Building Due In December To House 224

Construction of Willamette's new dormitory for men is well under way on the eastern end of the campus, progressing according to schedule which calls for completion by December.

The H-shaped building of fireproof construction will provide residence for 224 men students, 100 in the main residence hall and 124 in the four fraternity wings. It will be of modified Georgian architecture, in keeping with the style of the library and Collins hall.

General contract for the construction work is held by the Guy Atkinson company of Portland.

When the building is completed, all unmarried out-of-town men students will be required to live in and take all meals in facilities provided by the university. During the first semester next year the university will continue to provide some living quarters for men and aid others to find quarters in private homes.

Also under construction on the campus is an infirmary building which was transported from Camp Adair in 10-foot sections. It is expected to be completed in June.

The infirmary has an H-shaped plan and will contain a physio-therapy room, kitchen, matron's quarters, and a sterilizing room.

May Festival Changes Local

May Weekend ceremonies were conducted in a new location on the Willamette campus this year, in front of Eaton hall. Reason for the change was the turmoil of construction going on near the old May court to provide the new men's dormitory building.

Otherwise the annual festival was carried on in the traditional Willamette spirit on a warm sunny afternoon of May 3. Queen Margaret Allen was crowned by last year's queen, Paula Smith, attended by her royal princesses Elaine Cloudy and Mary East Runyan.

The weekend celebration began with the inter-sorority sing at 11 o'clock on Friday, followed by a barbecue on Sweetland field. That evening the drama group presented Agatha Christie's exciting mystery play, "Ten Little Indians" to a packed audience in the high school auditorium. The May Weekend ball, one of the best attended dances of the year, closed the festivities.

Summer Term Of 10 Weeks Starts June 23

Summer session of ten weeks offering courses in fifteen departments of liberal arts in addition to music and law will be conducted this year by a teaching faculty of 30 members. Walter E. Erickson, director of athletics this year and new director of admissions for next year, will be the director of the summer session.

The session will begin June 23 and end August 30. Students may earn as many as ten semester hours of credit. Three-hour classes in most cases will meet five days a week, two-hour classes four times a week for the first five weeks and three times weekly for the remainder of the session.

An education program consisting of a study of group work will run for the five weeks from July 28 to August 30.

Law school classes will be conducted for two five-week sessions.

Board and room as well as board alone are being offered by the university.

Courses offered besides law and music school work include biology, business administration, chemistry, education, English, German, history, mathematics, philosophy, physical education, physics, political science, psychology, sociology and speech.

Seniors Win Frosh Glee

Seniors won the 1947 Freshman Glee at one of the most spirited contests in the history of Willamette's traditional class competition March 8. Losers were the freshmen, who paid off in the usual manner with a swim in the icy Mill stream the following Monday morning.

Second place went to the juniors, and third to the sophomores.

Individual bet losers, faculty members among them, paid their debts the Monday after Glee according to custom by wearing outlandish garb on the campus and performing tasks calculated to reduce their dignity.

Heavy Registration Expected For Fall Term in September

Willamette's return to an 18-week semester will begin next fall with registration opening September 17 and classes starting Tuesday, September 23. An enrollment fully as heavy as this year's approximate 1,000 is anticipated.

The standard semester length of 18 weeks was compressed to 16 in July of 1943 in order to accommodate the Navy V-12 program of three semesters in a calendar year. When the V-12 program was closed at Willamette at the end of the summer of 1945, the school year was continued with two more semesters of 16 weeks.

In order to allow the normal vacation period after the late end of the school year last spring, the present year was started two weeks later than normal with each semester increased in length to only 17 instead of 18 weeks. The delayed opening also permitted extensive alterations between the close of the summer session and the regular session.

Two New Coaches to Take Over at Willamette in Fall

Two new coaches will join the Willamette athletic department next year. New director of athletics and head football coach to succeed Walter E. Erickson will be Jerome Cecil (Jerry) Lillie, who will arrive in August from Honolulu where he has headed athletics at the Punahou school.

John Lewis, baseball and basketball coach at Grant high school, will take over in his two specialties at Willamette, replacing Elmer Schaake.

Lillie is a graduate of Grant high in Portland and from the University of Oregon in 1931, where he was an outstanding football and basketball player. He coached at St. Helens, Bend and Grant high, and Central Washington college before going to his present post in Hawaii. His teams have been eminently successful. He has a master's degree from the University of Oregon.

Lewis is a former lieutenant (jg) in the navy who was assigned to coach at Grant high

A number of new faculty members, representing expansions in the staff and replacements, will be on hand in September. Among those who will not return in the fall is Dr. Robert Lantz, associate professor of education, who resigned to become superintendent of schools at Woodburn. He has been on the faculty since 1941.

Dr. Carl J. Folkerts, economics professor since 1945, will leave for Montana State university. Russell Bate, who came to Willamette this year as instructor in economics, will join the faculty of Utah state college. Temporary posts for the year will be relinquished by Darlene Dickson Albert in drama and speech and Janet Fleischauer in French, substituting for Prof. Marion Morange, who will return after a year's leave. Prof. Charles C. Haworth will again retire from teaching Spanish after returning for a semester to replace Dr. William Moellering, who left at the end of the fall term to teach at San Jose State.

Illinois Dean To Address 113 Graduates

Commencement for 1947 will take place Sunday, June 15, at 3 o'clock in the Willamette university gymnasium as 113 degrees are awarded to 99 graduating seniors, nine law school graduates and five who will become masters of education.

Dr. Charles Manfred Thompson of Champaign, Ill., professor emeritus in economics and dean emeritus of the college of commerce and business administration at the University of Illinois, will be the commencement speaker.

Baccalaureate services will be held in the First Methodist church the preceding Sunday, June 8, at 3 p. m. Rev. Robert A. Hutchinson, pastor of the Pilgrim Congregational church in Seattle and formerly of the First Congregational church in Salem, will deliver the baccalaureate sermon.

Saturday, June 14, will be Alumni Day on the campus with class reunions scheduled from noon to 3:30. At 3:30 the new men's dormitory under construction will be dedicated at a special ceremony. A convocation and also a business meeting of alumni will be held at 4 o'clock. The alumni banquet will begin at 6:15, followed at 8:30 by a reception in Lausanne hall.

Law alumni will hold a dinner meeting Friday, June 13, at 6:30 o'clock. The Loyalty Fund committee will meet at 7:30 the same evening.
