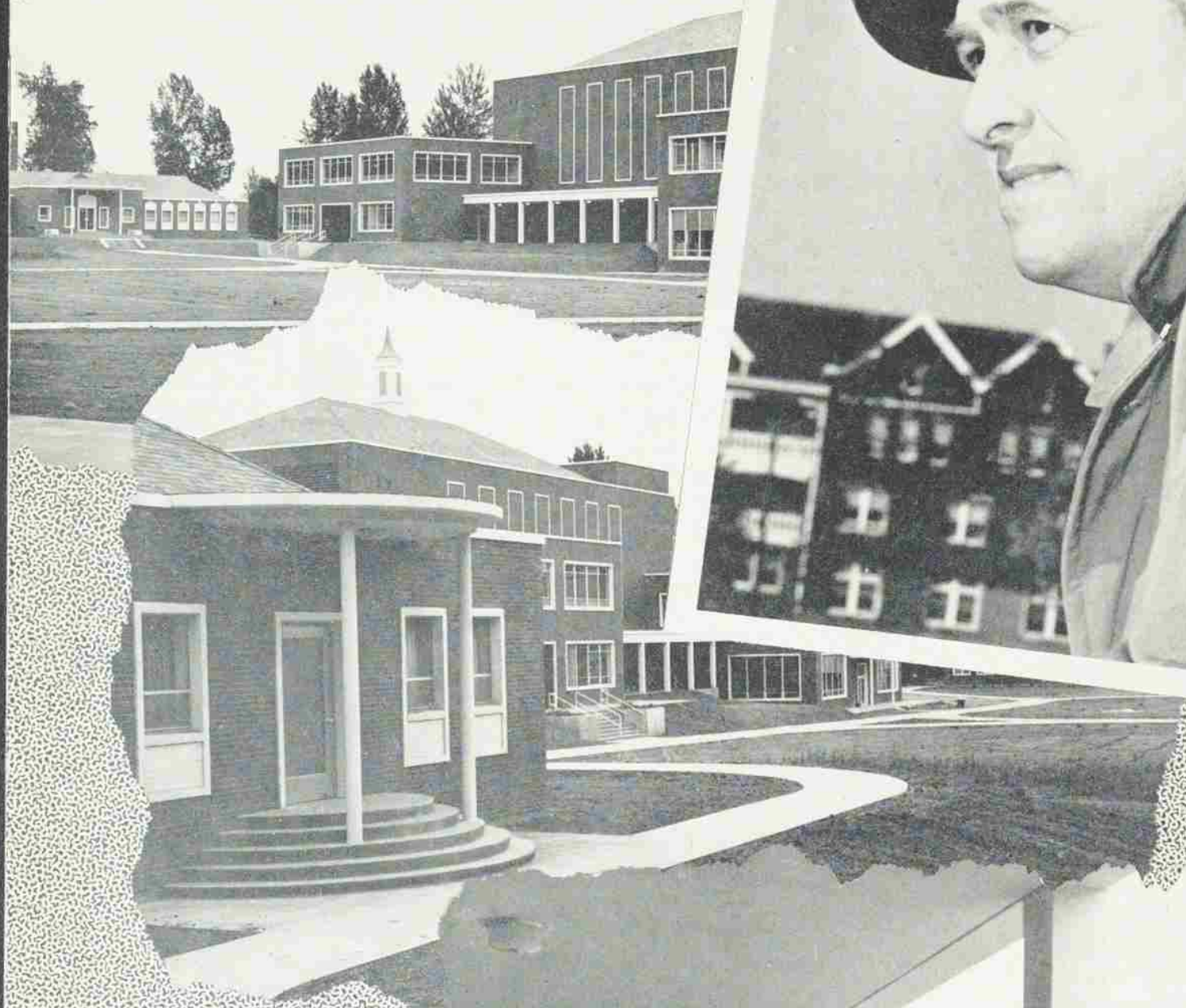

## BEARCATS SET FOR L & C HOMECOMING TILT



Windy Sequeira, carrying the ball, touched off the fourth quarter rally against Whitworth.

In what should prove to be one of Willamette's toughest and most important games, the Bearcats will meet Lewis and Clark at Homecoming, October 29 at 2:00 p.m.

The Pioneers have the league's best team on paper, with 13 lettermen back, nine of whom were regulars last season. To top this off, eight of these nine were All-Conference in 1954.

With his complete backfield returning, Coach Joe Huston has reason to be optimistic.

However, things look equally bright for Coach Ted Ogdahl. His backfield, with speedsters Bob Zoehel and Windy Sequeira and 220 pound fullback Charlie Koani, gives Willamette the best inside-outside they've had in years. Add to the running attack the fine

passing of quarterback Benny Holt, and you come up with a top flight backfield.

Up front, the Bearcats are counting heavily on the services of All-Conference end Dean Benson and All-League tackle Dave Anderson. Others expected to see plenty of action on the Willamette line are: Center, Chuck McClure; Guards, Gordon Chang and Vern Coates; Tackles, Sam Haina and Gerry Kangas; Ends, Jerry McCallister and Vic Backlund. Also slated for backfield duties are Fullback George Koani and Halfbacks Jim Anderson and Claris Poppert.

Willamette's opening game found the Bearcats losing 13 to 7 to highly touted Whitworth in a close non-conference game.

## Goal To Go For Challenge Fund

The original goal of the Challenge Fund was set in March, 1953 at a round figure of one million dollars for the erection of the Auditorium-Fine Arts building and the Women's Residence hall. Of this amount \$500,000 was made available by the two Challenge gifts.

The Board of Trustees in their June meeting reviewed the requirements to complete the financing of the construction, pay architect fees, and furnish the buildings. The total necessary, amounts to \$1,075,000, and the Board approved this new goal for the Challenge Fund campaign.

Up to August 1955, a total of \$432,175 has been paid or pledged on the matching money. This leaves a balance of \$142,825 to be subscribed during this period of completion of the buildings to reach the goal of \$1,075,000.

The Development Committee of the Board has stressed the urgency of continuing our effort while the balance of the matching funds are available. The need is also great to have as much cash as possible paid in to make final payments on our contracts for construction.

New gifts to the Challenge Fund will claim their share of the challenge money, and new pledges now subscribed to be paid during 1955, 1956 and 1957, will at once make an equal amount of Challenge money available.

## Prize Bronze Statue Presented to Willamette University

Gift of an award-winning bronze sculpture to the University for its new Fine Arts building was made by the former Governor and Mrs. Charles A. Sprague.

Entitled "Displaced," the statue is a work of Bertha Margoulies, New York sculptress who has been widely acclaimed by critics and museums. It represents the standing figures of a boy and a girl huddled into a single mass.

The bronze which Willamette now possesses won first prize in sculpture from the Montclair Museum in 1922, and the Garden Sculpture prize from the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts in 1951. It has also been shown by invitation by the Whitney Museum of American Art and the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and it has been included in a country-wide traveling exhibit. Photographs of the sculpture have appeared in many newspapers and other publications.

A graduate of Hunter college, Miss Margoulies has been singularly honored for her sculpture. Among other honors, she was awarded a Guggenheim fellowship for creative work on sculpture. She has executed sculptures for numerous public buildings, including the main post office in Washington, D. C.

Officially installed at the University on August 5, Theta Lambda became the second chapter in Oregon, Alpha Omega, at Oregon State College, having been chartered in 1928.

### Vacated Buildings Put To New Uses

New plans for two existing campus buildings and seeding plans for the tract of land on the southeast corner of the campus have been made.

The plan, underwritten by the Continental Casualty Company of Chicago, will cost \$4.95 per semester, per student.

### 1952 Law Class Ranks High

Dean Reese announced that twenty-four Willamette men have passed their bar exams. These men, entering their first year of law school in 1952, represent 66 2/3 percent of their original class. As pointed out by Dean Reese, this percentage is higher even than the national average of men graduating from law school alone (65 percent).

### W. U. Concert Series Set

The first performance of the Willamette University Distinguished Artist series will open the new auditorium to the public. The new Willamette auditorium located centrally on the campus, seats 1200 persons; and has been built for near perfection in acoustics and facilities for performances.

The series this year, will bring a group of fine artists to Salem.

Blanche Thebom, mezzo-soprano of the Metropolitan Opera Company is the opening attraction, and scheduled for Friday, October 21. Carl Palangi, young bass-baritone of the San Francisco Opera Company, will appear on November 17, and the Winged Victory Chorus of men vocalists, with Mary Ann Shay as soloist, will be here on February 24.

The final artist to appear on the series is Artur Rubinstein, distinguished pianist, February 24.

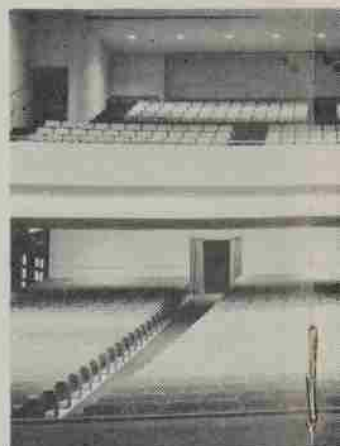

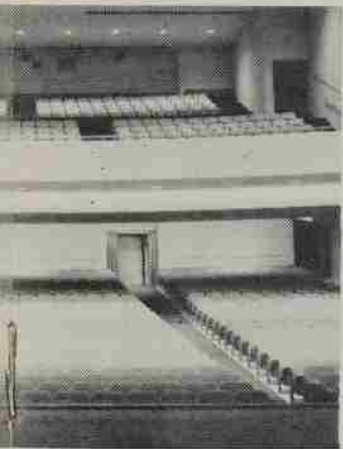
Parents Weekend, October 7-9, presented an opportunity for the mothers and fathers of Willamette students to share

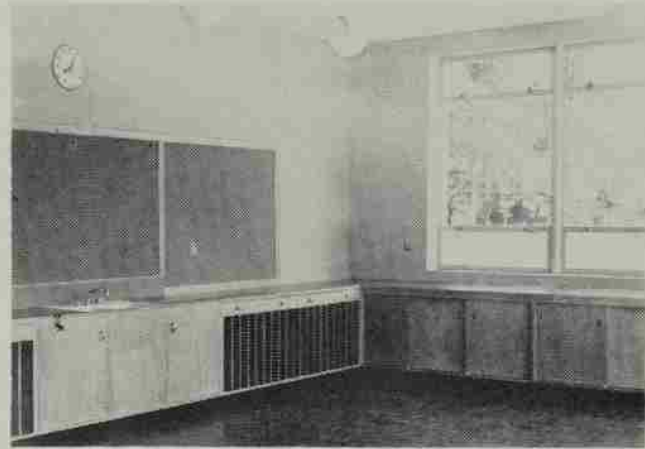
## Charles P. and Fannie Kay Bishop Memorial Health Center

the university sponsors the Dublin Players, a dramatic troupe, presenting the play "Pygmalion."

All the buildings have been in use since classes opened in September. The C. P. and Fannie Kay Bishop Memorial Health Center, student infirmary, contains 18 beds plus modern treatment rooms and a commodious lounge for recuperating students.

Largest building of the trio is the one which houses the 1,200 seat auditorium and fine arts department of the university. The spacious modern auditorium contains the latest in stage, seating, lighting, and electronics equipment plus make-up rooms, a small practice studio, and dressing rooms.

The fine arts section of the building includes painting, sculpture and crafts, classrooms, lecture and slide rooms, and a gallery and outside painting terrace.

The Carl Gregg and Jennie Evans Doney Hall is a complete three-story plus basement women's dorm housing 78 students. The colorful rooms, comfortable lounge and recreation room, and commodious space for laundry facilities all point to the modern construction of the building. The color scheme is pastel, as it is in all the new additions, and it, too, contains the latest in accessories. Landscaping in the newly constructed area has begun and is expected to be well under way in the near future.

Fourteen new members have joined the Willamette faculty for the Fall term. Twelve have been added to the College of Liberal Arts and one each in the College of Law and College of Music.

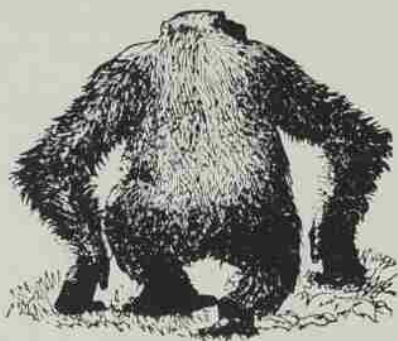
