Questions of Interest

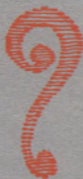
1. What is Willamette University?

2. What is its ultimate purpose?

3. How many years has it existed?

Eighty, having been founded in 1842 by Jason Lee, greatest of Oregon's forefathers.

4. What schools comprise the University?

The College of Liberal Arts, the School of Law, the Conservatory of Music, and the Department of Expression. The Kimball School of Theology is closely associated with the University.

5. Is Willamette a Church school?

It is part of the educational system of the Methodist Episcopal Church. It is denominational but non-sectarian. One third of its students belong to denominations other than Methodist.

6. Is Willamette an accredited institution?

Yes, with the Association of American Colleges, the University Senate, the United States Bureau of Education, the Rockefeller Foundation and the North Central Association.

7. Do Willamette's credits admit to institutions of highest rank?

Yes, both for under-graduate and graduate work.

8. Where is this University located?

At Salem, fifty miles south of Portland.

9. Is the campus favorably situated?

Yes, directly across the street from the Capitol and other State buildings of Oregon.

10. What is the area of the campus?

More than seventeen acres.

11. How many buildings has Willamette?

Five.

12. What are they?

Eaton Hall which serves administration purposes; Waller Hall, the oldest on the campus; Lausanne Hall, which is the women's residence; the Music Hall and the Science Building.

13. Are these buildings in good condition?

Most of them are worthy of the Institution.

14. What is Willamette's present enrollment?

Last year it had enrolled 568 regular students with no names repeated. The enrollment this year will exceed this figure.

15. Does this present student enrollment show an increase?

The Student Body has grown from ten to twelve per cent each year for the past five years.

16. What is the ratio of men to women students?

53 to 47.

17. What percentage of the students contribute to their own support while in college?

Eighty per cent of the men and twenty per cent of the women.

18. How many Alumni has Willamette?
Approximately two thousand.

19. What is the size of the University faculty?

Twenty five Professors in the College of Liberal Arts, five of whom hold Doctors' Degrees; five Instructors in the School of Music; ten in the School of Law, and five in the Kimball School of Theology.

20. Is the present College equipment adequate?

Not entirely so.

21. What are the pressing needs?

Increased endowment, better library facilities, and adequate equipment for the several laboratories.

22. What is Willamette's present productive endowment?

\$518,890.29.

23. What is the present operating budget?

\$86,000.00.

24. Has the budget increased materially in the last seven years?

Yes, an increase of \$56,000.

25. Why?

Increased cost of living, larger Student Body, more Faculty members, and necessary advances in salaries.

26. What is the present University indebtedness?

\$120,000.00 incurred from new buildings but not from the current budget.

27. What effort is the University making to strengthen its financial foundations?

The Willamette University Forward Movement seeks to raise \$1,250,000 by December 20, 1922.

28. What authority is there for this Movement?

It was authorized by the Oregon Annual Conference, approved by the Laymen's Association of the Oregon Conference and voted by the Board of Trustees of Willamette University.

29. Must this entire amount be raised at this time?

Yes, no pledge is binding unless the full amount is secured.

30. What are the general terms of payment for the Forward Movement pledges?

A five year basis.

31. How will this sum be used?

\$1,000,000 is for permanent invested endowment; \$50,000 or more for the new gymnasium; \$200,000 for expenses and other obligations.

32. Is \$1,000,000 necessary for Willamette endowment?

Absolutely; any smaller sum will be inadequate.

33. Does Willamette serve the Church?

It has given approximately twenty per cent of its graduates to the ministry; fifteen of its Alumni are on the mission field today. Others operate in large ways through the Young Men's Christian Association and the Young Women's Christian Association.

34. Does Willamette justify itself otherwise?

Fifty per cent of its graduates go into professional education work. Last year Oregon High Schools had eighty graduates of Willamette as teachers. Many Judges of the Supreme Courts of Oregon, Washington and Idaho have been Willamette students. Congressmen, Diplomats, Governors and a present Judge of the Philippine Court are among its Alumni.

35. Does this array of facts justify Willamette in asking for \$1,250,000?

Yes.

36. Do they justify you and me in rallying to its help?

Yes.

37. Will Willamette raise this amount in the allotted time?

Surely, if you and I face our privilege as God's stewards and give as we should.
