






































PARENTS' WEEKEND


































Junior Sato, Willamette's play maker, bends backward for two points.




Weaver's hook catches the Wildcats by surprise — but it doesn't happen often enough.






Coach John Lewis maps out strategy to team during time-out.



Gene Gregory, J.V. forward goes high to block an attempted lay-in by a Hammond player as Eric McDowell turns to help out.



Highlights of the season were the midseason twin wins over Lewis and Clark, and Ed Swearingin's 45 foot set shot against Linfield to throw the game into overtime.




Gene Gregory goes up for two points as the rest of the Bearkittens move in for a possible rebound.














