A bright and glorious future is awaiting our New Willamette.


The purpose of this book is to portray the wonderful progress our University has made in the past, and to give the reader a partial conception of her future greatness.


Willamette University

ILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY is on the highway to a great future. Through years of severe struggle she has remained faithful to her trust and has won a glorious victory. Now, her reward is greater than the highest expectations of her friends.


In the year 1853 Willamette University was established by an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Oregon. Our forefathers were men of keen insight and knew that a Christian University would be the need of the youth of the Northwest.

Since the year 1902 Willamette University has had a remarkable growth. At that time Dr. J. H. Coleman was elected President of Old Willamette. For the past five years amidst great discouragements Dr. Coleman has labored unceasingly for the University. He undertook a Herculean task. The results are marvelous. Not only has he raised the standard of Old Willamette to a higher plane, but several new college buildings have been erected upon the Campus.

In 1902 our University had one college building, eighteen students in the College of Liberal Arts, and only twenty professors. Besides this there was a debt of \$43,000. Willamette has now four well-equipped college buildings, one hundred thirteen students in the College of Liberal Arts, forty-five professors, and is entirely free from debt. In the several colleges of the University there are five hundred and seventy-one students registered.

A new building for the College of Liberal Arts is to be erected in the near future. It is to be of white pressed brick and is to cost about \$50,000. The building is to be thoroughly modern and up-to-date, containing large class rooms, laboratories, and lecture rooms. Several rooms will be reserved for a museum and one large room, especially adapted for the purpose, will be fitted up for a library. In the center of this college building is to be an auditorium large enough to accommodate the graduating exercises of the various colleges.

There have been established in the past year a School of Pharmacy, also a Teachers' College, with Professor W. E. Kirk as Dean.


There has also been established in the past year a "Willamette Summer School" at Newport, Oregon. This will be a delightful place to study, as it is near the Pacific Ccean and will be kept cool by the sea breezes. Here also will soon be erected a permanent building for the Marine Laboratory of Willamette University.

Within the past year an endowment of \$100,000 for the University has been started. Seventy-five thousand dollars have already been raised. The remaining \$25,000 will be secured in a short time.



for the College of Music.




College of Music

ILLAMETTE has another new college building. Mr. W. W. Brown, of Paulina, Oregon, has donated to our University a \$10,000 building to be used for the College of Music.

Willamette has been in need of a building for this purpose for a long time. In years past this department of the University has been very large, sometimes having as many as two hundred students.

Next year, with a new college building and with artists for professors, this department will be as strong as any in the University. It is estimated that there will be one hundred and seventy-five students studying voice in our New College of Music.

Dr. R. A. Heritage, formerly of Spokane, is the Dean of this department.




The Brown Building, the new home of the College of Music.

THE KIMBALL COLLEGE OF THEOLOGY was built last fall through the generosity of Dr. and Mrs. Henry D. Kimball, recently of Spokane. This is the only Methodist College of Theology in the Northwest, and because of its beautiful location and its capable teachers should grow and become one of the largest theological schools in America.

Dr. Kimball as a writer and preacher is known throughout the United States, and because of his learning and ability is well fitted for his position as Dean of this new College. His wide experience as a preacher and teacher makes him able to impart knowledge to his students, the benefit of which they may not fully realize until later years.

The building of the Kimball College of Theology is a modern structure. It is lighted with electricity and is heated by furnaces. The chapel is capable of seating over two hundred persons.

There are now twenty-two students in this College, and we think by the beginning of next year there will be at least fifty belonging to this department of Willamette University.

College of Medicine

ILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY has also a complete, up-to-date Medical College. The College has for its home a neat three-story brick building. The third story is fitted up as a dissecting room. On the second floor are large chemical and biological laboratories. Each student has his own locker, enabling him to do his work quickly and correctly. The biological laboratory has been completely equipped, making the study of bacteriology and histology comparatively easy. On the first floor are study and lecture rooms.


The course given in the College equals that given in many Eastern universities. Doctors of wide experience give daily lectures during the school year on the various prescribed studies.

Forty-six were enrolled in this department of the University last year, and sixteen received the degree of M. D. at the end of last semester.

The Medical College includes, also, a nurses training department, the Salem Hospital being run in connection with the Medical College. Four nurses graduated this year. The classes in the Medical College are each year growing larger and indications point to a very large freshman class at the beginning of the new semester.

College of Law


A LAWYER needs a first-class education. A man with an ordinary education can do the ordinary things of life, but one must have the best education possible to make a successful lawyer.

NE of the strongest departments of Willamette University is the College of Oratory. This College offers thorough training in physical and voice culture as well as in public speaking.




Religious Life


Debates

Willamette Team—Miss Mabel Glover, leader, Miss Helen Smith, and Miss Clara May, who upheld the affirmative.






The team that defeated McMinnville College.

back, is Captain of next year's team, which is sure to be a winner.


Our basketball team stands second in the Oregon League.

Willamette's Husky Team of 1906.





The Girls' Basketball Team.




Boys' Basketball Team

Some of the Track Men, In front of Willamette's large grandstand, Willamette Field.





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
