

KISS ME KATE





CHALLENGE FUND

The Student Challenge Fund entered its third year in December. 1955, under the leadership of Volney Sigmund with the assistance of his student committee. The purpose of the fund was to raise money toward the goal of \$10,000 to pay for Willamette's new buildings; the Bishop Memorial Health Center, the Auditorium and Fine Arts Building, and Doney Hall. The drive was presented to appeal to the students' sense of responsibility toward their school and what it gives to them; their donations represented the giving of themselves for the building of a better Willamette.






The Southern delegation noisily entered the gym in an attempt to swing the votes to their candidate, Senator Lyndon Johnson.






