Willamette ends 78-79 with all-sports trophy

Willamette ended the 1978-79 athletic season by capturing the Northwest Conference all-sports trophy with first place finishes in men's cross country, swimming and track and a three-way split of the baseball championship.

It's been six years since WU has earned the trophy, which originated in 1970 in memory of the late John Lewis, Willamette athletic director.

Expectations for the coming sports year are good. Football coach Tommy Lee has 40 returning lettermen, including quarterback Dave Claunch and key receiver Pete Sequeira. The defensive side, always strong at Willamette, will be boosted by the return of David Wong, Ken Garland, Rob Skinner and Mike Bryce. The first home game is September 22 against Oregon College of Education.

Fran Howard, women's athletic director, said the recruiting year for women's sports has been the best in her 10 years at the University. Howard, who coaches field hockey and basketball, said most of the incoming student athletes are from Oregon and Hawaii. Last season, Willamette women took conference titles in field hockey, badminton, golf and tennis and shared a first-place tie in basketball.

Law grad wins 1st place in natl. essay contest

A 1979 Willamette University College of Law graduate has been awarded \$500 for his third place finish in a national student essay contest.

John E. Rodgers, 25, Salem, wrote the essay for the Federation of Insurance Counsel Foundation contest. The paper will be published in the organization's quarterly magazine.

Rodgers, who helped coach the Willamette University speech team this year, will move to Forest Grove this month to start his private law practice.

Individuals, foundations and institutions applauded for supporting Willamette

When it is mentioned that Willamette is one of the more solid institutions in the area—both academically and financially—gratitude should be extended to the many individuals, foundations and other institutions that have provided program and capital support over the years.

Willamette's Center for Business-Government Studies, which received substantial media coverage recently for its roundtable of business and government leadership and its study of real estate sales performance in Oregon, is being funded by in its first two years by the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust. That foundation made its final \$200,000 payment of the \$350,000 grant this summer.

The extensive University planning, which includes self-studies by all liberal arts academic departments and a thorough review of our curriculum, has been made possible by the \$98,353 grant from Northwest Area Foundation.

Another grant—\$11,250 from the Ben B. Cheney Foundation, Willamette College of Law's fourth gift from that organization—will enable the law school to run two pilots of intensive trial advocacy courses; the first will be between semesters and the second at the conclusion of regular classes in May.

Willamette President named chairman-elect of NCHEMS board

Willamette University President Dr. Robert P. Lisensky is the new chairman-elect of the Board of Directors of the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems (NCHEMS), a nonprofit organization formed to improve management in postsecondary education.

Lisensky has been on the board since 1976. He takes over as chairman of the 30-member group next year, succeeding Dr. Barbara S. Uehling, chancellor of the University of Missouri-Columbia.

NCHEMS, which is funded by private foundation and public agencies such as the National Institute of Education, is an outgrowth of the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education, but is now independent of that group. Offices are on the campus of the University of Colorado at Boulder.

Its purpose is to serve as a resource for individuals, colleges, universities and higher education agencies to improve planning and management practices, which includes conducting research, development, dissemination and evaluation in such areas as academic and program planning and student recruitment. This year at Willamette, an NCHEMS consultant assisted the University in its academic and program planning efforts.

Lisensky is also president of the National Association of Schools and Colleges of the United Methodist Church.

The 1978-79 fiscal year closed after another solid year in fundraising. However, the \$1,479,123 in voluntary giving was below last year's \$1,637,269. The new fiscal year is off to a good start with \$466,622 in the first two months from voluntary and government sources. Last year, Willamette received \$445,044 in June and July.

Highlight of the 1978-79 giving was the exceptional response from individuals—alumni, parents and friends all exceeding the previous year's giving. Individuals gave 28 percent more in 1978-79 than in 1977-78. The percentage of alumni donors was down, though, for the July 1-June 30 period of the Collins Foundation challenge—19.7 percent to 18.3 percent. A very strong response in the last 90 days—865 of the 1,837 alumni donors—enabled Willamette to exceed the 18 percent needed to receive the basic challenge grant.

New trustees named to Willamette board

Five persons were elected new members of the Willamette Board of Trustees during the May 11 meeting on campus.

They are Stanley H. Hammer, Salem, president of Pumilite Block and Supply Co.; Peter Kremer, Newport Beach, CA, president of the Irvine Co.; Mrs. Beverly O. Smith, Salem, civic and church volunteer; the Rev. Raymond E. Balcomb, Portland, pastor of the First United Methodist Church; and Lewis M. King, Portland, lawyer and partner in the firm of Ragen, Dahl, Roberts, O'Scannlain, Robertson and Neill. They will serve three-year terms.

Leaving the board this year are James Hitchman, Bellingham, WA; James Sitzman, the Rev. William Walker, Benjamin Whiteley and Randall Kester, all Portland. Kester had been a board member since 1958.

In other business, several members were re-elected to serve another three years: Robert Blanding, Gerald Frank, George Rhoten, Salem; Amo DeBernardis, James Johnston, Diane Kem, William Kilkenny, Warne Nunn, Portland; Louise McGilvra, Forest Grove; Glenn Jackson, Medford; Donald Grant, San Mateo, CA, and Loren Winterscheid, Seattle. Nunn was also re-elected chairman of the 60-member board.

OPENING DAYS

Pulitzer prize-winning journalist addresses new WU students

Opening Days for New Students, the annual welcoming and orientation days for freshmen and transfers, concluded the evening of August 29 with an address by David Halberstam, honored journalist and best-selling author.

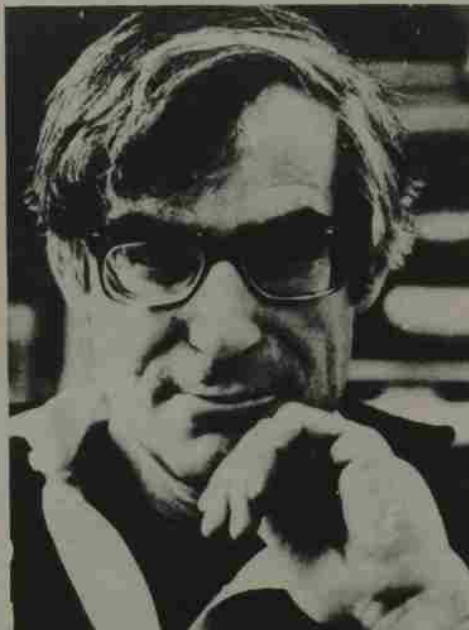
Halberstam cited the growing power of the major media, a disconcerting increase in the number of newspapers controlled by chains and the tendency for large major news organizations to be more concerned about stockholder dividends than freedom of speech. He sees newspapers as defining news and television as simplifying it.

Halberstam, who won a Pulitzer prize as a New York Times reporter in Vietnam, wrote *The Best and the Brightest*, a longtime bestseller, and now has another book near the top of the list, *The Powers That Be*. His new book presents a close look at four media giants—CBS, Time, the Los Angeles Times and the Washington

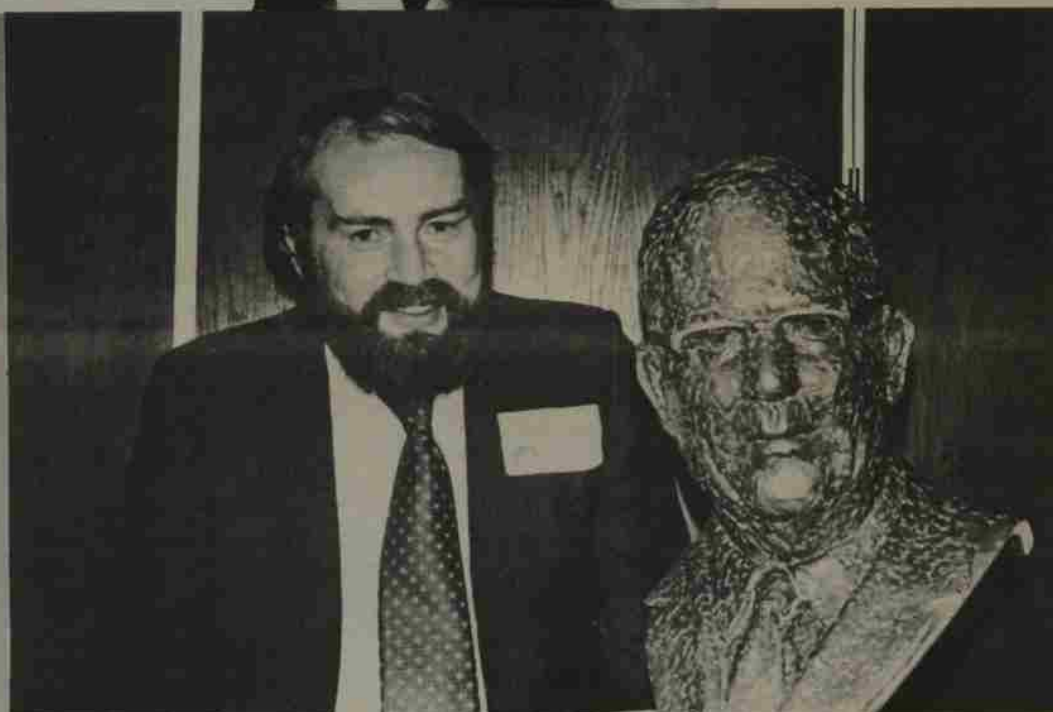
Post—and also devotes a small section to his former employer, the New York Times. He has been affiliated with several newspapers and was a contributing editor of Harper's and a fellow of the Adlai Stevenson Institute. His books include both novels and nonfiction.

Opening Days began Sunday, August 26, with a program for incoming students and another for their parents. Various advising, testing and auditioning were mixed in with special activities on August 27 and 28; the highlight was the Monday opening convocation with a speech by Dr. Robert P. Lisensky, University president.

Classes began August 29 followed by an all-campus picnic and Halberstam's address.

Barbara Karmel elected to boards of Bancorp and U.S. National Bank

Barbara Karmel, associate dean at the Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration and director of the Center for Business-Government Studies, joined a select group of Oregon women in June with her election to the board of directors of U.S. Bancorp and U.S. National Bank of Oregon. She is the first woman elected to either board.

"I'm honored and very pleased to have the opportunity to serve in this capacity,"

said Director Karmel, who has no previous association with the bank. She is also the only academic on the boards.

All directors of the bank and Bancorp stand for re-election annually.

She came to the Atkinson School a year ago from the University of Wisconsin, Madison, where she was a member of the faculty of the Graduate School of Business and director of the Professional MBA Program. She has also been on the faculty

of Oregon State University's School of Business. In addition, she has served as a management consultant to Tektronix, Inc., Pacific Northwest Bell and other public and private sector organizations.

Atkinson center research project contains findings on abilities of real estate salespersons

A research project under the auspices of the Center for Business-Government Studies was completed in May which measured on-the-job performance of licensed real estate salespersons in Oregon. It contained some disturbing findings about agents' abilities to write listing and earnest money agreements.

Major findings of the study were: (1) the technical performance of the majority of salespersons is low in quality; (2) a small percentage of the licensed group does most of the business; (3) the most active salespersons do no better than others writing earnest money receipts and only slightly better on listing agreements; (4) consumers run a high risk of securing inadequate service if they select at random from among all active salespersons; (5) salespersons as a group are changing because people are entering the field at a relatively younger age and have more education.

Earl Littrell, a professor at the Atkinson Graduate School of Administration, did the study for the school's Center for Business-Government Studies. The center opened last year to conduct research and continuing education programs to improve business-government relations. It and projects such as

Littrell's are funded in part by a development grant from the M. J. Murdock Charitable Trust.

The study has been described as pioneering because it may be the first that has attempted performance measurement for real estate salespersons in actual closed deals.

The result of several months of research and analysis, the study is based on a random sample of 400 of the some 16,000 real estate salespersons in Oregon. While the sample is small, it is large enough to support reliable conclusions, Littrell said in the report. In 1976, he did a similar study of 40 salespersons for the Real Estate Division of the State Department of Commerce. Findings were substantially the same as those in this report, Littrell said.

Littrell and an assistant compiled information for the recent study from several sources, which included Real Estate Division license files, questionnaires and interviews with brokers, and evaluations of receipts and listing agreements by a broker with licensing law administration experience.

Littrell is in the process of writing separate papers on some specific areas of research covered in the study, such as

performance variables and possible links between license exam scores and ability to write earnest money and listing agreements.

Salem and Portland area real estate brokers were briefed on the study's findings at continuing education workshops in May. The Salem Board of Realtors has sponsored an additional seminar on technical performance, with Littrell as speaker, on August 15 at the Atkinson School.

Littrell's research received considerable attention in Oregon newspapers and generated comment from some members of the real estate industry. Barbara Karmel, Center director, said such reactions are clear examples of the importance of independent research funding, "the design of which is not dependent on or modifiable by either the government agency or the industry in question."

Other Center papers are in progress on such topics as the regulatory effects on cost of capital in electric utilities and on debt policy and inflation. GSA offers noncredit financial planning courses

Three noncredit courses designed to help individuals understand the complexities and techniques of financial planning and money management will be offered this fall by the Continuing Education Division of the Center for Business-Government Studies of the Atkinson School.

Alumnus John E. Walker, B.A. '50, will be an instructor of one of the courses, "Financial Planning for Retirement." Each course will meet one night per week, 7:15-9:15 p.m. and the instructors will be available for an additional half hour to answer the questions of those who wish to stay longer.

The three courses to be offered include: "Personal Money Management and Financial Planning," Tuesday nights, September 25-November 27, 1979. Topics will include: managing money—the budget; insurance—general concepts, casualty, liability, health; accumulating and maintaining the monetary life support system—investment, banking; pension, profit-sharing and other retirement benefits; life insurance, annuities, social security; estate planning; common stock and mutual funds; income taxes and tax shelters; real estate and the mortgage, and fixed income securities. Preregistration is required and the cost of the course is \$100. Enrollment is limited to 40 persons.

The main instructor and coordinator of the course is Stephen H. Archer, Guy F. Atkinson Professor of Finance at the Atkinson School. Other instructors will be specialists on specific topics.

As an introduction to basic concepts, the course is primarily intended for individuals with no previous training in how to secure maximum use and benefit from current and future earnings, and how to allocate income to current expenditures, investment, insurance, pensions, etc., while minimizing taxes.

The second course is "Financial Planning for the Professional," to be taught

Wednesday nights, September 26-November 14, 1979, with topics such as fundamentals of financial planning, inflation: the transfer of wealth, taxes: avoiding the one-way trip to Washington, guaranteed investments, common stocks; high interest rates and bonds, options, life insurance; trusts, real estate investments, investments in energy and tax shelters. Preregistration is required and cost of the course is \$125. Enrollment is limited to 25 persons.

John R. Kerr, Vice President, Foster & Marshall, Inc., will teach the class. At the conclusion of the series, he will meet with class members who would like to have an individual planning session with him. The course is primarily intended for individuals interested in long-term development of wealth through investment and obtaining maximum tax advantages for current and future earnings.

The third course is "Financial Planning for Retirement," to be taught Thursday nights, September 27-October 25, 1979, including topics such as income needs after retirement and of surviving spouse, individual and business ownership financial planning, growth and maintenance of assets; timing for liquefying assets, types of investments which are and are not acceptable for retirement purposes, government benefits, employer benefits, estate taxation and planning; probate and estate shrinkage; avoidance of excessive taxation and probate and what to plan for at retirement. Enrollment is limited to 30 individuals or 15 couples and preregistration is required. Cost of the course is \$100 for individuals and \$125 for couples.

Alumnus John Walker, who is a registered retirement investment adviser with Assets Management, Inc. of Portland, will teach along with Victor E. Lacey, a consultant for Retirement and Financial Systems Co. of Portland. Both men have several

Archer appointed to Atkinson professorship

Stephen H. Archer, a recognized scholar in the field of finance, was appointed this spring to the Guy F. Atkinson Professorship, an endowed chair at the Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration.

Archer, who was dean of the school from its inception in 1973 until 1976, is the first person appointed to the position.

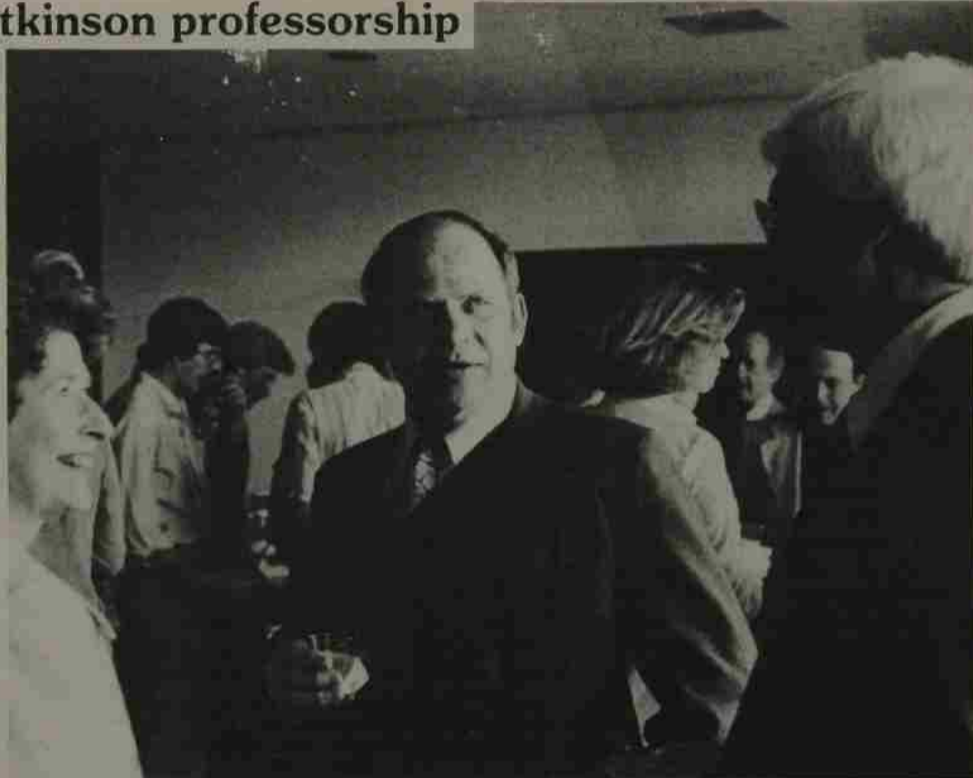
The chair was established to honor the late George Atkinson's father, an international contractor who for many years gave generously of his time, energy and means for the benefit of Willamette University. It is funded by the Myrtle L. Atkinson Foundation, the Atkinson Foundation, the Guy F. Atkinson Company, Rachel C. Atkinson and other members of the Atkinson family.

"This is definitely an honor," Archer said about the appointment because not only is he the first Atkinson professor, he is also one of the first professors in the Northwest to hold a fully endowed chair in business administration.

Although his teaching responsibilities in finance and economics will not change, the professorship will provide him necessary support for additional work in research and writing which would otherwise not be possible.

Jay Doubleday, dean of the Atkinson School, said he was "delighted Professor Archer accepted the chair. His outstanding qualities as a teacher, researcher and colleague make him an invaluable member of the faculty."

Archer joined Willamette in 1973 as dean of the Atkinson School, which at that time existed only on paper and in the minds of supporters. Working out of a

temporary office in Doney Hall, Archer recruited students and faculty, consulted on the design of the proposed Seeley G. Mudd Building and also helped raise construction funds. The school opened in September, 1974.

Archer brought to Willamette 17 years experience on the faculty of the University of Washington Graduate School of Business, six of those as chairman of the department of finance.

His accomplishments are many and are continuing. He has co-authored six texts, the most recent on financial management; an earlier work called "Portfolio Analysis"

was published in second edition in May. In addition, he is a member of the editorial boards of the *Journal of Financial Education and Economic Perspectives*. This summer he is drafting three separate research papers for the Atkinson School's Center for Business-Government Studies.

Joint-degree students enter with high GPAs and maintain grades

There is no such thing as a free lunch, but there is such a thing as getting both law and administration degrees in four years instead of the usual five—and some Willamette graduate students have already done it.

The Geo. H. Atkinson Graduate School of Administration and the College of Law have worked out a four-year program that leads to both the Master of Administration degree and the Doctor of Jurisprudence degree. Four students graduated with the joint degree in 1978 and another five received the two diplomas in 1979.

The requirements for the two degrees involve 120 semester course hours, 40 in the Atkinson School and 72 in the College of Law. This proportion fits the emphasis if one were to study at the two schools one at a time as administration regularly takes two years and law three.

The idea of joint administration/law degrees is not unique to Willamette. Some other universities with similar graduate schools have the same option because it makes sense to many students and many employers. The latter like managers who understand the legal framework and lawyers who have management knowledge and techniques. The relative quantitative emphasis in administration and the relative qualitative emphasis in law complement each other.

Of the first four joint-degree graduates, three are with large Portland CPA firms and one is with a law firm in Olympia, WA. It is believed that joint-degree students will have a wider range of employment options and will have a competitive edge for certain positions, such as trust administrator and tax specialist.

Straub public service scholarship established

An endowed scholarship in the name of former Oregon Governor Bob Straub has been established at Willamette University's Atkinson Graduate School of Administration.

It's called The Governor Robert W. Straub Endowed Public Service Scholarship and will be an annual award to a full or part-time student who plans a career in government service. Initial funds for the scholarship were contributed by Straub's friends in honor of his work as governor.

Oregon Attorney General Jim Redden presented the initial funds, about \$2,400, to Willamette President Dr. Robert Lisensky and Jay Doubleday, dean of the Atkinson School. Additional contributions to the scholarship can be made through Dean Doubleday's office.

Spring semester Straub, who had an office in the school, served as an executive-in-residence speaking to classes about his experiences as a public executive and private businessman.

Joint degree program leads to two degrees in four years

Passing the bar is a concern for some joint-degree students because they have concentrated in two subject areas instead of one, having used elective courses in a manner to satisfy degree requirements for both. Still, all four joint-degree recipients passed the bar on the first try last year.

Atkinson School figures show that those who enter the joint-degree program tend to come with a higher GPA than average and to maintain above-average grades in the graduate program. The age, grades and test scores of those who drop out of the joint-degree program tend to be the same as for those who stick with it. The joint-degree student tends to be slightly younger and have less job experience than the student who begins graduate study in one area. Joint-degree students come from Northwest schools such as Willamette, Gonzaga, Oregon and Portland State, California schools such as Stanford, UCLA and Pepperdine and more easterly schools such as the University of Minnesota, Indiana University and Drew.

Several problems that are being worked upon are conflicting classes between the two schools, Atkinson classes lasting 75 minutes compared to 50 in the law school (and being held on only four days of the week instead of five), law exams taking place while the administration school still has regular classes and a tendency for some students to overload in order to get in all the needed coursework.

Still, the joint-degree program is an attractive one and the problems are not insurmountable. One undergraduate is adding a new wrinkle to her way of approaching the acquisition of the two graduate degrees. She plans to begin in the 3-2 program (combined liberal arts/administration degree), then switch to the joint-degree program for administration and law. If she follows through, she'll receive three degrees in seven years compared to the usual nine. It can be done.

Portland Advertisers give annual awards to Willamette students

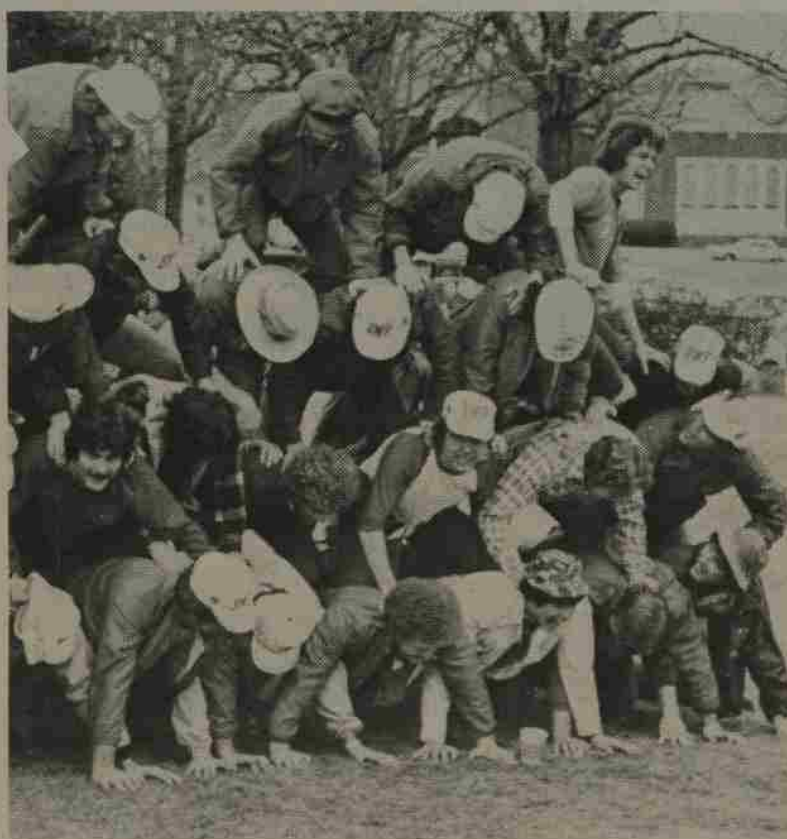
Willamette students continued their winning ways in competition sponsored by the Portland Advertising Federation.

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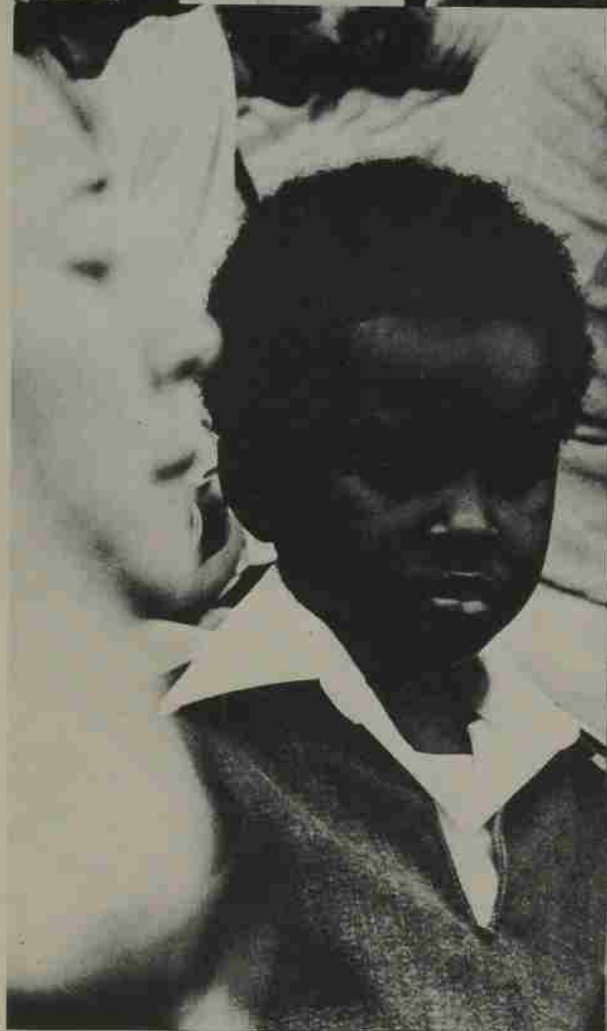

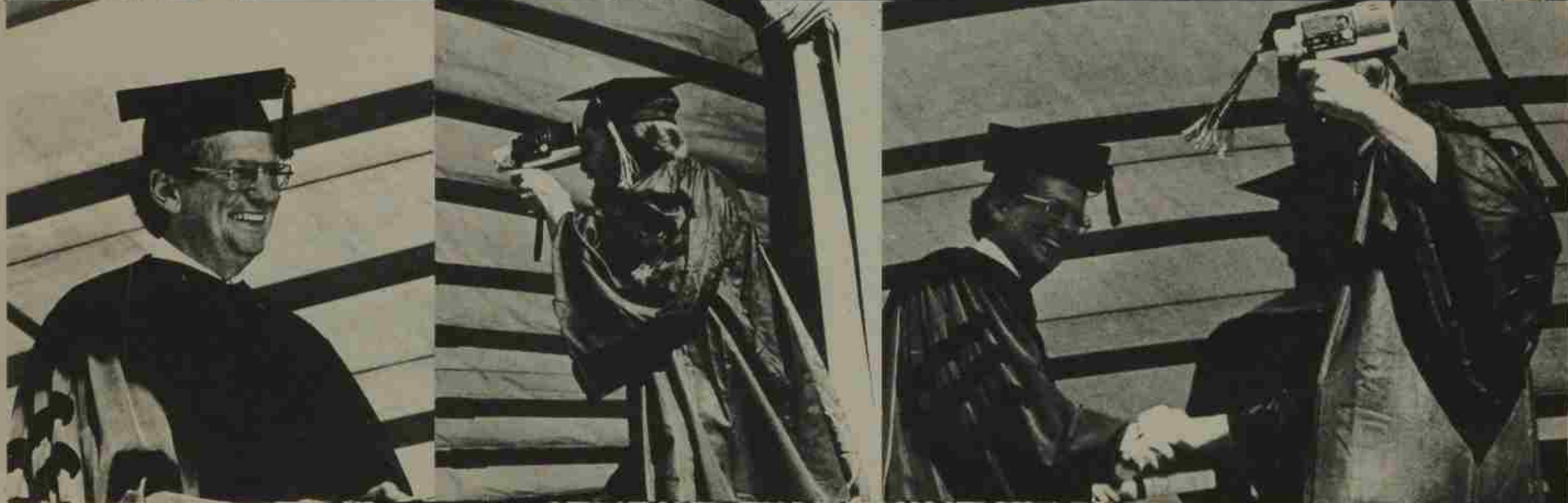

OFF-CAMPUS STUDY

A unique understanding of the Italian Renaissance

For four weeks during May and early June, a combination of 32 students, professors and alumni spent an exciting post-session studying the art and literature of the Italian Renaissance in Florence, Italy. The course was team-taught by professors Roger Hull and Adele Birnbaum, who through a combination of lectures, tours, reading, and on-the-spot discussions led the group to a unique understanding of the period.

Florence, the birthplace of the Renaissance, is the ideal place for such a study as it not only houses the bulk of the great Renaissance masterworks in its famous museums, but also includes the first, and many of the best known examples of Renaissance architecture.

Florence is so well preserved that in many ways it is the entire city that best captures a sense of the period. It gives one an exciting sensation to walk narrow, winding streets and stroll through palaces and marketplaces that have remained virtually unchanged for 500 years. The essence of the age of the Renaissance is preserved in the timeless nature of this wonderful city.

The course was interesting and demanding to both mind and body as one would easily cover as many as five miles in a day. A typical day would begin with a lecture by Professor Hull on the particular work the group would be seeing that day. The works themselves might be found in the Uffizi or Bargello museums, a church, or virtually anywhere in the city, as there is hardly a street which doesn't have some major work of interest.

To see the works one would begin a walking tour, which would last until noon or 1 p.m., when the group would break up to seek their lunches. For most, this would be found in a marketplace and eaten wherever a quiet place might be found. One such spot was Fort Belvedere, the citadel which commands one of the best views of the city. Another favorite for many was the famous Boboli Garden of the Pitti Palace.

This time of day is siesta time in Italy, and as most churches and museums close for a few hours, this was our time to sightsee, or stroll in the gardens and marketplaces. For many it was the ideal time to go out for one of Italy's most famous delicacies, Gelati, the special Italian version of ice cream. And of course, for others it was time to read or take a few moments to relax.

Around 4 p.m., as life begins to pick up in the city, classes would resume as Professor Birnbaum generally led a literature session which included such authors as Dante, Robert Browning, Henry James and D. H. Lawrence. This would last an hour or two and was followed by free time until our scrumptious evening meal.

After dinner there was an endless array of opportunities which included anything from performances of symphony, opera or ballet, to a quiet stroll along the moonlit Arno—followed perhaps by a glass of wine in a sidewalk cafe.

Highlights of the program included trips by the group to exciting cities or quiet villages including: Venice, Rome, Pisa, Sienna, San Gimignano, Assisi, Arezzo, Paderia and even some beaches on the Italian Riviera. Such side trips not only

added excitement and change of pace, but they also set up fascinating contrasts which brought a great deal of focus on the central point of Florence.

For many it was the first experience of travel abroad. For others, including many of the art majors along, it was the first real chance to observe first-hand many of the important foundation blocks of art history and art as we know it today. And of course for these people, some of the greatest highlights were times spent in the presence of the awe-inspiring works of such great men as Michelangelo, Donatello, DaVinci, Brunelleschi, and Raphael.

One such highlight for all had to be the museum, built especially to house Michelangelo's magnificent *David*, the Academia. There, even amidst hundreds of crowing tourists as well as their tacky guides with "canned speeches," *David* reigns supreme. Also in the Academia are Michelangelo's unfinished slaves—mighty titans caught in their struggles to be free from their marble prisons—truly an awesome sight to behold.

Indeed, each day included some wonderful new sight or some new adventure. Just having to communicate in a foreign language made each encounter quite a challenge. Responding to these challenges and insights from the experience brought forth new levels of understanding from each person in the group. This priceless kind of education will remain with each of us, enriching our experience as well as providing fond memories, for the rest of our lives.

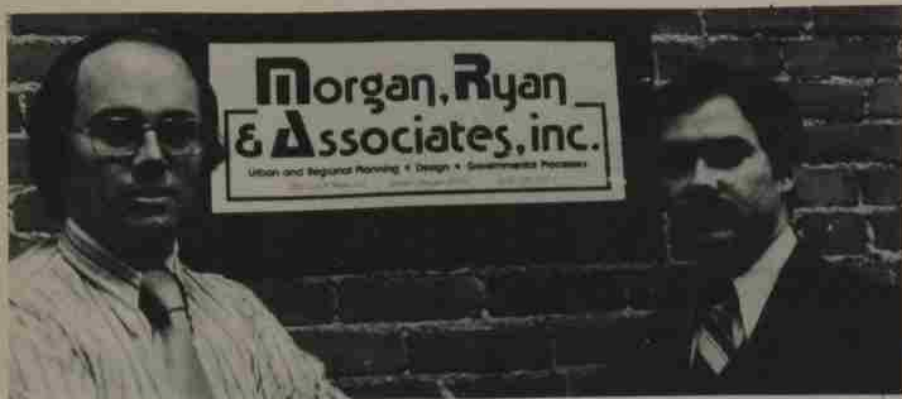

Special Award Given '33 Alum

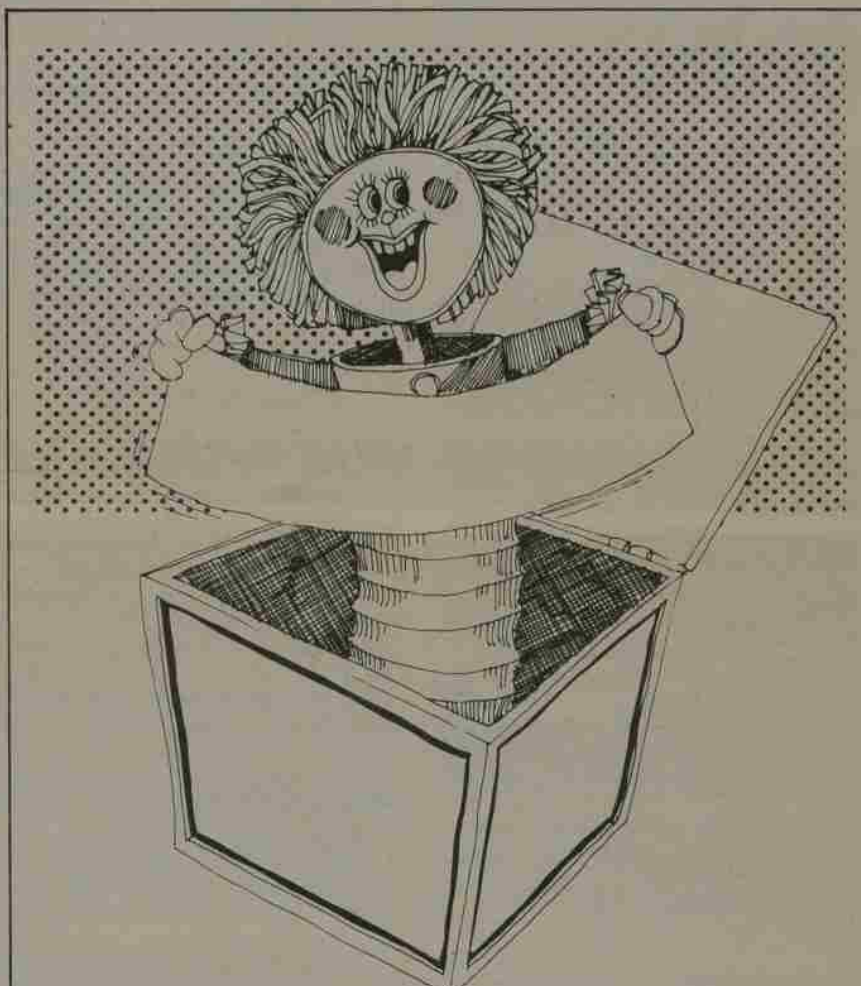

YOU DO HAVE A WILL, DON'T YOU? We're told that 70 percent of adults in the United States die **intestate** (without a will). If you do not have a will, state law will determine how your estate will be distributed. As a result, someone you love could be hurt. And your Church, Willamette University, and other institutions (or causes) in which you are interested may not get one penny from your estate.
