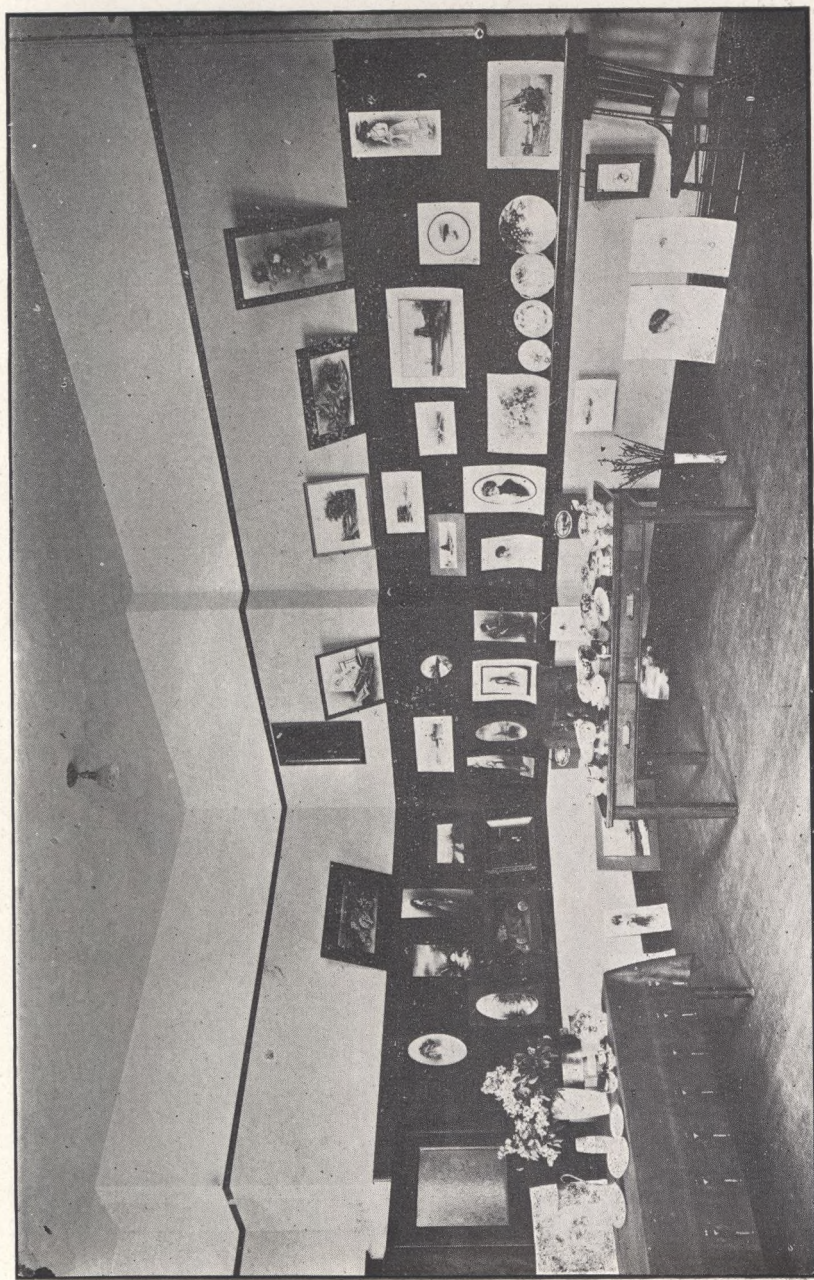

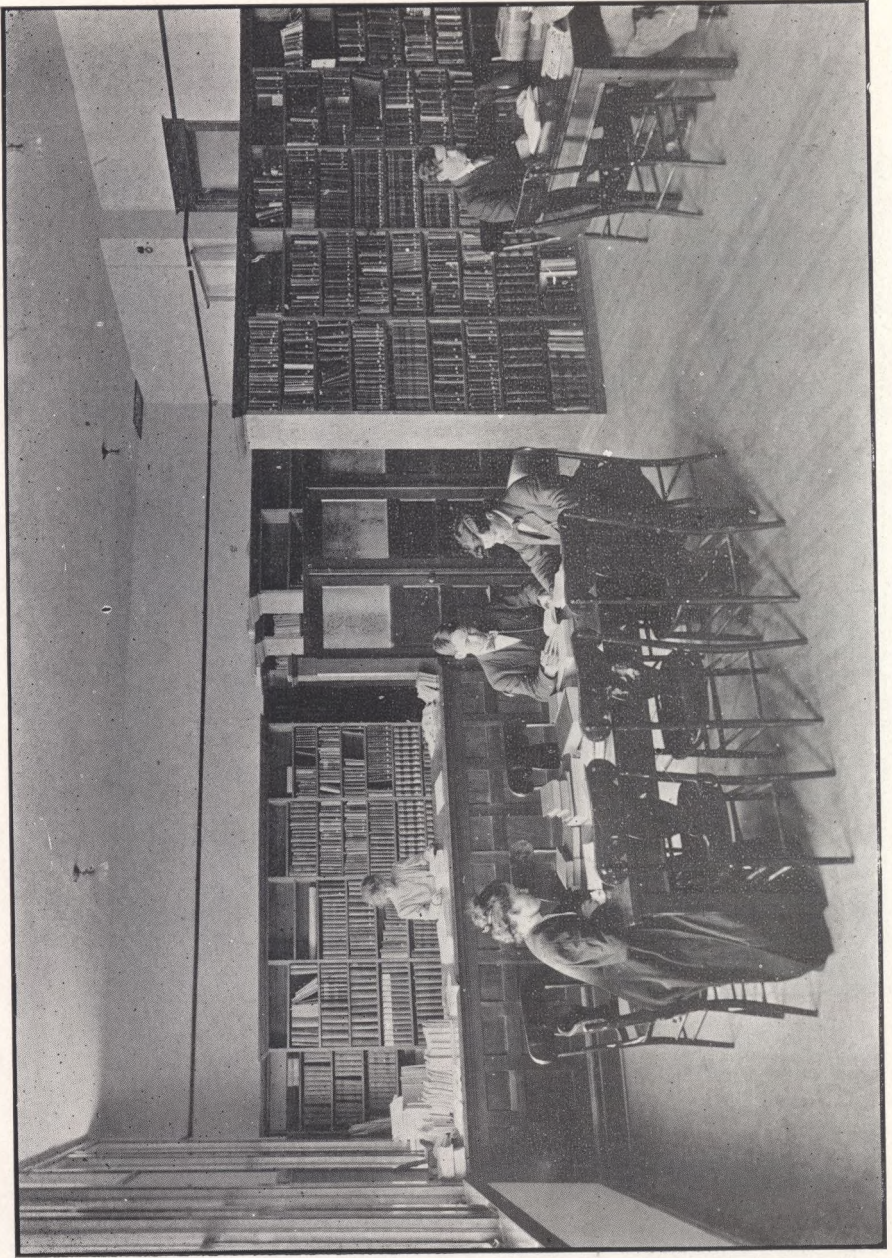
\$50,000 MEMORIAL AUDITORIUM

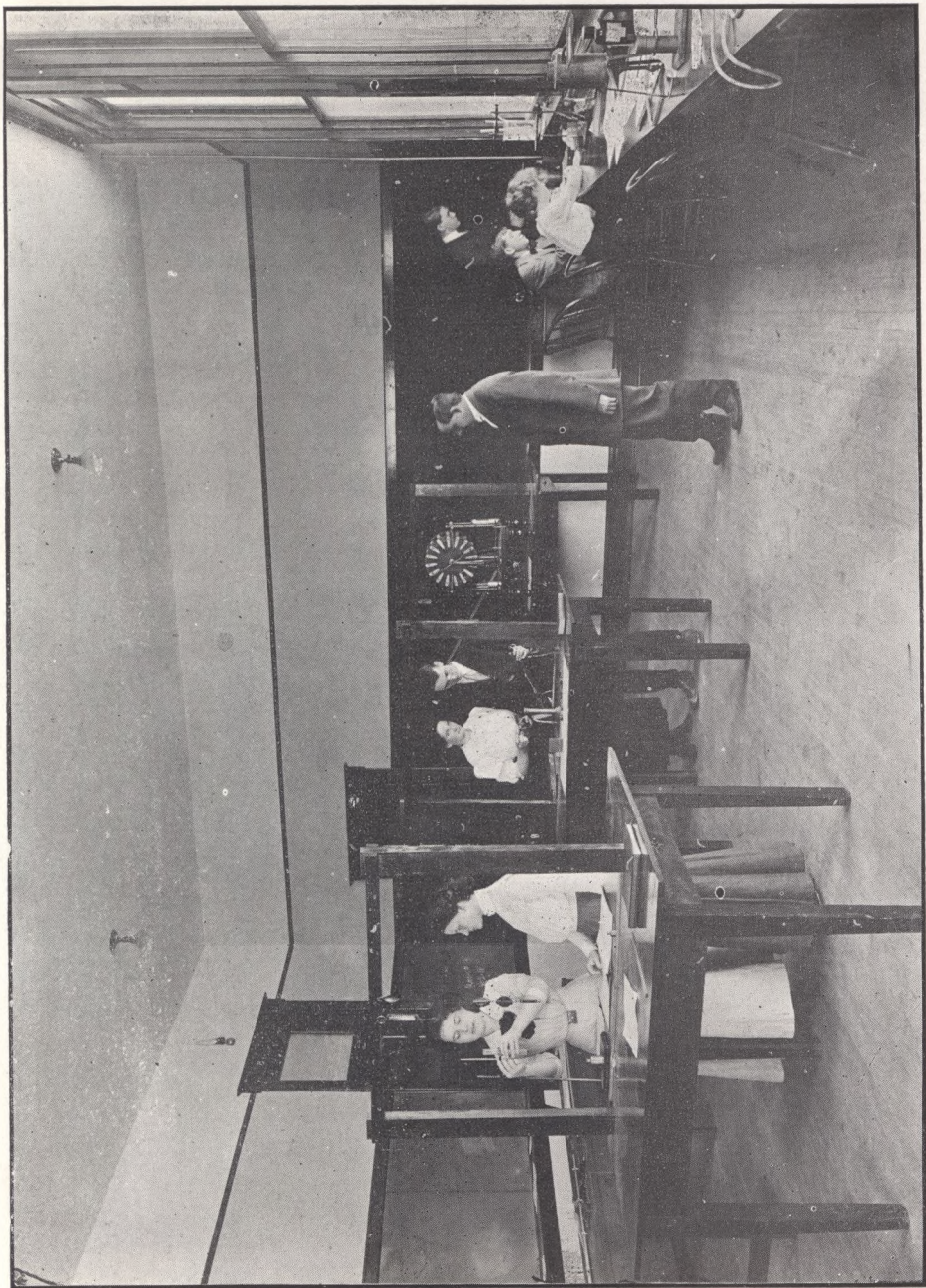

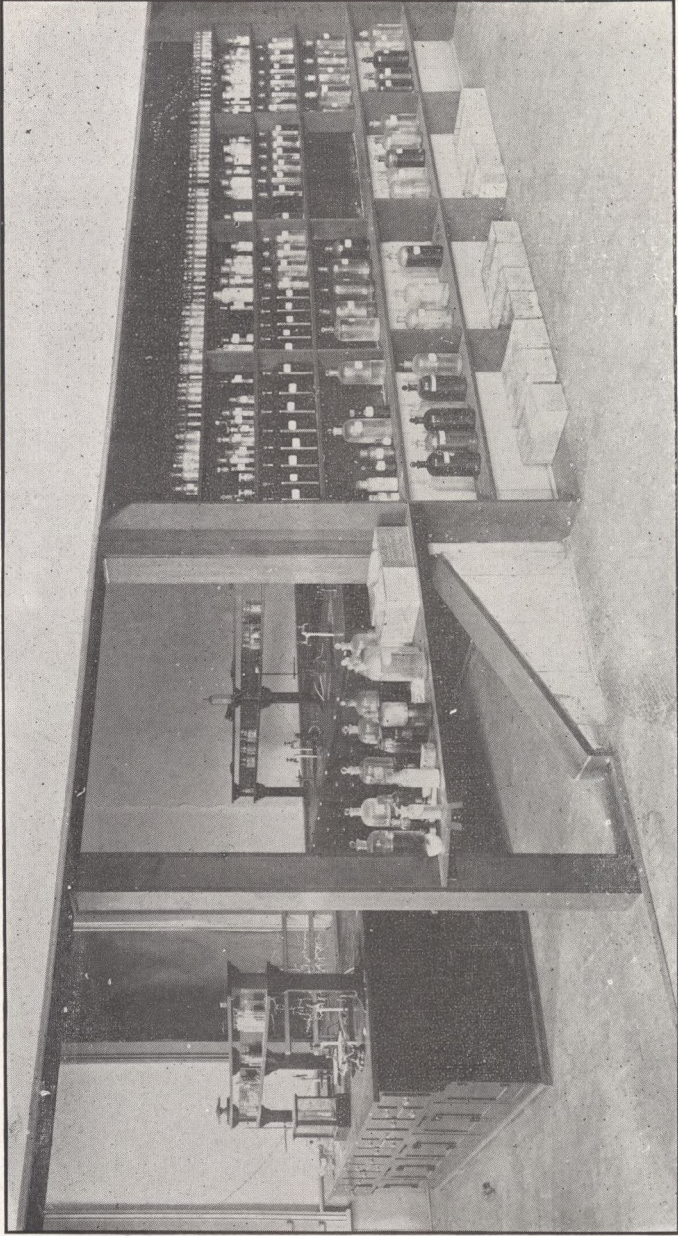

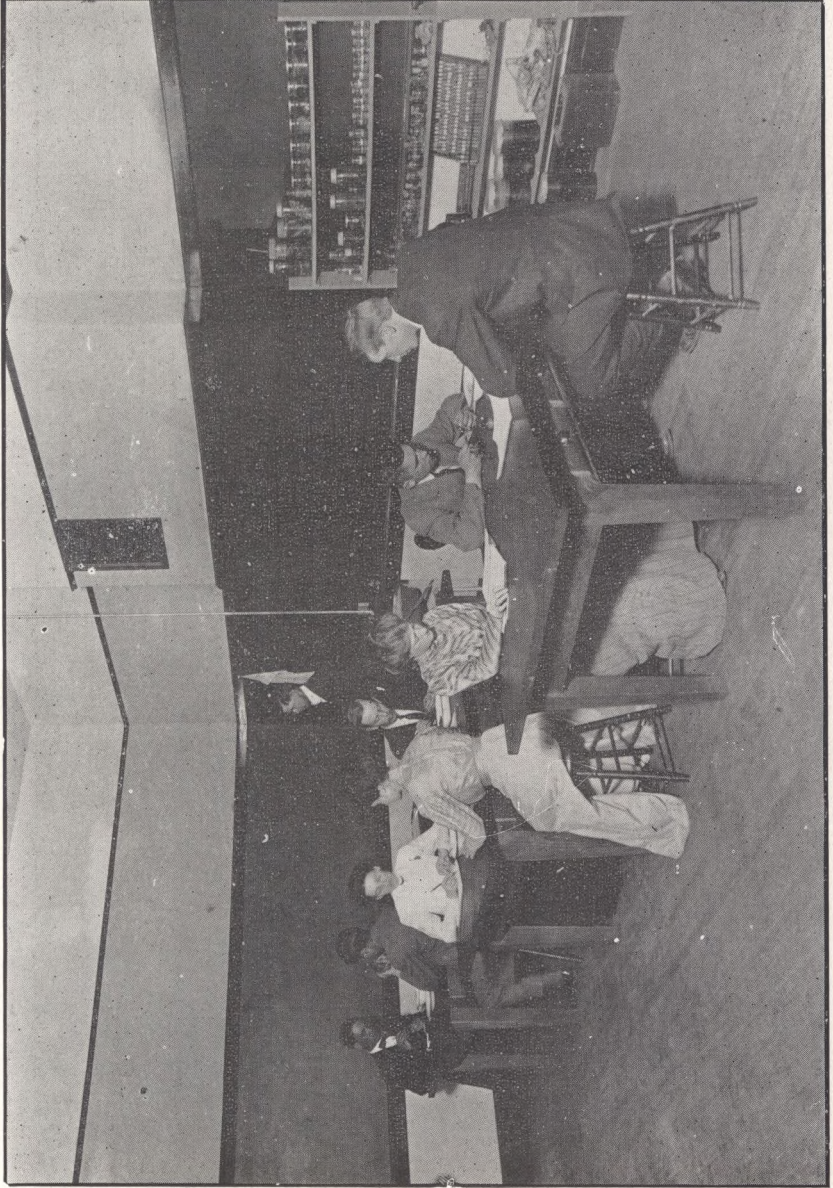

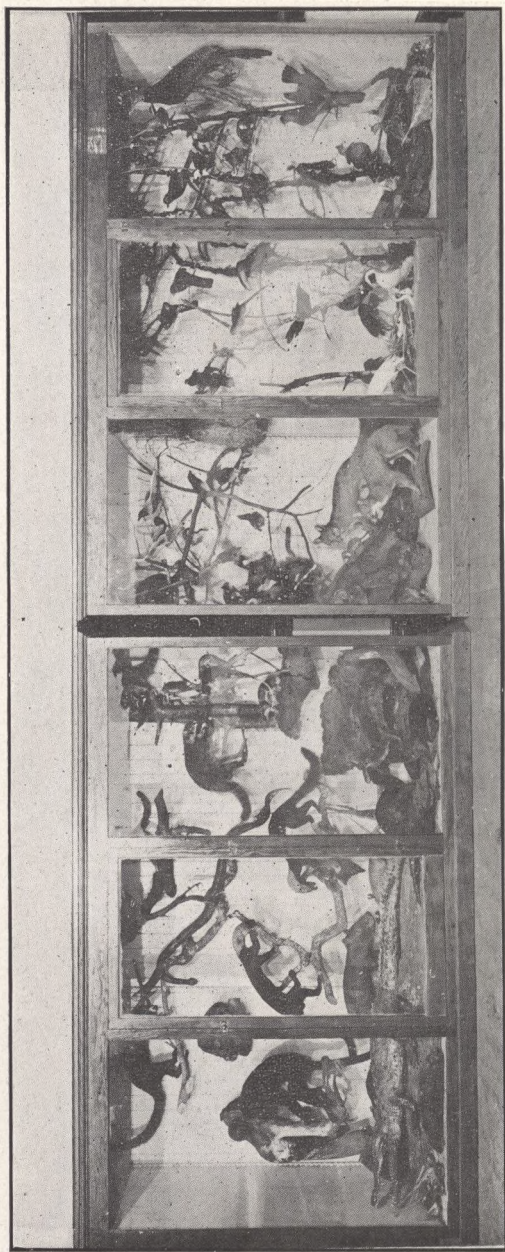
Section of Physical Laboratory.



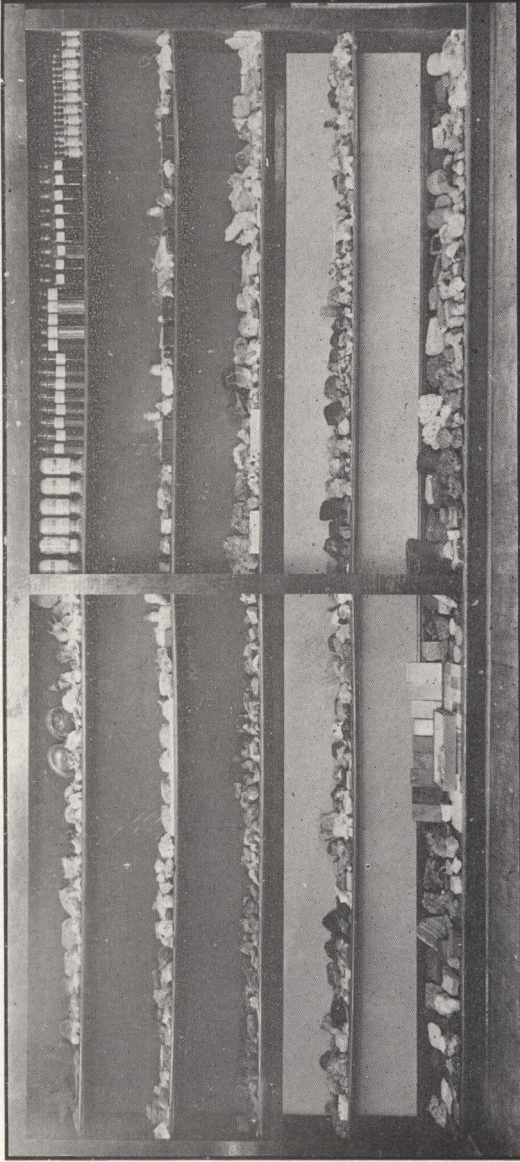
Section of Chemical Laboratory.

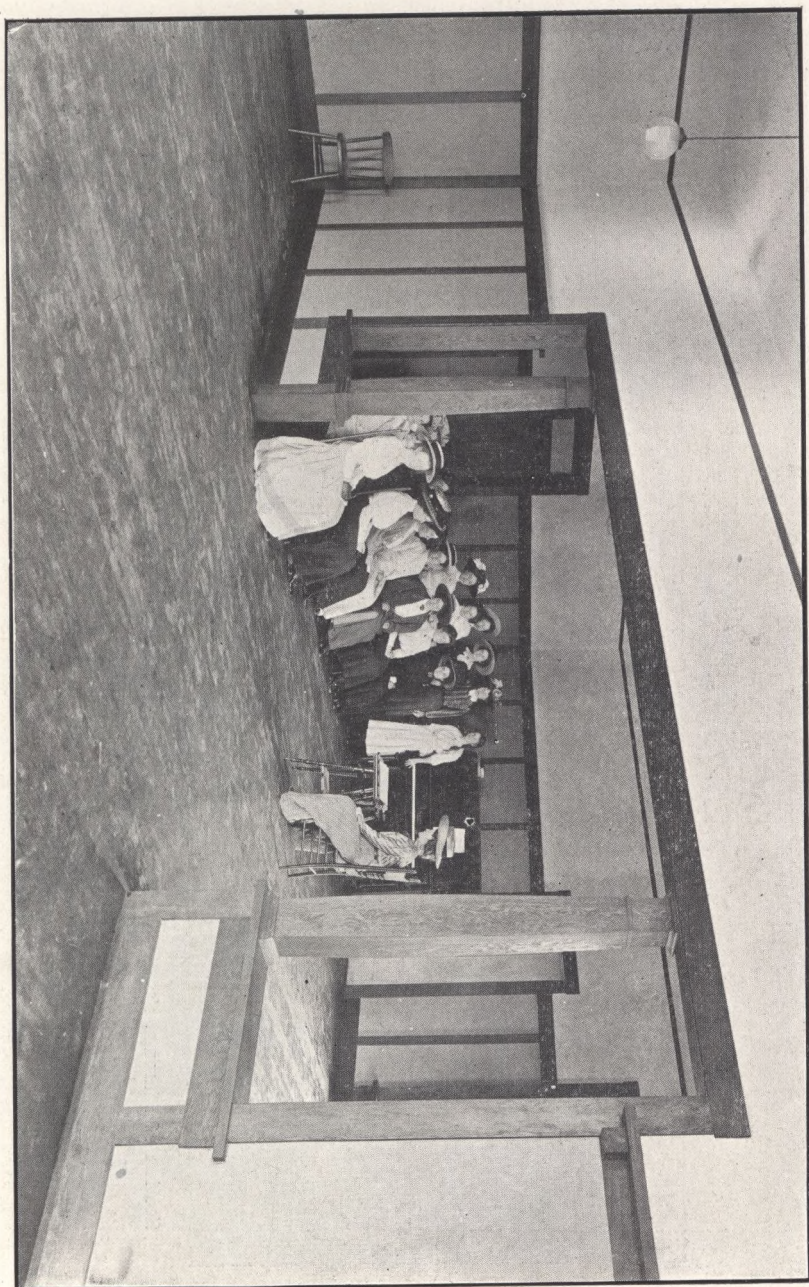

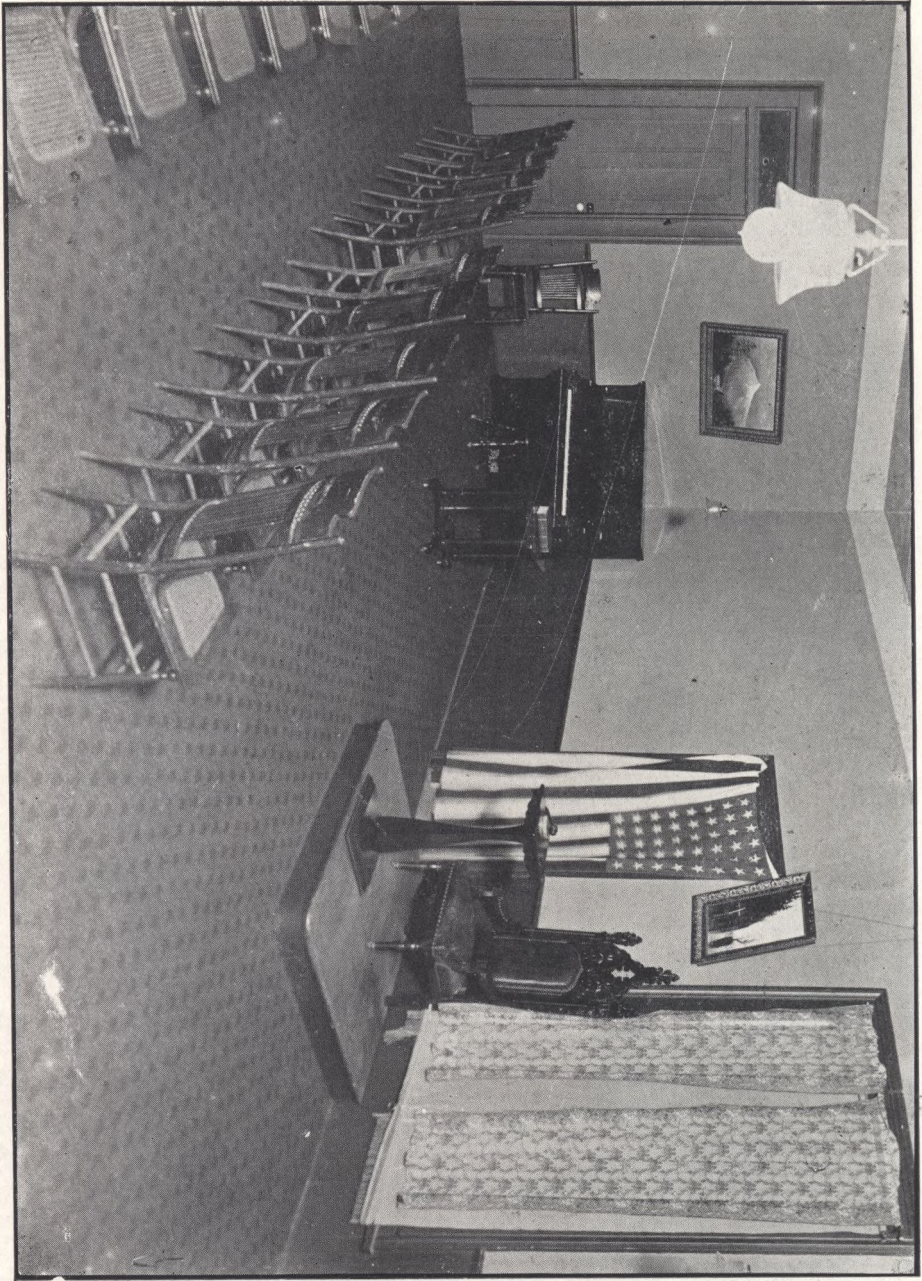
Professor Von Eschen is acquiring an enviable place as an assayer in this State of many mines.
