"You young folks have a big job," Dick Gregory kept repeating. This generation of young folks is the best informed and most morally conscious in history!"

"With the economy as bad as it is now, the young could not only end the War, but they could phase out Phase I, II, III and IV and even phase out Dick Nixon."

"I was glad that Nixon decided to go to Red China and admit that the Red Chinese exist. That's 800 million people they were trying to write off."

"That's going to be some arrival in Peking. Nixon and Pat will get off the plane and Nixon will say, 'Pat and I have always liked Charlie Chan.' Agnew will probably send his laundry."

On crime and political protest, Gregory said, *"One of the most glorious days in American history was the May Day demonstration to end the War. Senator Charles Percy said that it only hardened those who were beginning to get soft to the idea of ending the War. I say, 'Who gives a damn?' They didn't end it when they were soft to the cause of ending it, so let them get hard to the demonstrators."*

"People say that they cannot understand the May Day demonstration. But 99 percent of those who demonstrated were of draft age..."

"They arrested 7,000 people in one day, but they didn't get one criminal. The Washington D.C. police must be the best in the world, because to arrest that many people in one day without getting one pimp or whore takes a lot of skill. I would have thought they'd get at least one pimp or whore, even if they had said, 'Well, we're sorry. Didn't mean to bring you in.'"

"We believe we know what a criminal looks like in America...He has a beard, sideburns and is young. But look at the New York City police. That commission investigating the police there are just discovering things that the Black folk have known about for years... When I was five years old, living in the ghetto, I knew what a pimp looked like. I knew what a whore looked like. I knew what a bookie looked like. I saw cops patting the bottoms of the whores."

And on alcohol and drugs, he said, *"Alcohol is all right with the old folks. But alcoholism is the number one drug problem in the U.S. today. No one is upset over this because the old folks made it legal."*

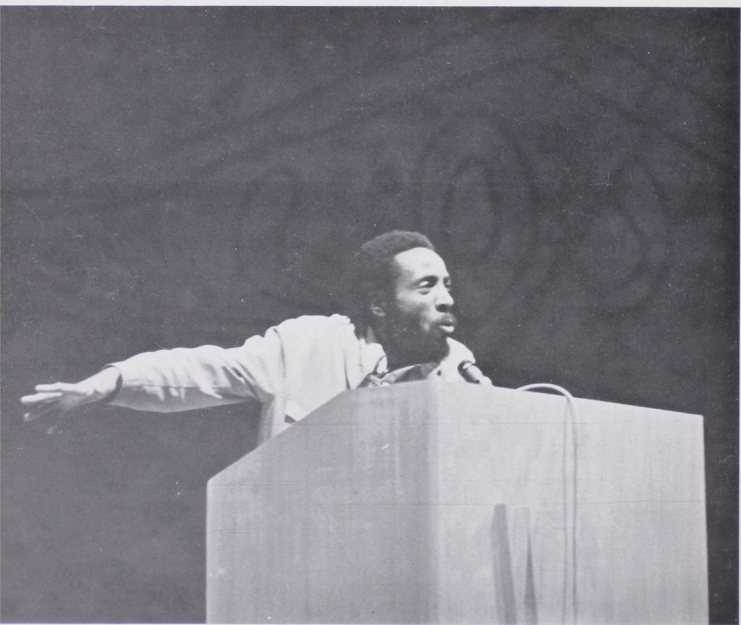
"To make pot legal you've got to organize all the users in the country. Get one dollar from each user. Use the money to pay some university research department to get on television and lie about it."

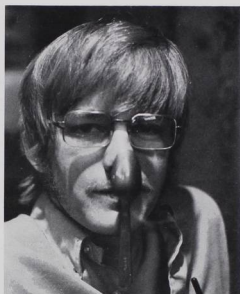
"If you get the old folks to like it, you'll get it legalized. Then it'll be good-bye Geritol and hello, reefers."

"Always remember, though, that any time you put anything in your body that stimulates, you have to pay a price. Nature has a police system too."

"I meet so many young kids who think that the more drugs they smoke or use the sooner the revolution will come. I call these people 'revolutionary pimps'. Don't worry about the sick slimy old folks. They're going to die soon. But any sick, slimy young folks are going to be around for a long time."

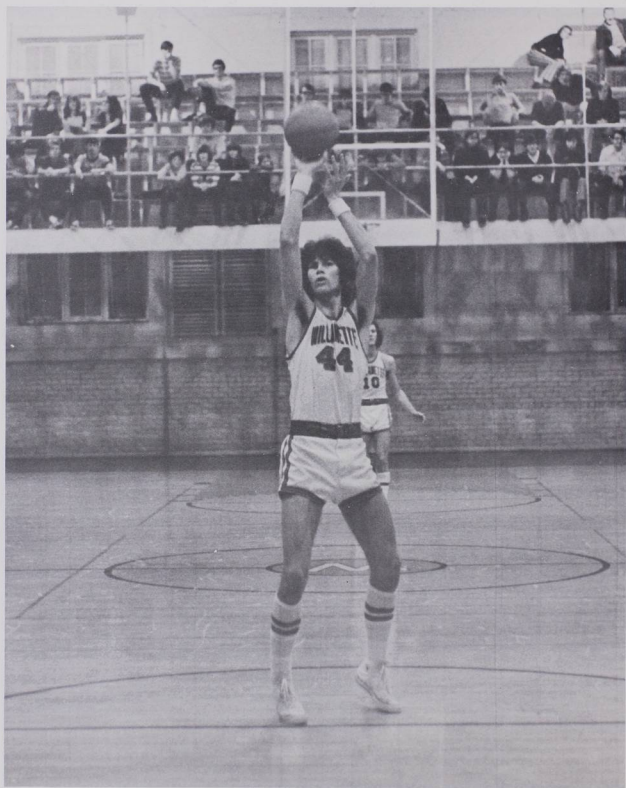
Gregory received a standing ovation at both the beginning and the end of his speech.





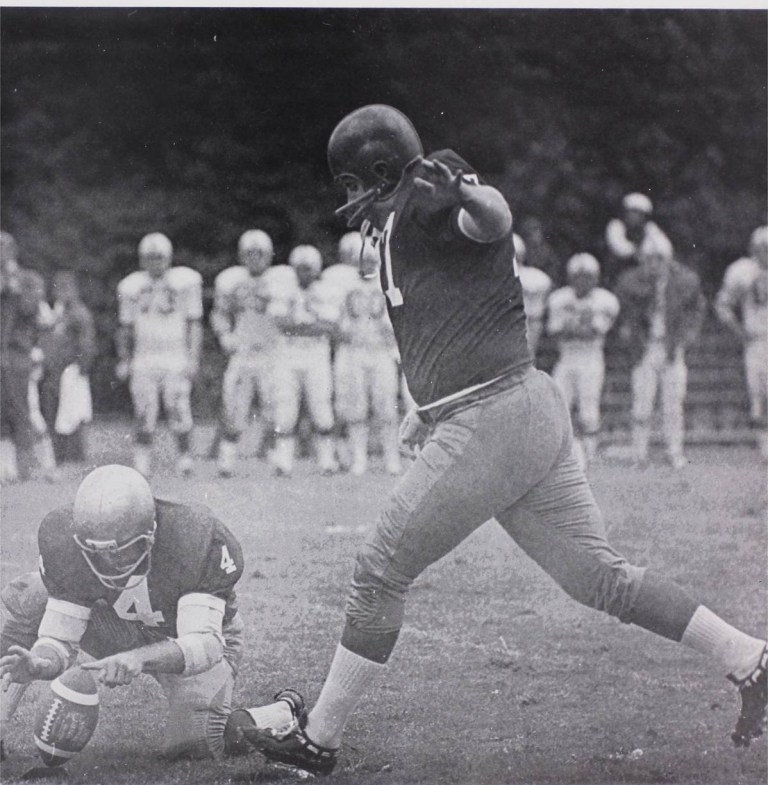










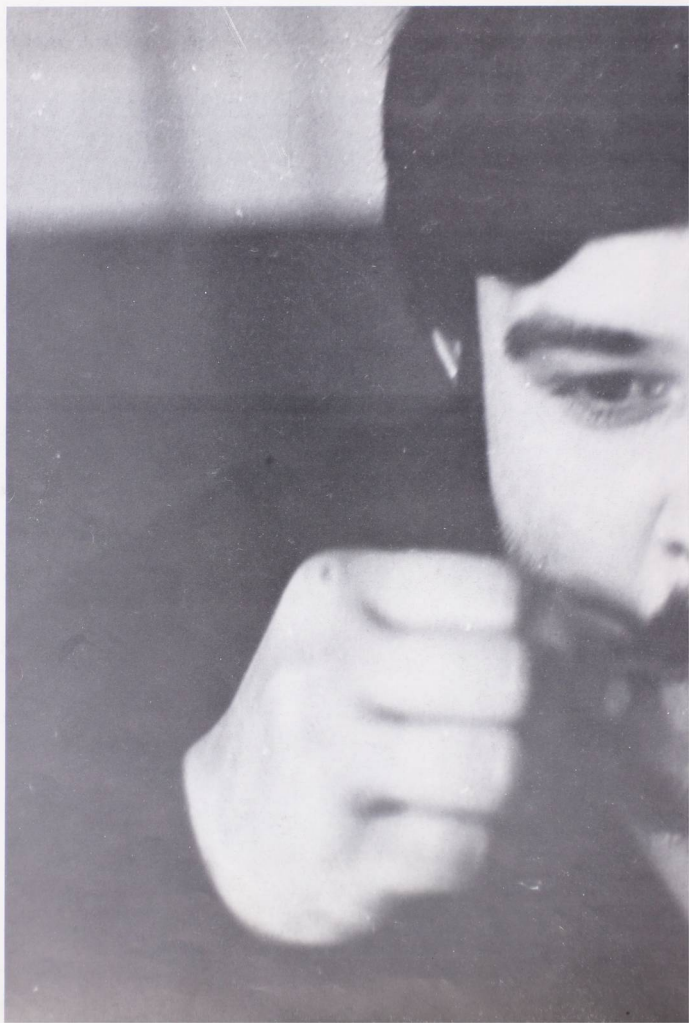










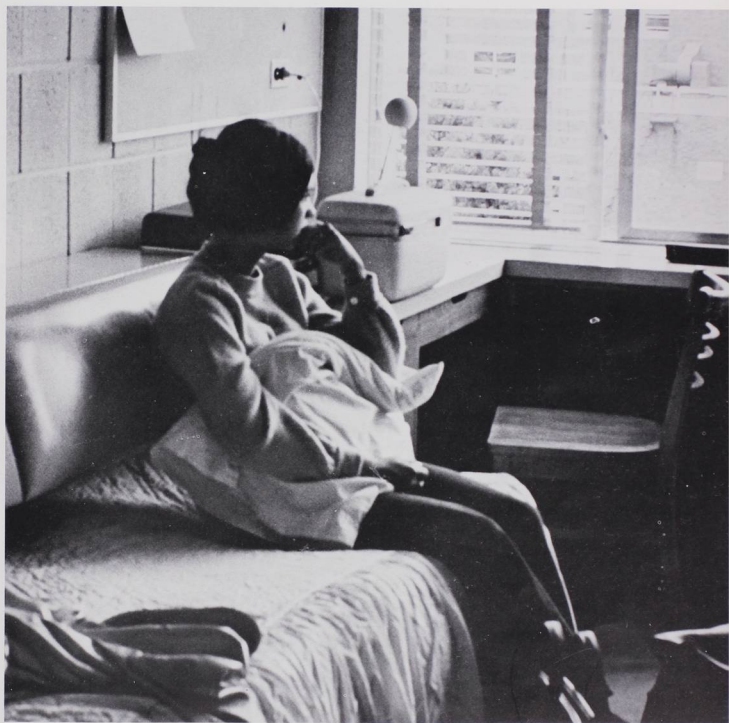


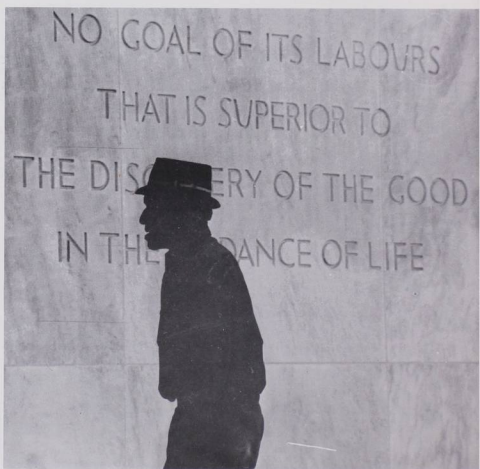






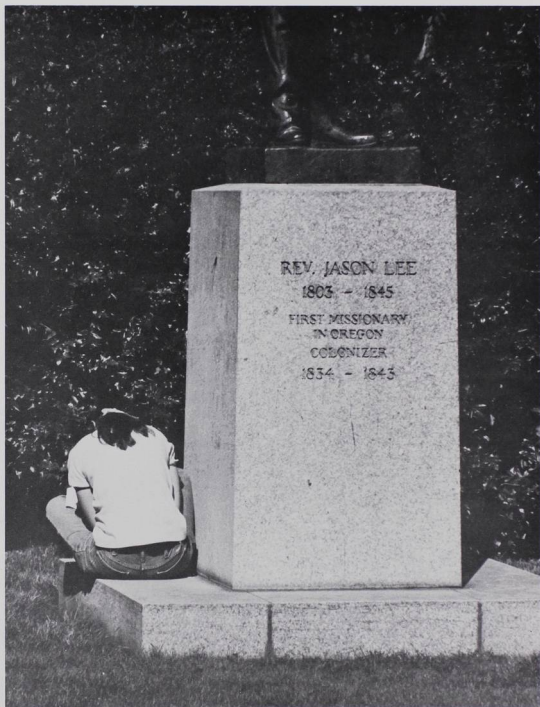








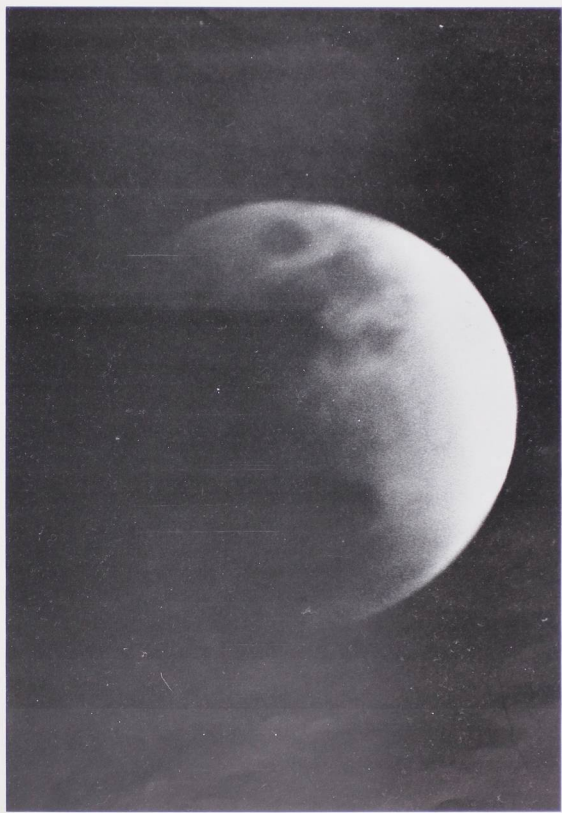
