Class of '57 Largest Since 1948

Willamette University's class of 1957 is the largest freshman class since 1948, it was disclosed this week by Harold B. Jory, registrar. There are 364 students enrolled as freshmen in the college of liberal arts and music, according to final registration figures.

Total fall semester enrollment for the university is 1081. Of this number, 1037 are full-time students — exactly the same number of full-time students as was registered last year.

The first year law class, comprised of 53 students, is the largest first year group since 1949, reports Dean Seward Reese.

A breakdown of registration figures shows 888 students in liberal arts, 81 in music and 112 in law. The ratio of men to women in liberal arts is slightly less than two to one in favor of the men. Music school has a ratio somewhat exceeding 2.5 women to one man. There is a 36 to one ratio of men to women in the law school.

Thelma Mills Named NYC "YW" Director

Another page in her "book of success" was added this year by Thelma Mills, '23, when she was named director of New York City's YWCA. In this position the educator has a \$2,000,000 annual budget and a staff of more than 500 to organize activities of 28,000 members.

Miss Mills' career in education has taken her over much of the world. Following two years teaching at Roseburg, then Raymond, Wash., she went to China in 1925 to teach English at a boys school. Reminiscent of this period in her life are her apartment walls, which are in the form of Chinese paintings on fabric from Llam Buddhist temples and hand-carved teakwood frames.

Returning to the United States, Miss Mills spent a year as director of dormitories at the University of Wyoming. She then attended Columbia university and received her master's degree in personnel, college guidance and administration. The Willamette graduate then won the Felix Warburg fellowship in personnel study and after finishing graduate work she went to Vermont to study needs of high school girls for the commission on rural life.

From 1930 to 1938 she was dean of women at Whitman college and taught so-

ciology. She was president of the American Association of University Women for four years, the president of the Washington Deans Altrusa club and secretary of the Western Association of Deans of Women. From Walla Walla, she traveled to Columbia, Mo., to be dean of women at the University of Missouri, where she completely altered the job and became director of student affairs for women. In 1948, the St. Louis Action Council named her as a "woman of achievement."

Physics Department Wins Research Grant

Willamette's physics department is the recipient of one of 60 grants approved recently by the advisory committee of Research Corporation of New York, it was announced this week by Dr. Joseph W. Barker, president of the foundation.

The grant was approved for Dr. Robert L. Purbrick ('42), the associate professor of physics at the university. Title of Purbrick's research is "An Investigation of Diatomic Molecules Formed from Elements in the Same Column of Periodic System."

The awards were made to 49 colleges and scientific institutions in this country. The 60 grants totalled \$150,000.

Dr. James C. Nichol, associate professor of chemistry at Willamette and currently on a \$4,000 research fellowship at Yale university, has been awarded the Frederick Gardner Cottrell grant in chemistry from Research Corporation of New York for three years.

Former Dean of Women at Willamette Dies

Olive M. Dahl, dean of women at Willamette for 21 years, passed away August 7 at the age of 65. Death came to the ex-dean, who resigned from her position as dean of women in 1948 and from the German department in 1952, as the result of a heart condition, according to Dr. Ralph Purvine.

Miss Dahl came to Willamette in 1927 as dean of women and assistant professor of German. In 1935 she was promoted to associate professor of German and held that position until 1952 when she retired. She was dean of women until her health forced her to resign the post in 1948.

It was over this period of 25 years that Miss Dahl formed the lifelong friendships with hundreds of university students. Following her retirement, Miss Dahl spent

Challenge Fund Total Now \$201,660

Subscriptions for the Willamette \$1,000,000 challenge fund, which will provide for the erection of an auditorium-fine arts building and a women's residence hall, have climbed to \$201,660, it was reported October 3 by Pres. G. Herbert Smith.

The greater Portland area campaign has raised \$50,835 since the program was launched in early September. Goal for the Portland project, under the chairmanship of Robert C. Notson, is \$150,000.

Salem contributions to the university development program now tally \$134,640. Outside gifts, prior to general canvass, amount to \$16,185. University staff and faculty members have pledged \$14,425 to the building project.

Around the Campus . . .

Betty Jean Joseph, former fashion coordinator at Meier & Frank Company in Portland, has been named admissions counselor at Willamette. The former May queen, a graduate of the music school in 1952, has appeared in concert both in Salem and Portland. She was featured recently in the Portland Civic Theatre production of "The Gondoliers." Mrs. Joseph is the star of a color movie depicting Willamette campus life.

Associate Professor A. Freeman Holmer, director of the Oregon Citizenship Clearing House at Willamette, attended a meeting for directors of ten citizenship clearing houses in New York in September. Chief Justice Arthur T. Vanderbilt of the New Jersey Supreme Court was chairman for the group in planning the coming year's program. Willamette was named headquarters for the Oregon Citizenship Clearing House in May.

Lt. Col. Norman W. Todd has been appointed professor of air science and tactics at Willamette. Colonel Todd reports to the campus following two years active duty at Northeast Air Command headquarters in Newfoundland where he was director of management analysis. He replaces Lt. Col. Norman W. Campion, currently assigned to the Air Command and Staff school, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama. The new AFROTC commandant holds B.S. and M.S. degrees from North Dakota Agricultural college. He also earned a master's degree in public administration at the University of Minnesota.

John Paulus, associate professor of law, was selected to participate in the university faculty seminar conducted by Standard Oil Company of California, August 30-September 11 in San Francisco. Fifteen major universities and colleges in the seven western states were represented in the two-week program.

Two special workshops were conducted during summer session. A language arts workshop, designed for four hours each afternoon for eight days, was introduced for the first time. The program was directed by Dr. Howard W. Runkel, professor of speech; Dr. Murco Ringnald, professor of journalism; George Edwards, instructor in English and Margaret Burroughs, instructor in drama and English at Salem Senior High school. A second workshop, specializing in speech, was presented for the second year.

Dr. James C. Nichol, associate professor of chemistry at Willamette since 1949, has been granted a \$4,000 fellowship at Yale University. The fellowship is for the academic year of 1953-54. Dr. Nichol will do straight research in the general field of poly-electrolytes. A graduate of the University of Alberta, he received a B.S. degree with honors in 1943 and a M.S. degree from the same institution in 1945. With the Canadian Chemical Warfare Department during the war, he aided in the "synthesis of organic compounds project." The research chemist was awarded a Ph.D. degree from the University of Wisconsin in 1948.

A new Institute of State Affairs has been established on campus. The research center in state affairs will identify and define current and emerging problems in Oregon state government; identify and establish liaison with existing groups and individuals engaged in research and investigation by existing groups; undertake other research as necessary; and provide media and a forum for the dissemination of results of such research and study. The Institute of State Affairs agenda for study in 1953-54 is: the state's role in property taxation, the proposed department of revenue, the desirability of continuing the Governor's Committee on Children and Youth, ways of promoting wider participation in politics and the need for revision of Oregon's constitution.

Eight new professors joined the Willamette faculty fall semester. New to the College of Liberal Arts are Arthur E. Gravatt, instructor in sociology; Dr. Frank J. Bauer, assistant professor of psychology; Robert M. Putnam, assistant professor of speech and drama; James Fonseca, instructor in Spanish and German; and James A. Nickell, instructor in mathematics. Don Gleckler, supervisor of vocal music in Topeka, Kansas, high school system since 1937, has been appointed to the music school faculty. He will take over the a cappella choir directorship from Dean Melvin Geist, who will devote more time to the administrative duties of a greatly expanded program of music education. The appointment of Celia Koch, new instructor in cello, theory and piano, brings the music school staff to nine full-time members. Dr. Reginald Parker, nationally recognized law educator and author of "Administrative Law" has been named professor of law. Prior to coming to Willamette, Dr. Parker was editor of the National Association of Claimants' Compensation Attorneys law journal. He was also on the faculty of Northeastern university in Boston.

A predominantly European distinguished artist series will be presented by the university for the 1953-54 season. Appearing before Salem audiences will be Welsh-born baritone Thomas L. Thomas; American violinist Isaac Stern; the European ensemble, the Vienna String Symphony; the First Piano Quartet, with artists from Poland, Italy, Austria and the United States.

A reprint circulation in Indonesia and Malaya has been authorized for "The Asia in Emerson's Mind," by Dr. Egbert S. Oliver, former professor of English at Willamette and now associate professor of English, Portland State Extension Center, Oregon State System of Higher Education. Announcement was made by the publishers of Korean Survey who printed the article in their May, 1953 issue. Dr. Oliver, author of Melville's Piazza Tales, has received letters from Internationals praising his work for its aid to world-wide understanding. "The Asia in Emerson's Mind" is the second Oliver work published by Korean Survey.
