

minute TD via the air lanes. The third non-conference go resulted in a bloody 6-6 ite with the University of Portland as a Douglas-to-Lorenz aerial in the last 20 seconds of play accounted for WD's lane tally in what proved to be the most exciting fraces of the year.

Total scoring in all games listed the Bearcats with a favorable 129 to 94 edge over their opponents.

Individual scorers were led by McKeel with six TD's and one conversion, trailed by Goodman with four six-pointers.

Most spectacular play of the season could be reckoned as a late-game pass against the Linfrielders, in which West Virginian Johnny Slanchik, capable of tremendous passes and punts, uncorked one far down the field, forcing speedster Marv Goodman into a dead-run finger-tip catch, netting 80 yards combined and a touchdown.


