





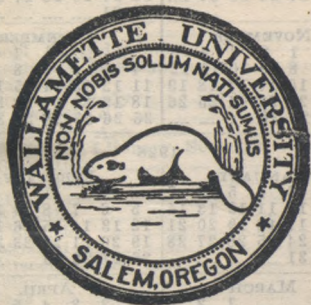

Regular Student Body meetings are held every fourth Friday at the Chapel hour. The Student Body fee, paid at registration, entitles the student to a voting membership in the organization and pays for a subscription to the Collegian, a copy of Wallulah, class dues, and admission to all athletic and forensic contests.

## RULES OF INTER-SORORITY COUNCIL

1. The Sorority rush season for the

year of 1927-1928 shall be from September 20 to October 29 inclusive.

2. Formal rush season shall be from October 24 to 29 inclusive, and each Sorority shall have one mid-week dinner date.

3. Sororities may pledge, during the first semester, any girl who has been on the campus a previous semester.

4. New girls of Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, or Senior classes shall not be pledged until the formal pledging of rush week.

5. No bids shall be promised to any girls at any time.

6. Bids shall be sent out on the date set by the Inter-Sorority Council which shall be after the last rush party. There shall be a system of preferential bidding as decided by the Inter Sorority Council.

7. There shall be no personal rushing during the formal rush season, each girl in each Sorority taking a personal pledge to refrain from such intercourse.

8. Any Sorority violating the above rules shall be obliged to forfeit one-half of all bids for that year.

9. Although the rules set forth in Article 8 do not compel Sororities to refrain from personal rushing of girls who have completed a year's work at Willamette, the Council suggests that this is the best policy to be pursued in regard to any girls who have been on the campus one year.

10. Any girl seeking advice or information concerning Sororities during rush week will receive impartial advice from the Dean of Women.

11. In case of doubt or argument as to what a purely business relationship includes, the opinion of the Dean of Women will be final.

## RULES

Each society shall hold its reception and each new woman shall have an opportunity to attend each society at least once and not more than twice before the second Saturday before Thanksgiving.

No woman shall be invited to join a society, either by verbal or written invitation, before the second Saturday before Thanksgiving.

Each girl shall answer in writing.

Any girl taking ten hours work in music, law or arts, or in regular standing in the university is eligible for membership in any society.

Any non-society girl, no matter how much or how little work she is carrying is entitled to attend the various open meetings and "At Homes."

In order to secure secrecy in the actual bidding, the preferential lists are prepared from the choices by the faculty member of

the Inter-Society Council alone, and these lists are sealed and not opened until after the meeting in which they are to be voted upon has been formally opened.

All the invitations to the various "At Homes" are printed on one card, with their respective dates, and sent to each non-society girl at the beginning of the season.

The answers to the invitations to join a society shall be in the mail by Monday night, following the Saturday they are issued.

No girl can change her choices after she hands them in.

## HONORARY

### ALPHA KAPPA NU

This is a local honorary society established primarily for the encouragement of high scholarship. Not more than fifteen per cent of any Senior class are eligible to membership.

### BETA CHI ALPHA

The purpose of the national honorary society is to create a standard for college annuals and also to afford a medium for the consideration of college annual problems. Members are elected from students who have one year of experience on the Wallulah staff.

### PI GAMMA MU

This national honorary social science fraternity has as its aim the development of interest on the part of young college men and women in the scientific solution of human problems. Seniors who have had twenty semester hours in this field

with an average grade of at least 85 per cent therein, are eligible.

### THETA ALPHA PHI

This national dramatic fraternity promotes a deeper interest in dramatics and public speaking on the campus. During the year it presents from two to four major plays. Membership is open to students who show real ability in this line of work.

### TAU KAPPA ALPHA

In recognition of Willamette's excellent work in forensics during the past years, a local chapter of the national forensic fraternity was established on the campus. All students, except freshmen, who have won awards in forensics are eligible for membership.

### BLUE KEY FRATERNITY

The Blue Key, a national fraternity for upperclassmen, was formed to foster a national student spirit through an exchange of ideas and common understanding. The watchword of the club is "service."

### PHI DELTA DELTA

Epsilon Chapter of this fraternity for women law students was installed on the Willamette campus in 1925.

## ATHLETIC

## ATHLETIC COMMITTEE

The Athletic Committee is composed of representatives from the trustees, faculty, alumni, and students. Its function is to advise in matters of policy, finance, etc., and to promote athletics at Willamette.

## "W" CLUB

This organization takes a keen interest in Willamette and does much to further her work in athletics. Its membership includes all students who have received the official athletic "W."

## WOMEN'S ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The purpose of this club is to develop interest in women's athletics and to instill in its members the spirit of true sportsmanship. Membership and awards are based on a point system. As soon as possible the association will apply for membership in the Athletic Conference of American College women.

## FORENSIC

### FORENSIC COUNCIL

The Forensic Council is composed of three wearers of the Bar "W." It has direct charge of all debate and oratorical activities including the finances of the department.

### BAR-W CLUB

This club is made up of those individuals who have won the official bar "W" pin. Through its members it does much to promote interest in public speaking at Willamette.

### DEBATE

Debate at Willamette is an outstanding activity, and three successful tours have been made in the Middle and Southwest in recent years by the men. The women also have been very successful in debate and were undefeated in debate last year.

Inter-class and Freshman debates have a place and offer an opportunity for aspiring varsity debaters.

### ORATORY

The inter-class, Old Oratory Line, Peace and Inter-State Oratorical Contests which are held yearly provide sufficient activity for those interested in this work. In the past Willamette has placed first or second in these inter-collegiate contests.

## MUSICAL

### WOMEN'S GLEE CLUB

There is a great interest in music at Willamette and this women's organization provides a pleasing expression of that interest in its numerous local concerts, a home concert, and an extended tour at mid-year. The vacancies in membership are filled by an open try-out.

### MEN'S GLEE CLUB

The membership is determined by open try-out and the Dean of the School of Music is the director. It also makes an extended tour over Oregon and Washington. Besides affording the club great pleasure and good financial returns, the trip is an advertising feature for Willamette.

### THE VARSITY BAND

The A. S. W. U. Constitution encourages a Varsity Band by providing awards for activity in this field.

### ROGUISH UMPS

A group of girls playing stringed instruments compose the membership of this organization and their serenades are pure joy.

### BEETHOVEN SOCIETY

This organization of talented musicians have organized for the purpose of developing more interest in music and of furthering its appreciation on the campus. Twice every month the Beethovens present a musical program in chapel.

### THE FRESHMAN GLEE

This is an inter-class rivalry song con-

test provided for in the A. S. W. U. Constitution. It is a time of intense excitement and great rivalry between classes. The four songs produced are all of merit and those which stand the test of actual use become a part of Willamette's large collection of songs.

## MISCELLANEOUS

### BLACKSTONE CLUB

The men of the School of Law formed this organization to create a closer unity among the members of the three classes and "to aid the growth and development of the College of Law of Willamette University."

### CLASSICAL CLUB

Through its regular meeting this group develops a better understanding and appreciation of the Greeks and Romans and their languages. Any student taking the classics is eligible to membership.

### COFFEE HOUSE

This group which is composed of students showing literary ability and inclination meets for the purpose of stimulating its members to better creative writing by mutual criticism and suggestion.

### FRENCH CLUB

This organization of students taking advanced work in French provides a opportunity for those interested to study the French nation and to learn to speak the language more fluently.

### HOME ECONOMICS CLUB

The purpose of this organization is to

further interest in Home Economics. Its members are Home Economics majors.

#### LAUSANNE HALL CLUB

"Lausanne is more than building; it is an ideal." Those girls who meet under its spacious roof in an atmosphere of culture and refinement unite to form a significant campus organization with Willamette traditions as its ideal.

#### WILLAMETTE WESLEYANS

The Willamette Wesleyans are a part of a national organization of students who are planning on full time Christian service in the home or foreign field. The members lunch together once a week and discuss problems pertinent to their future work.

## THE HAND BOOK

The Handbook is published every year by the Christian Associations. Its purpose is to briefly acquaint the new students with the traditions, songs, activities, rules and spirit of the school.

## PRIZES

At commencement time of each year a number of prizes are awarded to those students in the University who have shown ability in certain fields of activity.

*Albert Prize:* Mr. Jos. H. Albert, of Salem, awards \$25 to the student having a record for faithful study and scholarship not below the average, who during the school year, opportunities considered, has made the greatest progress toward the ideal in character, service, and wholesome influence.

*The Colonel Willis Prize:* Col. Percy Willis, '85, of Portland, offers a prize of \$25 "to the student who throughout the school year has done the most real good to fellow students and the University by deeds of kindness and genuine helpfulness, coupled with steadfast devotion to high ideals and upright character."

*Burghardt Prize:* Mr. William Burghardt, Jr., of Salem, offers \$25 to the stu-

dent in the first course in calculus who earns the highest grade throughout the year.

*Steeves Prize:* A prize of \$10 is offered by Dr. B. L. Steeves, '91, for the student who does the best work in Latin.

*Keyes Prize:* Hon. Walter E. Keyes of Salem, offers two prizes of \$15 and \$10 to those who win first and second honors in oratory.

*University Prizes:* The University offers the following prizes to winners in any University contest in Public Speaking, to be applied on tuition in the College of Liberal Arts, except in the case of Seniors in their last semester, who will be paid in cash:

Oratory: 1. Five dollars to the winner in a tryout.

2. Ten dollars to the winner in an inter-collegiate contest.

3. Fifteen dollars to the winner in an inter-state contest.

Debate: Ten dollars to the winner in an inter-collegiate contest.

A winning team will divide the University prize.

No person may receive more than one prize in any college year.

*Senior Scholars:* Senior scholars are chosen from the various departments each year to serve as readers and student assistants in the respective departments. Besides the honor attached to the choice there is also credit given in college hours.

## ATHLETICS

### EXTRACTS FROM THE NORTHWEST

#### CONFERENCE ELIGIBILITY RULES

5. A student who has participated in athletics in one institution shall not represent a second institution until he has satisfied Rule 6 in the new institution and until he has passed one season of each sport thereafter. He shall lose one season's participation in each sport.

6. No person shall participate in any intercollegiate sport—

(a) Unless he is a bona fide student, doing at least twelve hours work in a regular or special course as defined in the curriculum of his school or college.

(b) Unless he shall have passed two-thirds of the regular work for the semester or quarter of residence previous to participation; provided, however, that a fractional portion of an hour shall not be regarded in declaring him ineligible.

(c) Unless one week before the first Conference game he shall be carrying eleven hours satisfactorily, or eleven-sixteenths in accordance with section (b) above. All members of the squad found eligible at that time shall be declared scholastically eligible for the season in question.

(d) Conference rules shall also apply to games with non-conference games.

(e) No student shall participate in in-

tercollegiate athletics who has more than one-fifth as many hours of delinquency on his record as he has hours of total credit passed.

(g) No student shall represent his institution in any intercollegiate game or contest who registered later than three weeks after the first day set for registration in the semester or quarter in which he desires to compete.

8. No student shall represent an athletic club or organization, baseball club or team other than his institution from the opening of the fall quarter or semester to the close of the spring quarter or semester, provided that students not in training as members of freshmen or varsity squads may compete on church teams.

## THE CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY

### PREAMBLE

We, the students of Willamette University, in order to provide an organization for the control of all matters of general student concern, do hereby ordain and establish the following constitution and by-laws:

### CONSTITUTION

#### Article I—Organization

Sec. 1. Name. The name of this organization shall be the Associated Students of Willamette University.

Sec. 2. Membership. All registered students in the department of Willamette University shall be active members of the Associated Students of Willamette University upon payment of the student body fee, as provided in Article VIII of this constitution.

#### Article II—Meetings

Sec. 1. Regular. The regular meetings of the Associated Students of Willamette University shall be held on the third Friday of each month during the school year.

Sec. 2. Special. Special meetings shall be held upon the call of the president on his own initiative, upon the request of three members of the executive committee, or upon a petition of fifty members; provided that twenty-four hours notice shall have been given in all departments before such meetings.

Sec. 3. Quorum. Fifty per cent of the members shall constitute a quorum.

## Article III—Officers

Sec. 1. General Officers. The officers of this organization shall be a president, first vice-president, second vice-president and secretary, all of whom shall be chosen from the two upper classes of the following year.

Sec. 2. Duties of President. The president shall preside at all meetings of the association; shall be ex-officio chairman of the executive committee; shall appoint such committees as are hereinafter specified; shall approve all bills and sign all warrants for disbursements of funds except as otherwise provided; and shall perform the usual duties pertaining to this office.

Sec. 3. Duties of first vice-president. The first vice-president shall assume the duties of president in the absence of that officer.

Sec. 4. Duties of second vice-president. The second vice-president shall order and issue student body tickets at the time of registration; shall provide official poll-books for all A. S. W. U. elections by listing the name of all students who have paid their dues one week before the time of elections; and shall act as manager for all student body funds not otherwise provided for. He shall issue requisitions to the A. S. W. U. treasurer for all expenditure from student body funds.

Sec. 5. Duties of secretary. The secretary shall keep records of all proceedings of this association and at the close of the college year shall place these records in the care of the registrar of the University.

## Article IV—Elections

Sec. 1. Officers elected at regular elections. The president, first vice-president, second vice-president, secretary, the editor of the Collegian and editor of the Wal-

lulah, shall be elected at the regular election to be held on the fourth Friday in April.

Sec. 2. Nomination. Nomination for the officers names in Section 1 shall be made by petition, signed by twenty-five members of the student body. Said petition shall be filed with the executive committee before the Saturday preceding election, and must be sanctioned in writing by the nominee. Said petition shall be posted on the A. S. W. U. bulletin boards by the executive committee by the Saturday preceding election, and the names of the candidates shall be published in the Willamette Collegian previous to the election. The privilege to write in the names of candidates on the ballots shall not be abridged by this provision.

Sec. 3. Rules for election. The provisions of this section shall be effective in the election of officers listed in Section 1.

Clause 1. The Australian system. The Australian ballot system shall be used.

Clause 2. The polls shall be open from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m. and for the law department at such times and such places as shall be deemed expedient by the executive committee, providing that public notice of such times and places be given one week previous to the balloting.

Clause 3. Election officers. There shall be at the polls at all times an inspector, one ballot distributor, and one clerk.

Clause 4. Ballots. The ballot distributor shall give out one ballot to each voter, and ballots shall not be received from any other source.

Clause 5. Eligibility to vote. The clerk shall keep an official poll-book compiled by the second vice-president as provided in Article III, Section 4 of this constitution, and no one shall be permitted to vote whose name is not in this book.

Clause 6. Counting ballots. The bal-

lots shall be counted by the executive committee or a special committee provided by the executive committee, immediately after the closing of the polls, and the results of the election shall be posted upon the various department bulletin boards.

Clause 7. Electioneering. No electioneering or soliciting of votes shall be permitted within the limits established around the polls by the inspector.

Clause 8. Majority. A majority vote shall be required to elect, and in case no candidate receives a majority, the executive committee shall call a new election within one week; at this election only the names of the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall appear on the ballot.

Section 4. Term of office. The officers listed in Section 1 shall assume the duties of their respective offices at the beginning of the college year following their election, and shall hold office one year or until their successors shall be regularly elected and qualified.

Section 5. Installation. Formal installation of these officers shall be held at the last regular meeting of each college year.

Section 6. Special elections. Special elections shall be held as follows:

Clause 1. At the first regular meeting of the association each year the following officers shall be chosen by ballot:

A. The four members at large of the executive committee, one from each of the four classes.

B. The faculty member of the executive committee.

C. An inter-class rivalry chairman. It shall require a majority to elect.

Clause 2. At the regular meeting of the association in March nominations for May Queen shall be made from among the girls of the senior class by popular ballot.

of the A. S. W. U. The three girls receiving the highest number of votes shall become candidates for this office. Election shall be held one week after nomination and a plurality shall elect.

Clause 3. Nominations for the forensic council shall be made at the regular May meeting of the association. The election shall be held the following Wednesday.

Clause 4. At any regular or special meeting of the association a special election may be called to fill any vacancy that may occur in any elective office.

Sec. 7. Recall. A special election for any officer or officers of the association shall be called by the president of the A. S. W. U. at the petition of twenty-five per cent of the members. It shall require a two-thirds vote to effect the recall.

#### Article V—Vacancies

All vacancies which may occur in elective offices of the A. S. W. U. shall be filled by the regular popular ballot at the special election.

#### Article VI—Executive Committee

Sec. 1. Membership. The executive committee shall consist of:

A. The president of the A. S. W. U., who shall be the presiding officer without vote except in a case of a tie.

B. The first vice-president of the A. S. W. U.

C. The second vice-president of the A. S. W. U.

D. The secretary of the A. S. W. U., who shall keep record of the proceedings of the committee.

E. A member of the faculty of the College of Liberal Arts.

F. The editor of the Collegian.

G. Four members at large from the A. S. W. U.

## Sec. 2. Meetings.

Clause 1. Regular. Regular meetings of the executive committee shall be held once in each fortnight during the college year.

Clause 2. Special. Special meetings of the committee shall be held upon the call of the president or upon the request of three members of the committee.

Clause 3. Quorum. Five members besides the presiding officer shall constitute a quorum.

## Sec. 3. Duties.

Clause 1. Make the following appointments:

A. A Collegian manager for the following year before May 15.

B. A May Day manager before March 1.

C. A Yell King, a Crown Prince, and a Song Queen before May 15.

D. Elect an A. S. W. U. Treasurer before June 1.

E. Elect a Wallulah advisory committee and a Wallulah manager as provided in Article XVI of this constitution.

Clause 2. Enforce the constitution. The executive committee shall require all officers to comply with the provisions of the constitution and shall have full control over all student activities.

Clause 3. Prepare budget and require bonds. The executive committee shall prepare a general budget for the A. S. W. U. finances and shall require bonds of whatever denominations it may deem appropriate from the treasurer.

Clause 4. Uniform system of bookkeeping. The executive committee shall establish a uniform system of bookkeeping throughout the departments of the association, audit all accounts and file the same as permanent records.

Clause 5. Awards. The executive committee shall procure awards as ordered by the awards committee.

Clause 6. Elections. The executive committee shall arrange all elections as provided in Article IV of this constitution.

Clause 7. Athletic fund. The executive committee shall hold through the student body treasurer a permanent athletic fund to be composed of twenty five per cent of the annual student body funds as provided in Article VII of this constitution, and all money accruing from athletic contracts, contests, or from any other source.

Clause 8. Athletic policy. The executive committee shall determine the general athletic policy of the school, appoint athletic managers, approve all schedules of games, choose and instruct the representatives to the Northwest Intercollegiate Conference, and recommend to the president of the University each year, before January 15, an athletic director.

Clause 9. Athletic director. The athletic director shall be the administrative head of athletics and as such shall schedule games, arrange contracts, select equipment, arrange for officials for all games and contests and supervise the work of the athletic managers in accordance with the policy determined by the executive committee.

Clause 10. Division 1. Athletic managers. The executive committee shall appoint the following:

A. A football manager, by May 15.

B. A basketball manager, by November 1.

C. A spring sports manager, by February 15, and shall prescribe their respective duties.

Division 2. Duties of managers.

A. To collect all athletic funds, turn

over the same to the treasurer of the student body, and to keep a complete record of all receipts.

B. To issue requisitions for the purchase of equipment necessary for the conduct of their respective sports, to approve all bills incurred, and to pay the same with checks from the student body treasurer, to keep a complete record of all expenditures.

C. To make complete reports to the executive committee at the ends of their respective sports seasons covering all moneys handled by their departments during their term of office.

D. To assist the coach as he may direct them.

## Article VII—Dues

### Sec. 1. A. S. W. U. Dues.

Clause 1. The dues for membership in this association shall be ten dollars (\$10.00) each semester, payable at the time of registration. A signed note will be considered as payment. Such payment shall entitle the members to student body tickets admitting them to all University games or contests held on the campus, and shall include them on the subscription list of the Willamette Collegian. Payment of student body dues for the first semester shall entitle members to have their photographs in the annual Wallulah. Payment of dues for the second semester shall entitle members to a copy of the Wallulah.

Clause 2. Failure to pay dues. Failure or refusal to pay dues shall render students ineligible to hold office in the association, to vote at its elections, or to represent it in any manner whatsoever.

Clause 3. Funds. Student body dues together with all other moneys accrued by the association shall go into a gen-

eral fund.

Clause 4. Expenditure of funds.

Division 1. Five per cent of the annual A. S. W. U. dues shall go to the manager of the Willamette Collegian for the support of that paper.

Division 2. Twenty-five per cent of the annual A. S. W. U. dues shall go to the manager of the Willamette Collegian for the support of that paper.

Division 3. Thirty-three per cent of the annual student body dues shall go to the manager of the Wallulah for the support of that book.

Division 4. Twenty per cent of the annual student body dues shall go to the four class treasurers, through the A. S. W. U. treasurer, in proportion to the number in each class paying student body dues, which shall be determined by the A. S. W. U. treasurer. The collection and disbursement of this portion of the A. S. W. U. dues shall not abridge the right of any class to levy additional taxes.

Division 5. All other expenditures shall be made only by the treasurer of the A. S. W. U. upon official warrant.

Article VIII—Treasurer

Sec. 1. Qualifications. The treasurer may be any person not an undergraduate. He shall be appointed by the executive committee, and his appointment approved by the president of the University.

Sec. 2. Duties. The duties of the treasurer shall be as follows:

A. Receipts. He shall receive all student body fees from the University office, and shall receive all funds collected from any source from the managers of all student activities.

B. Disbursements. He shall pay by check through the managers of activities all properly approved bills.

C. Records. He shall keep an accurate account of all transactions and be ready upon five days notice to render a full account to the executive committee of the A. S. W. U. He shall make a complete report at the close of his term of office.

D. Class taxes. He shall collect and disburse the class taxes as provided in Article VII of this constitution.

E. Salary. The treasurer's salary and all expenses pertaining to the office shall be apportioned per rata among the funds handled, as shall be determined by the executive committee.

#### Article IX—Willamette Collegian.

Sec. 1. Name. The paper shall be known as the Willamette Collegian.

Sec. 2. Policy. The active policy of the paper shall be determined by the editor and manager, each of whom shall organize his staff.

Sec. 3. Contract. The president of the A. S. W. U. shall appoint a committee of three to draw up a contract for the student body, party of the first part, the business manager and editor of the Collegian, party of the second part, said contract to contain specifications for a minimum number of thirty issues per year on a weekly basis, and any other points required by the executive committee. This contract shall be signed before the publication of the first issue.

Sec. 4. Financial report. The manager shall render to the executive committee a monthly report of the financial status of the paper.

Sec. 5. Profits. At the end of the college year all profits shall be divided as follows:

A. An amount equal to ten per cent of the funds received from the A. S. W. U. shall be placed in a permanent Collegian fund.

B. Futher profits to the amount of two hundred dollars shall be divided equally between the editor and the manager.

C. Of all further profits twenty-five per cent shall be paid to the manager, and, of the remainder, sufficient money to bring the permanent Collegian fund up to \$300 shall be placed in that fund. All further profits shall be placed in the regular student body funds.

D. No further compensation for members of either the editorial or managerial staff shall be taken from regular Collegian funds unless such expenditures are first authorized by the executive committee.

Sec. 6. The permanent Collegian fund, which shall be administered by the executive committee, may be appropriated only to cover deficits in current expenses of the Collegian and to pay for permanent improvements deemed advisable by the executive committee.

#### Article X—Student Book Store (Not in effect)

#### Article XI—Forensic Council

Sec. 1. The forensic council shall consist of:

A. Three Bar "W" members of the A. S. W. U., one of whom shall be a man and one of whom shall be a woman.

B. Coaches of debate.

Sec. 2. Election for the forensic council shall be held on the Wednesday following the regular May meeting of the A. S. W. U.

Sec. 3. The president of the A. S. W. U. shall call a meeting of the council within ten days following its election. The council shall, at this meeting, choose a chairman from its members.

Sec. 4. The chairman of the council

shall have direct charge of all debate and oratorical activities and be responsible for all moneys within the forensic department, but shall be accountable by the council in the fulfillment of his duties.

Sec. 5. The chairman shall nominate to the council as he shall see fit any other persons to be officially connected with these activities.

## Article XII—Yell King and Song Queen

Sec. 1. Officers. The officers of this department shall be a Yell King, a Crown Prince, and a Song Queen.

Sec. 2. They shall be selected by the executive committee.

Sec. 3. Term of office. The term of office of these officers shall be the same as that of the other A. S. W. U. officers.

### Sec. 4. Duties.

Clause 1. Yell King. It shall be the duty of the Yell King to endeavor at all times to promote loyalty to Willamette University and enthusiasm over its student activities. For this end he shall, during his term of office,

A. Provide for and conduct at least two rallies of an athletic nature and one of a forensic nature;

B. Personally conduct the rooting at two-thirds of the inter-collegiate contests held at home and provide for the other one-third;

C. Provide decorations for the grandstand at all field contests and provide a band wherever possible;

D. Have charge of all excursions accompanying teams to other colleges.

Clause 2. Crown Prince. It shall be the duty of the Crown Prince to assist in the leading of yells at rallies and contests, and in otherwise promoting interest and enthusiasm in student activities.

Clause 3. Song Queen. It shall be the duty of the Song Queen to lead in the singing at all rallies and contests.

### Article XIII—May Day

Sec. 1. The A. S. W. U. shall hold an annual May Day festival on the first Friday of May.

Sec. 2. The festival shall be conducted by a committee of four composed of a manager appointed by the executive committee, who shall be chairman, and three assistants appointed by the president of the A. S. W. U.

Sec. 3. There shall be a Queen of May elected according to Article IV of this constitution.

### Article XIV—Clubs (Not in effect)

### Article XV—Special Committees

Sec. 1. Auditing committee. There shall be an auditing committee composed of the first vice-president of the A. S. W. U. and two others appointed by the president of the A. S. W. U. which shall audit the books of the treasurer of the A. S. W. U.

Sec. 2. Freshman Glee committee. There shall be a Freshman Glee committee of four as provided in Article III of the by-laws.

Sec. 3. May Day committee. There shall be a May Day committee of four as provided in Article XIII of this constitution.

Sec. 4. Inter-class Rivalry committee. There shall be an Inter-class Rivalry committee as provided in Article IV of the by-laws.

Sec. 5. Honor Code committee. There shall be an Honor Code committee of seven appointed by the executive committee of the A. S. W. U. as provided in Article V of the by-laws.

Sec. 6. Awards committee. There shall be an Awards committee as provided

in Article II of the by-laws.

Sec. 7. Wallulah advisory committee. There shall be a Wallulah advisory committee as provided in Article XVI of this constitution.

### Article XVI—Wallulah

Sec. 1. Name. The college annual shall be known as the Wallulah. Each edition of the Wallulah shall be known by the year in which it is published beginning in 1927. I. E.—“The 1927 Wallulah.” The Wallulah to be published in 1926 shall be given a special name to be chosen by the editor.

Sec. 2. Division 1. Policy. The active policy of the annual shall be determined by the Wallulah advisory committee.

Division 2. Wallulah advisory committee. This committee shall be composed of:

A. Three juniors chosen within 10 days after the annual student body election by the executive committee, from the Wallulah staff of the preceding administration. They shall serve during the ensuing year.

B. The editor of the Wallulah.

C. The manager as soon as he is elected by the executive committee.

Sec. 3. Division 1. Editor. The editor of the Wallulah shall be chosen from the members of the sophomore class at the annual student body election.

Division 2. Manager. Immediately following its organization the Wallulah advisory committee shall recommend to the executive committee two or more members of the sophomore class as candidates, for manager of the Wallulah. Further nominations may be made by the executive committee. The executive committee shall then, before May 15, elect the manager of the Wallulah for the following year.

Division 3. The editor and manager of the Wallulah shall each organize his own staff. Department heads shall be chosen as nearly as possible from the junior class, while other members of the staff shall be selected from any of the three other classes.

Division 4. At the end of each year's administration all profits shall be divided as follows:

A. Profits to the amount of \$200 shall be divided equally between the editor and manager.

B. Provided there is sufficient profit remaining the manager shall receive a further compensation equal to twenty per cent of all money collected from advertising over the amount of one thousand dollars (\$1000.)

C. All further profits shall go into a permanent Wallulah fund. This fund shall be administered by the executive committee, and may be appropriated only to cover deficits in current expenses of the Wallulah or to pay for permanent improvements deemed advisable by the executive committee.

#### Article XVII—Repeal or Amendment of Legislation

Any act of any officer, committee, or organization existing under this constitution may be repealed or amended by a two-thirds vote of this association at any regular or special meeting.

#### Article XVIII—Amendment to Constitution of A. S. W. U.

Amendments to this constitution may be proposed in writing at any meeting of this association. They shall then be posted for at least ten days and must appear in the Willamette Collegian. At any subsequent meeting they may be passed by a two-thirds' vote of the student body.

## BY-LAWS

## Article I—Order of Business

Sec. 1. The order of business shall be:

Reading of minutes  
Report of committees  
Unfinished business  
New business  
Adjournment.

Sec. 2. Rules of order. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be the standard of parliamentary procedure.

## Article II—Awards

Sec. 1. Awards committee.

Clause 1. The awards committee shall consist of the president of the A. S. W. U., who shall be chairman; the secretary of the A. S. W. U., who shall keep a record of all proceedings; the faculty member of the executive committee, and:

For athletic awards, the coach and manager of the activity involved;

For forensic awards, the coach of the activity and the chairman of the forensic council;

For Collegian awards, the editor and assistant editors;

For the band, the Yell King and the director.

Clause 2. Four members shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 2. Athletics.

Clause 1. The official award for men participating in football, basketball, track, and tennis shall be a cardinal coat sweater bearing on the left hand side an old gold full block "W" 5 inches by 3¾ by 1 inch.

Clause 2. The official award for women in tennis shall be a white coat sweater bearing on the chest a cardinal Old Eng-

lish "W" 5 inches by 4 by  $\frac{5}{8}$  inches.

Clause 3. Awards shall be given as follows:

Division 1. Football—to men playing five complete quarters of conference football, or with schools of conference standing.

Division 2. Basketball—to men playing five conference games or the equivalent playing time.

Division 3. Baseball—to men playing two-thirds of the total innings, except pitchers, who shall play one-fourth of the total innings.

Division 4. Track.

A.—To men making three points in a meet with a conference team in which freshmen are not eligible.

B.—To men making six points in a meet with a conference team in which freshmen are eligible.

C.—To men placing in the Northwest Conference meet.

D.—To men earning the total of twenty points in all meets of the season.

E.—Each member of a relay team which wins first place shall receive two points.

Division 5. Sec. 1. Tennis—to men winning a match with a team of conference standing or playing in at least three conference meets.

Sec. 2. To women winning a match with a team of conference standing or playing in at least three conference meets.

Division 6. Exceptions to general rules for awarding letters—To seniors, who are not qualified under the regular rules because of physical injury, or who have been faithful for at least three years, or who have performed exceptionally meritorious work, the official "W" award may be given upon the recommendation of the director of athletics, the coach, the team captain, and with the unanimous vote of

the executive committee.

Division 7. No official award shall be given to anyone who has not received the recommendation of the coach and the unanimous vote of the awards committee.

Clause 3. Four-year awards. Any member of a varsity athletic team who has earned the official award for three years and turned out for four years in either football, basketball, baseball, track, or tennis shall be entitled to the official cardinal Indian blanket, which shall be 56 inches by 80 inches in dimensions with an old gold block "W" 2 by 12 by 14 inches, sewed in the center. The blanket shall weigh at least three pounds. Five pointed stars, the points resting on a circle three inches in diameter, shall be used to designate in what sport awards have been earned. Each star shall represent a season's service. The stars shall be arranged as follows: For football and basketball the stars shall be placed in parallel lines above the letter, the first line being three inches from the letter tips, the second two inches above the first. The stars in line shall be three inches apart. Stars arranged as above noted shall be placed below the letter for baseball and track. For football the stars shall be gold; for basketball, black; for baseball, green; for track, blue; for tennis, silver. For each season's captaincy a ring three and one-half inches in diameter shall surround the star; and it shall be the same color as the star. Any individual shall be entitled to only one official blanket.

Clause 4. Each of the three athletic managers shall receive a cardinal sweater with two side pockets and a block old gold "W" four inches by three inches on the left pocket.

Clause 5. No official award to anyone below sophomore standing in the University shall include a sweater or letter, but

freshmen shall receive the official certificate on the first award day after earning the same and such individuals shall receive the sweater and letter on the first award day following their registration after receiving sophomore rating.

### Sec. 3. Forensics.

Clause 1. Official award for participation in forensics shall be a solid gold block "W"  $\frac{3}{8}$  of an inch wide, mounted on a gold bar  $\frac{5}{8}$  of an inch long.

Clause 2. Awards shall be given as follows:

Division 1. Debate—winning of one or participation in two intercollegiate debates.

Division 2. Oratory—participation in an inter-collegiate contest in which at least five colleges participate.

Division 3. Exception. If, through no fault of the participant the number of contestants in a regular inter-collegiate oratorical contests is less than five, the awards committee may, at its discretion, approve the granting of the Bar-W to the participant.

Division 4. Any student who has earned the official award for three years, and turned out the fourth year in either debate, oratory, or extemporaneous speaking, shall receive an official four year award, which shall consist of a silver loving-cup 8 inches high, mounted on an ebony base 6 inches in diameter by 4 inches high. The cup shall be embossed with an official W. U. seal, and engraved with the name of the recipient, the activity, in which it was earned and the date of the award.

### Sec. 4. Band.

Clause 1. Official award for participation in the band shall be a solid gold lyre designed as a "W" which shall be  $\frac{5}{8}$  of an inch high by  $\frac{3}{4}$  of an inch wide.

Clause 2. Award shall be given to

students for complete participation in three-fourths of the local appearances; provided that the band shall appear at all local football and basketball games, and provided that the band at such appearances shall have all the pieces of a ten-piece regulation band.

Clause 3. The earning of four awards shall entitle the member to a cardinal felt pillow top bearing an old gold "W" of the design of the pin award.

Sec. 5. Yell King. The award of the Yell King shall be the official sweater with a round old gold "WU" which shall be on the left of the chest.

Sec. 6. Collegian.

Clause 1. Collegian award shall be a solid gold old English "C."

Clause 2. Faithful and punctual service of high quality shall entitle a member of the Collegian staff to the official award; provided that not more than forty per cent of any year's staff shall receive such award.

Sec. 7. Any person failing to finish the season with the respective group and the semester in school shall forfeit the award except in the event of unavoidable incapacitation, which is to be determined by the award's committee.

Sec. 8. No person shall receive more than one award in athletics, or in forensics, or for Collegian service, or for participation in the band, or for Yell King, or for manager of athletics. For each award earned he shall receive a certificate specifying the fact. This certificate shall be proof of the right to wear such award.

Sec. 9. Each graduate who has received an award based upon inter-collegiate activities shall be awarded on the last award day previous to graduation a parchment four inches by five inches, on which shall be a record of the awards earned in inter-collegiate activities.

Sec. 10. There shall be five award days. The first shall be for all men who did not receive a letter and sweater because of freshmen standing, and shall be held as soon as possible after the opening of school in the fall. The second shall follow the football season as soon as practical. The third shall follow the basketball season as soon as possible. The fourth shall follow the forensic season as soon as practical. The fifth shall be late in May at which time all A. S. W. U. awards shall be presented. The exact dates shall be set by the awards committee for which purpose it will be composed of all officers concerned who were enumerated in Section 1 of this Article. The president of the A. S. W. U. shall be responsible for the presentation of awards.

### Article III—Freshman Glee

Sec. 1. An inter-class song contest called the Freshman Glee shall be held annually on the second Saturday in March. The contest shall be sponsored by the Freshman class and no admission shall be charged.

Sec. 2. The glee shall be conducted by a manager elected by the Freshman class, who shall act under the supervision of a committee of three upper-classmen appointed by the president of the A. S. W. U., one of whom shall be designated as chairman. The four shall constitute the Freshman Glee committee.

Sec. 3. Words and music shall be composed within the class rendering the song and the song shall be rendered by the entire class.

Sec. 4. There shall be three judges on each of words, music, rendition and adaptation. They shall be selected by the Freshman Glee committee and shall judge according to rules laid down by that committee.

Sec. 5. The freshmen shall present the

winning class with the permanent Freshman Glee pennant upon which shall be pinned in the proper place a sterling silver pin which shall not be larger than  $1\frac{1}{4}$  by  $1\frac{1}{4}$  inches.

Sec. 6. The Freshman Glee committee shall decide before the regular A. S. W. U. meeting in May the type of song for the ensuing year. The type selected shall be published in the last and first issues of the Collegian for the year and announced at the last and first meetings of the A. S. W. U. of the year.

#### Article IV—Inter-class Rivalry

Sec. 1. Inter-class Rivalry committee.

Clause 1. There shall be an inter-class rivalry committee elected each year, consisting of the following members: a chairman elected by the A. S. W. U. and one member elected by each of the classes.

Clause 2. The chairman of the committee shall be an upper classman and shall be elected at the first regular meeting of the A. S. W. U. for the year. The representatives of the classes shall be elected within the first two weeks of the school year.

Sec. 2. Duties.

Clause 1. The committee shall regulate and control all forms of interclass rivalry including numeral painting and inter-class disputes.

Clause 2. The following inter-class activities shall be held each year; basketball, tennis, baseball, forensics, Freshman Glee, and other activities that the committee shall decide upon. Percentage of class membership earning inter-collegiate awards for the year shall be counted an activity. In all activities first place shall receive five points, the second place three points, and the third place one point.

Sec. 3. Contestants.

Clause 1. Representatives of the classes

must rate: for the seniors 88 credits, for the juniors 56, for the sophomores 24. Students carrying less than twelve hours shall not be eligible, provided that seniors carrying sufficient hours for graduation shall be eligible.

Clause 2. The class having the highest number of points at the close of the year shall be the inter-class rivalry champion and shall receive a suitable award.

#### Article V—Willamette's Honor Code

Sec. 1. Code. For the purpose of perpetuating the spirit and practice of honor which Willamette University has always cherished as her ideal, the A. S. W. U. hereby adopts the following standard of action to be considered as its tradition of honor. Dishonesty in examination, unfair work on notebooks and essays, improper use of library books and materials as well as property of other persons, and the employment of all illegitimate methods not herein specified shall be deemed opposed to Willamette's standard; and students guilty of such action shall be guilty of flagrant violation of the sacred traditions of the University.

#### Sec. 2. Enforcement.

Clause 1. Enforcement of this code shall be under the direct supervision of the executive committee, which shall appoint at its first meeting in October seven students, four of whom shall be seniors, two juniors, and one a sophomore. These shall constitute the Honor Code committee. The committee shall be called together by the president of the A. S. W. U. within seven days, at which time one of the committee shall be elected as chairman. The committee shall organize further as it sees fit.

Clause 2. The Honor Code committee shall have charge of the enforcement of the Honor Code.

Clause 3. The executive committee may grant an appeal to the A. S. W. U.

Clause 4. All decisions shall be subject to review by the President of the University.

Article VI—Amendments

Amendments to these by-laws must have been read at a previous meeting, must have been posted for ten days, and must have been published in the Wilamette Collegian before coming up for adoption at a regular meeting of the A. S. W. U. They must receive a two-thirds vote for adoption.
