INTERCLASS RIVALRY RULES Article III.

Sec. 1. The class having the largest number of points at the close of the year shall be declared inter-class rivalry champion, and shall receive a suitable reward.

Sec. 2. The following number of credits shall be required for eligibility to represent each class: Seniors, at least 88; Juniors, at least 56; Sophomores, at least 24.

Sec. 4. Students registered for less than twelve hours shall not be eligible to represent a class in a contest.

RULES

Each society shall hold its reception and each new woman shall have an opportunity to attend each society at least once and not more than twice before the second Saturday before Thanksgiving.

No woman shall be invited to join a society, either by verbal or written invitation, before the second Saturday before Thanksgiving.

Each shall answer in writing.

Any girl taking ten hours work in music, law or arts, or in regular standing in the UUniversity is eligible for membership in any society. Any non-society girl, no matter how much or how little work she is carrying is entitled to attend the various open meetings and "At Homes."

Every new and non-society girl turns in her preference of societies in order; a committee formulates lists of choices for each society and furnishes the societies with their lists. Each society bids from the lists as received in order.

Each society has one "At Home," and one week-end rush date.

In order to secure secrecy in the actual bidding, the preferential lists are prepared from the choices by the faculty member of the Inter-Society Council alone, and these lists are sealed and not opened until after the meeting in which they are to be voted upon has been formally opened.

All the invitations to the various "At Homes" are printed on one card, with their respective dates, and sent to each non-society girl at the beginning of the season.

The answers to the invitations to join a society shall be in the mail by Monday night, following the Saturday they are issued.

The membership of these societies is chosen according to the following rules:

Men's Inter-Society Rules

Article III. Rules for Rushing.

Sec. 1. Beginning with the second Wednesday after the completion of registration, each society shall hold four and only four open meetings to which onefourth of all non-society men shall be invited. No one may be invited a second time to the same society.

Sec. 2. During the season no society or members of a society shall participate in a social function in which a prospect is present if there are not present men from another society. This shall not apply to programs mentioned in section 1 of this article. No direct or indirect bidding shall be carried on except as hereinafter specified. Unsportsmanlike conduct by any individual or society in the carrying out of these regulations shall make the society amenable to the Inter-Society Committee.

Sec. 3. During the Friday afternoon following the fourth meeting each socciety shall mail sealed invitations to the non-society men whom they wish to pledge. Acceptance must be mailed by Monday noon. From the mailing of the invitations until acceptances are due there shall be no communication what-ever concerning societies between society and non-society men.

Sec. 4 There shall be no rules covering the acquiring of members for the re-mainder of the school year except that new men shall be encouraged to visit all societies before pledging.

Rules of the Inter-Sorority Council

1. There shall be no formal sorority rush season during the first semester.

2. Sorority rush season shall be held during the second semester, the date being fixed by the Inter-Sorority Council.

3. Sorority rush season shall be con-fined to one week, each sorority having one mid-week dinner date.

4. Sororities may pledge during the first semester any girl who has been on the campus a previous semester.

5. New girls of either Freshman, Soph-omore or Junior classes shall not be Senior girls may be pledged during the first semester but shall not live in the house until the second semester.

6. No bids shall be promised to any girl at any time.

7.Bids shall be sent out on the date set by the Inter-Sorority Council, which shall be after the last rush party.

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8. There shall be no personal rushing during the formal rush season. Personal rushing shall be defined as: Entertaining girls in any manner whatsoever, such as visiting on or off the campus, dinner or show dates, discussing sororities in any way.

9. Any sorority violating the above rules shall be obliged to forfeit one-half of all bids for that year.

The Forensic Council

The Forensic Council is composed of three wearers of the bar "W" and the coaches of debate. The student members are elected by the student body, and the chairman of the council is in direct charge of all debate and oratorical activities including the finances of the department.

Debate

Especially during recent years, Willamette has made an outstanding record of victories in debate.

Debate for women has been claiming more and more favor from the coeds. Five out of twelve members of the Bar "W" Club last year were women.

Oratory

The Keyes Prize, and University Prizes (see Catalogue), stimulate activity in oratory, as well as do the State Oratorical Contest and the Peace Oratorical Contest, which are yearly held.

The inter-class oratorical contest is one that arouses real interest among the students.

College life abounds in chances to learn to speak in public, and the student does well who takes advantage of them.

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MUSICAL

The Women's Glee Club

The vacancies in the membership of this organization are filled by an open try-out. The girls work conscientiously during the year and the resulting concerts are universally pleasing. Besides several jaunts to near-by places last year, the club performed in Chehalis, Bremerton, Seattle, Kirkland, Raymond, Doty and Klaber.

The Men's Glee Club

This organization is well and favorably known almost as far as is Willamette itself. The membership is determined by open try-out, and the Dean of the School of Music is director. Each year it makes a tour, carrying musical programs to large and small towns alike. Besides affording great pleasure to the club and good financial returns, the trip represents Willamette as an advertising feature.

University Band

An official band of seventeen pieces flourished on the campus last year. The constitution provides for awards for activity in that field. Music at athletic contests is well worth the time and trouble it takes to make it possible.

Freshman Glee

Freshman Glee means that each year four new songs of a type to be agreed upon before-hand are added to Willamette. Of these, usually one, or at most two, survives the test of actual use, so the old school is rich in favorite songs which have real merit. The Glee is an inter-class contest.




