

Classes Vie in 38th Freshman Glee March 8

For the 38th consecutive year Freshman Glee will take place, this year Saturday, March 8, in the gymnasium. Once more the four classes will compete for the traditional Glee banner, and the losing class will take its customary swim in the Mill stream on the campus.

Fantastic bets by class members, now a firmly established component of the Glee, will be paid on the campus the following Monday.

Demand for tickets to the competition promises

to reach a peak this year with the overflow enrollment on the campus.

Consequently, Alumni Secretary Mary Jean Huston has announced that a policy of first come, first served will be followed in allotting tickets to alumni who have paid dues or contributed to the Loyalty Fund. Alumni desiring tickets should address Miss Huston at the Alumni office at the university.

Alumni seats will be in the north balcony of the gymnasium.

The Novelty theme has been chosen for the songs in this year's competition.

Don Yocom, freshman, is the manager for the 38th Glee. He and his committees have got preparations well under way toward building up a spirited rivalry between the classes.

Intensive practice and drills by participants are due to begin shortly after the spring semester opens February 10. Enthusiasm is expected to mount steadily until it reaches its climax the night of the traditional contest.

Tuition To Be \$160 Per Term For Next Year

Tuition at Willamette for the next school year will be \$160 a semester. The new rate covers all payments made to the university for college work in liberal arts and law. The additional charges for applied music for regular students will remain at the present figure.

Establishment of the new tuition charge followed careful study by the board of trustees of the problem of financing the university in the face of higher costs.

In announcing the change, President G. Herbert Smith, declared that the board recognizes that faculty salaries have not been increased in keeping with the increase in living cost.

A financial program that would permit general increases in salaries as well as funds to maintain high standards of education, he said, is essential.

Willamette, the president pointed out, has only three sources of revenue: income from endowment, gifts from private sources, and tuition receipts. Of these sources, he finds only tuition capable of providing additional revenue.

At this time it is impossible to secure increased revenue from endowment, according to Dr. Smith.

"It is common knowledge," he said, "that income from invested endowment has decreased in recent years. Willamette has a sound investment policy and refuses to sacrifice safety of investment for greater possible yield."

Funds solicited from private sources during the past three years have been for providing housing for men students. Thus current gifts are not available for the general budget since they are so greatly needed for plant improvements.

The new tuition charge will bring Willamette closer in line with comparable colleges on the Pacific Coast and in the Middle West. A random sampling of such institutions show their present tuition generally from 20 to 100 percent higher than that of Willamette.

An increased number of scholarships and a generous fund for grants-in-aid are available to assist worthy students who need financial assistance.

Two Sessions Next Summer

Two summer sessions of five weeks each will be offered at Willamette. They will start June 25 and close August 30. Five hours of credit may be earned at each of the sessions.

Under the plan of offering 10 hours of work each summer, students who wish to accelerate their schooling will be able to graduate in three years by attending three summers in addition to the customary load in regular sessions.

The summer program is divided into two sessions to accommodate those who do not desire so long a course as ten weeks, including teachers who do not wish to occupy so much of their vacation with further study.

Law College Wins Top Recognition

Walt Erickson Resigns After Champ Season

Resignations by Walter E. Erickson and Elmer Schaake as coaches at Willamette were announced this month by President G. Herbert Smith. Both men are in their first year of mentoring Willamette athletics.

Coach Erickson's football team won the Northwest Conference championship with a clean sweep of victories, tied one non-conference game with Portland, and lost to San Jose State and Whittier.

"After a highly successful football season as head coach and director of athletics," President Smith announced, "Mr. Walter E. Erickson resigned from his position as director of athletics and football coach."

"His resignation was submitted to me at the close of the football season and has been discussed only with the head of the athletic committee of the board of trustees and with the president of the board of trustees."

"Mr. Erickson has given valuable service to the university as an administrative officer and it is the purpose of the administration to recommend Mr. Erickson's appointment as director of admissions and placement at the first meeting of the executive committee which also will consider his resignation as director of athletics."

Before taking over as head coach, Erickson had served as director of admissions and dean of freshmen. He came to Willamette in 1939 as registrar after an outstanding high school coaching career. A Willamette graduate of 1933, he is remembered as one of Willamette's foremost athletes.

Coach Erickson's explanation of his decision was summed up in one sentence: "At the close of the football season, I submitted my resignation to President Smith for the very simple reason that I discovered that coaching no longer held the same interest for me that it had previously."

Coach Schaake's resignation was submitted January 6, to be effective July 1. He had served as assistant football coach and is now head basketball coach.

New Semester To Have Vacation

The spring semester this year will begin February 10, one week earlier than scheduled in the original calendar. The new calendar eliminates the week's vacation between semesters and allows a week of vacation starting April 5 in the middle of the term. The schedule formerly allowed no recess during the entire second semester.

Fraternities Become National In Joint Installation Rituals

Willamette's three local fraternities became chapters of the venerable Miami Triad national fraternities at joint installation ceremonies January 3 and 4.

Alpha Psi Delta has become a chapter of Phi Delta Theta.

Kappa Gamma Rho is a chapter of Beta Theta Pi.

Sigma Tau is now a chapter of Sigma Chi.

The three fraternities known as the Miami Triad were all formed on the campus of Miami university at Oxford, Ohio, be-

tween 1839 and 1855 and were the first three fraternities west of the Allegheny mountains. Each of the fraternities has chapters in Canada besides chapters throughout the United States.

National officers on hand for the ceremonies were Dr. G. Herbert Smith, national president of Beta Theta Pi; Barret Herrick of New York, general council member of Phi Delta Theta; Dr. W. Henry McLean of Illinois, grand praeter of Sigma Chi; Stanley R. Church of Astoria, district chief of Beta Theta Pi.

WU Collegian Does It Again! Wins 7th Straight Pacemaker

For the seventh successive semester the Willamette Collegian has been awarded the Pacemaker rating by the Associated Collegiate Press.

This latest award gives the Collegian the longest string of successive Pacemaker honors in the history of college journalism, so far as can be ascertained.

The rating was given for the issues of last spring, edited by Evelyn Deal, who piloted the paper to her first Pacemaker award in the fall of 1945. Miss Deal is now a senior majoring

in biology and has retired from college journalism.

First of Willamette's Pacemaker Collegians was edited by Nadene Mathews in the fall of 1943. Her spring semester publication won the same recognition.

Under the editorship of Catherine Thomas, who succeeded Miss Mathews, the Collegian won three more Pacemaker awards in one year by publishing during the summer semester as well as fall and spring during the three-semester Navy V-12 program.

The Associated Collegiate Press, with headquarters in Minnesota, judges college newspapers critically each semester and rates the outstanding ones as All-American. The cream of the All-Americans are then nominated for further competition for the rare distinction of Pacemaker.

Only those few agreed upon by the entire board of judges as worthy of being singled out for setting the pace for all other college papers are awarded the Pacemaker rating. As few as four and as many as nine college papers have rated the honor during the seven times the Collegian won the distinction.

Prof. Haworth To Be Back

Prof. Charles C. Haworth, who taught Spanish at Willamette from 1927 until his retirement in 1944, will return to the campus this spring.

During next semester he will take over Spanish classes which will be left by Dr. William Moellering, who has accepted an appointment at San Jose State college. Prof. Haworth has been living in California since he retired.

Dr. Moellering has been at Willamette since 1943.

Law Alumni Form Association

With adoption of a constitution and election of officers, alumni of Willamette's college of law have formed an association and will hold its next meeting at the time of the annual meeting of the Willamette Alumni association in June at Commencement.

The new association is to be entirely autonomous, with one of its chief purposes to promote the interests of the college of law. Members will automatically become affiliated with the Willamette Alumni association.

Officers of the organization are James B. Bedingfield, '22, of Coos Bay, president; Allan G. Carson, '22, Salem, vice president; Robert W. DeArmond, '42,

Salem, secretary-treasurer.

The executive committee consists of John B. Ebinger, '30, Klamath Falls; Samuel B. Bowe, '33, Grants Pass; and Paul E. Geddes, '30, Roseburg.

Dues have been fixed at \$2.50 a year, and every law graduate is urged to send in his dues to the secretary and to take part in the new organization.

The law alumni association was formed November 2 at a meeting attended in Salem by about fifty alumni, President G. Herbert Smith, Dean Seward P. Reese, and members of the law faculty. Hon. High Standard Rates Election By Association

Election to membership by the Association of American Law Schools during the Christmas holidays brought Willamette's college of law to the top rung in the ladder of recognition among the nation's law schools.

The new honor places Willamette among 99 similar institutions that comprise the association. The college of law had been approved by the American Bar association in 1940 and has now been recognized by the only two accrediting organizations for law schools.

Acceptance of Willamette for membership in the AALS followed a recent inspection by Laurence W. DeMuth, professor of law at the University of Colorado, representing the association. Requirements for admission were four full-time instructors, expenditures of at least \$10,000 for books, treaties and reviews every five years, high quality instruction, strict grading, and careful selection of students.

Willamette was voted into membership at the annual meeting of the association December 27 in Chicago. The college of law's new dean, Seward P. Reese, was present at the meeting.

"This recognition we have just received," said the dean, "is the work of many people, some of whom have received little credit for their work and contributions but have been happy in the satisfaction that they have contributed to their school."

"Although from the standpoint of recognition by associations, our college of law has nothing further to achieve, it can always improve in becoming a better and better school as time goes on and in rendering greater and greater service to its students, graduates and society."

"Gaining membership in the association marks the beginning of a new era in the history of the school."

A tentative draft of the constitution was presented by Wallace Carson, '23, of Salem, and was adopted after some amendments. Committees were appointed to study and make recommendations on scholarship, library and other funds to be created for the college of law.

A detailed program for continued substantial support and development of the law school on a permanent long range plan was explained to the gathering by Dr. Smith and Dean Reese.

Those attending the meeting expressed the conviction that the Willamette college of law is outstanding and that it is to become second to none in the West.

What the Alumni of Willamette are Doing

1875

Wilbur F. Starr, '75, died October 23 in Corvallis at the age of 96. He was the son of an early circuit rider who founded the Eugene Methodist church. After his graduation from Willamette, he taught school in Oregon for many years until moving to his farm in south Benton county. He was active in church work throughout his life.

1890

Mary Steiner Denton, '90, died the morning of January 13 at the Salem General hospital where she had been a patient for a week. Since her graduation from Willamette, Mrs. Denton has maintained a piano studio in Salem and was for many years chairman of State Music Week. She was also historian for the State Federation of Music clubs and principal organizer of the Federated Music clubs in Salem and through this was in charge of the civic music programs given at the Oregon state fair yearly. Her husband, Walter Denton, died in 1928.

1896

John H. Whitaker, '96, who is manager of the Goodwill Industries Book store in San Diego, Calif., was featured in a recent issue of the San Diego Journal. Mr. Whitaker is following in the footsteps of his father, George Whitaker, president of Willamette from 1891 to 1894, by advocating racial tolerance. He has traveled extensively, teaching in Singapore, and the Philippines and was deputy superintendent of schools in Sulu Archipelago. He also did newspaper editorial work on the Malay Peninsula. He has been connected with the bookstore where he is now employed for 13 years.

1898

Frank T. Wrightman, LL.B. '98, died in a Salem hospital December 2 after a long illness. Mr. Wrightman, who was once a member of the law firm of Brown, Wrightman & Myers, was also a former Marion county sheriff and later head of the state corporation department. He was the last surviving charter member of the Salem Elks lodge.

1901

Warren F. Pohle, ex '01, died December 3 at his residence in Turner following a heart attack. Mr. Pohle was an implement dealer in Salem for 35 years, heading the organization that is now known as the Interstate Tractor company. Among those surviving is a sister, Frances Pohle Utter, '12.

1906

Ruth Field, '06, is returning to India after 21 months' absence because of her health. She will be in charge of a girls' school in Calcutta with approximately 400 pupils aged five to 18. The school is sponsored by the Methodist church.

1908

Walter C. Winslow, LL.B. '08, has been appointed to sit on the Oregon supreme court for six months to a year during the absence of Justice James T. Brand, who was called to Europe to act as judge on a military tribunal for axis war criminals. Mr. Winslow was appointed by Governor Earl Snell.

1910

Col. Dana H. Allen, LL.B. '10, United States army, retired, died January 2 at Letterman hospital in San Francisco, after an extended illness. Col. Allen had a long military career, dating back as far as 1916 when he served with the national guard on the Mexican border. For many years he acted as judge advocate general for the Philippine islands.

During World War II he served as head of army schools in Fort Benning, Ga., and more recently as commandant of military schools in various parts of the country.

L. Guy Lewelling, LL.B. '11, died November 8 at the Albany, Oregon, hospital where he had been a patient for a week. Mr. Lewelling was circuit judge for Linn and Benton counties since 1932. Previous to that he practiced law and served as district attorney for Linn county. He was suffering from leukemia.

Longer Terms For Next Year

Fall semester of 1947-48 will see Willamette return to the 18-week semester which was discontinued when the V-12 arrived on the campus in 1943. Fall semester registration dates have been moved up to September 17 to 22 to provide the extra week.

One result of the 18-week semester will be a full two-week Christmas vacation and a four-day Thanksgiving vacation.

Flight Training Work Offered At Willamette Under GI Bill

Private pilot training is among the courses offered or credit this year at Willamette. The training, which includes ground school and flying experience, leads to a private pilot license and four hours of college credit.

Nearly 40 students are signed up for the course, all of them veterans, including one woman. Expense of the instruction is met out of the \$500 yearly educational allotment allowed veterans under the G.I. Bill.

In order to keep the veteran's yearly expense within the \$500, the course is spread over three semesters, although veterans have the privilege of taking the work at a faster rate by paying additional expenses from their own pockets or forfeiting some of the educational time due them.

Six of the students have already soloed during their first semester of the course, which is conducted by the Salem Air school in conjunction with the university.

Enrollment in the air school, for both flight and ground school training, will be open for new students during the regular registration time at the end of the semester, according to John Hughes, director of the air school.

Ground school and flight

Bush's Pasture Athletic Field Leveling, Grading Completed

First proof of the excellent quality of Willamette's future athletic field in Bush's Pasture was given by the condition of the grounds after the heavy winter rains.

Inspection of the site after the heaviest of rains revealed no puddles and testified to the effectiveness of the grading work and drainage system installed this fall.

Four-inch tile has been installed around the quarter-mile track as well as around the baseball diamond and along the football field. Water is carried away in two directions through six- and ten-inch tile.

It is hoped that seeding of the

fields may be done this spring in order to provide the best turf for the fall of 1948, when it is expected that the field will be put to use.
