






College days for the class of '41 ended with commencement June 7.




Eyes of the class of '42 look forward to the events of the senior year when traditions of century old Willamette will be reviewed.





Prexies Stacer and Sculati, and Payne, Pickett, McWain, Wilson, Hamilton, Matthews, and Wicks were among campus leaders.








# College of Law

Greater cooperation between the law school and liberal arts student bodies was apparent during the semesters in 1940 and 1941.

Notable for the lawyers were the more numerous social functions. Several exchange parties, including a picnic with University of Oregon law school, were highlights. Big event of the year was the alumni banquet in the spring.

In March the law students presented their annual chapel program. The title was "Case of S. Quentin Quail vs. Ida Said Yes," and the plot concerned a marriage annulment. A law school quint, the Hollywood Stars, won the city minor league basketball title.

### Paper Features Modern Makeup

Pages Streamlined With New Type Faces; Rules Removed

Progress toward modern streamlined make-up was one of the chief accomplishments of the 1940-41 Collegian staff.

On the front page, the two columns at the left were combined. Extending the full length of the page, this double column was used for special news, features and editorials, for tabulations, schedules, lineups, etc.

The other six columns of the front page were topped by a mast of modern type. Make-up was different each issue, with a variety of head styles used. Italic heads for news stories were abandoned, yielding preference to dark, easy-to-read ultra-bodoni types. Features printed in bold face type with distinctive stymie heads provided variety.

Probably the most radical change was the abolition of column rules throughout the paper. The additional white space proved pleasing to the eye of the reader.

Under Managing Editor Joe Van Winkle, in charge of make-up, the staff strove for balance and variety. Murco Ringnald, professor of journalism, offered valuable suggestions for improvement.

### Collegian Gets High Rating

First class honor rating was awarded to the Collegian by Associated Collegiate Press critics for first semester editions.

Society and sports pages were commended for being generally well edited. Makeup and typography rated high. Criticism of the paper showed aspects in which improvement is needed.

The ACP critical service is offered semi-annually for college publications. For the spring semester of 1939-40, the Collegian received second class rating.





The Willamette Bearcats in 1940 won the Northwest Conference championship for the sixth time in the last seven years.

Employing an intricate man-in-motion offense the Keene machine opened their 1940 season against the Portland University Pilots on the Multnomah stadium gridiron in Portland where they dropped a 21 to 7 decision. Blamed for the defeat was bad timing in the Bearcat's new man-in-motion plays. The lone Willamette touchdown came in the second period when Ted Ogdahl hauled down an end zone pass from Bud Reynolds, diminutive pass-pitching back.

"Pop" Warner and Ben Winkleman brought their San Jose State Spartans to Portland for the Bearcat's second game in the Multnomah stadium. Still unpolished in offensive strength the Keenemen took a 20 to 0 defeat at the hands of the powerhouse Spartan eleven. All 20 points were scored in the first half of the game which was to prove the turning point in the Bearcats' season.

Though losing by a narrow 7 to 6 score the Bearcats were in top form for their first Sweetland Field clash with the strong San Diego Marines. The new man-in-motion system clicked as the Bearcats rolled up 372 yards to the Leatherneck's 189. A dropped pass in the end zone and a force out of bounds

on the six inch line, both on fourth downs on two different occasions, cut short two Willamette scoring chances. Ted Ogdahl gathered in Bud Reynold's 30 yard pass in the closing minutes for the Bearcats only score.

College of Puget Sound was the first Northwest conference foe to feel the Bearcats' rising power as they went home with a 39 to 0 defeat.


Gonzaga university, one of the strongest independent football aggregations on the Pacific coast, edged the Bearcats 7 to 6 in the first meeting of the two clubs since 1914. The game was played in Longview.

The in and out Willamettes hit their highest scoring stride of the year, swamping the Linfield Wildcats 51 to 0 for their second straight conference victory. The versatile Willamette attack rolled to 15 first downs, three of these from passes, completed seven of 16 passes for 182 yards, and muddled through to 332 yards from scrimmage while losing but 37.

Pacific university, strongest conference opponent of the Bearcats in recent years and defending champion, bowed to the Methodists 20 to 6. Gene Stewart and Bud Reynolds paced the Bearcat win.





On hand to lead the student body in yells and songs was the pep staff consisting of eight members.





## Cubs




Judges selected winners in their chronological class order: Seniors, Juniors, Sophomores, and the Freshmen swam.





The highly problematical success of the 1941 club was centered around three sensational freshmen pitchers, around whom Mentor Keene built his club.




