Freshman Initiation

Restoring a tradition broken by the class of '39 as freshmen, this year's sophomores, the centennial class of 1942, for the first time in four years took a hand in freshman initiation. The football team and most of the "W" club men being in California the first two weeks of school, the sophomores, under President John Hathaway, were granted permission by the A.S.W.U. executive council to conduct initiation until the team returned, holding two moot courts. Paul Whipple wrote "Through the Telescope" at the first part of the year and succeeded in interpreting campus and national affairs with unusual intellectual clarity.

"Fads and Fashions," by Margaret Moulton, has been an unusual and clever review of university society each week. Her style, clear and lucid, is comparable to many of the cosmopolitan society writers.

"Via the Grapevine," a "dirt column," was short-lived and only appeared once.

Joe Van Winkle writing in his "Rips, Raps, and Roots," covered with keen insight and impartiality the many sports events of each week—giving frank and helpful tips that made the contests really enjoyable for the fans. His column in defense of football was tops.

"Lausanne Hall News" and "W.A.A. News" by Eve Shellito were sparkling and informative.

Collegian Staff Headed by Competent Editor

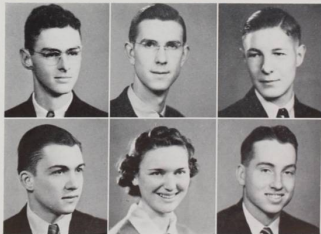

FOOTBALL

A 1939 gridiron season full of ups and downs plunked the Bearcat back into mediocrity in the northwest as she chalked up three wins, fought to two taililess deadlocks, and lost four contests.

Playing rugged ball, the Keene combination, inexperienced only at the tackle positions, after two disastrous starts became more versatile as the season progressed, then slumped in its final conflicts. The well-balanced crew hampered by injuries at first, returned from a disappointing southern jaunt to get its scoring machine into action. Mixing the old Keene power with a wide-open style, the 'Cat shook its Walden and McGlenn-paced backfield loose to amass 105 points to its opponents' 88, totaled in the nine-tilt schedule. Willamette accomplished a per game average of 11.7 markers to 9.8 for the opposition. Passes and end-arounds were efficient sparking devices of the Bearcat offensive.

Despite defeats and the loss of the Northwest Conference throne, held from 1932 on, to Pacific University, stars of the Bearcat galaxy garnered personal prestige. Joe Holland, veteran guard, was unanimously voted an all-conference berth, was named on the undefeated San Jose State all-star opponent eleven, and was selected Little All-American by the Paul B. Williamson rating. Bob Hinman, end, unanimously, and George McGlenn, halfback, were placed on the all-conference team. Al Walden was a San Jose all-opponent choice.

Beginning workouts early in September, the Methodist aggregation moved into California after one week's practice in Salem.

Another week's practice at the San Diego Marine base was held, but hindered by the effects of intense heat. The result was a 26-0 victory for the Marines after the Bearcats had staved off thrusts for two quarters.

The heat, assisted by injuries among the Keenemen, again took its toll the week following as Santa Barbara State overpowered the Bearcats, 20-14. Willamette's 7-6 halftime lead was erased by the long dashes of the Gaucho's McArthur.

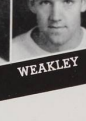

FOOTBALL

Back in the Oregon capital city on October 6, the 'Cat held its traditional rival of the northwest, Portland University, to a scoreless tie. Defensive skill was the characteristic of the evenly-matched teams.

Meeting her initial conference opponent, Willamette blasted out a 29-6 margin over the Linfield Wildcats, as the Walden-McGlinn duo carried the brunt of a diversified running and passing attack. Bunny Bennett, although he saw little action, tallied ten points.

Appearing invincible, the Bearcat gridmen ruined the College of Puget Sound homecoming celebration in Tacoma, running to a wide-open win, 42-6. Sweeping end-arounds with Hinman carrying the leather spurred the onslaught. The Loggers tallied against the 'Cat second lineup.

The greatest Willamette achievement of the 1939 season was the flash of defensive strength displayed in opposing the colorful, undefeated San Jose State Spartans, one of the nation's top teams. For nearly three quarters the determined Bearcat held, before the reserve power of the "Pop" Warner creation forced the Willamettes to bow, 15-0. The Bearcats relaxed in midfield but tightened in goal-line stands.

Realizing its first major step in wresting the Northwest conference title from the 'Cats, Pacific University gave Willamette a scoreless deadlock for a Homecoming present. Receiving the opening kick-off, the Bearcats boomed down the field; but, that march, as later thrusts, ended short of pay dirt.

In Caldwell on the following Saturday, the Keenemen staged a thrilling comeback, led by Hinman, Walden, and McKeel, and drove for two touchdowns after permitting the Coyotes to score first. All points were gathered in the first half of the 13-7 Bearcat win.

Willamette's long reign in Northwest Conference football met its finale; and the crown passed to Pacific, as Whitman downed the Bearcats on Thanksgiving day, 8-7.

Willamette's record in the conference was three wins, one loss, and one tie.

The rookie squad, in its second year of existence, struggled along with a meager turnout under the supervision of George Sirmio, All-Conference varsity tackle of 1938.

The Bearkitten contingent vied in only one fracas in opposition with outside competition. Running up against a heavier Astoria high school team, the Frosh emerged from a hard-fought defensive fray with a 6-0 decision. Bill Hughes, main cog of the Freshman, capitalized on a break when he scampered 55 yards for the tally. The tilt was played on the prepster's gridiron.

Necessity to concentrate attention on the Varsity eleven threatened the Frosh program and practice was discontinued several weeks before the Bearcats completed the season.

During the past year, in particular, this organization has made a splendid showing in arranging various marching formations and special stunts for the entertainment of their audiences. "Cake-walking" for example, has proved to be one of the most entertaining talents of this selected group. Besides appearing at the major athletic contests, the marching band has been featured in many important campus affairs, and this year they made an excursion trip to the College of Puget Sound game in Tacoma.

The concert band is presented in two yearly programs of varied symphonic and orchestral compositions which illustrate the fine balance in instrumentation and the technical ability necessary to afford the requisite tonal effect in such work.

The winning slogan, "Paralyze Pacific," by Bruce Williams, senior, was the theme of the festivities of November 10 and 11, which included the annual sign contest and noise parade, an Alumni banquet at the Quelle, followed by the Willamette-Pacific football game and the sophomore-freshman bagrush between halves, and a dance in the gymnasium—all events of Friday evening. On Saturday morning alumni registration at Chresto cottage took place; in the afternoon the fraternities and sororities entertained their alums, while in the evening the Homecoming play was presented.

By use of a pun on the slogan, Alpha Phi Alpha sorority for the fourth time in the last five years again won the sign contest. The sign, "Peril Ice, Pacific," warned an ice-skating Pacific Badger of danger ahead, and was the work of a committee headed by Madeline Morgan. Kappa Gamma Rho won second place. The noise parade preceding the game for the third successive year was won by Sigma Tau fraternity, with Alpha Psi Delta fraternity for the third consecutive time taking second. The Sig float contained a large victory bell, a battery of horns, a first-aid car, a tractor, and two trucks loaded with noise-making devices, including a "Model-T" Ford mounted in the air with a chain fastened to a revolving rear wheel to clang on a water tank.

Though the Willamette-Pacific football game ended in a scoreless tie, the colorful bag rush between the sophomores and freshmen at half time bore all the ear-marks of the antag-

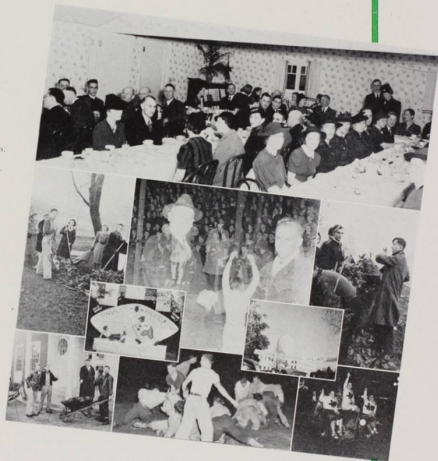

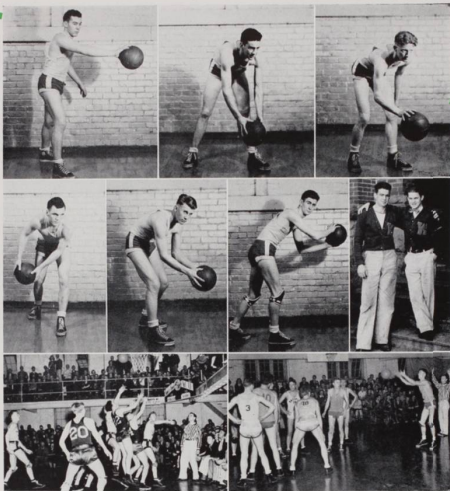

The 'Cat, contending for its third year under the mentorship of Coach Howard Maple, won 14 tilts in 26 games and slipped into third place in Northwest conference standings.

Conference competition saw the Bearcats capture four contests in an 8-game slate, as the title was annexed by College of Puget Sound, against whom Willamette did not vie. The Maplemen downed Linfield twice and split two-game series with Pacific, Whitman and College of Idaho.

Outside the northern league Willamette's chief accomplishments were victories over the University of Idaho and the Rubenstein Oregonians, state A.A.U. champions. Bearcat attempts to garner wins from Oregon State college and Portland university, met with disaster in two fracasas with these opponents. The Rubenstein five dumped the 'Cats in a duo of later games. Most exceptional tilt of the season was probably the wind-up fray with Eastern Oregon college of education. The teachers won, 80-73, in overtime.

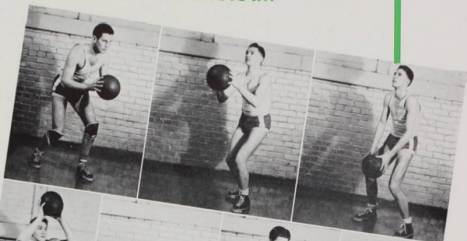

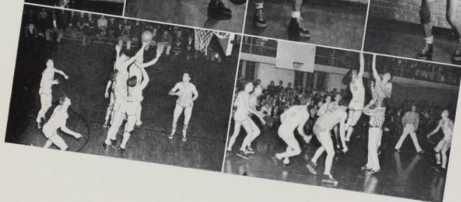

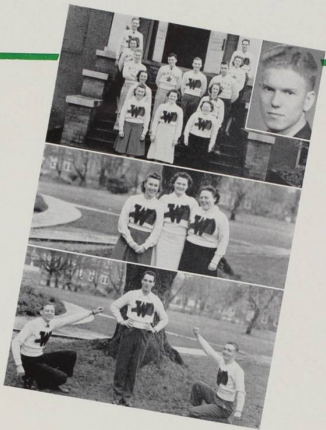

AND so ends a year of more contests won, more trophies gained, and more ideas volubly expressed. Dr. Herbert E. Rahe, returning from a year of graduate study, was instructor, coach, counselor, and friend of all those in the forensic field. To each member of the squad "Prof" gave individual attention and valuable aid.

Starting the year's activities was a trip to Stockton which proved very profitable both to Willamette and to the squad—Marjorie Waters, Helen Newland, Beverly McMillin, Bill Thomas, and Al Klassen. The women's team tied for second, winning five out of seven of their debates; and the men won seven out of their nine debates, coming in third in the contest.

Interspersed throughout the year was the competition in the Inter-Collegiate Forensic association of Oregon which incorporates all forensic activities except debate and impromptu speaking. Those winning places were: Bill Thomas, first in extemp; Helen Newland, third in extemp; Glenn Olds, third and a prize of twenty dollars in Peace orations; and Tom Terjeson, third in Old Line oratory. Linfield was the scene of the greatest "all-around" activity. Seven debate teams, composed of twenty-four persons, represented the school there, and Willamette was the only school to have all of the teams go from the preliminaries to the next round. 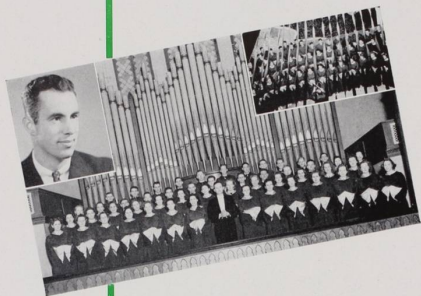

Dayton Robertson, local student body president, was in charge of arrangements and was assisted by the following members of the executive council: Verna Vosper, secretary; June Brasted, entertainment; Wiff Achor, housing; Henry Frantz, meals; Dan Moses, reports; Fred Bernau, publicity; John Martin and Bill Thomas, registration; and Bill Hanzen, and Herb Davis, programs.

All Oregon schools but two were represented at the convention, with each allowed five official voting delegates, and as many others as they desired to send unofficially. Represented were Southern Oregon College of Education of Ashland; Oregon State college, Corvallis; Oregon College of Education, Monmouth; Pacific University, Forest Grove; University of Portland, Portland; Eastern Oregon College of Education, La Grande; Albany college, Portland; Mt. Angel; Linfield college, McMinnville; Pacific college, Newberg; St. Helens Hall, Portland; Marylhurst college, Marylhurst; Multnomah college, Portland; and Willamette University of Salem.

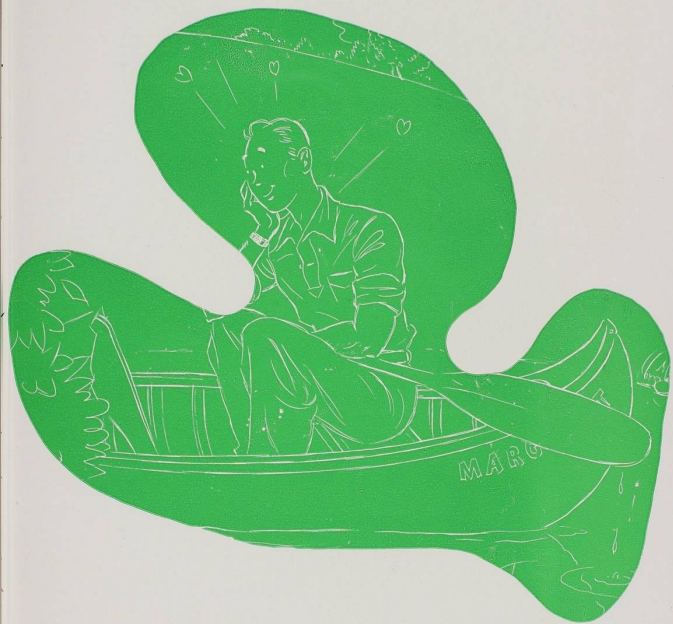

A TEAM that exceeded expectations is the story of Bearcat baseball in 1940. With a nucleus of few capable veterans Coaches Spec Keene and Howard Maple called upon reserves and freshmen to aggregate a well-balanced diamond nine that was victorious in seven of its first ten collegiate battles. With exception made of its mound strength, the Keene-club was rated as one of the best in history.

Opening the season, the 'Cats won one and lost two vying with Oregon State; and they split a series with the University of Oregon. Additional non-conference wins were posted over Albany college, Portland university, and Mt. Angel college. The Willamettes jumped into the Northwest conference race by nosing out Linfield college in a duo of frays. As this page goes to press, the Bearcats have conflicts ahead that they must capture if they wish to reach the play-off with the College of Idaho, winner of the eastern division of the conference.

With wealth of other material, Willamette placed the brunt of hurling duties upon Bob White and Harold McAbee, lone men with varsity experience. White in his early mound duties was consistently victorious, while McAbee experienced trouble. Diminutive Frank Lester, rookie, was the only other pitcher to see much service.

Baseball

Chief asset to the Willamette power in 1940 was the marked advancement in hitting strength. This factor accounted for much of Spec Keene's elation upon his return from the Hawaiian voyage.

Recognized as the most improved player on the 1940 club was catcher Jimmie Robertson. The Albany lad bore the receiving task alone and with pitcher White formed one of the highest regarded batteries in northwest collegiate circles. His work with the hickory was a spur in the 'Cat campaign. Without doubt, the most outstanding Bearcat infielder was the veteran second-baseman, Lee Shinn; his slugging as well as his fielding were missed in the conference mixes.

In other infield spots John Kolb held down the third sack; Ollie Williams and Jack Steiger had the edge over Gordon Moore, Joe Murray, and Art Baird at first; Al Walden generally had first call at short, while Bill Belcher, Orville Ragsdale and Bob Dpgett competed for the mid-infield positions. Dwight Catherwood, Durb Southard, Maurice Lonergan, Gene Stewart and Murray saw action in the outer pasture. On the chucking staff were Joe Holland and George Sirnio.

Track

BEARCAT Track in 1940 was at its highest peak in recent years; and to date have scored two meet victories, over Linfield college (the first in 12 years), and over Oregon Normal.

In the initial meet of the year Pacific dropped the 'Cats $73\frac{1}{2}$ - $57\frac{1}{2}$; Justin Weakley garnered two of Willamette's six first places and led his team's tallying with 13 points. In the other two meets the Bearcats downed Linfield, $74\frac{1}{2}$ - $56\frac{1}{4}$, and Oregon College of Education at Monmouth, 88-42. In the former Gardner, Putnam, and Weakley turned in outstanding performances; while in the latter event the same men, together with Farmer and Robertson, carried off the bulk of the honors. In a triangular meet with College of Puget Sound and Pacific, Willamette took third.

Veteran and probably the outstanding performer is Justin Weakley in the javelin, hurdles, and the pole vault. John Gardner, in the mile and two mile, and Rex Putnam in the sprints and pole vault, were bulwarks of the team. Slow to hit their stride in 1940 but improving, are veterans Dexter Russell and Lancer

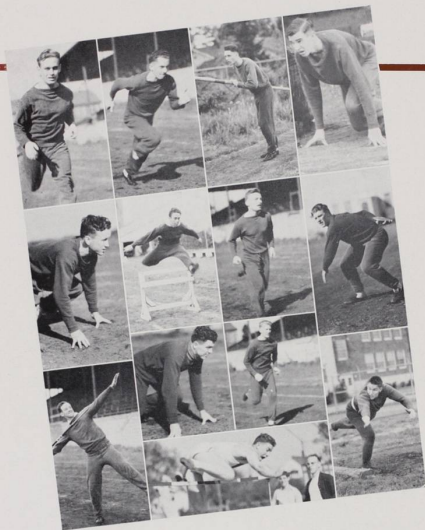

A setback to emphasis on track came when Mentor Howard Maple was forced to divide his attention between his cindermen and the diamonds while Head Coach Spec Keene was in Hawaii. Improved activity of the 1940 crew reveals excellent possibilities.

Tennis

Men

SPARKED by its Northwest conference singles champion, Bud Gilmore, the Willamette tennis club has met with only fair success in 1940. The Bearcat racquetiers lost two matches to Oregon State and one to University of Oregon; on the other side of the ledger they beat Portland university twice and Pacific university once.

Gilmore, a two year titlist in the Northwest, has not been defeated in collegiate singles play thus far this season. Showing well, but not as successful as Gilmore are George Gutekunst, Hume Downs, Warren Bertelson, Sumner Gallaher, and Howard Eberly. Others out for tennis include: Merle Turner, Tom Hill, Gilbert Lieser, Ralph Ransom, Dick Smith, Wayne Sturdivant, Bill Moynihan, Glen Olds and Ralph Martin.

Matches yet to be played are with San Jose State, Linfield college, Leader Tennis shop of Portland, and the Northwest conference tournament.

Women

LACK of coaching was a hindrance to Willamette's women varsity tennis possibilities early in the season. In the opening three matches the co-eds lost twice to Linfield and once to Oregon College of Education. 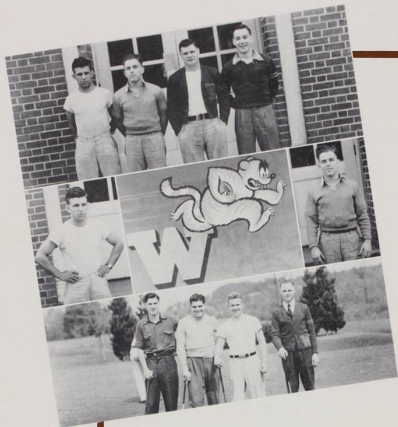

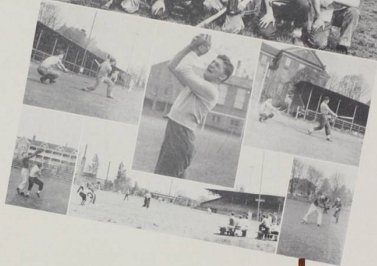

Dean of Women

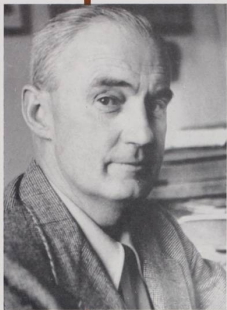

ALTHOUGH Willamette teams were not so successful in the 1939-1940 school year as in previous intercollegiate campaigns, Spec Keene, in his fourteenth year at the helm of Bearcat athletics, with a capable staff developed aggregations of high calibre that made excellent showings in contests with formidable opponents.

Keene assumed the head-coaching duties in football and basketball, and with Howard Maple in the role of assistant tutor built two well-balanced crews. Maple guided a veteran lineup through an average season in basketball, and his work as track mentor resulted in the production of the best cinder-club of recent years; "Happy" Howard directed the 'Cat diamonds while headman Keene was in Hawaii in the early spring. Lestle Sparks continued his constructive work as varsity tennis coach, and he was faculty administrator for the large and popular intramural program. Miss Gale Currey completed another successful year as pilot of women's athletics.

Increased school spirit was a harmonious factor in the 1939-1940 administrative advance.

Graduate Manager

A graduate manager, to whom the organizations receiving student funds and the classes must submit a record of all expenditures, is the head of the present system of student finance originated in 1929. Under Professor Leslie J. Sparks, the graduate manager's office has functioned capably and smoothly, with Verna Vesper, Virginia Bendiksen, and Erna Taylor providing able student help. Mr. Sparks also acts as advisor to the A.S.W.U. Executive council. All athletic funds, including those of the Oregon state high school basketball tournament, are handled through this office.

Student Placement Bureau

A Willamette graduate of 1938, Miss Inga Oehler has this year taken over the duties of director of the Willamette University teacher placement bureau also serving as secretary to the Dean of the University. As director of teacher placement Miss Oehler contacts school officials throughout the state and makes applications for those registered with the bureau.

Registrar

With her duties as recorder, which consists of the keeping of all scholastic records, issuing of transcripts and grade reports, Miss Frances Harris is also secretary to the Registrar and aids in conducting the regular business of the office. Miss Harris, a member of the student body, is a sophomore.

President's Secretary

Returning to Willamette after a two-year sojourn as a teacher at Ashland high school, Miss Charlotte Kallander, '37, is the fourth new member in the administration this year. 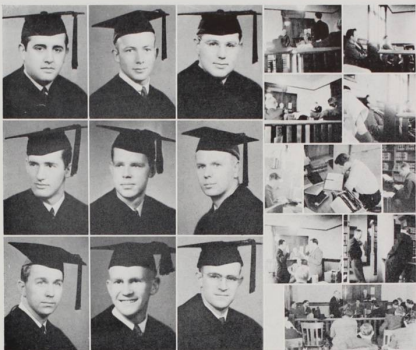
DEAN ROY M. LOCKENOUR, present head of the Law School, will retire at the end of this year to assume the role of a professor. He will be replaced by George M. This change will boost the faculty to four full-time professors, including the new Dean.
