### Business Secretary

## Dean of the University

A LIST of the unknowns in higher education as given recently by an authority in that field—unknowns as to value or probable future—seems to include every phase of college activity with which the average reader is familiar and adds some new varieties. Nothing is omitted. Yet, stop; one omission, perhaps an oversight—the college annual is not there. Or it may have been intentional, for the one factor of college life which seems unchanging and of unquestioned value is friendship among college youth of good ability grouped about common ideals of worth; and the year book is the record of such friendship. It may be, as some wise men affirm, that this selective feature of college is the feature of greatest value, more potent for good than the more formal aspects of education. This select body of youth bound together by common ideals is not among the unknowns of higher education.

## College of Law

FOR FORTY-NINE years Willamette and its law students have enjoyed reciprocal advantages of great value from the maintenance of the College of Law. The University has afforded a large number of worthy students an opportunity to obtain legal training in an atmosphere which is conducive to the development of the better type of lawyer, and in this way has had a marked influence on the bench and bar of the Northwest. The alumni claim that Willamette College of Law has produced more Oregon judges, district attorneys and other public officials than any other law school.

Willamette University College of Law was ready to make application for membership in the Association of American Law Schools last year, when the requirements for membership were raised. Because of this action the Board of Trustees considered abandoning the Law School, but have surmounted this difficulty and are standardizing the school.

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## Senior History

FEW FIRST places in interclass rivalry events but innumerable new customs and bettered traditions have been the accomplishments of the class of 1932. In the fall of 1928, they came to the Willamette campus as a rather timid group of freshmen numbering in all only 187 students. The minutes of the first meeting include this simple statement: "The class is urged to display sportsmanship under discipline, and to cooperate with the other classes of the school." In brief, that is the history of the class of '32.

Third place in the glee, which under the management of the class was proclaimed one of the most beautiful ever held; first in interclass debate; a basketball team undefeated during the entire season—these were a few of the achievements of the freshman year.

When the next fall the class donned blue and white sweaters in place of green caps and ribbons, the pride which each member felt in wearing class colors was increased by the sight of the freshmen carrying the cardinal and gold instead of the green.

Second place in the glee and first in women's basketball marked the sophomore year; during that year class members became active in school events.

A Junior Tea and a Junior Play capped off by a Junior-Senior Banquet were traditions successfully followed by the class of '32 in its third year. Third place in the glee was again the reward of the class for its hard work.

"Cord" wars were few during that year, but class friendships were many.

As Seniors, the class undertook the establishment of new social traditions upon the campus. A formal tea for faculty and trustees' wives; numerous informal teas sponsored by the women of the class for themselves and the men of the three upper classes; an informal party following one of the night football games—these in addition to the usual social events of the year marked it as one of unusual social interest.

Taking fourth place in the glee, the class turned weeping into rejoicing, and staged one of the most unusual and meritorious glee parodies ever held at Willamette when it presented the "Thirteenth Annual Senior Glee" in chapel the Monday following the lower class victory.

Flunk Days, the Farewell Song, senior orals—all these have come and gone, but the class of '32 remains intact, smaller 'tis true, but more firmly organized and more friendly than ever before.

## Student Body

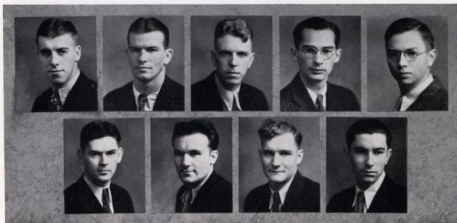

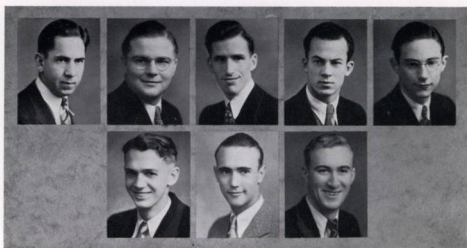

## Moot Court

ASIDE from the fact that the location of the College affords an opportunity for the law students to observe the practice and procedure in the Supreme Court, Circuit Court, County Court, Justice Court, and Municipal Court, a practice court is conducted once a week throughout the year. Each Wednesday night Professor C. N. Inman presides over moot court, which is held in a modern court room in Waller Hall. The trial is governed by regular court rules, although the case is some fictitious one made up by a professor.

Each Wednesday night the judge states some fictitious case and assigns lawyers on either side, giving them a week to prepare the case. On each side there are three attorneys, the head attorney and a helper from the senior class aided by an assistant from the junior class. When court is called on the following Wednesday the facts of the case are given, witnesses are called upon, and when the counsels have presented their arguments, the judge instructs the jury, composed of freshman law students, as to the law involved. The jury goes out and weighs the facts of the case, returning with the verdict which is then read in the court room by the jury foreman or judge.

Regular attendance at all of these cases is required, for which each student receives two hours credit. The cases provide an opportunity for self-expression and allow the students to stand on their feet and think as a real lawyer thinks.

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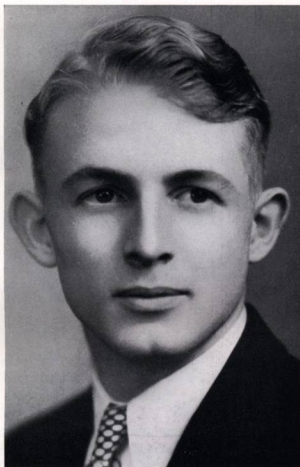

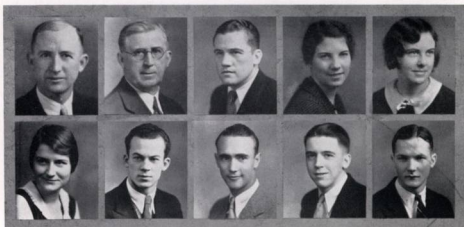

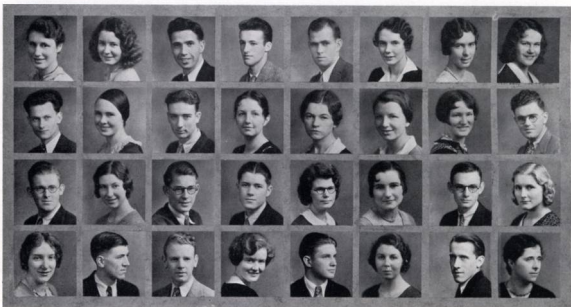
### Editorial Staff

## Women's Debate

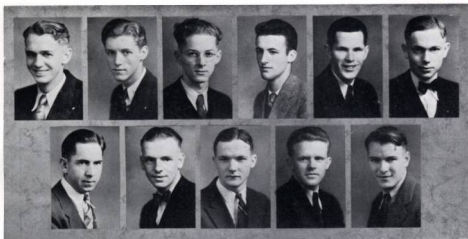

## Men's Debate

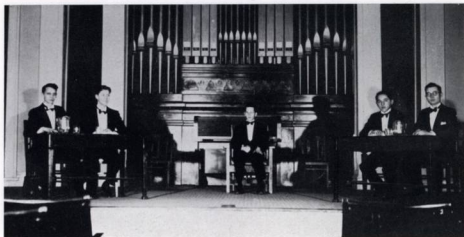

The questions debated were: "Resolved: That Congress should enact legislation providing for centralized control of industry," and "Resolved: That the cutting of wages during the present depression has retarded the progress of business recovery."

There were two debate tours, one to the north taken by Ralph McCullough and John Rudin, and one to the south taken by Ray Lafky and Ross Knotts. Besides the debates on these trips, there have been over twenty home contests, in which the men have done fine work.

Of especial interest was the Linfield Debate Tournament in February, in which eighty-four students and coaches participated in 101 debates. The Willamette squad won first place.

Besides the teams from Oregon colleges and those of the conference, the Willamette men have debated against Stanford University, Washington State College, University of Washington, University of Montana, Pasadena College, University of British Columbia, University of Southern California, and California Institute of Technology.





## The Stanford Debate

THE MOST brilliant debate of the year was held in Waller Hall on February 23, 1931, with the men's debate team from Stanford University. Willamette upheld the affirmative of the question "Resolved: That Congress should enact legislation providing for centralized control of industry."

Ray Lafky and Ralph McCullough represented Willamette against Howard Conn and Abe Mellinkoff of Stanford. That the victory for Willamette was hard-won and well-earned is evident, for the two Stanford men are seniors and hold long lists of victories from their careers as debaters at the University. The debate was outstanding for the remarkable rebuttal work as well as for the constructive argument, and we may be justly proud of the ability of our team.

The contest was the only formal debate of this year, and was quite an event on the campus. It was addressed to one of the largest audiences at debates this season. The judges were Judge Rossman of the State Supreme Court, Miss Ada Ross, head of the English department of Salem High School; and Mr. McAllister, representative to the State Legislature. Donald Clark was the chairman.

The two Willamette debaters are well known for their skill. Mr. Lafky is a junior in the Law School and has been active in forensics through his college career; Mr. McCullough is a junior in Liberal Arts and has also participated in forensics the last three years.

## Oratory and Extemporaneous Speaking

### Linfield Tournament

SEVERAL colleges and universities participated in the Linfield tournament, February 5 and 6, 1932. Willamette was represented in the contests as well as in the debates. Hal Bolinger participated in the men's oratorical contest, his subject being "Are we Responsible?," a discussion of prison reform.

In the men's extemporaneous speaking contest, Willamette representatives won the first two places. Ralph McCullough won first place, and Ray Lafky second; their general field was the 1932 political campaign.

Virginia Durkee, Willamette entrant in the women's extemporaneous speaking contest, won second place with "Modern Advertising" as her subject.

### State Extemporaneous Speaking Contest

Ray Lafky represented Willamette in the State Extemporaneous Speaking Contest held at Corvallis, February 12, 1932. His address, "Government of and by the People under American National Politics," won first place.



### State After Dinner Speaking Contest

WILLAMETTE was represented by Willis Shuler in the State After Dinner Speaking Contest held at Eugene, December 11, 1931. He won fourth place with his talk, "The Reno Trail," a discussion of the divorce racket.

There were eight entrants in this contest, each one speaking on one of the great American rackets.

### State Washington Bicentennial Oratorical Contest

Hal Bolinger represented Willamette in the State Washington Bi-Centennial Oratorical Contest at Salem, February 22, 1932.

### Pacific Coast Oratorical Contest

Eugene Smith won third place for Willamette in the Pacific Coast Oratorical Contest held at Los Angeles, March 21, 1932. The title of his subject was "A Declaration of Dependence."

### Pacific Coast Extemporaneous Speaking Contest

Ray Lafky was Willamette's participant in the Pacific Coast Extemporaneous Speaking Contest at Los Angeles, March 22, 1932. His subject was "Unemployment and the Growth of Radicalism."

In the Pacific Coast contests there were nine and eleven entries respectively, and the University of Arizona won first place in both.

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## “Skidding”

“SKIDDING,” a three-act comedy by Aurania Rouveral, was the annual Homecoming play produced by Theta Alpha Phi Dramatic Fraternity, October 24, 1931. The story concerns a girl who, on her return home from college, finds her father in the midst of a political campaign and determines to help him win the election. In spite of her fiance’s strenuous objections, she gains the people’s support for her father and then is herself elected to the legislature. There arises the problem of career versus marriage, which is finally settled by a sane combination of the two.

This play brought credit to Prof. Rahe for his fine coaching of dramatic productions. The managerial work was ably handled by Alfred King.

The Speakers' Bureau, which was started last year, has been managed this year by Beulah Graham. Speakers and entertainers are obtained for community and club programs through this bureau.



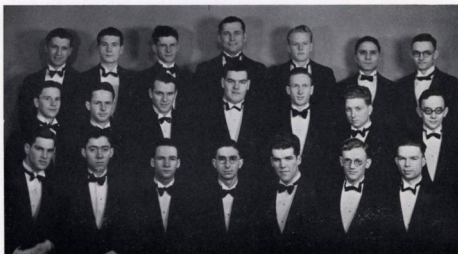

## Freshman Glee

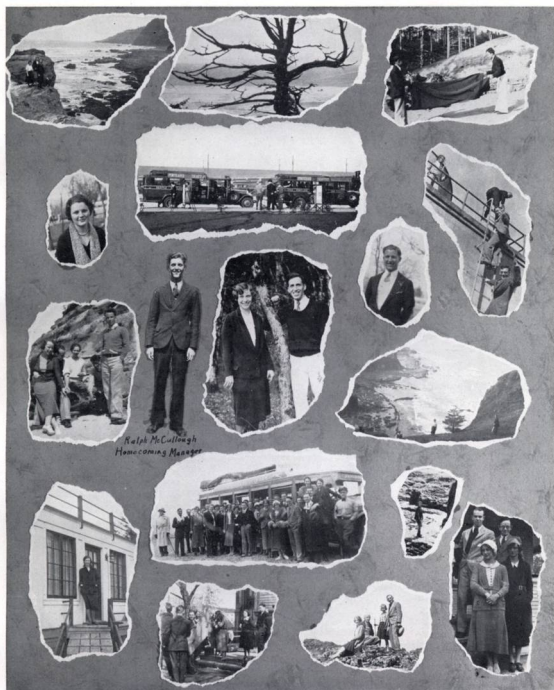

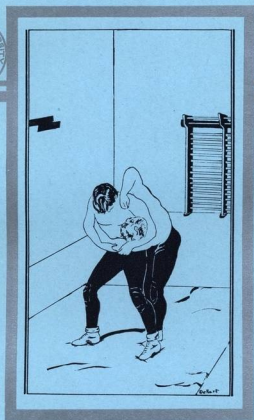
## May Day Festival

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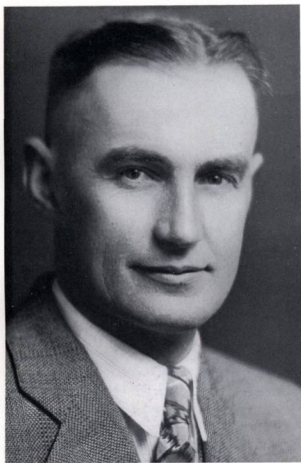

A well-rounded intramural program is carried on through the school year, giving every student opportunity to take part in some form of athletics.





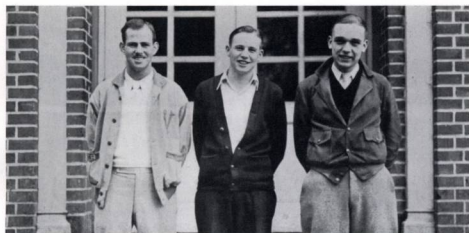

## Coaching Staff

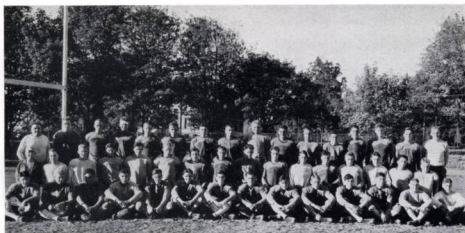
THE WILLAMETTE coaching staff, headed by coach Roy, "Spec," Keene and assistant coach Lestle Sparks, and augmented by a capable group of assistants, has set a high standard for Willamette athletics.

"Spec" Keene during his six years at Willamette has won a place of respect for himself in the hearts of the Willamette students and alumni. His teams have been representative of our school, and have stood for the best qualities in inter-collegiate sports.

Assisting "Spec" has been Lestle Sparks, who in addition to coaching track and freshman basketball, has served as General Manager of the Associated Students. The students have "Les" to thank for the careful supervision of the student funds. Burgess Ford, an alumnus of Willamette and former coach at Gooding College, has taken charge of the track squad.

Football was coached ably by a corps of assistants including Howard Maple, former Oregon State athlete who coached the backfield; Paul Ackermann, former Northwest Conference all-star; Jessie Deetz, former Willamette backfield man; and Eric Hauser, former All-American guard, who was head line coach.





## Non-Conference

FOUR non-conference games were played by the Bearcats. The first, a night game against O. S. C., played at Corvallis, was dropped 76 to 0. "Spec" Keene, using many substitutes, looking over his prospects for later games, and taking no chances of his regulars being injured, was pointing toward later conference games. Willamette lost her only chance to score in the second quarter when she lost the ball on the 2-yard line.

Capitalizing breaks for three touchdowns in the first quarter, the Bearcats continued the slaughter. Erickson, Jones, Faber, Grannis, Carpenter, Houck—the whole team played a fine game.

Using second string players, Willamette won her last night game of the season on November 20, by defeating Albany College 25 to 13. The Bearcats displayed a brilliant air attack in the first few minutes to score the first touchdown. A 93-yard run by Adamsheck, who intercepted a pass, was Albany's climax.

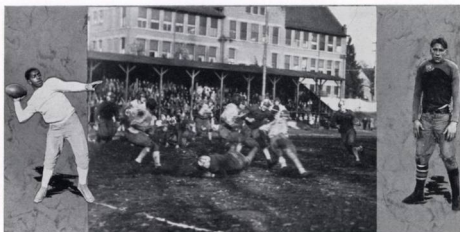

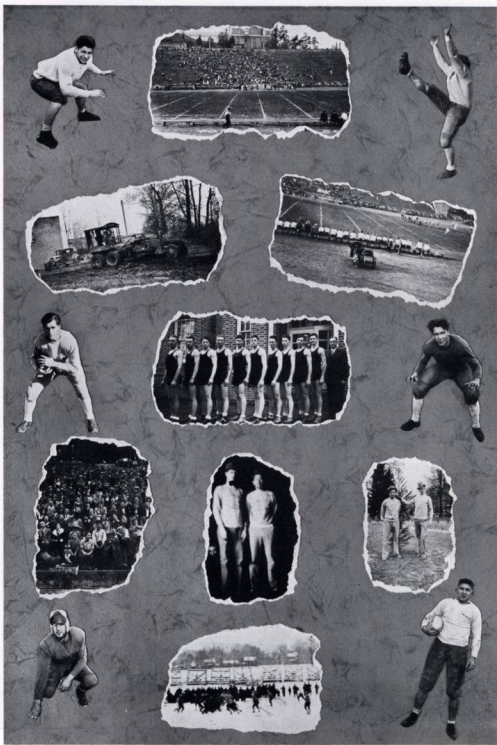

Astoria, the champions won their last three games in the tournament by a total margin of five points.

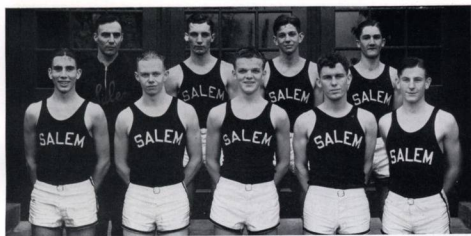

## Frosh Basketball

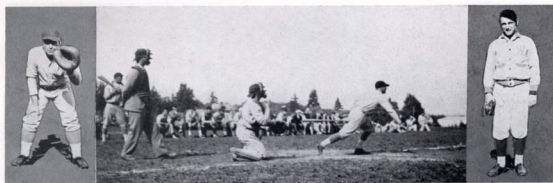

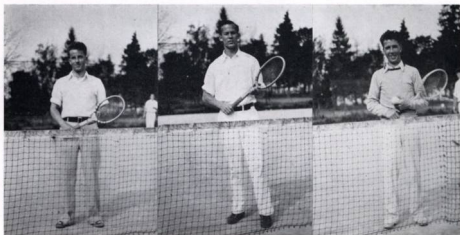

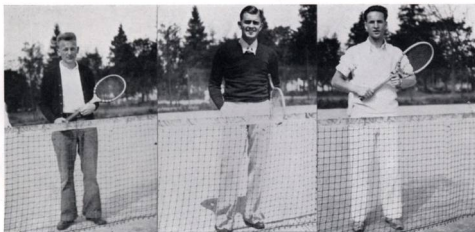
### Linfield 3—6 Willamette

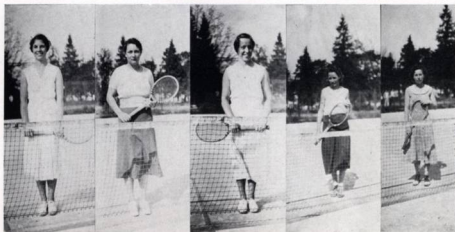

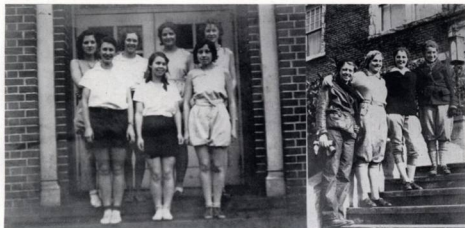
## Tennis

## Basketball

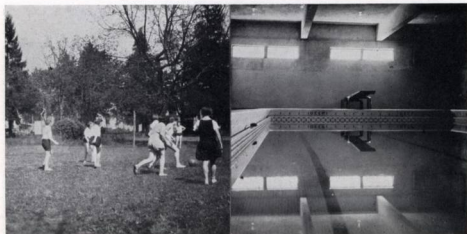

Fall and spring tournaments were held among the archery classes this year, and next year the team hopes to challenge the normal school in a contest which is expected to draw much interest.

## Volleyball

Volleyball is the chief mid-term sport among the women of Willamette, and a great amount of interest is shown in it. An interclass tournament is held yearly under the auspices of the Women's Athletic Association. This year the class competition was so keen that no one team was victorious, and the volleyball tournament ended in a three-way tie favoring the senior, sophomore and freshman classes. The volleyball teams played in the basement of the gymnasium this year, which has been especially equipped for the game.

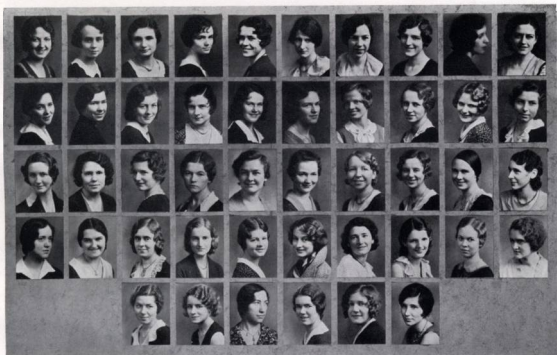

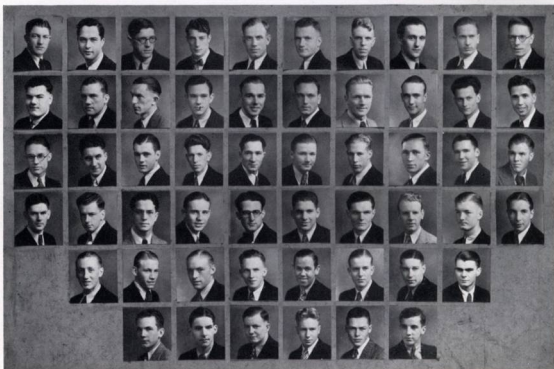

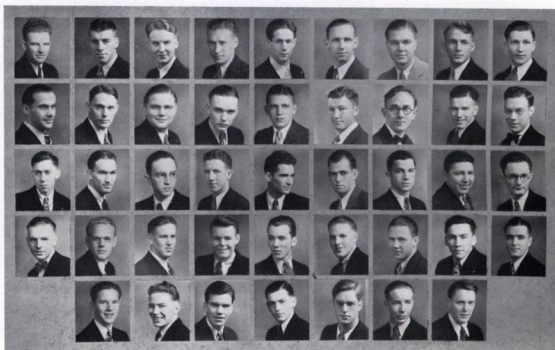

## Lausanne Hall

IT WAS on the ship "Lausanne" which brought the pioneer missionaries to Oregon that the idea for Willamette University was originated. 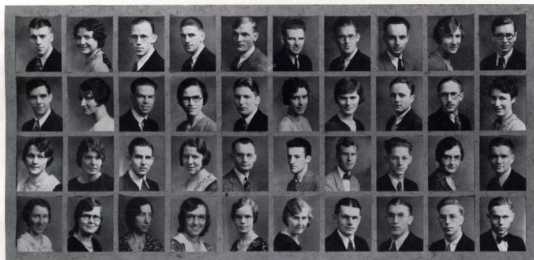

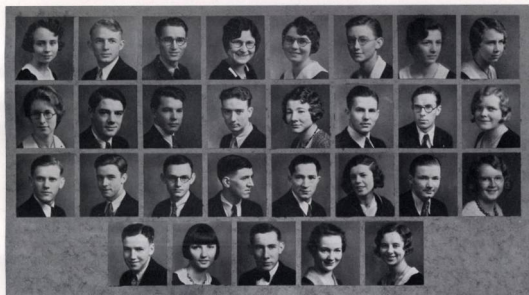

## Y. M. C. A.

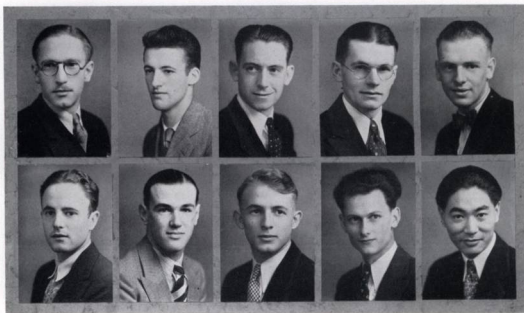
