Everybody attends all chapels.

Students' mail addressed to Willamette University is placed in the alphabetical mail boxes on the first floor of Eaton Hall.

Freshmen are required to do ten hours of work on the campus and athletic field.

TRADITIONS

FRESHMAN GLEE—Begun in 1909; held in February. Freshmen challenge three classes in song tournament; members of each class compose words and music; includes senior procession and recession (audience stands), take offs and chants by each class begun by seniors, and the actual contest. The banner is presented to the winning class by Prof. Clark who always makes the occasion interesting. A dance follows. Climax of the evening is the annual serenade of the winning class. Monday sees payment of bets, singing of parodies on the winning song, and the mill-stream plunge of the losing class.

MAY WEEK END—Begun in 1906. Week end beginning Friday noon with Frosh-Soph Tug of War, and the Greased-pole Climb between the same classes. Friday night is the annual play, and Saturday morning is the May Day Breakfast at Chresto. Saturday afternoon sees the coronation of the Queen and the May Pole Dance. Climaxing the week end is the dance Saturday night.

HOMECOMING—First held in 1921. Honors alums of Willamette. Events include alumni banquet, slogan contest and sign contest entered by living groups, and the annual football game with Whitman.

VICTORY BELL—Located in tower of Waller Hall. Rung after WU athletic victories, once for each point of Willamette's winning score.

CHAPELS — Assemblies 11:40-12:10 Monday (cultural), Wednesday (religion), Friday (student), Monday-Wednesday attendance required.


KANGAROO COURT—By common consent of other classes Frosh required to attend. Held during Friday chapels. Frosh obey words and wishes of upper classmen.

INTER-SORORITY SING — Begun 1944. Part of May Day festivities. Contest won by Alpha Chi Omega this year.




HAROLD MALDE, Alpha Psi Delta

Budgeting of the general fund and administration of all ASWU elections are the specific duties of the second vice-president. She is a member of the student council.



Keeping records of all proceedings of the ASWU is the main task of the secretary.




BILL STORTZ, Sigma Tau

Dr. Lantz's duties as general manager are in an advisory capacity, as well as that of handling finances. From his office are obtained student activity tickets, Fusser's Guides, the Wallulah, and equipment and supplies for social functions.

GENERAL MANAGER'S OFFICE

The business office of the ASWU, which also serves as the office of the student body president, is located on the ground floor of Waller Hall and is under the direction of the general manager. All money payable to the Associated Students is turned over to this office, and all payments for the carrying on of student activities are made through the general manager.

The office is maintained by student secretaries appointed by the general manager to serve the students. Property and a telephone are available there for student use.


Student activity tickets, representing membership in the Associated Students, are distributed through the general manager's office.

The activity ticket entitles the holder to admission to games and entertainment financed through student body funds, the use of student body equipment, and to receipt of all student body publications (except that a copy of the Wallulah is given to those only who have paid dues for two semesters or pay a proportional amount in addition to the dues for one semester).

Dean of Freshman, Director of Admissions


New students readily become acquainted with this popular Willamette enthusiast. Under his guidance students absorb the traditions and spirit of Willamette.

Dean of Women



ASWU

The Associated Students of Willamette University is the organized student body of Willamette.

Its governing body is the student council, composed of the president, first vice-president, second vice-president, secretary, member-at-large, the editor of the Collegian, a representative from each class, and a member of the faculty elected by the student body.

Dues for membership in the ASWU are \$10 a semester and include dues for membership in the class to which each student belongs.

HERE'S WHAT YOU GET . . .

For your student body ticket you are entitled to attend all functions and participate in all activities. Only charge made is federal tax. Specifically, this is part of what you may expect.

I. Athletics (Includes Women's and Intramural)

Admission to all W.U. games. Participation in football, baseball, softball, volleyball, track, tennis, badminton, etc.

II. Social Functions

ASWU

All-school affairs are supported by student body money. Many social events

Little Chapel—4th Floor, Waller

Built by volunteer student labor. The Little Chapel is a place for meetings of all campus religious groups.

Little Theatre—3rd Floor, Waller

Seats approximately 100. May be used for presentation of student productions.

PUBLICATIONS

STUDENT DIRECTORY

Commonly known as the "Fusser's Guide" gives name, address, phone number, and home address of each student.

STUDENT HANDBOOK

The Handbook is published each year to acquaint new students with the student body and impart information concerning campus activities.

WALLULAH

This annual publication of the associated students appears in June. Upon the approval of the awards committee, ambitious staff members are awarded a certificate with an old English "W." Editor this year will be Ann Strother.

WILLAMETTE COLLEGIAN

The official college paper, published weekly by the student body, is one of the outstanding University publications in the country. The Collegian has for nine straight semesters won the All-American rating, and for the last two years was Pacemaker, the highest honor awarded to a college newspaper. Evelyn Deal is editing the 1945-46 Collegian. It is usual and expected that Willamette students patronize Collegian advertisers.

WILLAMETTE SONGBOOK

The Songbook includes the outstanding Willamette songs and grows larger each year as Freshman Glee gives new songs.

MUSIC

SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

Directed by Bernard Barron, composed of students; plays at school functions.

BAND

Creates pep and spirit at games. Under direction of Maurice Brennen.

A CAPPELLA CHOIR

Organized 1939. Under direction of Dean Melvin H. Geist. Gives annual Christmas Vesper Service, Spring Concert Tour, appears on chapel programs and civic functions.

CARNEGIE LIBRARY

First floor of the music building. Consists of a record player placed in the school of music for the use of all Willamette University students. Special hours for listening during which students take charge. Record collection includes both classic and modern music.

STUDENT RECITALS

Presented every two weeks by music students. All students invited, compulsory for students in the College of Music.

DRAMA

Under direction of Professor Rahe. Two major productions given, one in Fall and Spring semester. The Little Theatre is used for skits and one-act plays which are often under student direction.

FORENSICS

Professor Rahe in charge since 1929. Contests and tourneys. Inter-Collegiate participation in oratory, extemporaneous and after-dinner speaking.

W.U. speakers take part in the various contests in the coast-wide Pacific Forensic League, which includes trips to tourneys held elsewhere. Many awards and trophies are offered. Each year, many W.U. students win many first place honors. Most of these contests do not require experience.

High school forensic tournament sponsored for last nine years. They are held on the Willamette campus with high school speakers and Willamette student judges.

ATHLETICS

Athletics at Willamette is maintained under the supervision of the director of athletics and under the jurisdiction of the athletic board of control.

Willamette belongs to the Pacific Northwest Conference which will meet in November to plan its schedule for basketball and other spring sports. The conference is composed of the following schools: Whitman College, College of Idaho, College of Puget Sound, Pacific University, Linfield College and Willamette. It fosters as far as possible participation by all members in contests of football, basketball, softball, tennis, and track.

Willamette will not lack in exciting competition in both intramural and intercollegiate games.

ASWU Constitution

PREAMBLE

We, the students of Willamette University, in order to provide an organization for the control of all matters of general student concern do hereby ordain and establish the following constitution.

Article I—Organization

Sec. 1. Name. The name of this organization shall be the Associated Students of Willamette University.

Sec. 2. Membership. All registered students of Willamette University shall be members of the Association upon payment of the student body fee.

Article II—Officers

Sec. 1. The officers of the Association shall consist of the president, the first vice-president, the second vice-president, and the secretary, all of whom shall be chosen from the two upper classes of the following year and shall be elected for a term of one year.

Sec. 2. The president shall preside at all meetings of the Association, shall be chairman of the Student Council, and shall perform the usual duties pertaining to this office.

Sec. 3. The first vice-president shall assume the duties of the president in the absence of that officer and shall act as chairman of the Social Activities Board.

Sec. 4. The second vice-president shall be in charge of all ASWU elections.

Sec. 5. The secretary shall keep a record of all meetings of the Association and of the Student Council and shall perform the usual duties pertaining to this office.

Article III—Meetings

Sec. 1. Meetings of the Association shall be held upon the call of the president on his own initiative, upon request of the Student Council, or upon petition of fifty members of the Association in which they state the object of the desired meeting.

Sec. 2. Twenty-four hours notice shall be given for all meetings.

Sec. 3. Fifty-one percent of the members of the Association shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV—Elections

Sec. 1. All candidates for the elective offices of the Association shall be nominated by petition of twenty-five members of the student body at least one month before the close of the second semester. Whenever possible at least two candidates for each office shall be named.

Sec. 2. The Australian ballot system shall be used for all elections.

Sec. 3. All members of the Association whose names appear on the official poll books shall be entitled to vote.

Sec. 4. The voting hours shall be set by the Student Council and published one week before election day.

Sec. 5. All officers shall be elected by a majority vote and in case no candidate receives a majority the Student Council shall call a new election within one week; at this election only the names of the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall appear on the ballot.

Article V—Vacancies

Sec. 1. All vacancies which may occur in the elective offices of the Association shall be filled by the regular popular ballot at a special election.

Article VI—Funds

Sec. 1. Funds of the Association shall be derived from money received in the form of dues paid upon registration in Willamette University and from such other receipts as may result from the activity program of the Association.

Sec. 2. Student body dues are ten dollars per person per semester.

Sec. 3. Funds of the Association shall be administered as outlined in Article IX, below.

Article VII—Publications

Sec. 1. The official publications of the Association shall be the Collegian, the Wallulah, the Student Handbook, the Fusser's Guide, and such other publications as may be approved by the Student Council.

Article VIII—Student Council

Sec. 1. The Student Council shall consist of the president, the two vice-presidents, the secretary, a member of the faculty selected by the council for a term of one year, and one representative from each class to be selected by the separate classes. The runner-up for the position of

student body president shall be a member of the council as a member-at-large. The editor of the Collegian and the General Manager shall be council members but they shall have no vote.

Sec. 2. The council shall hold meetings as it deems necessary or upon call of the president. Six voting members besides the presiding officer shall constitute a quorum.

Sec. 3. The council shall enforce the Constitution, shall have charge of elections, shall be responsible for adherence to the traditions, shall make appointments for ASWU activities, committees and boards, and shall be responsible for the general interests of the Association. The council shall be the chartering agency for all student activities with the exception of those under panhellenic or inter-fraternity control.

Sec. 4. Emergency powers may be granted to the council by a three-fourths vote of the Association. When such emergency powers are granted, the council may act on all matters without strict adherence to the constitution. Such powers shall be granted only for one year at a time and only when school or national emergencies make such action practicable.

Article IX—Finance Board

Sec. 1. The membership of the Finance Board shall consist of the student body president, who shall act as chairman, the two vice-presidents, the secretary, the publications manager, the graduate athletic manager, the general manager, and the faculty member representing the Educational Activities Board.

Sec. 2. The Finance Board will administer all funds of the Association under

supervision of the General Manager, provided however, that the class funds shall be administered by such officers as the individual classes may determine.

Sec. 3. The budget of the Finance Board is subject to the approval of the Student Council.

Sec. 4. The Finance Board shall publish in the Collegian during the second semester the budget for the ensuing year and, within a month after registration day in the fall, shall publish in the Collegian the report of the finances of the preceding year.

Sec. 5. Unused funds for one school year shall be left to the credit of the activity fund for which they were allowed and such deficits as are approved by the Finance Board shall be deducted from the sinking fund; if not approved such deficits may be deducted from the corresponding funds of the following year.

Article X—Publications Board

Sec. 1. Membership of the Publications Board shall consist of the student body president, the publications manager, the editors of the Collegian and of the Wallulah, two members of the Association selected by the Student Council from other than its own membership, two faculty members selected by the Student Council for one year terms, and the general manager who shall vote only in case of a tie.

Sec. 2. The Board shall meet as it deems necessary or upon call of the chairman.

Sec. 3. The Publications Board shall maintain monthly reports of progress in organization, shall be responsible for training of personnel, shall appoint the editors of the Collegian and the Wallulah,

the publications manager, and other editors of ASWU publications by review of applications rendered and shall set all salaries for members of the business and editorial staffs subject to the approval of the Finance Board and the Student Council.

Article XI—Athletic Board

Sec. 1. Membership of the Athletic Board shall consist of the student body president as chairman pro tem, the president of Willamette University, the director of athletics, the general manager, the faculty athletic representative, two members of the board of trustees elected by that board, and two members of the Association appointed by the Student Council from other than their own membership.

Sec. 2. Regular meetings of the board shall be held during the first week of each month except when there be no matters to come before the board.

Sec. 3. The board shall prepare a general athletic budget for all sports and shall submit this budget to the Finance Board. Upon adoption of the budget the board shall enforce the same throughout the ensuing year. The board shall attempt equitable distribution of funds to the various sports and shall foster no sport at the expense of any other. The board shall approve all athletic schedules and may require any reports and such records as it sees fit. The board shall be directly responsible to the Student Council for the execution of their duties.

Article XII—Social Activities Board

Sec. 1. Membership of the Social Activities Board shall consist of the first vice-president acting as chairman, the subcommittee of the faculty-student affairs

committee, and students representing each of the separate organizations as determined by the Student Affairs Committee.

Sec. 2. The Board shall meet each semester to form the social calendar and at any other time when deemed necessary.

Sec. 3. The Board shall compose the social calendar for the school year and shall mediate when conflicts arise.

Article XIII—Cavern Board

Sec. 1. Membership of the Cavern Board shall consist of the student body president, the first vice-president, a member of the faculty appointed by the Student Council, the Dean of the College of Liberal Arts, the cavern manager appointed by the board, and two members of the student body at large appointed by the student council from other than its own membership.

Sec. 2—The board shall meet as it deems necessary or upon call of its chairman.

Sec. 3. The board shall present a report each semester to the Finance Board and shall determine the use to which the Cavern proceeds shall be put, subject to the approval of the Student Council.

Article XIV—Educational Activities Board

Sec. 1. Membership of the Educational Activities Board shall consist of the student body president, the general manager, a forensic manager, a drama manager, and a music manager, the last three being selected by the department heads with the approval of the Student Council. A faculty member selected by the Student Council shall advise the board.

Sec. 2. The Educational Activities Board shall meet as it deems necessary.

Sec. 3. The Board shall be responsible for the budgeting of their activity funds and shall determine the policy and the activity schedule of the educational activities: music, drama, and forensics.

Article XV—Petitions

Sec. 1. Any individual or group of individuals may petition the Student Council on any matter of student interest. The Student Council shall consider all petitions and recommend decisions to the proper administrative official, committee or board.

Article XVI—Repeal or Amendment of Legislation

Sec. 1. Any act of any officer, committee or board existing under this constitution may be repealed or amended by a two-thirds vote of quorum at a meeting of the Association.

Article XVII—Amendment to Constitution

Sec. 1. Amendments to this constitution shall be proposed by the Constitutional Revision Committee at a meeting of the Association, shall then be posted for one week, and must appear in the Collegian. At a subsequent meeting they may be passed by a two-thirds vote of quorum.

BY-LAWS

Article I—Awards Committee

Sec. 1. Membership of the Awards Committee shall consist of the president, the secretary, the faculty member of the Student Council, the general manager and the various faculty heads of the respective activities.

Sec. 2. The committee shall decide what awards will be given to members of the Association who have performed exceptionally meritorious work.

Sec. 3. Awards shall be presented only on award days designated by the Awards Committee.

Sec. 4. Funds for the awards shall be derived from the various activity allocations.

Article II—May Week-End Committee

Sec. 1. Membership of the May Week-End Committee shall consist of a manager appointed by the Student Council and three assistants appointed by the president.

Sec. 2. The May Queen and her court shall be elected by a regular election of the Association.

Article III—Freshman Glee Committee

Sec. 1. Membership of the Freshman Glee Committee shall consist of a manager elected by the freshman class and three upper classmen appointed by the president.

Sec. 2. The committee shall lay down the rules of the Glee and shall appoint three judges from the faculty.

Article IV—Homecoming Committee

Sec. 1. Membership of the Homecoming Committee shall consist of a manager appointed by the Student Council and three assistants appointed by the president.

Sec. 2. The committee shall promote the Homecoming sign contest and other traditions associated with Homecoming.

Article V—Constitutional Revision Committee

Sec. 1. Membership of the Constitutional Revision Committee shall consist of the President, the senior class representative on the Student Council and three other members appointed by the president.

Sec. 2. The committee shall propose revisions to this constitution at any meeting of the Association.

Article VI—Amendments to the By-Laws

Sec. 1. Amendments to these by-laws are subject to the same conditions as amendments to the main body of this constitution.
