Aim.

The object of the Y. W. C. A., is the development of christian character first, then the stimulating to active christian work, the deepening of spiritual life of those students who already know Christ, and finally the bringing of the unconverted girls into a personal relation with our master.

Meetings.

The regular devotional meetings are held every Sunday afternoon at 3:30 in the Philodorian Halls. Practical questions which interest every college girl are discussed and the girls are led to realize the different phases of their christian life.

Membership.

The active membership of the association consists of the girls of the college and lady members of the faculty, who are members of some evangelical church. Girls who are not members of any church may become associate members. The dues are \$1 for the year.

Bible Study.

The importance of a systematic study of the Bible and the morning watch is being more and more recognized. One's education is not complete without it.

The study of the Bible in the Y. W. C. A. classes has for its purpose, not primarily the intellectual development of the student, but his moral and spiritual growth.

During the past year, a very interesting and helpful class was conducted by Miss McNary; and another for the city and college Y. W. C. A. was taught by Mrs. Park.

Mission Study.

During the past year a very successful and interesting class was conducted by Mrs. Patterson. The text book used was the Islands of the Sea.

It is the purpose of this department to promote an intelligent interest in missions and missionary methods among the students by a systematic circulation of missionary literature and by classes.

Employment Bureau.

The fall campaign committee will have charge of a list of places for the employment of girls during the winter. Any girl desiring to work for her board or wishing employment during the holidays should not hesitate to consult the chairman of the committee in room 11.

Social Committee.

The Social committee endeavors to increase the refinement and purity of social intercourse in the college, and to make the Association a pleasant home for the student while attending the University. To accomplish this end an afternoon reception is given at the opening of the college year and about the same time the annual reception to students is given jointly with the Y. M. C. A. Aside from these regular events, afternoon teas and social parties relieve the student from the exertion of study and fit her for the highest enjoyment of college life.

Mrs. W. E. Kirk, living at 1322 State street is Dean of Women and during the past year has been most helpful to the girls on many occasions. Mrs. Kirk wants to know the new girls, and wants to help them in any pleasure or difficulty.

Seaside.

The best thing in Y. W. C. A. work comes in the spring of the year, when the summer conference at Seaside is held. The privileges and delights of Seaside can only be told by a former delegate. Willamette's delegation was the largest last year, consisting of nine girls.

The young women meet annually for the purpose of gaining strength in their own life and efficiency in serving others, but especially in working for the increased usefulness of the Association. Every girl should attend at least one of the summer conferences while she is in college.

Invitation.

Every girl in the University who is in sympathy with christian work and desires to be a witness for her Savior is especially invited to join the association. We urge every student to enlist as a worker for the Master.

Adelante Society.

A recently organized society for college girls. By its splendid literary work it has won a high place among the other societies.

Social Y. M. C. A.

The first and perhaps the greatest social event of the year for men will be the "Stag Social" held in the gymnasium at the beginning of the school year. The joint reception, the second week given by the two associations is the big event of the opening week. Don't miss it.

Room.

Room 11 at the head of the stairs on the second floor is known as the office of the Y. M. C. A. Here you will find the University mail box also the Employment and Information Bureau, with lists of rooms, boarding places and places to work. Don't hesitate to come and ask questions. We are here for no other purpose than to help you.

Meetings.

On Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock the regular Association meeting is held. This meeting is given up chiefly to talks and addresses on topics of concern to thoughtful college men. Every noon the men gather for a few minutes in the noonday prayer circle. You are cordially invited to each of these meetings.

Extract from the Constitution.

Article II.—Object.

The object of this Association shall be to promote growth in Grace and Christian fellowship among its members, and aggressive Christian work, especially by and for students, to train them to devote their lives to Jesus Christ, not only in distinctively religious callings, but also in secular pursuits.

Article III.—Membership.

Sec. 1.—The active membership of the Association shall consist of men, either students or members of the faculty, of this institution, who are members in good standing of some evangelical church, and have been elected by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting. Only active members shall vote and hold office.

Sec. 2.—Any man of good moral character, either student or member of the faculty of this institution, may become an associate member by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any meeting.

The membership fee shall be \$1.00 per year, payable at the opening of the college year.

Sec. 4.—It shall be the duty of each member to co-operate heartily in carrying out the objects of the Association in Article II., according to the policy determined by the Association or Executive Committee.

Statement.

The Young Men's Christian Association of Willamette University stands for the best there is in college life. It is the strongest organization in college, including among its members the strongest men both in athletics and scholarship. A cordial invitation is extended to every man in the University to ally himself with the Association either as an active or associate member.

Bible Study.

Recognizing the fact that no man is truly educated without a thorough knowledge of the Bible; that its systematic study is almost indispensable to a powerful Christian life; and, that few men will keep up this study alone, we have organized bible study classes. Dur-

ing the past year three courses have been offered. Each one is arranged for about twenty minutes daily study and meets once a week for fellowship helps and for consideration of the past weeks study.

Missions.

The association endeavors to stimulate an intelligent interest in the Missionary movement by means of its Mission Study Classes. One or more courses will be offered this year.

Missionary meetings are held each month on live and practical phases of the work, often in conjunction with the Y. W. C. A.

The Student Volunteer Band.

This organization is closely allied to the missionary department and is composed of students who have definitely signified their intentions to become foreign missionaries if the Lord permits. Last year we had ten members in our Volunteer Band.

The Prohibition League.

Meets every two weeks for the study and discussion of the liquor problem. We hold a local oratorical contest to select a representative for the Inter-Collegiate Prohibition contest. Our delegate won this in '08 and as the state contest is to be held here in April '09 we must do all in our power to 'boost' the local society that we may again win "Laurels." There is no better way of

getting a good understanding of the temperance question than by affiliating yourself with this society.

The Student Body.

is the organization of the students of all departments of the University, and controls all student enterprises. Every student who desires to participate in athletics, debate or oratory MUST, join this organization. The success of all student enterprises depends upon the interest which each individual student manifests in college affairs. A fee of \$3 is charged to defray the expenses of the Student Body.

Conventions and Conferences.

State Y. M. C. A. Convention.

The Oregon-Idaho State Convention is held every year at one of the city association or college towns and is a source of inspiration and help to all who attend.

Pacific Northwest Conference.

The greatest event in a Y. M. C. A. man's life is the summer conference held in June at Breakers, Long Beach, Wash. To go apart for a period of ten days in the company of the best and strongest men of the colleges of the northwest is a privilege which no college man can afford to miss. We want you to go this spring.

Debates.

Considerable enthusiasm has been shown in debates during the past year. Five teams from the University have met in Intercollegiate debates.

This department of student enterprise is under the supervision of a Debate Council.

Students Handbook.

The handbook is issued every year by the Christian Associations and distributed free of charge to all students. The purpose of this little publication is to give general information concerning school life which we hope will help you over some of the rough places.

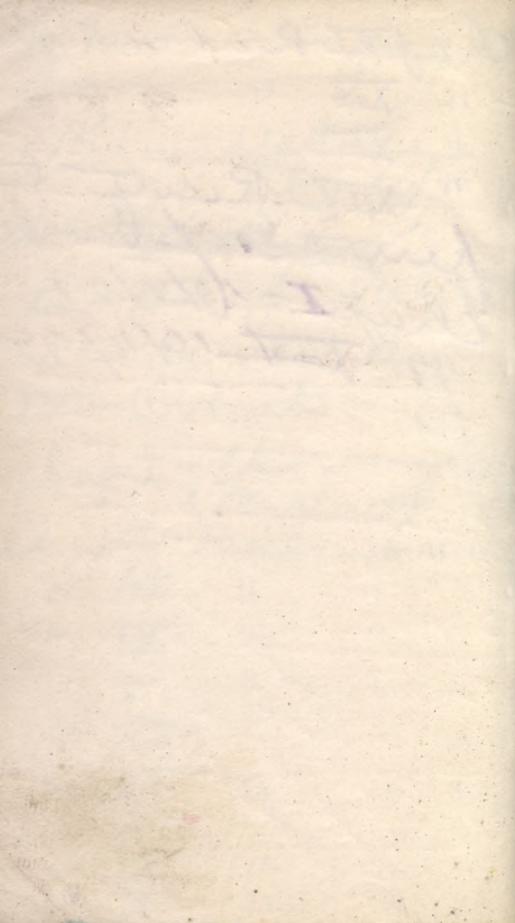

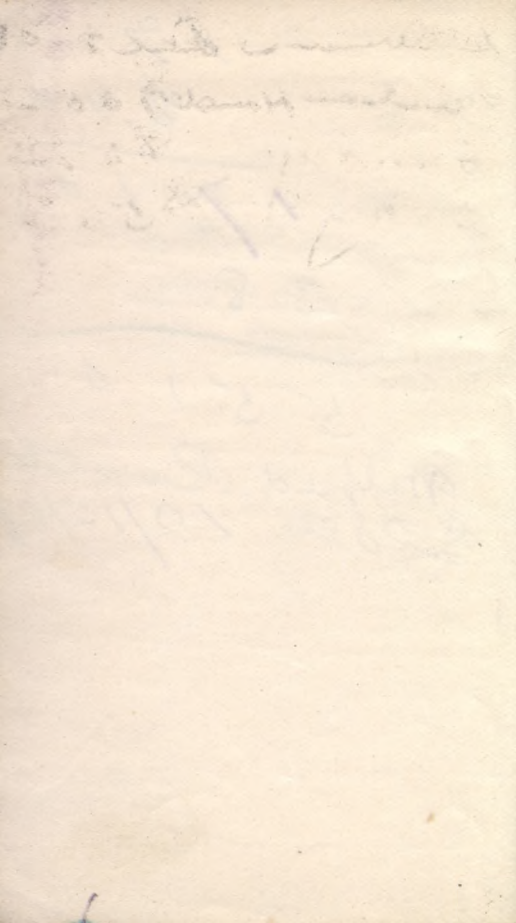

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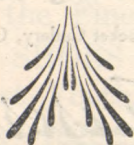
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
