ASWU General Manager

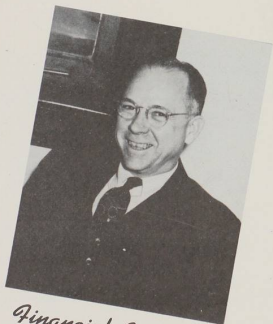

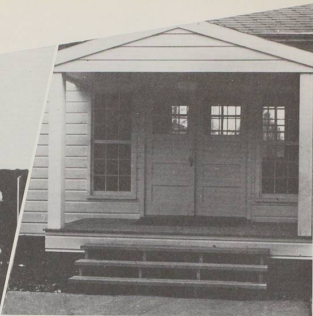

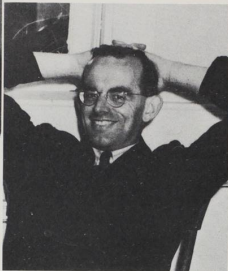


Education

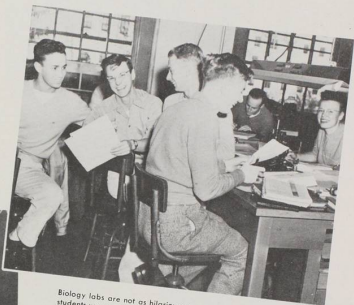

Biology

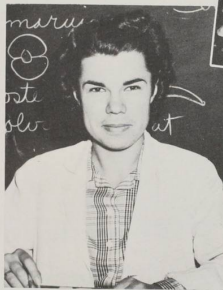

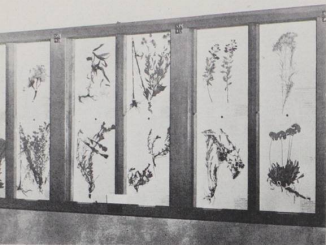

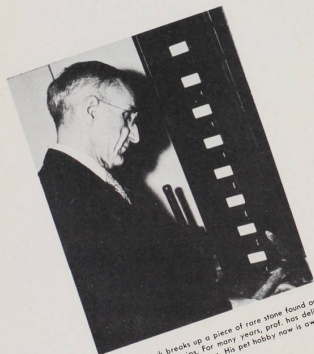




Dr. Peck's pride is this herbarium mounted in the hall museum. It is a complete collection of growth typical of the Pacific Northwest.

Chemistry



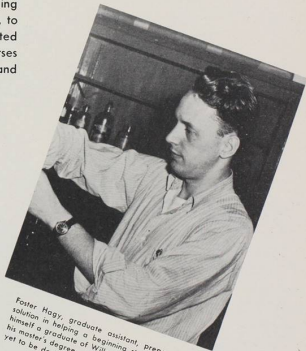

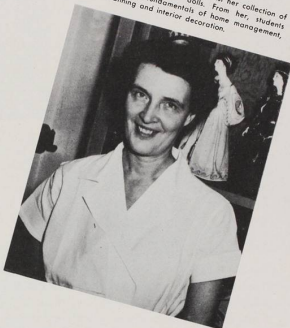

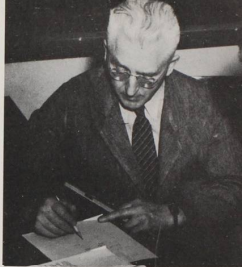

Dr. Lowell Brown, department head, delves into the perplexities of an Atomic problem. Outside interests of the professor are in the atomic and electronic field.

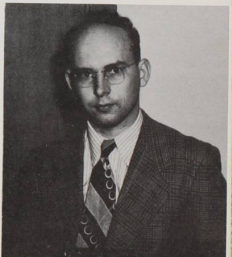

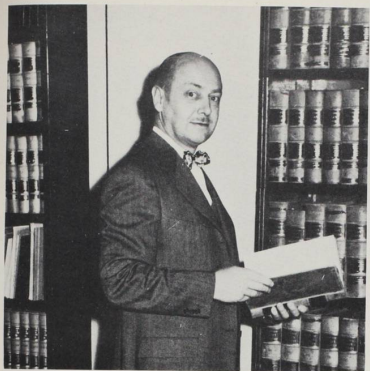

College of Law

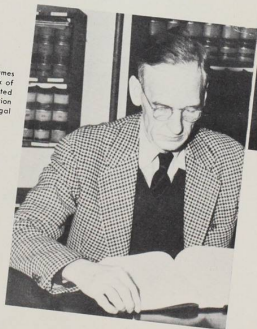

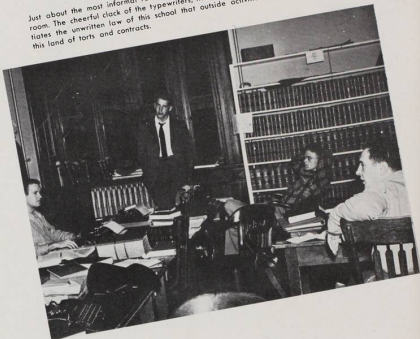

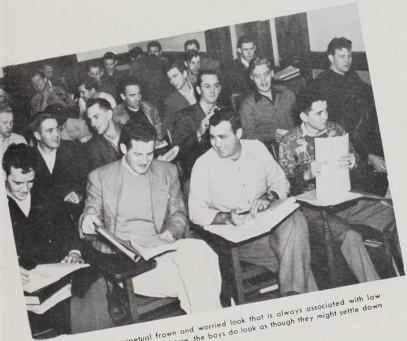

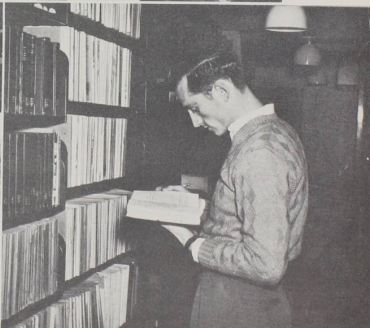

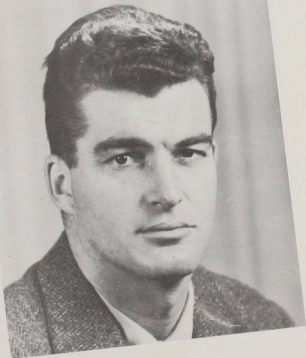
Athletics

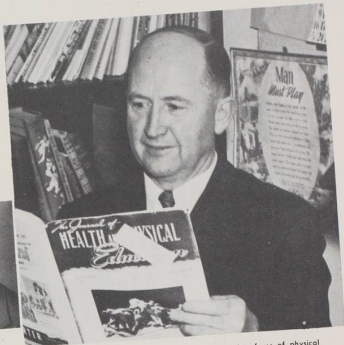


Education

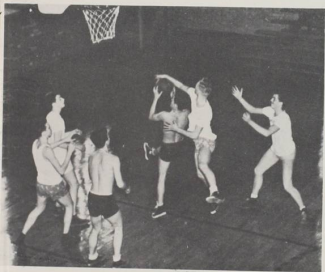

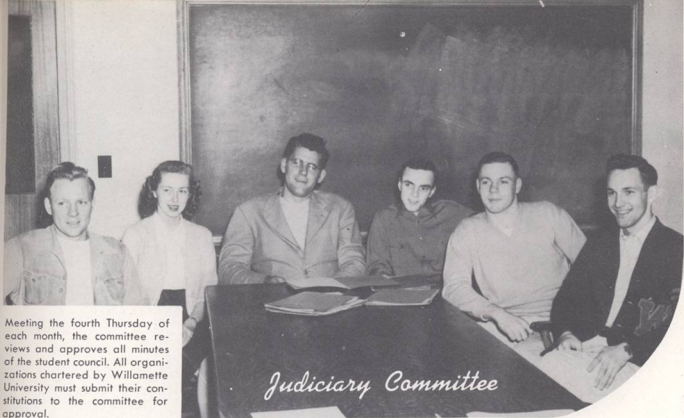

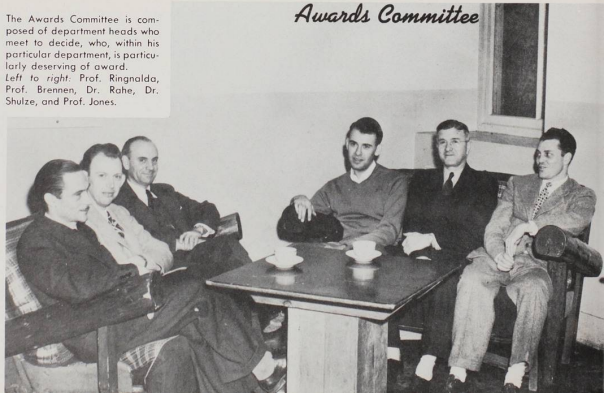

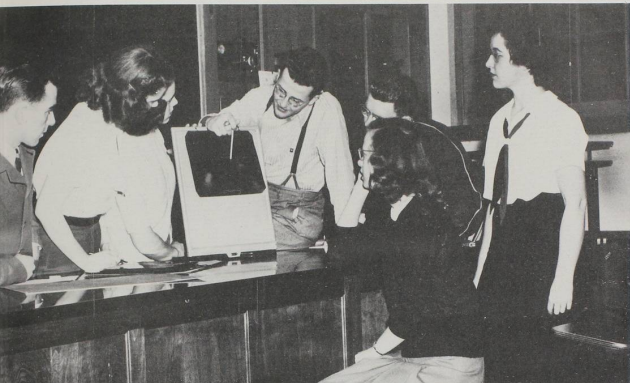

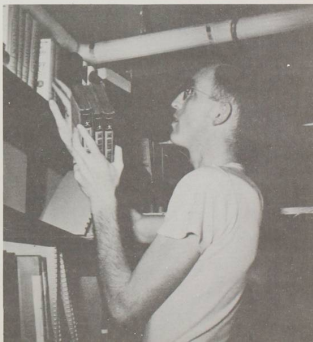
Bookstore

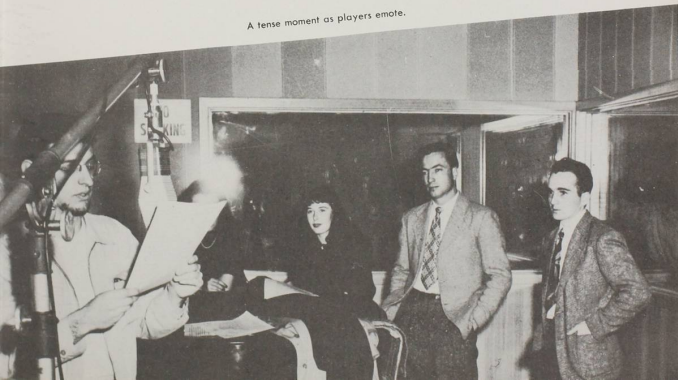

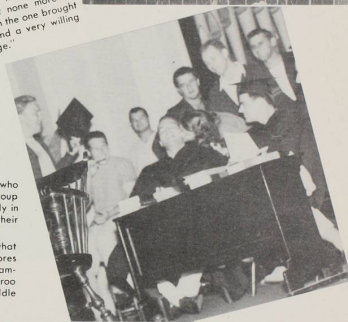

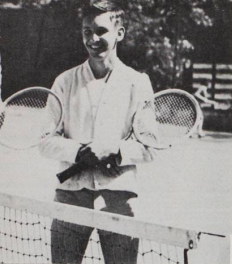

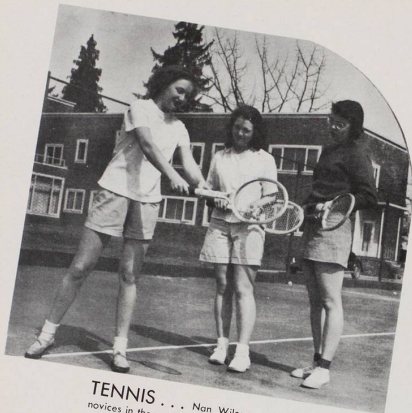

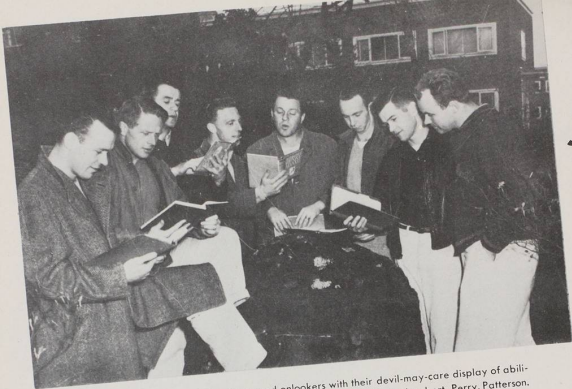

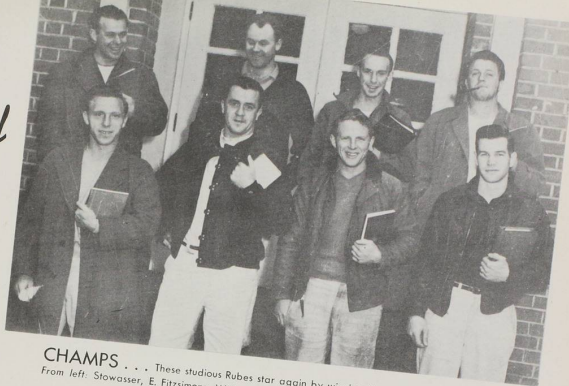

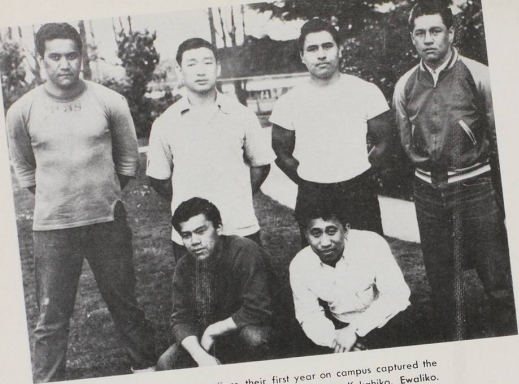

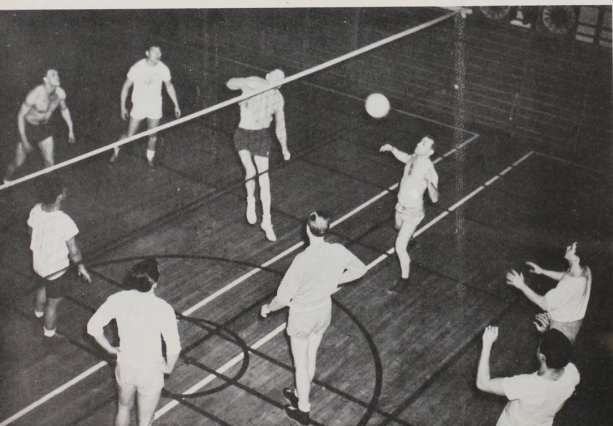

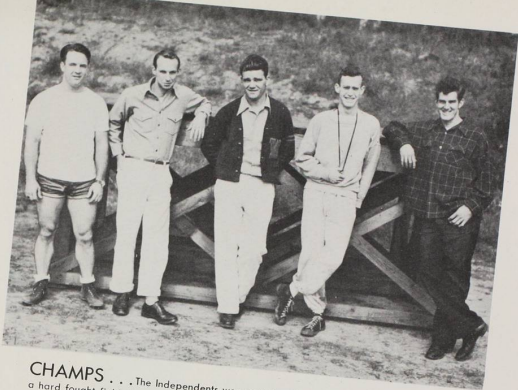

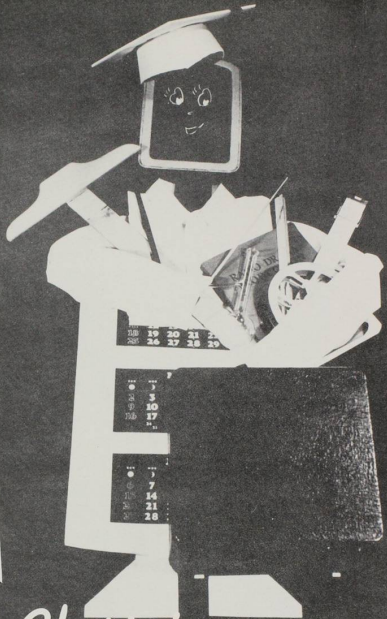

Hard working and serious minded veterans anxious to finish their formal education compose the nucleus of the group whose curricular interests vary from things athletic to scientific as well as language and home economics.

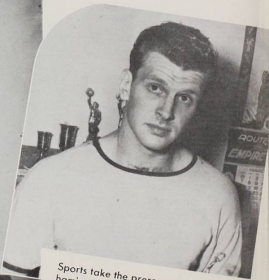
Spare periods they double as profs to test their theories or toss a new verb to unsuspecting students. Then, over to the high school, away to other jobs or out to the gym for relaxation.

Most valuable contribution of the year was made May Weekend with the whole class cooperating to sponsor this long remembered annual event.



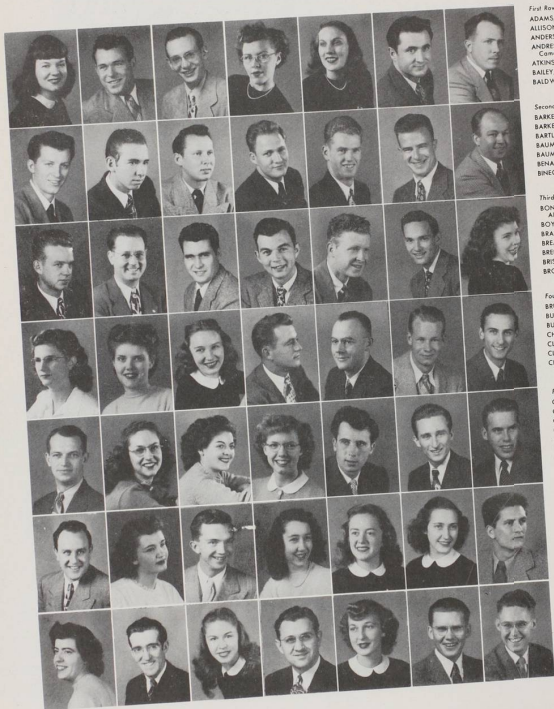

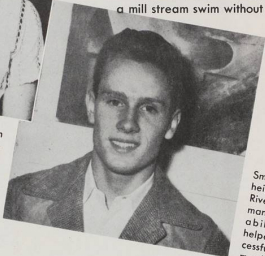


Class of

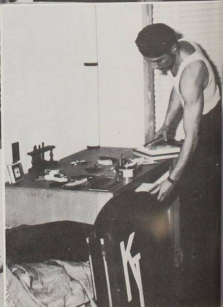

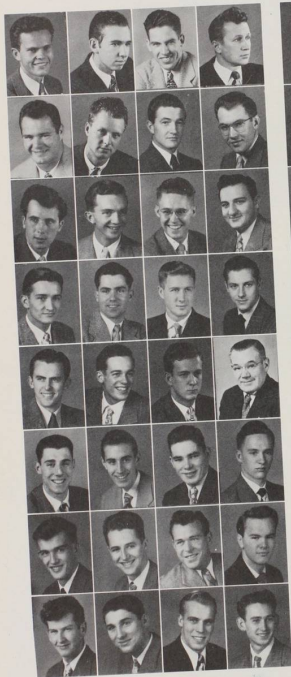

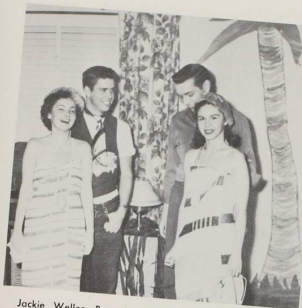

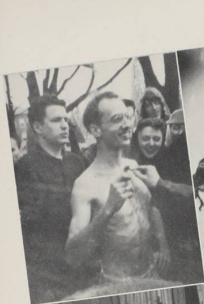

Cabana Combo . . . in striped cotton, midriff blouse, elasticized at neck and midriff, Dirndl Skirt elasticized at waist.

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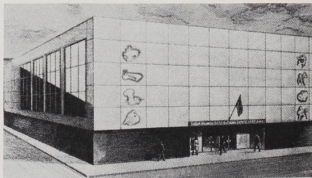
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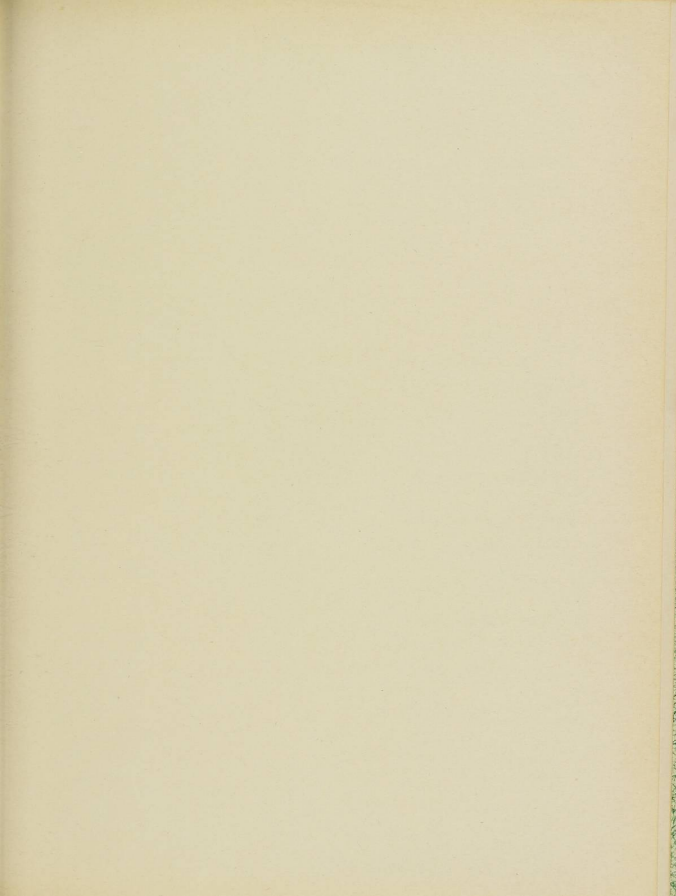
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
