### SORORITY RUSH RULES

1. Girls planning to graduate from Willamette will be given first consideration in "rushing."
2. Girls who are registered for less than twelve semester hours are not eligible for pledging.
3. Girls on probation will not be "rushed."
4. Independent or fraternity men may not assist in sorority "rushing."
5. Unfriendly conversation about other houses shall not be indulged in.
6. "Rushing" will take place the 15th, 16th, 17th

of October. October 19th is the date for the preferential dinner.

7. Friday, October 18th, shall be a day of silence for both "rushees" and active girls.

8. No favors will be given to guests at the buffet suppers.

9. Alumnae of the sorority must observe all "rush" regulations.

Violation of any "rush" rule will be subject to punishment, namely, the forfeiture of the winter social function of the sorority.

Sorority members may not invite new girls to stay in their homes.

Sorority girls may become acquainted with new girls in a normal manner. The following are suggestions: Study together; attend church together; double date.

Costs of preferential banquet not to exceed \$50.00 including favors, decorations, food, etc.

Each sorority must submit an itemized account of "rushing" expenditures to Dean of Women.

Procedure: Subsequent to registration, a time set by Inter-Fraternity Council, each new registering man shall be given opportunity to signify choice of fraternities, which shall be written, filed in Dean of Men's office. Each fraternity shall present to the Dean a list of new men whom it wishes to pledge. Official notification shall issue from the Dean's office

to each fraternity respectively of the names which correspond to the list it has handed in.

Time of Pledging: No man shall be offered the opportunity to pledge any fraternity until the time of pledging set by the INTER-FRATERNITY COUNCIL and until he shall have completed registration. Completion of registration means the making of final arrangements with the business office in regard to the payment of tuition. Any violation of this provision on the part of any fraternity shall mean the forfeiture of the right to pledge the man in question for a period of thirty days.

Bids for preferences to houses shall be turned in to the Dean of Men's office by four o'clock Friday of Freshman Week.
