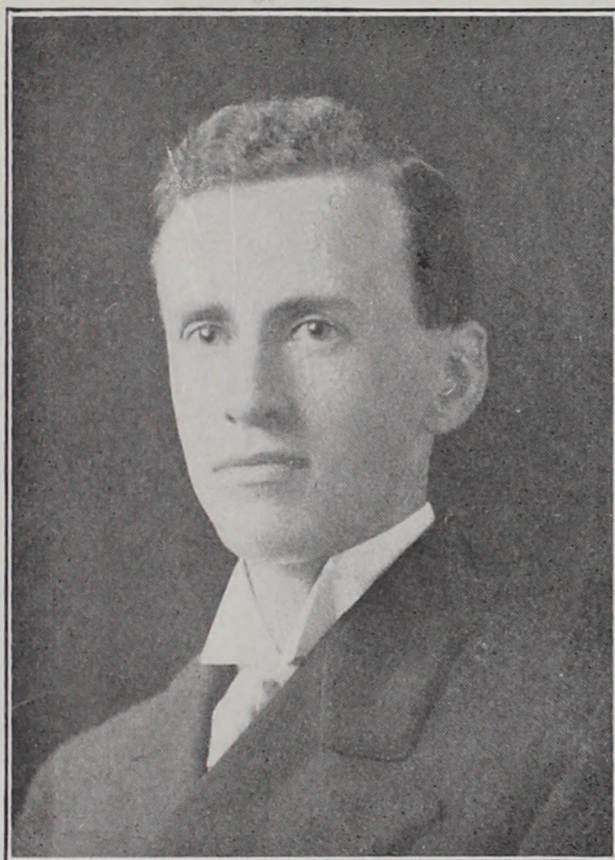
OUTLOOK

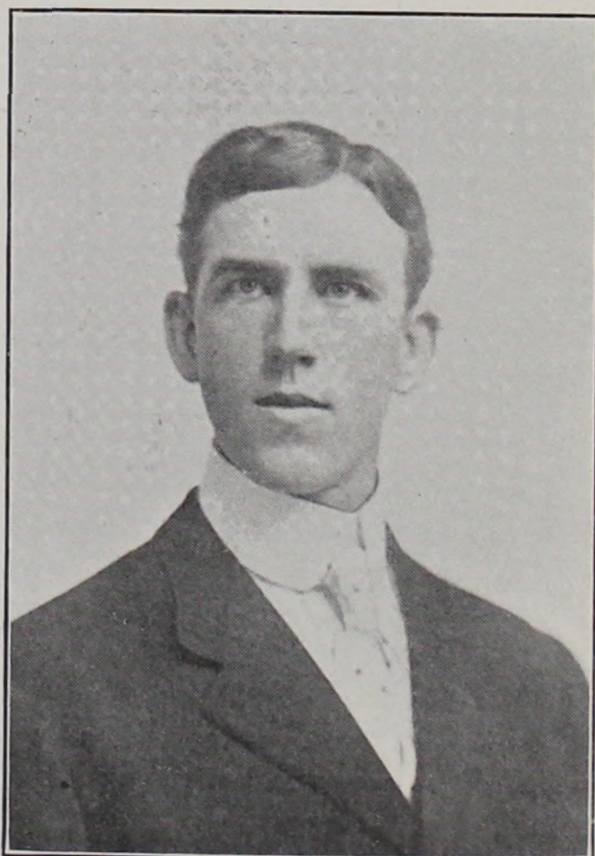
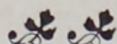
