwood, won the conference title, while Donnell Saunders was runner-up to Whitman's ace in the singles. The Bearcat women's team won both doubles and singles, Rose Mary Huffman and Ruth Yocum winning doubles, and Rachel Yocum the singles.

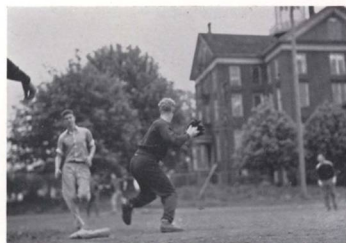

The golf team in its first intercollegiate competition was runner-up to Oregon State in the state intercollegiate golf tournament at Oswego, April 22, 23. The Bearcat linksmen were also the medalists of the meet. Other meets at this writing are scheduled with Pacific, Mt. Angel, Reed, Linfield, Albany, and Portland.

## Freshman Basketball

Compiling the impressive season record of thirty victories against only eight defeats, Coach Lestle Sparks' Willamette Bearkittens wound up a 38-game schedule with the best record of any freshman basketball team of recent years. Coach Sparks has never tutored a yearling hoop team which has lost more games than it has won.

Included in the Bearkitten's victory column are wins over every opponent whom the local frosh played this year.
