To her surprise and excitement, the misplaced envelope contained a collection of more than 100 letters and notes from famous authors, statesmen, poets, playwrights, editors, journalists, and financiers. She had uncovered the collection of the late Viola Price Franklin, wife of the late Dr. F. G. Franklin who served as reference librarian at Willamette from 1921-34.

Included in the collection were notes signed by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, Louisa May Alcott, William Jennings Bryan, Sir James Matthew Barrie, Calvin Coolidge, Herbert Hoover, Zane Grey, Vachel Lindsay, Dorothy Dix, Christopher Morley, and many, many other distinguished personalities of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

A note explaining that the collection had been turned over to the library was included in the envelope, but otherwise there was no record of the manuscripts in the card file.

Most of the letters were addressed to Charles W. Price, brother of Viola, who served as secretary of the Lotos Club of New York, a literary organization that invited distinguished people to speak or attend special banquets.

Mrs. Johnson and visiting librarian William Carlson plan to exhibit the collection at the library during National Library Week April 7-11.

Associate Professor of education Dr. Wright Cowger, B.M.Ed., Oberlin, M.Ed., Willamette; Ed.D., University of Oregon; teaching experience University of Hawaii.

Assistant Professor of physics, Dr. Donald G. Montague, B.S., Oregon State; M.S., University of Washington; Ph.D., USC.

Instructor in history Donald R. Hinton, B.A., Louisiana Polytechnic, M.A. (and Ph.D. candidate), Emory University.

The resignations include Vice-president for development Raymond Brahams, whose plans are indefinite; Director of Admissions Al Fedje, who will be director of cooperative programs of the American Heritage Association; and Financial Aid Director Theodore Shoberg, retirement.

Exchange with Chemawa starts with a song

It all started with a song. That's how sophomore Carol Blucher described the start of what she hopes to be a regular exchange with the Chemawa Indian School near Salem.

A group from the Indian School attended a concert on campus and felt that their fellow students should hear the voice of freshman Sharon Fisher. Through the help of Al Fedje, Director of Admissions, and Rev. Gerald T. McCray, Sr., religious coordinator at Chemawa, Carol, Sharon and Chris Offen appeared on a program at Chemawa. Fedje invited the Chemawa students to visit the campus sometime to get a glimpse of college life.

Carol worked out the details, and on February 11 some 30 Chemawa students spent a day and a night on campus. They were assigned campus hosts and attended classes and informal gatherings. Several found themselves in the roles of "experts" in the class "Amerindians of North America."

Arrangements have been started for a similar visit by Willamette students to Chemawa, and Carol says, "We don't want to stop here. We hope to organize a tutoring program for the new Chemawa students and involve a larger number in the exchange program."

Student initiatives cover wide range of issues

Negotiation without confrontation is the way one administrator sizes up the actions of Willamette students to date. Committees have been formed to study a wide variety of issues, particularly in regard to non-academic matters. A summary of recent initiatives follows:

The annual study of convocation policy has resulted in a proposal to allow voluntary attendance for fewer programs, with emphasis placed on gaining speakers of distinction. Renamed the University Speakers Program, the former convo programs will be of two types, University Forum (getting 75 per cent of the budget) and Lecture Programs (25 per cent). This proposal has been passed to the faculty for action.

Student Senate has appointed a committee to study the housing situation on campus and its effects on the total university atmosphere. Investigation will include the areas of co-educational dorms, open dorms (opening rooms to visitors of the opposite sex), revisions of the present housing plan, freshmen dorms vs. all-class dorms, and off-campus housing. Recommendations have not yet been made.

A Research and Planning Commission under second vice-president Bruce Botelho has appointed investigative committees on sophomore and junior keys (which would eliminate closing hours for these two classes); University Fiscal Policy (where does all the money go?); Managers Guidebook; and the Students Bill of Rights. Two other committees are in the planning stages, Book Store Investigating Committee and one to study off-campus housing for women.

The Educational Policy committee of the faculty has authorized a study of various proposals for an Honors Program. The general goal is to provide an opportunity for superior students to do extra and more advanced work under the guidance of one or more faculty members. Individual proposals from faculty members and students have been offered, but none has been approved.

Course evaluations by students will be published for the first time in three years this spring. A committee has distributed questionnaires covering lectures, texts, professor, value in field, and the interest the student had in the subject. Responses will be fed to the computer and the results are to be published.

Omicron Delta Kappa launches "free university"

Self-education through a "free university" has been instituted on the campus through the efforts of Omicron Delta Kappa men's honorary.

Courses in the "free university" can be on any subject. Teachers—whether

they be faculty members, students, or citizens of the community—announce the course and its meeting time and proceed as interest and material hold out. ODK is serving as the coordinating body to help in publicizing the courses.

The first schedule of courses was released in early March and included courses in art, campus living, foreign culture, literature, mathematical application, music, photography, sports activity, and war games and tactics. Among specific titles were: "Question Mark—Fraternity"; "Oriental Miscellany Mystical Tour"; "Rock and Blues Analysis and Experience"; "Fundamentals of Motorcycling"; "Practical Game Theory Applied, Geo-political Warfare: a simulated Model"; and "The Church—Where in God's Name is it Headed?"

Swimmers 2nd, wrestlers 4th; Lundahl leads hoop stars

Bearcat swimmers finished second to Pacific Lutheran in the Northwest Conference championship meet, while the WU wrestlers were fourth in the title test. The only individual first in either meet for the Bearcats was Ian Fulp's championship in the 177-pound division.

Bearcats fared better on the NWC All-Star basketball selections. Sophomore center Bob Lundahl was the only unanimous first team choice, and forward John Barker and guard Sandy Marcelino, both seniors, were named to the second team. Freshman Dave Steen gained an honorable mention. Lundahl, who averaged 19.3 points per game, also made the All-District squad.

Five Distinguished Alumni Receive Citation Awards

THE eleventh annual Alumni Citation Awards recognized achievements by five alumni in teaching, community service, educational administration and science. The Awards were made at the Founders' and Benefactors' observance in January. Following are this year's recipients:

DALE GORDON CLEAVER, '50

A professor of art at the University of Tennessee for the past 11 years, Dr. Cleaver received the first Outstanding Teacher Award presented by the University of Tennessee Alumni Association in 1966.

He earned his M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in art history from the University of Chicago, and later conducted research in Brussels on a Fulbright Grant. A textbook he has written "Art, An Introduction," is now in use at 152 colleges and universities. He has also published numerous articles and reviews in both European and American scholarly journals.

In Knoxville Dr. Cleaver has served as president of the Knoxville Art Center, and he has been active in the Dulin Art Gallery. He is presently conducting

GENEVIEVE THOMPSON DYER, '26

More than three decades of voluntary service have been devoted to community religious, civic, and political organizations by Mrs. Dyer in the Astoria area.

For 28 years she has been Director of the Clatsop County American Red Cross, Chairman of Home Service, and a home service and blood bank volunteer. For 13 years she has been a Director of the Clatsop County United Good Neighbors, serving as Chairman of the Board of Directors in 1959. She has also been a Director and Secretary of the Maritime Museum and a member of the Astoria Planning Commission.

Mrs. Dyer has been active in the Republican party, most recently serving as Vice-Chairman of the Clatsop County Nixon for President Committee and Chairman of Women for Nixon. She has been a local and state Director of the League of Women Voters, and she has served the Presbyterian Church as a Trustee, President of the Thursday Club and the Women's Association.

KENNETH VICTOR MACKENZIE, '34

Knowledge of earth's last frontier, the area under the seas, has been significantly advanced through the career of Mr. Mackenzie. He is an internationally recognized authority on deep and shallow water acoustics, sound speed, reflection, reverberation, propagation, and instrumentation.

For 22 years he has specialized in anti-submarine warfare. He currently serves as Supervisory Physicist with the Acoustic Propagation Division of the Ocean Sciences Department at the Naval Undersea Warfare Center in San Diego.

Mr. Mackenzie has made many deep dives, including nine in search of the lost submarine Thresher, and he obtained the first measurements of sound speed, salinity, temperature, and depth conducted aboard a deep submersible.

Author of over 100 scientific papers and co-author of a recent book "Men Under Water," Mr. Mackenzie has served as a consultant to the governments of Canada, Japan, Denmark and England.

For exemplary service, Mr. Mackenzie has been awarded the Certificate of Merit from the Office of Scientific Research, the Certificate for Exceptional Service to Naval Ordnance Development, and the Navy Unit Commendation.

JOY HILLS GUBSER, '28

Following graduation, Dr. Gubser began her long career in education as a teacher in the Salem schools. She now serves as Assistant Superintendent of Public Instruction, a post she has held since 1953. Her career also includes service as Director of Curriculum and Publications for the State Department of Education, principal of Leslie Junior High School, and State Director of Teacher Education and Certification.

She earned her Master of Arts degree from the University of Wisconsin and the Doctor of Education degree from the University of Oregon.

In her professional capacities, Dr. Gubser has been particularly effective in securing for public education a fair share of Oregon's funds, in planning and articulating special education programs, and in developing and implementing a new certification program in cooperation with the state's institutions of higher learning.

In 1967, Dr. Gubser received the University of Oregon award for distinguished service to education.

TREVAL CLIFFORD POWERS, '25

One of the world's leading authorities on the properties and applications of concrete, Dr. Powers began his professional career as a chemist in the materials testing laboratory of the Oregon State Highway Department. In 1920 he became an associate engineer with the Portland Cement Association Research Laboratories in Chicago, subsequently becoming head of the Basic Research section, and finally Research Counselor until his retirement in 1965.

Following study at Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1936, Dr. Powers wrote a paper on the application of colloid and capillary theories to concrete research which laid the foundation for 20 years of basic research in the Portland Cement Association laboratories.

His writings and research have won him the coveted Wason Medal of the American Concrete Association on three occasions. He also received the Sanford E. Thompson Award of the American Society of Testing Materials for a research paper which proposed a new test to measure the resistance of concrete to freezing and thawing.

Dr. Powers holds an honorary doctorate from the University of Toledo and is an honorary member of the American Concrete Institute.

THE Pioneer University of the West is in its infancy in regard to understanding the Black Revolution. No one is more aware of this than the 11 Black students now enrolled. "Willamette Blacks feel like missionaries to an extremely ignorant campus," is the way one student expresses the situation.

Alumni are probably aware that their ranks include no more than about a half-dozen Negro graduates. With twice that many now enrolled and the prospects of 25 to 30 additional Black students in the Fall, the University faces a new challenge in human relations.

One person who has been instrumental in recruiting Black students is Al Fedje, Director of Admissions. He believes that "no white person on this campus really understands what the Black students have gone through. It is important for Willamette to attract more Black students so the few here won't feel like they are carrying the cross. We have a long way to go in understanding the problems faced by Black students, and we're getting a late start."

This past fall, the Black students formed a Black Student Union to serve as a base for promoting better understanding between the races. *The Alumnus* invited three of the Black students to comment on the B.S.U. and their involvement on campus this year. Their responses on why a B.S.U. is necessary, purposes of the B.S.U., and Blacks on a White campus follow:

The Black Student Union

Why it is necessary...

*From the hand of night
The fingers of time scratch
Over my Black Body and take me
Back to my stolen and forgotten
past.*

*Flames of passion leaped through
my cold heart,*

*Surged with emotion
and branded my mind*

*With infinite patterns of
rhythm.*

*Alabaster spears
Pierced my heart
and usurped an untimely
defiance.*

*Across the great water I sojourned
To a hostile habitat*

*For to appease and please
and lend a helping hand,*

*It was borrowed
but never returned.*

*Its uncontrollable fingers
Still scratch over my*

Black Body,

*Opening new and old
wounds.*

If this were really understood, there would be no need for a Black Student Union. Black students do understand this and therefore attempt to make this system realize that it is perpetuating racism through the one institution that has the potential for ending it. This institution is education.

Here at Willamette, Black students and White students alike are being disillusioned and castrated by the "system" of education. The fact that the realization of this systematic process of de-education is somewhat thwarted, may be justification for the apathetic contentment of the major portion of Willamette White students. But the racist attitude of the students and administration is immediately realized by the Black students. The subtleness of this attitude creates bitterness and suspicion.

There is really no need for one to wonder how such an attitude could exist at a White Christian oriented University like Willamette. The hypocrisy and ignorance here can be compared to other White Christian oriented American groups such as the Ku Klux Klan and the National States Rights Party. This comparison may be somewhat far flung, but so is my situation.

Black people can detect the hypocrisy and racism that is the foundation of this power structure because they are suppressed under the foundation. In other words, this system is continuously kicking our asses. Black people are getting tired of begging White men to stop stepping on them because their pleas have been falling on deaf ears. The formation of Black student groups on predominately White campuses was inevitable because "we weren't ready for integration."

For too long Black people have been deprived of a decent education. This is a definite attempt by the system to keep the masses of Black people ignorant so that they wouldn't realize just how racist and anti-Black this system is. If a person doesn't know what type of ailment he has, he couldn't possibly know what type of medicine to take in order to cure it. As long as people are oppressed because of their color, they will drift closer together in an effort to put an end to oppression or destroy that which is oppressing them.

Yes, the Black students at Willamette are being oppressed and deprived. Willamette prepares its students for White middle class society and not for life and all of its diversities. A disillusioned Negro would believe that he too was being prepared for White middle class society and probably dig it. In a way, Willamette does prepare Blacks for White middle class society. It prepares them by exemplifying what the real enemy is like and where he learns all the tricks of the trade.

The simple fact that we as Black students are all put into one category and treated accordingly makes a Black Student Union necessary. When one can look at Willamette University collectively and see reasons for the existing situation of Black People, then he can understand why a Black Student Union is necessary.

PURPOSES OF THE B.S.U.

When one asks the question "What is the purpose of Willamette's Black Student Union?" it is easy to give the response: "It shall be the purpose of this organization to promote understanding between the membership, to enhance personal realization and sense of belonging, to help in developing our purpose of getting an education and helping in community activities as a moral obligation; to 'educate' the public as to what we stand for and our cultural heritage."

The B.S.U. runs such programs as study tables, sensitivity sessions, and issues seminars to increase their realization about themselves and the Black Movement. Contact is maintained with other schools in Oregon on their activities and ours. Every weekend Willamette students visit other colleges, or other collegians visit us, all to develop their own awareness of their part in the Black Revolution. Unity is found in understanding and this is one of the goals.

The moral obligation to the Black community stems from the fact that Black students are but an arm of that community. Wherever their school may be, the surrounding community is their home; for Black people have the same problems everywhere in America.

The B.S.U. can be called on by the community at anytime for any need; no brag, just fact. Meanwhile, the B.S.U. members tutor students in the subject field where they need it. On Saturdays, discussion seminars are held on Black history and the Freedom Movement of

today, between the B.S.U. and the young Black people of Salem.

The final theme in the statement of purpose is the education of the public. The reaction to the B.S.U.'s honest attempts leads one to Frederick Douglas' words: "It is enough to make a slave ashamed of the country that enslaved him." One must observe the composition of Willamette to understand this.

Willamette is composed of upper middle class people. The economic, social and geographical spectrum is limited. Status quoism is the philosophy of Willamette, for the real issues are not tackled by the students, only beanies, dress standards, and open dorms. Willamette students, on the most part, remind one of the older generation.

Therefore, the B.S.U. meets a large resistance whenever it attempts anything, yet it still tries.

The fact that no Black professor that was suggested by the B.S.U., professors, and the community was ever interviewed for a position speaks for itself about the administration's position. The attempt to cancel the Black Culture class speaks further of the administration's position. The B.S.U. is still attempting to get a professor.

Black Week was torpedoed quite well. In September, the B.S.U. was ASKED by students to put it on. So, through six months of communication and time, a week involving speakers from Seattle to Los Angeles was put together, covering the large spectrum of Blackness. Three weeks before this educational experience, the promised money disappeared. This again speaks for itself.

B.S.U. members have traveled to schools, churches, committees, and classrooms in this never-ending commitment. Now they are tired, yet in April they will hold open seminars.

A statement of purpose says nothing unless there is living up to it. The B.S.U. works hard in living up to its purpose, mostly trying quietly to enlighten not only themselves, but the society that is moving toward apartheid. I ask one question: Why must the Black students fight against such obstacles on a Christian campus?"

BLACK ON WHITE

Being Black on an all White campus is rather perplexing even in these days of the so-called era of better race relations. The real shocking thing, not only for Willamette, but in the country today, is the fact that there is an even greater

polarization of the Black and White races. The strange thing facing a Black student on what is continually referred to as the "oldest university in the West" is the fact that once realizing the longevity of Willamette's life one sees that here we are in the year 1969 and there are only 11 Black students on a campus of approximately 1500 students. This is mainly because in the past there has been little effort if any to recruit more Black students for Willamette University. Realizing this, one must envisage that in the endeavor to recruit more minority students, Black students themselves would be instrumental in recruiting minority students.

The most important thing for people to realize in this day and age is that the educational process has failed minority students. This is evident when one observes the anachronistic educational system that is trying to educate today's Black youth. The reason for this is that the high schools tend to gear today's Black youth to the semi-skilled labor force. In order for the Black student to utilize his full potential, today's colleges and universities must actively enroll these almost forgotten students.

It seems funny that I or anyone else for that matter, should be talking about enrolling Black students in colleges and universities. It would seem obvious that minority youth need an educational background as much as today's White youth. The important thing to note, however, is that not only should minority youths come to Willamette for their own benefit, but it would also be beneficial for the Whites as well. In order for this country to exist, because it is made up of very diversified cultural backgrounds, these cultures have to be understood. The only way for the ever increasing polarity of the races to be alleviated is for all the races to meet, especially on the college level, if for no other reason than to understand each other. One can especially see that this is needed for Willamette, because there are some students here who have never even come in contact with Black people.

The world is becoming a vast community of complex mixtures of cultures. If this community is to exist with all elements involved, working cohesively, it must, as a prerequisite, understand human beings. This understanding must come about by certain vicissitudes on the college level and if failing in its attempts to actualize the potentialities of colleges on the "crisis in Black and White" it will be confronted with the resounding blow of Black on White.

Dr. Roger J. Fritz to succeed President G. Herbert Smith August 1st

On March 14, the Willamette Board of Trustees met to receive the recommendation of the Presidential Selection Committee and to elect a successor to President G. Herbert Smith. Dr. Roger J. Fritz was elected to assume duties August 1, at which time President Smith will become chancellor of the university, devoting his attention to the University's development program. Dr. Smith will become president-emeritus January 1, 1970, and will take terminal leave until his retirement is fully effective August 31, 1970.

Following is the report of the Presidential Selection Committee which includes a full resume on President-elect Fritz:

For the past 27 years we have enjoyed a rare type of leadership from Dr. G. Herbert Smith. He has been a builder of Willamette, educationally and materially. He has been an effective steward of the high trust that this board and its predecessors have placed in him, and Willamette prospered.

Facing the termination of his lengthy tenure, this board created a special committee more than two years ago to seek a successor as president of the University. This was a foresighted step, more judicious than we at the time realized. Our initial purpose was to avoid any lapse in the leadership of the school, such as has existed at other schools during lengthy period of search.

Probably we did not anticipate the difficulty and delays that lay ahead. We were to learn that more than 300 colleges were seeking presidents. If we were to add to that number the junior colleges and community colleges, the number would be nearer 500.

We also were to find that the supply had dwindled. This country today is in a pattern of population where there is a serious shortage of leadership talent in the middle age area. The simple fact is that the 30 to 45 age group—from which middle managers, executives and college presidents are chosen—has not grown in proportion to the rest of the population.

Meanwhile, top executives who reached high levels in the immediate post-war period are now retiring in increasing numbers. Large corporations are facing this dearth of material. In the next ten years some 60 per cent of today's top executives must be replaced.

For colleges the problem is magnified. In other times the role of the college president was one of prestige, pleasant academic associations and relative security. Many persons aspired to any vacancy.

This is not necessarily true today. The situation is marked by two aberrations:

1. Increased load which galloping inflation and cost spirals have placed upon our colleges and their top leaders, and
2. The ferment and militancy that have seized some student bodies and some faculty personnel.

Not only have these burdens hastened the desire and the necessity for college presidents to retire, but their impact has lowered the desire of potential presidential candidates to enter the arena.

These are among the realities that your committee has faced during the many months that we have been looking for a

new president. We have proceeded deliberately, with care and, we think, effectively.

Early in our quest we set certain basic qualifications that we considered fundamental to a new president. We decided that he must be an educator, an administrator, a fund raiser and a master of communication, both with students and the public. We decided that a Willamette president must also possess strong spiritual and moral leadership qualities.

The committee invited nominees from many sources. We studied the personal and professional qualifications of more than 60 candidates. Many were quickly eliminated or eliminated themselves. We selected a prime list of ten candidates and a reserve list of equal number and began a laborious checking on them...

Topflight candidates considered

Let me say that the men we found tops, the one's we looked over the sharpest, were also the men that other institutions also found attractive. It was bound to happen: While we were assessing these men, we would lose some.

One has been named chancellor of a state university. Another has been elected president of Colgate. Two have taken high positions with large corporations. Another decided to remain vice-president of one of our great universities. A sixth, now dean of a large graduate school, apparently is headed for some still larger post. And so it goes —

Five candidates visited the campus, two at the invitation of the committee, two informally and one on other business. Two others were invited, accepted and then declined at the last minute. Some of the candidates seemed to possess some qualifications in high degree and others less. All did not want to be identified publicly.

In all of this extended review, one name came repeatedly to the top. It was the name of Roger J. Fritz. Dr. Fritz paid a visit to the campus unexpectedly in February, 1968, and liked what he saw. Without commitment, he asked that his name be kept under consideration until his outlook and plans matured.

Fritz, a mid-west educator and business administrator, had been recommended to the committee by Jay Gerber of Gonser & Gerber, who served as public relations counsel to Willamette for three years.

The committee studied the educational background and

professional and personal achievements of Dr. Fritz. Here, in brief, is a summary of his curriculum vitae.

Dr. Fritz has served colleges and universities of the mid-west in various capacities including: Admissions Counselor, Monmouth College, 1949-50; Counselor of Student Activities, University of Wisconsin, 1951-52; Assistant to Dean of Men, University of Wisconsin, 1952-53; Assistant Dean of Men and Assistant Professor, Purdue University, 1953-56; and Member of Board of Directors, Monmouth College, 1957 to date. Chairman of the Board and Chairman of the Executive Committee since 1961.

During his tenure as Chairman of the Board, Monmouth College has made unprecedented forward progress. He attributes this to effective teamwork of trustees, faculty, alumni and students...

At a period when many private colleges have been in difficult financial circumstances, the budget of Monmouth College has been balanced or a surplus generated each year.

Dr. Fritz now occupies the post of Director of Management Development of Deere & Company, headquartered in Moline, Illinois. He has been in charge of planning coordination and implementation of company-wide programs of recruiting, induction and training of management personnel. He has headed the continuing education program of this international corporation, one of the world's largest manufacturers of farming machinery and implements.

He has also been a director of John Deere Foundation and a member of the corporate contributions committee.

He has served on numerous local boards, councils and commissions related to business and education, including the Illinois Board of Higher Education's Committee on Preparation of College Teachers. In 1968 the President appointed him one of a 14-member Citizens' Advisory Board on Youth Opportunities.

Fritz was born in Green County, Wisconsin, July 18, 1928. He attended public schools in Freeport, Illinois.

In high school he was president of the student council, participated in band, orchestra, oratory and debate and lettered in four sports. He was student commencement speaker.

His college undergraduate major was political science, with minors in history and speech. He held numerous offices and served on the student-faculty committee. He was the Illinois finalist for a Rhodes Scholarship in 1949 and was both Illinois and national oratory champion the same year.

Ph.D. in educational counseling

He worked his way through college, getting a B.A. from Monmouth College in 1950, and M.S. from University of Wisconsin in 1952 and a Ph.D. in educational counseling and personnel services from University of Wisconsin in 1956.

He served several years as public relations director for Cummins Engine Company and secretary of the Cummins Engine Foundation. He joined the John Deere organization in 1959.

At the community level he has served as superintendent of the church school of the First United Methodist Church of Moline and on numerous civic organizations, including Association of Commerce, Moline School Foundation, steering

committee of Black Hawk Junior College, Community Chest and County Hospital Planning Council.

In 1962 he was named "man of the year" by Moline Junior Chamber of Commerce. In 1961 and 1965 he was given American Red Cross Outstanding Service Awards. And in July 1964 he was selected as one of the "Outstanding Young Men of America".

He is the author of three books and many articles on counseling, argumentation, company philanthropy and adult education. He has been a popular speaker before a wide variety of audiences, including regional conferences of college presidents, American Council for Aid to Education, Associated Colleges of Illinois, service clubs and high school commencement programs.

He married Kathryn Goddard in 1951, and they have two daughters, Nancy 13 and Susan 9.

Seem to fit Willamette scene

Last July the committee authorized two of its members to visit Dr. and Mrs. Fritz at their home in Moline. Mr. Atkinson and Mr. Grant spent most of a day with them and reported enthusiastically on their observations. We invited Dr. and Mrs. Fritz to the campus and they came last November. We found them to be delightful people, folk who seemed to fit the Willamette scene as if they had been designed for it.

Later, Dr. Fritz affirmed an interest in the presidency of Willamette. Mr. Atkinson and your committee chairman met with him in Denver, February 1. We explored his ideas for the University and he explored our own and that of this board. The conversations were most satisfactory on both sides.

Dr. Fritz is a man of attractive appearance, poise and affability. He expresses himself with ease and with candor. There is nothing of the stuffed shirt about him. He discourses without difficulty either with businessmen or students. He reflects character as well as knowledge. He would represent Willamette well in any company.

Mrs. Fritz is appealing, genteel, naturally pleasant and friendly. Her physical beauty is enhanced by an unusual depth of perception. She is a womanly woman. She would attract friends easily on and off the campus.

In summation, this committee chose Dr. Fritz because of his educational leadership, coupled with demonstrated abilities in organization, administration, fund raising and communication, both with students and the public.

These qualities, the committee believes, are especially needed in these times of financial pressures and ferment on the campuses. We believe that he is a man of courage and conviction but a man who is able to listen. We believe that he is a man who can provide what President Nixon described the other night as "a sense of purpose and idealism that young people can understand and support".

The committee is unanimous in recommending to the Board of Trustees that Dr. Roger J. Fritz be elected President of Willamette University to succeed Dr. G. Herbert Smith.
