

Now, through the generosity of the late Everell Stanton Collins, longtime trustee, benefactor, counsellor and friend of the University, this need has been met. The beautilui and commodious building herein pictured will make possible up-to-the-minute scientific training which the formerly limited facilities denied.

I wish, personally and on behalf of the institution, to express our thanks to this good and gracelous and generous man. It is a distinct challenge to this present student body to be worthy of the confidence of such men as Mr. Collins. We must match the improved physical equipment of the campus with distinct moral and spiritual attainment.



All Conference Men

Three Willametic Bearcats, one senior, one sophomore, and one freshman, were voted to first sting positions on the Pacific Northwest conference all-star football team selected by member coaches. Selected were John Kolb, East Orange, N. J., left end; Al Walden, La Jolla, Calif, fullback, and Tony Fraidol, Murray Hill, N. J., guard.

The second team all-conference backfield was made up of three Bearcats, Gene Stewart, Bud Reynolds, and Larry Drury. Floyd Cline, tackle, was the fourth Bearcat chosen.



The Willamette Bearcats in 1940 won the Northwest Conference championship for the sixth time in the last seven years.

Employing an intricate man-in-motion affense the Keene machine opened their 1940 session against the Portland University Pilots on the Multinomah stadium griditon in Portland where they dropped a 21 to 7 decision. Blamed for the defeat was bad timing in the Bearcat's new man-in-motion plays. The lone Willamette touchdown came in the second period when Ted Ogdahl hauled down an end zone pass from Bud Reynolds, diminutive pass-pitching back.

"Pop" Warner and Ben Winkleman brought their San Jose State Spartans to Portland for the Bearcat's second game in the Multhomach stadium. Still unpolished in offensive strength the Keenemen took a 20 to 0 defeat at the hands of the powerhouse Spartan eleven. All 20 points were scored in the first half of the game which was to prove the turning point in the Bearcats' season.

Though losing by a narrow 7 to 6 score the Bearcats were in top form for their first Sweetland Field clash with the strong San Diego Marines. The new man-in-motion system clicked as the Bearcats rolled up 372 yards to the Leatherneck's 189. A dropped pass in the end zone and a force out of bounds





on the six inch line, both on fourth downs on two different occasions, cut short two Willamette scoring chances. Ted Ogdahl gathered in Bud Reynold's 30 yard pass in the closing minutes for the Bearcats only score.

College of Puget Sound was the first Northwest conference foe to feel the Bearcats' rising power as they went home with a 39 to 0 defeat.

Gonzaga university, one of the strongest independent football aggregations on the Pacific coast, edged the Bearcats 7 to 6 in the first meeting of the two clubs since 1914. The game was played in Longview.

The in and out Willamettes hit their highest scoring stride of the year, swamping the Linfield Wildcats 51 to 0 for their second straight conference victory. The versatile Willamette attack rolled to 15 first downs, three of these from passes, completed seven of 16 passes for 182 yards, and mudded through to 332 yards from scrimmage while losing but 37.

Pacific university, strongest conference opponent of the Bearcats in recent years and defending champion, bowed to the Methodists 20 to 6. Gene Stewart and Bud Reynolds paced the Bearcat win.




All-star Basketball




On hand to lead the student body in yells and songs was the pep staff consisting of eight members.


In capturing their conference pennant the Bearcats took double victories from Whitman College and College of Puget Sound, while splitting a pair

Kittens




A much reduced budget must be taken into consideration in the evaluation of this year's production.



The highly problematical success of the 1941 club was centered around three sensational freshmen pitchers, around whom Mentor Keene built his club.






University Vespers
