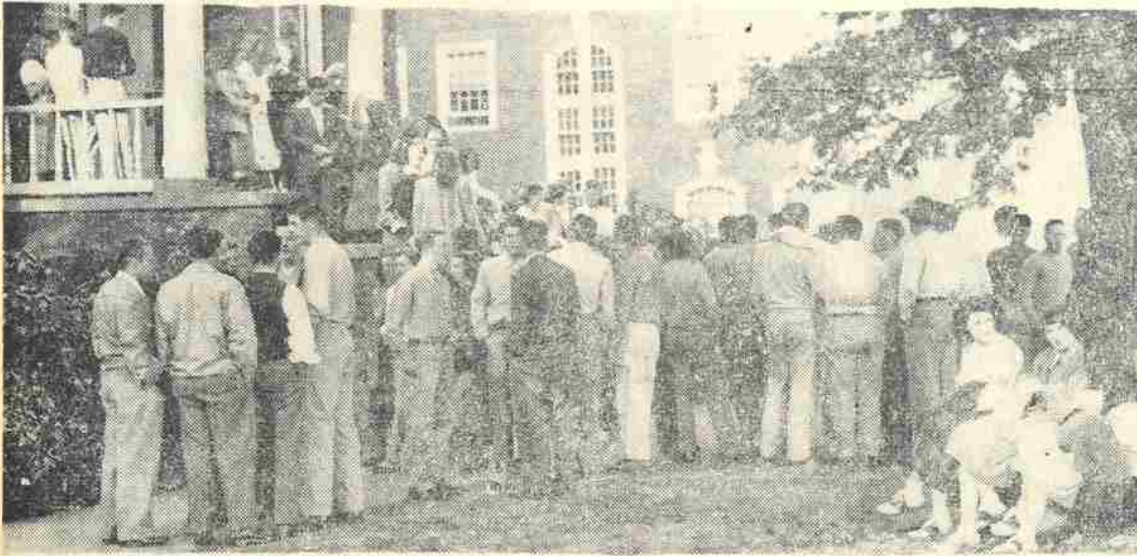

## Freshman Flock From First Formation



Approximately 400 freshmen and transfer students met previous to the above scene for the first time in Waller chapel Wednesday at 9 a.m., to hear university fathers' greetings in preparation for orientation and registration. Any puzzled expressions noted in picture above are attributed to worry over psychological examinations which followed the above scene at 10:15 in the chapel.

## Faculty Changes Numerous

Numerous faculty changes during the summer were announced by President G. Herbert Smith. Fourteen new members are replacements and additions in the college of liberal arts; one in physical education; three in the music school and four as part time instructors in the law school.

With announcement expected Sunday of a new dean of women, the administration has been supplemented during the summer by Dr. Robert D. Gregg, from Carnegie Institute, who has been appointed dean of the college of liberal arts. New acting dean of students is Dr. Raymond A. Withey, who is also counselor of religious life. Mrs. Alice Nel-

son has been appointed as pan-hellenic advisor.

New liberal arts instructors are Geraldine M. Meroney, instructor in history, succeeding Dr. Ivan Lovell; Alfred W. Sheets, assistant professor of sociology; Dr. Robert M. Haley, new head of economics department; James I. Elliott, instructor in accounting; James W. Kirkwood, professor of speech, succeeding Dr. Herbert E. Rahey; Edward T. Gibson, assistant professor in speech and drama; Dr. George C. Seeck, new head of psychology department; Charles H. Dertthick, instructor in psychology; Kermit G. Clemons, assistant professor of mathematics; Thomas Gillies, assistant librarian and instructor in English.

Howard P. Hinde, instructor in zoology; Edward C. Kollman, assistant professor of philosophy, replacing Raoul Bertrand and Dr. Kenneth V. Lottick, associate professor of education.

The music school has added Elwood Bull, as instructor in music theory and organ to replace Josef Schnelker who is completing his doctor's degree at Michigan. New part-time instructors in music as announced this week are Clorinda Topping, voice instructor and Bernard Barron, cello instructor, both of Portland.

Fredrick H. O. Cords will instruct in the YMCA training program here for the first time since the war.

## Registration Hits New High Here

Registration at the university is expected to reach the 1200 mark by Monday night after sign-ups Monday of returning students and Saturday of freshmen. Approximately 400 freshmen and transfer students attended the opening chapel Wednesday in Waller hall, the registrar's office said.

## Collegian Has 16th Straight Honor Rating

The Willamette Collegian has again won an All-American honor rating from the Associated Collegiate Press for last fall semester's endeavor by editor Bob Guild and his staff.

This latest certificate has been hung in the Collegian office next to 15 other All-American and Pacemaker ratings. Since 1931 the Collegian has not fallen below All-American which is the second highest award of the press survey.

The fall semester's Collegian was judged in competition with 44 weekly newspapers from colleges with enrollments of 1,000 to 2,499. Campus news coverage was singled out for special praise as well as the cartoon of Ed Fitzsimons which the judges termed "refreshing."

Of freshmen registering, approximately 92 are veteran students of which 23 are married and 10 have children. About 500 veterans are expected to be enrolled here this semester, of which three will receive state aid and four vocational rehabilitation aid.

As listed in the orientation and registration bulletin freshmen will continue with group conferences with advisors this morning and library orientation this afternoon. A freshman class organization meeting will be held this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock in Waller chapel. On Saturday law students will register at 9:30 a.m. in the law building and freshmen will register in the library and receive physical exams in the infirmary at 9 a.m. Returning students will register as per schedule beginning at 8 a.m. Monday.

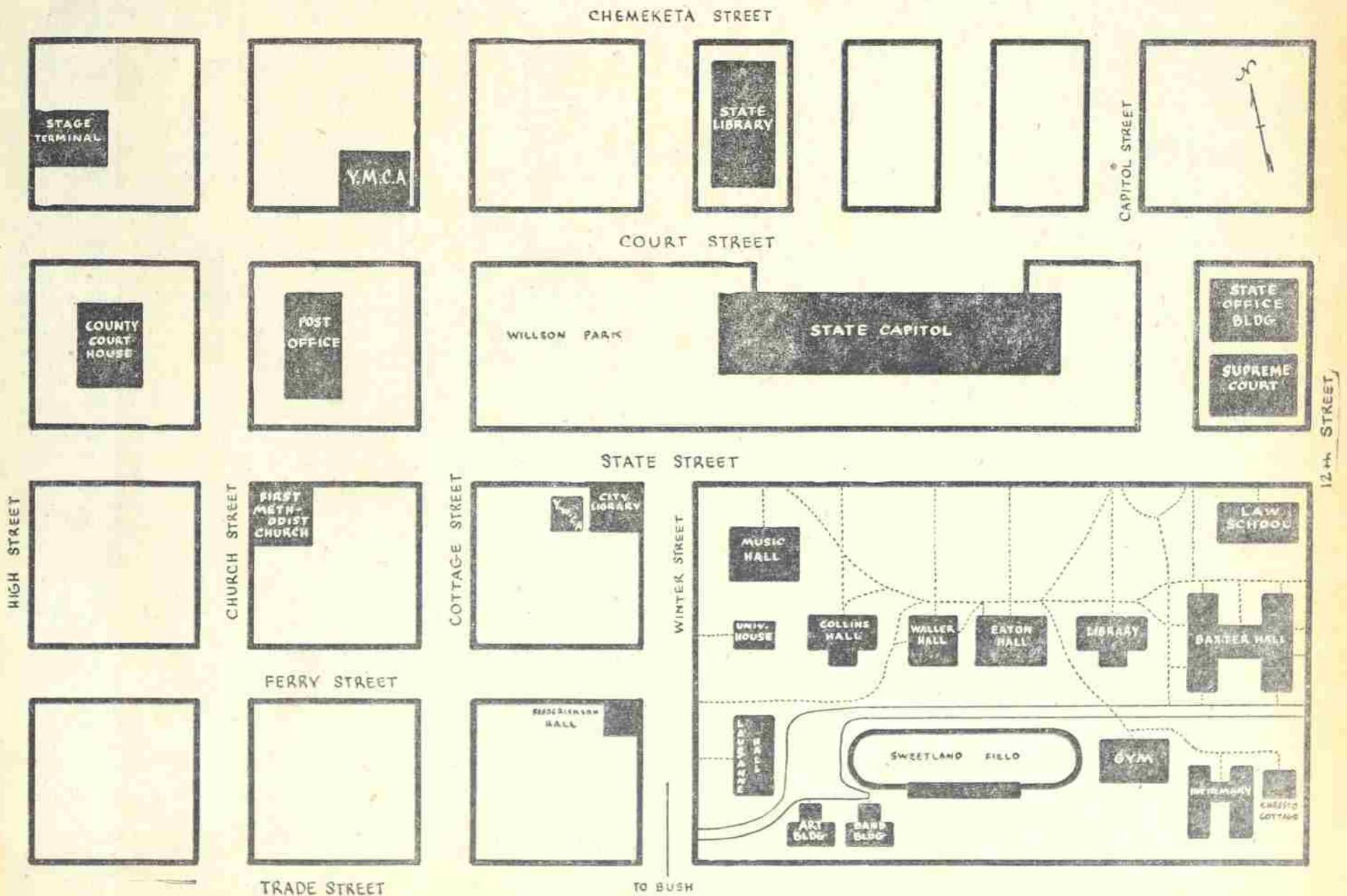

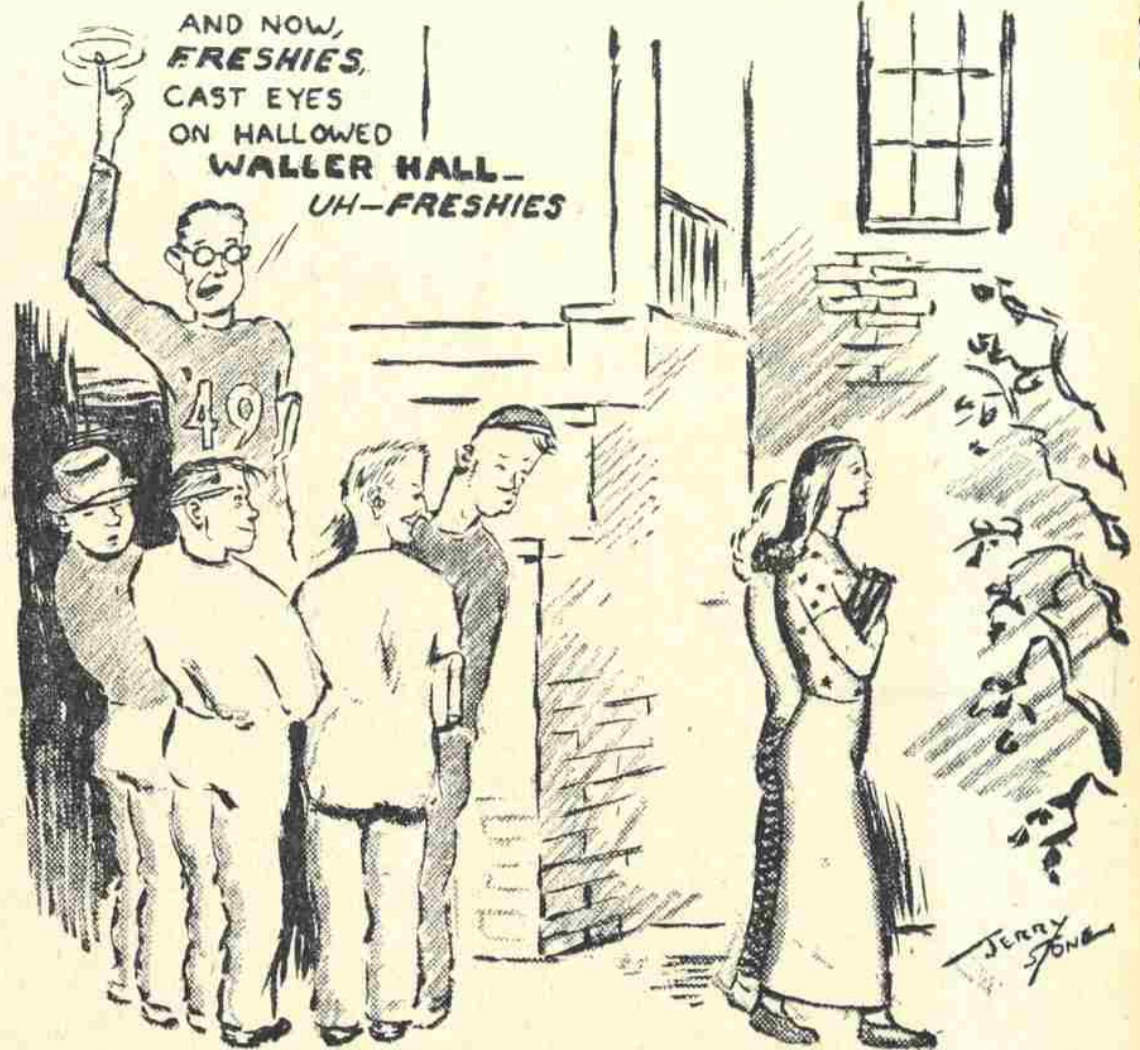

## Collegian Launches Short Story Contest

The *Collegian* announces in its first issue the sponsorship of a short-short story contest to begin immediately and to end Friday, December 10, 1948. Announcement of winners will be made Friday, December 18, 1948, in the Christmas issue of the *Collegian*.

Rules of the contest are as follows:

1. Stories may be on any subject of general interest, preferably with a surprise ending.

2. Stories must be submitted in typewritten form and may not exceed 500 words in length.

3. Decisions of the judges, to be announced later, will be final and no entries will be returned to the writer unless the writer specifically requests return and picks the manuscript up at the *Collegian* office personally.

4. Stories must be in the hands of the judges at the *Collegian* office prior to noon, December 10, 1948.

5. Winning stories, first, second and third prize winners, will be published in the *Collegian*, the first prize-winning story on December 18, 1948.

6. Prizes will be: First, \$10; second, \$7.50 and third \$2.50.

7. Winning stories will also be submitted with recommendation from the *Collegian* and judges to a national publication for consideration.

8. Entries must include the writer's name, Salem address, home address and phone number, if any, and student body card number.

9. All associated students of Willamette university are eligible to enter the contest.

10. Entries agree that the *Collegian* holds priority publication rights to all manuscripts.

Further announcements concerning the progress of the contest will be made in the *Collegian* as the contest progresses.

## Veteran's Tips

The Veterans administration has requested that veterans under the G.I. bill be informed that payments of subsistence allowance accruing for the fall term will be deferred until October 31. Subsistence checks earned in September and October will be received about November 1, the VA said.

All veterans who do NOT want leave following spring semester, MUST write the VA stating that they do not want leave. Otherwise, it will be granted automatically. The letter must be received by the VA not less than 30 days prior to the conclusion of spring semester. Those who signed a statement that they did not wish leave when they completed their re-entrance will not need to write a letter also. All veterans new to Willamette this year must write if they do not wish leave.

No reduction in subsistence will be made to veterans as long as income from productive labor and subsistence allowance does not exceed these monthly "ceilings" established by Public Law 512 last spring: (1) \$210 for a veteran without dependents; (2) \$270 for a veteran with one dependent; or, (3) \$290 for a veteran with more than one dependent.

Flight training for veterans will not be approved by the university this fall. Authorization must especially be obtained from the Veterans Administration.

## Need 1/2 Payments When Registering

Dr. Robert W. Fenix, financial vice-president, reminded non-veteran students this week of the necessity for down payments of board and room and tuition for the coming semester.

Tuition must be paid with at least one-half down at registration and the balance on November 1 and university board and room at the rate of at least \$75 down and the balance on November or December 1, he said.

## Book Store Open Saturday, 9 a.m.

Mrs. Delsia Larson, book store manager, announced this week that the book store, ground floor Waller hall, will open at 9 a.m. Saturday to handle freshman book needs only.

The store will open Monday at 8:30 a.m. for other class books. Law students only will receive their books on Monday beginning at 6 p.m., Mrs. Larson said.

## Library Gains Book Collections

Dan Graves, Willamette librarian, this week announced the acquisition during the summer of an interesting collection of over 30 books presented by the Pacific Supply cooperative. Other collections acquired last spring and partially catalogued during the summer are the Baxter and Bush collections, Graves said.

The cooperative collection lists among its authors such social experts as Beatrice Potter Webb, Peter J. Warbasse, A. M. Carr-Saunders. Other books in the collection are written by Stuart Chase, Henry Wallace and Louis Brandeis.

Life stories of 361 persons who figured in the news of 1947 appear in Current Biography, 1947, the 760-page reference volume, just added to the reference collection of the library, Graves said.

Graves, during the summer, was appointed to two library committees of the Oregon Library association, the intellectual freedom committee and the legislative committee, he said.

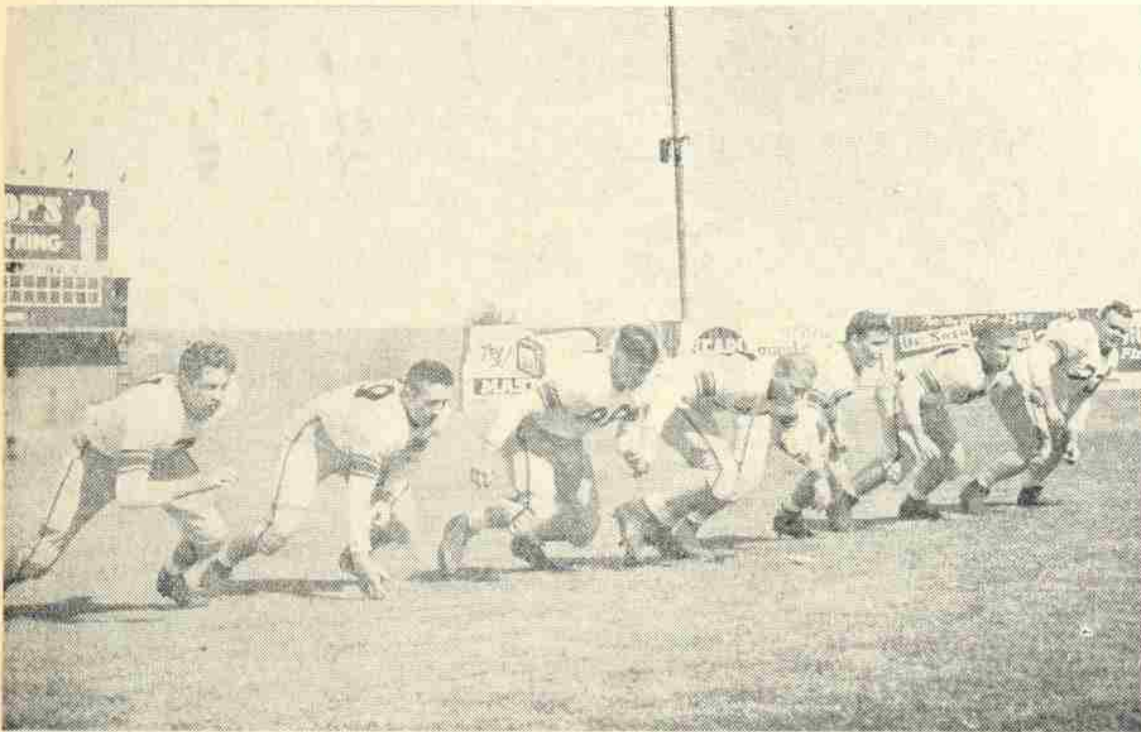

## Annual Grid Feud Inaugurates Season at Multnomah Stadium

Willamette university's Lillie coached, T-formation grid machine will open their 1948 fall pigskin campaign tomorrow afternoon against the mighty Portland Pilots at Multnomah stadium, scene of last year's 'Cat loss to same Pilots 27-0. Kickoff time has been set for 2 p.m.

The annual grid tussle is the third consecutive since the war with the count standing one win for Portland and one tie. In competition since 1931, Willamette has won three times and lost six and tied twice.

### 'Cats Hopeful, Untried

This year's squad of hopeful but somewhat untried 'Cats face nearly the same problems as last year's, in playing the powerful Portland eleven. These problems are how to overcome superior Pilot weight, experience and ability with a good backfield but a stopgap line.

For the past two and a half weeks Lillie and Assistant Mentor Johnny Lewis have worked the players over scrimmage and fundamentals in an effort to check the northerners and even perhaps extract a victory.

### Eighteen Vets Back

Eighteen lettermen pad the squad with a variance of one to three years college experience.

The line as it has shaped up the past week finds the right end position still wide open with Norm Diversdahl, 185 pound freshman from Jefferson high, frontrunning. Gene Allison, 188 pound two year letterman will likely start at the left end position.

The rest of the forward wall is about one deep with Bill Kukahiko, 204, left tackle; Chuck

Bowe, 185, left guard; Chuck Patterson, 185, center; Art Beddoe, 195, right guard and Chuck Massey, 225, right tackle. Beddoe's playing still depends on a doctor's report on a recurrent high school ailment. All front wall men are 'Cat lettermen except Diversdahl and Massey.

### Backfield Strong

In the backfield, Lillie has at least two deep and nearly three in every position, including nine lettermen spread over all positions. At quarter is Bob Bur-

If some of these prospects look good just gander at Portland's probable starting lineup. Reading across their complete forward wall from left to right end are seven lettermen. They are Jack Sonnhalter, Bill Hoffer, Bud Hickman, Bill Kambich, Jack Manni, John Cappiello and Ray Utz.

In their light, speedy backfield are Phil Pappalardo, Dan Christenson, Bill Faragher and Jim Connors, also all lettermen.
