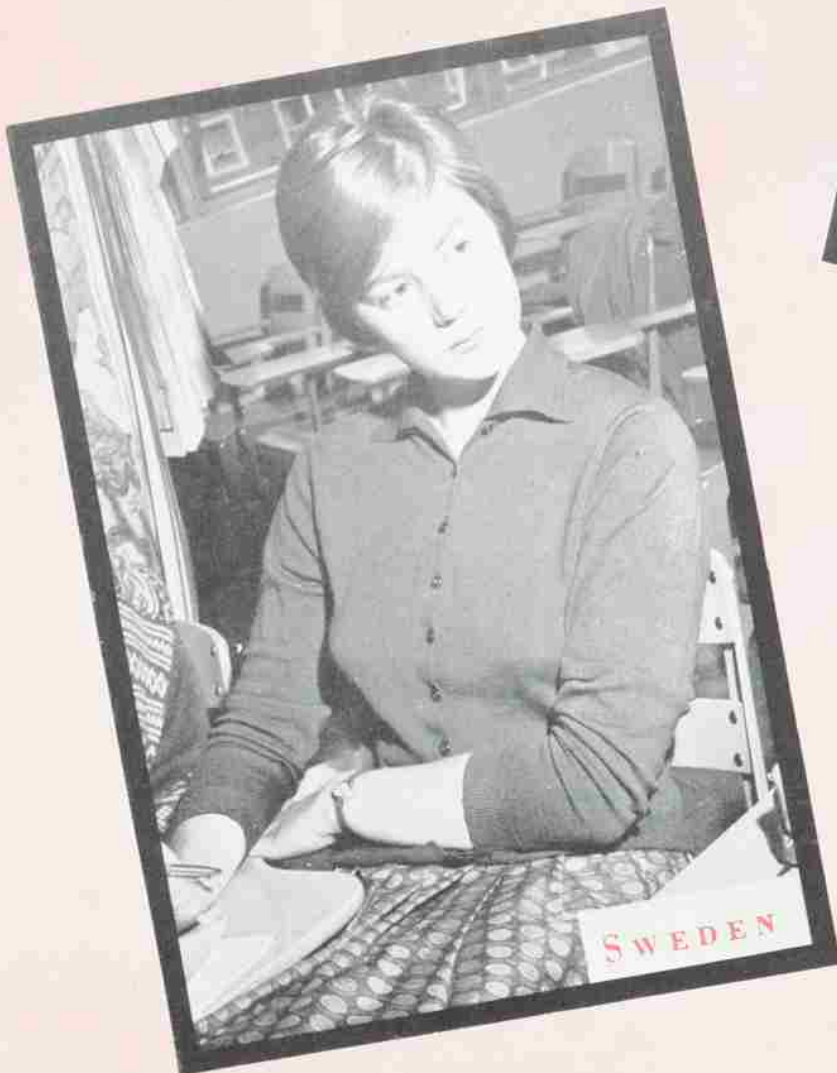
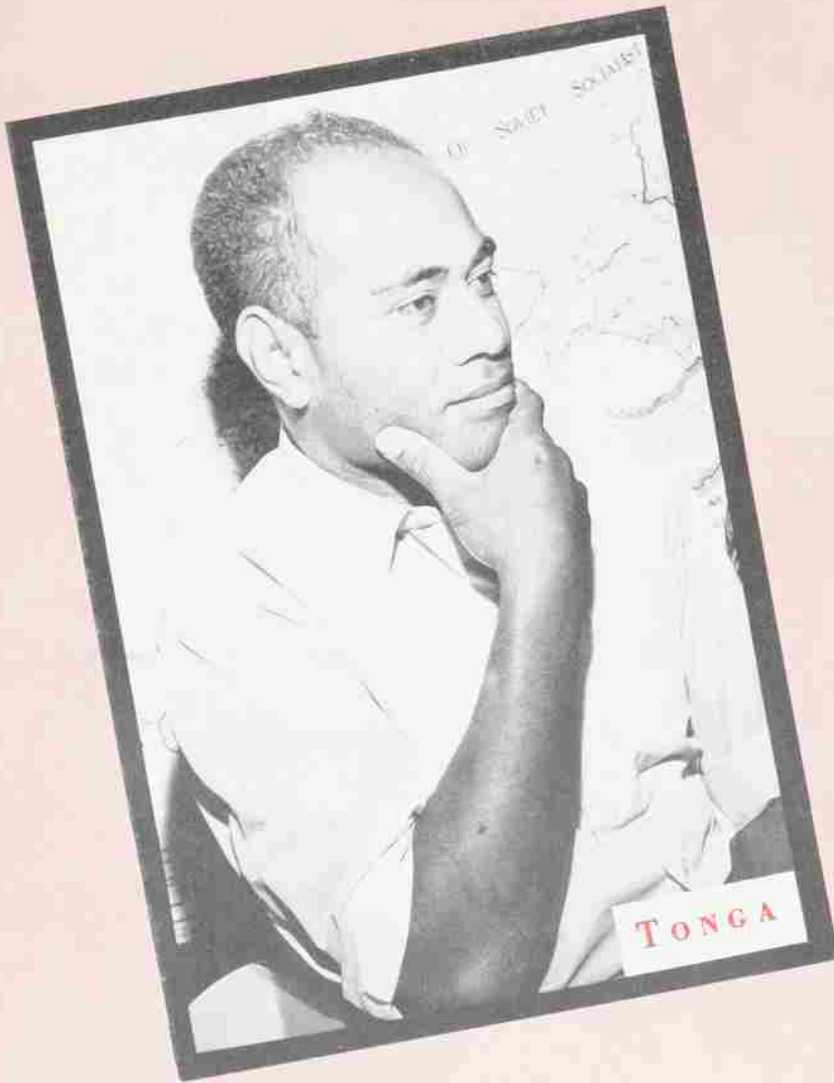

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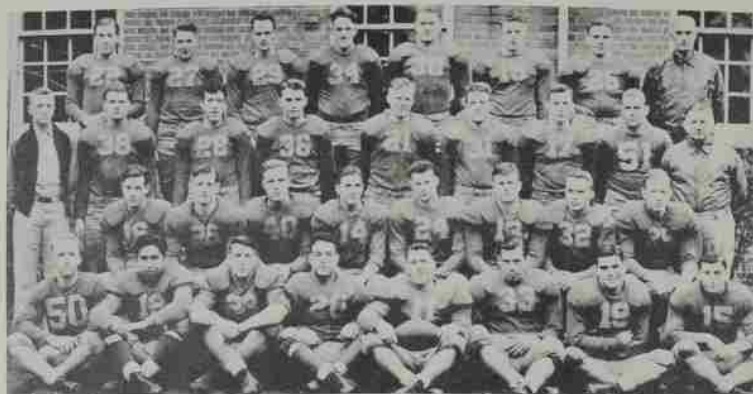

Foreign Students Contribute to Willamette . . .

"Americans really do work . . . and in the summertime, too." "Your American tradition of freedom of the press sometimes makes writing such that you don't know whether you are reading a Communist or American magazine."

"They give you a second cup of coffee in the United States without pay". "My first impression of the United States was that you trust more people . . . leaving cars unlocked, houses open and no fences around so you are allowed to cross the lawns".

These were only a few of the many such statements and impressions that were of great interest to some of us American-born natives as we 'listened-

in" on a recent group discussion participated in by the foreign students at Willamette this fall.

Included in Willamette's historic record enrollment this fall is also a record number of foreign students. Represented are eleven countries (see cover), numbering 21 students . . . including two girls, 17 boys and a young married couple from Germany.

Twelve of the visiting students are from Germany as part of the Carl Duisberg Society exchange program. These students will attend Willamette the fall semester and then will be placed by the University, for 12-18 months, in vocations (most locally but may be anywhere in the U. S.) to help train them for their chosen occupations. Required to take English, they may elect all their remaining courses while here.

This program had its earliest beginnings in Germany in 1926 when over 500 young engineers and agriculturists from Germany spent two years in the United States studying our methods, etc. These men mostly hold top positions in West Germany's economy today.

Then after World War II, in conjunction with the Marshall Plan Ministry in Bonn, this program found approximately 400 young skilled German workers doing practical work-training in the United States, for one year. The present program however is not limited to Germans coming to the United States but includes an increasingly larger number of Americans going to Germany each year. The plan is also being extended into Britain.

The program went by the name of "International Council for Youth Self-Help" when founded in 1949. In 1955 it was changed to its present name in memory of its founder and benefactor, Professor Duisberg, who as a scientist and industrialist, contributed valuable service in the exchange of students and trainees following World War I.

The Society is supported by both German firms and private individuals with most of Germany's large labor and industrial federations represented on the Society's Board of Directors. Participants in the program are selected on the basis of sufficient preliminary training, good health and knowledge of the language needed.

This year's crop of foreign students and their countries are . . . Peter Verloop, Holland; John Mistkawi, Israel; Carol Stenger, India; Sigbjorn A. Larsen, Norway; Kristina E. Chi, Taiwan; Setalki Kaveinga Havea, Tonga; Lale Refioglu, Turkey; Ahmed Mohamed Makki, Yemen; and Walter Barein, Josef Brunnhuber, Friedrich Burgemeister, Gerd Hennecke, Ulrich Hettler, Helmut Kastner, Manfred Kirsch, Herbert Krieger, Reinhold Menzel, Elmar Wefers, Hella and Walter H. Brings from Germany.

The latter two are the married couple mentioned earlier. He is 25 and she 24 and they have only been married since last January. They met while both were working for Ford-Werke AG in Cologne, Hella's hometown. Walter hails from Kiln-Lindenthal. He is interested in automotive salesmanship and mechanics while she is furthering her secretarial career.

Incidentally their off-campus apartment at Willamette is their first home together . . . alone! And they had to come 6188 miles to do it. Due to the crowded conditions and housing shortage in Cologne, they have never lived alone, but with one of their parents since their marriage.

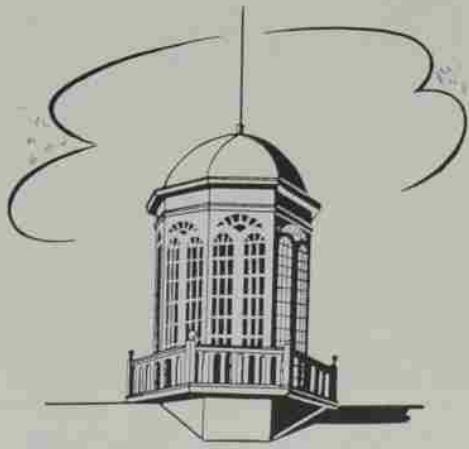
These students, from all the countries, have banded together this fall to organize an International Relations Club on campus. They meet each Friday with a different member in charge of the program. Each member may bring two American students as guests. Willamette Chaplain, Rev. Calvin McConnell is serving as their advisor.

Another interesting sidelight is that the Swedish Miss, Kristina Gullers, had heard quite a bit about Willamette prior to her arrival. Her older sister, Birgetta, also attended Willamette in 1956. A very popular co-ed, she met and married Neil Causbie who was Student Body President at the time and a star Bearcat athlete.

It is quite evident in the few weeks that these students have been on campus, that their influence on Willamette life and its student body will be considerable whether it be a question of why we have cheerleaders or a discussion of the Berlin situation.

Miss Sara Jane Fernald comes to Willamette as an Instructor in English from Willowbrook Commercial High School at Villa Park, Illinois. She has her B.A. from Monmouth College in Illinois and her M.A. in English from the University of Maine.

Mary L. Fleet is the new head of the reference department in the University library with rank of Instructor. She comes from the Naval Weapons Lab's Technical Library as Head of their Documents Section at Dahlgren, Virginia. Laurence D. Stifel is the new assistant professor of economics. He has been teaching business administration at Kent State University, Kent, Ohio and has his A.B. from Harvard in Cambridge, Mass. He also received his M.B.A. from the Harvard Business College in Boston, Mass. and his L.L.B. from the Cleveland-Marshall school in Cleveland, Ohio.

D. DeVon Wade is Willamette's new chief accountant and an Instructor of economics. He comes here from teaching accounting at Evansville College, Evansville, Ind. He has his A.B. from Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky, and his M.A. from the University of Kentucky at Lexington, Ky.

Robert A. Wilcox is the new Director of Public Information. With considerable journalistic and newspaper background he comes to Willamette from Journalism Advisor and Public Relations Director for West High School in Columbus, Ohio. He has his B.S. from the Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio and has all but his thesis completed towards his M.A. degree at the same university.

Lyle Wilbelmi who teaches biology and chemistry at South Salem High School is also serving as part-time instructor of Education. He holds both the B.S. and M.A. from Willamette.

Mrs. *Elizabeth Yocom* is part-time Instructor in biology. She is also the wife of Willamette Registrar "Buzz" Yocom. Parker's Book on Timely Topic

In a day when labor disputes, strikes, etc. are almost daily in the headlines, Dr. Reginald Parker of the Willamette College of Law, has written a layman's guide on the subject.

Dr. Parker's newest book, "Guide To Labor Law," is just off the presses in a popular paperback edition selling for only \$1.75.

Especially written for the layman, the book is geared for the small businessman who can not afford expensive legal advice for his problems or for the high school youngster who wants to report to the class, know what the newspaper headline is all about, or what's behind the dispute at Dad's plant.

The book contains basic facts in its chapters which cover the gauntlet of labor law. Each chapter is concluded by pertinent statutes and questions (and their answers) commonly asked.

Dr. Parker just returned from a visiting professorship at Rutgers Law School last spring, during which time he finished the book. This is his fourth book and it can soon be purchased in all better book stores or obtained from your library.

New Enrollment Record Set

Willamette is operating this year with the largest enrollment in the school's 119 year history. The new record of 1333 students was established Oct. 1 as registration for the fall semester came to a close.

The previous high enrollment had been 1320 set in the post-World War II boom year of 1948. This also betters the 1960-61 schoolyear mark of 1230 by 110.

The Willamette Law School also set a new enrollment record with 164 enrollees as compared to the previous high of 150, also set in 1948, and last year's 142. This includes 68 new members of the Law School as compared with last year's figure of 51.

The bulk of the increased enrollment is not to be found in the entering freshman class as might be expected. There are 407 new frosh this fall as compared to 411 last fall. The record smashing enrollment was due to transfers and quite a few readmissions of former Willamette students in the upper three classes.

The enrollment figures broken down

read like this . . . by classes: sophomores are up 79 over last year's 255 to a present 324 mark; juniors are up to 194, four over last year's 190; while the seniors list 179 currently, up two over last fall's 177. The enrollment figures also include 12 full-time graduate students and 41 listed as "special" students. There are also 12 German students attending Willamette under a special exchange program. They will attend classes at Willamette the fall semester and then be placed in various jobs throughout the country the spring semester.

Rotary Fellowship Recipient

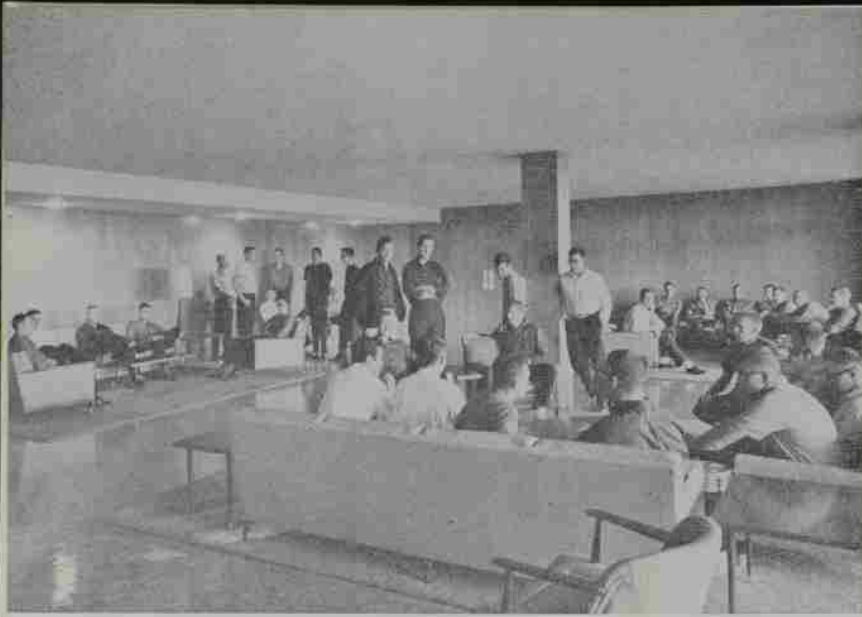
Marian Hauke has become the fourth Willamette student in history to receive a Rotary International Scholarship. Miss Hauke after graduation from Willamette next June will spend the 1962-63 school year studying at one of Argentina's universities under the sponsorship of the Salem Rotary Club.

From Astoria, Oregon, she maintained a straight "A" average throughout her high school career and to date at Willamette has an excellent 3.968 average. Her scholastic ability earned her a Mary Collins Scholarship for her freshman, junior and senior years. She is also a member of the Upper Class Honors Program and a Senior Scholar in the Political Science Department for 1961-62.

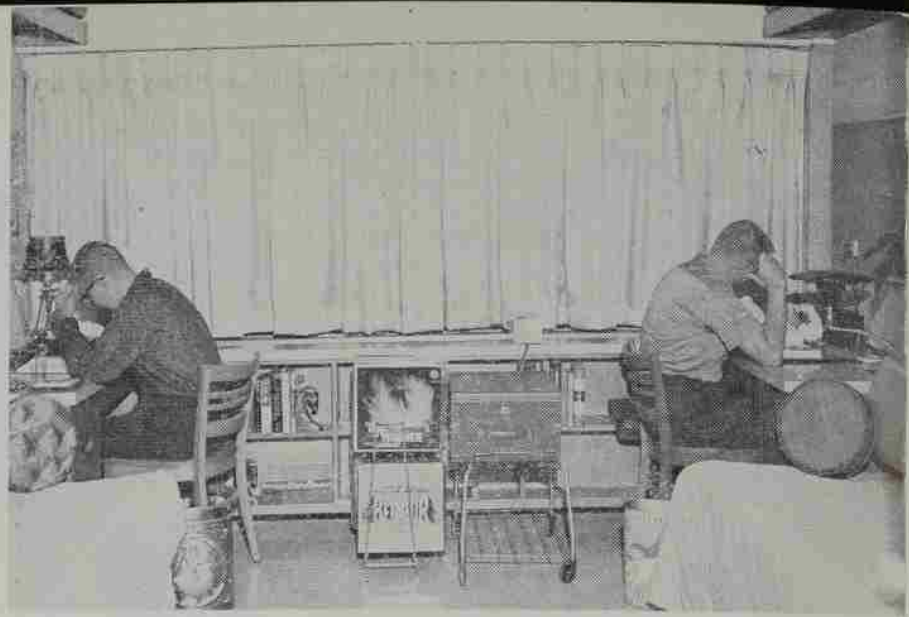
Marian has been active in many activities . . . she was president of the Pi Beta Phi social sorority; was a member of Alpha Lambda Delta, national freshman women's honorary; was president of Beta Alpha Gamma, Willamette sophomore women's honorary; and is currently a member of Mortar Board, national senior women's honorary. Quite active in various sorority, campus and class social affairs, she also was a delegate to the model U.N. Regional Assembly in 1959 through her interest in international affairs.

The Rotary Foundation Fellowships for International Understanding has a three-fold purpose: an opportunity for young men and women to live and travel for international understanding in any foreign country where there are Rotary Clubs; to provide educational opportunity but not mainly for advanced degrees; and for Fellows to be ambassadors of good will of the U.S. and to bring home their impressions and interpretations.

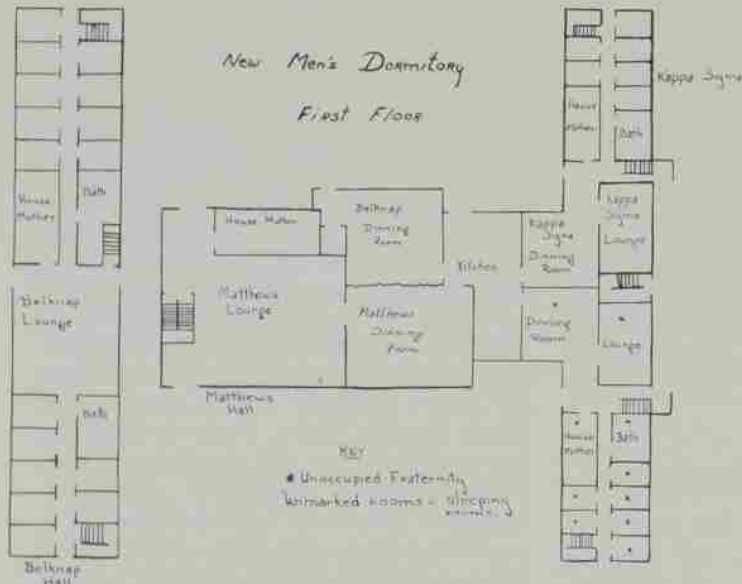


The Matthews living room and its residents just before dinner.

New Dormitory B



Willamette opened the doors of its largest and most modern dormitory this fall. The building, costing \$1,250,000, contains four individual living units with a total capacity for 240 men. It includes Matthews Hall for 98 freshmen, Belknap Hall houses 78 upperclass men, and the Kappa Sigma fraternity with room for 32 members. Although not occupied this fall, the fourth unit is also planned for a fraternity with a capacity of 32 students.

Each unit has its own living and dining rooms, recreation room, and sleeping-study quarters. They are all served, however, from a central kitchen. Also included in each wing is a spacious two-room apartment and bath for the housemother. This fire-proof building, of poured concrete and brick veneer, is two stories high except for the center section (Matthews Hall) which is three stories.

In 1947 when Baxter Hall was built, Willamette pioneered in bringing its fraternities on campus as separate units housed under a single roof. A further innovation is included in this beautiful new building with individual study rooms provided for each two students in the fraternity wings; a large sleeping room for all the men is located on the second floor of these units.

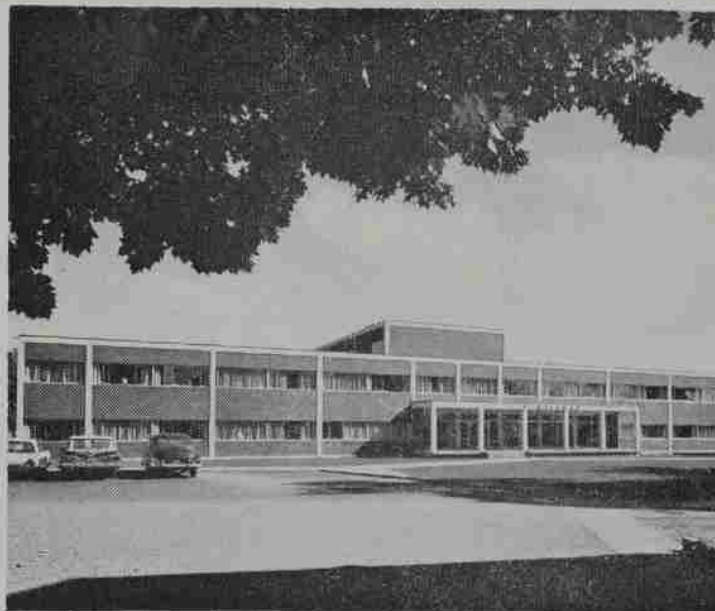
Brings Innovations

Another relatively new innovation in dormitory living is the 'bed-loungers' in each of the sleep-study rooms in Belknap and Matthews Halls. Built into the wall and beds at night, they become lounge sofas with bolster-storage areas and shelves during the day. All the furniture, except the chairs, is built-in.

Student parking for approximately 90 cars has been provided directly in front of the dormitory.

Matthews Hall was named in honor of one of Willamette's own graduates and most revered teachers, Dr. James T. Matthews, Class of 1885, gave devoted and distinguished service as teacher and head of the mathematics department. He had just completed his forty-ninth year at Willamette when he died in 1942.

Belknap Hall is named for Dr. L. F. Belknap, a Willamette graduate of 1888. Dr. Belknap, a great friend of his alma mater, was a beloved Methodist minister. The University conferred a Doctor of Divinity Degree on him in 1945. Dr. Belknap died in 1948 after serving over seventy years in the ministry.

TWENTY YEARS . . . 1941 - 1961

Willamette University's Bearcats took the field on Saturday, September 23 against the grid machine of the University of Puget Sound Loggers at Tacoma to open their 1961 campaign. That opener marked the 61st year that the Jasons have fielded a team. Willamette has been in continuous gridiron competition since 1894 with pauses only the Spanish-American War, World Wars I - II.

The 1961 football season marks the 20th anniversary of the 1941 session that found the Bearcats stranded on the Hawaiian Islands during the infamous Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

Roy S. "Spec" Keene, who guided the Bearcat grid fortunes from 1925 to 1942, pressed the 'Cats into service as guards, while the team awaited transportation back to the States. One of the gridgers visiting the Islands with that team was a young man named Ted Ogdahl. Ogdahl, now coach of the Bearcats, is starting his ninth year as head coach and now is second only to Keene in tenure for Willamette football mentors.

The Willamette press information book of 1941 brings back some interesting thoughts and memories. The bright cardinal and gold cover sports a picture of Keene, arm and index finger extended with the comment, "Spec Keene points towards eighth conference championship." The legend on the cover clarions, "Willamette University—In Its Centennial Year, Presents the 1941 Edition of Battering Bearcats."

In 1941 the Bearcats faced an eleven game schedule. Besides their regular Northwest Conference opponents, the schedule included Portland Army Base, Portland University, Whittier College, University of Idaho, Mather Air Field and in an afternoon contest on December 6, 1941 at Honolulu, the University of Hawaii.

Notes of interest in the book show that Willamette suffered its worst defeat in 1925 when they took a 108-0 drubbing at the hands of the University of Washington Huskies. Their most lopsided victory came in 1934 when the Bearcats beat Whitman 75-0. The best season for the 'Cats to that time was the 1934 slate when they compiled an 8-1 record. The single defeat came at the hands of the Oregon State Beavers who nipped the Jasons, 13-0.

The Willamette roster for 1941 included Marsh Barbour, now head basketball coach at Woodburn High

School; Anthony Joe Fraiola, who made Little All-American honors for the 'Cats; and Bill Reder, Chuck Furno, Earl Hampton and Cecil Connor who returned after the war to bolster the Bearcat ranks for later campaigns.

The starting eleven included Reder, Fraiola and Ogdahl. Comments on the starters revealed that:

"Fraiola is a one-year letterman at 175 pounds. Formerly with the Marines, Tony set the Conference afire in his freshman season last fall with his brilliant defensive playing. He was selected on the all-star team of every one of Willamette's nine opponents. A cinch for Little All-American honors if he continues last year's pace." (He made it.)

"Ogdahl is a one-year letterman at 172 pounds. The man in motion in Keene's offense, this sophomore speedster led the conference scoring and was 21 in the nation in this department in his freshman year."

The pamphlet concludes on an optimistic note, "On paper Willamette's veteran grid machine looks like an odds-on favorite to repeat in the NWC, but it's a long road until their final Hawaii appearance December 6, and the Bearcat's ambitions to cop the title and the majority of their non-conference tilts will depend on freedom from injuries to key men and the ability of veterans and freshmen alike to live up to advance expectations."

Now the 1961 Willamette grid crew is halfway through their 1961 season. Again the Jasons have a talented crew including returnees such as All-Conference end Stu Hall (also picked on the Scholastic All-American squad), stellar quarterback Tommy Lee and the behemoth of the Bearcat line Ernie Nihi who weighs in at more than 300 pounds.

In the backfield the 'Cats can choose from Larry Miller, Jim McCaffery, Doug Chan and Kevin Nagel. It is hard to replace the talents of such as Stan "King" Solomon and Marv "Cisco" Cisneros but Ted Ogdahl is blessed with plenty of raw material.

The preseason outlook, according to "tearful" Ted, "Its black." It is hard indeed to improve on an undefeated season. (The Bearcats first since 1913 with their 1960, 8-0 mark.) The present crop of talent in the Willamette grid camp indicates that the Bearcats should be in the thick of things to retain their NWC title and perhaps earn a shot at a post season berth which they missed in 1960.

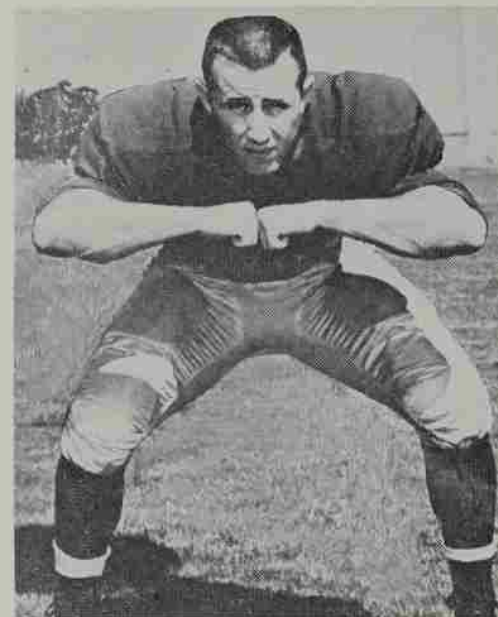
After three games, Ogdahl's opinion would seem to be well founded.

In the season opener, Willamette dropped a 20-19 verdict to the College of Puget Sound Loggers at Tacoma. The game evened the score with Willamette for their one point defeat of UPS in 1960. In that game the Bearcats came from behind to score two touchdowns in the last five minutes to grab a 26-25 victory.

Humboldt State met the 'Cats in this year's second game. The burly boys from Humboldt, one of the top small-college teams in the nation, handed Willamette a 27-14 defeat. This loss was rather expected, but the Bearcats showed some sparkling offensive efforts, and came within a whisker of knotting the score.

CHAPMAN ASSISTANT COACH



Norman L. Chapman, better known as Norm, is the new Willamette assistant football coach under head mentor Ted Ogdahl. Chapman will also handle freshman basketball and the golf team.

Chapman replaces Jerry Long who moved on to a similar post at Oregon State University late last spring.

He co-captained the 1954 Medford Team in the Shrine All-Star classic and then went on to play football and run track at the University of Oregon. He co-captained the 1958 Ross Bowl Ducks that lost a thrilling 10-7 decision to the Ohio State University, the Norm had to settle for a spectator capacity due to a late season injury. That season he was also named to the All-Coast football squad.

Norm graduated from the University of Oregon in 1958 and spent a six-month tour of duty with the United States Army at both Ft. Gordon, Georgia and Ft. Lewis, Washington.

He then signed as assistant football and track coach at Springfield High in 1959, the next year moving into the head coaching slot at the same school.

OREGON'S FIRST TAX JUDGE



Justice Harold Werner of the Oregon Supreme Court administered the oath of office to Peter M. Gunnar, LLB '50, August 9, as Oregon's first Tax Court judge. With Justice Werner and Judge Gunnar are Governor Mark O. Hatfield and Dr. G. Herbert Smith, president of Willamette University.

Oregon took another step in its pioneering of a new judicial field when it formed the Tax Court in the 1961 legislature.

Judge Gunnar sees two divisions of his court as separate and distinct entities. The first, he said, is the small claims division which hears cases involving property valued at less than \$25,000 or income taxes of less than \$250. The citizen can represent himself and does not need a lawyer in this division of the court. The second court will be the "regular court" and appellate in nature. All cases before the court will be heard by the tax judge without a jury.

The Tax Court will begin hearing cases in Jan., 1962. Holding the rank of circuit judge, Judge Gunnar can sit in any county seat in the state to hear a case.

Appointed by Governor Mark Hatfield, the office is elective with the first election scheduled in the May primaries.

Judge Gunnar has been prominent in state politics. He is a former state Republican Party chairman. In his Salem law practice, he spent over half of his time on tax cases, a field he deeply enjoys.
