BETTING—Grew out of Freshman Glee. Paid chapel time, on Monday following Glee. Compulsory swim of unsuccessful class in Mill stream. Glee bets paid in front of grandstand.

HOMECOMING—First held 1921. Honors alums of Willamette. Events include alumni banquet, football game, Homecoming Play, Sign Contest and Noise parade entered by living organizations.

FRESHMAN GLEE—Begun 1909. Thirty-four-year-old tradition; held in March. Freshmen challenge three classes in song tournament; members of each class compose words, music. Freshmen manage whole affair.

MAY WEEK END—37 years old. Willamette night, party and dance on Friday. Saturday, Frosh-Soph Tug of War and athletic contests. May Queen coronation and parade Saturday afternoon. Saturday evening is the play.

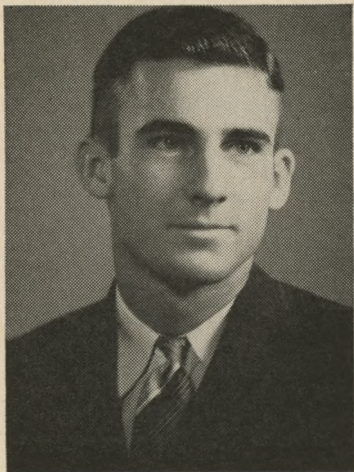

NAVAL COLLEGE TRAINING PROGRAM (V-12)

Willamette University's Naval College Training Program is one of approximately 160 such programs on college campuses in America. Willamette is the site of the only basic undergraduate college program for the Navy in Oregon.

At Willamette, 258 men are assigned to carry on their work in premedics and basic work for deck officers. The curriculum comprises a well-rounded course of study, including English, Languages, History, Psychology, Drawing, the Sciences, and Mathematics. The students in the Navy program are in every sense of the word regular students of Willamette University, participating fully in all phases of college life.

As president of the Willamette student body John Macy will direct student government and head the executive committee. He is enrolled in the navy program and will help the men become acquainted with Willamette life.

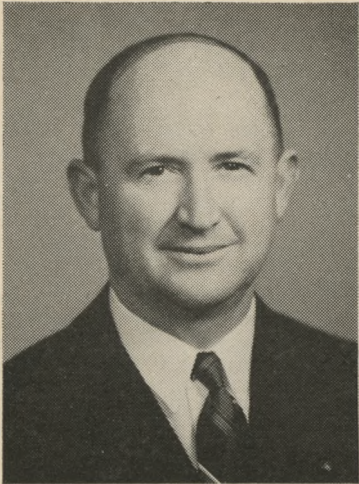
ASWU

The Associated Students of Willamette University is the organized student body of Willamette.

Its governing body is the executive committee, composed of the president, first vice-president, second vice-president, secretary, the editors of the Collegian and the Wallulah, a representative from each class, and a member of the faculty elected by the student body.

Under the constitution, a publications board governs the student publications. Membership on the board consists of the publications manager (this year there are two co-managers), the editors of the Collegian and the Wallulah, the student body president, the student body secretary, the professor of Journalism, and the general manager. Publications budgets are subject to approval by the executive committee, as are the budgets of all other activities.

Dues for membership in the ASWU are \$10 a semester and include dues for membership in the class to which each student belongs. Distribution of the dues is shown on page 14.

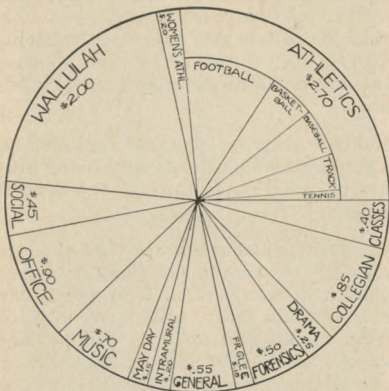
General Manager's Office

The business office of the ASWU is located in the gymnasium and is under the direction of the general manager. All money payable to the Associated Students is turned over to this office, and all payments are made through the general manager.

Student activity tickets, representing the \$10 membership in the Associated Students, are distributed through the general manager's office.

The activity ticket entitles the holder to admission to games and entertainment financed through student body funds, the use of student body equipment, and to receipt of all student body publications (except that a copy of the Wallulah is given to those only who have paid dues for two semesters or pay a proportional amount in addition to the dues for one semester).

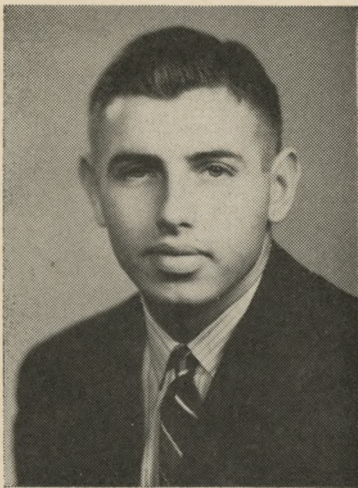

Editor, Willamette Collegian

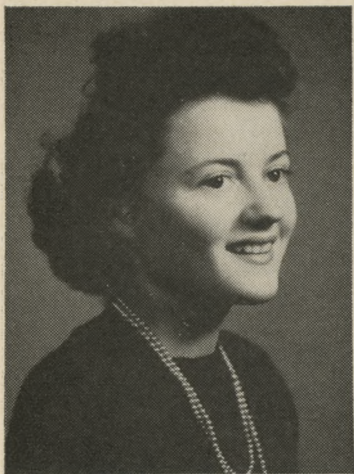

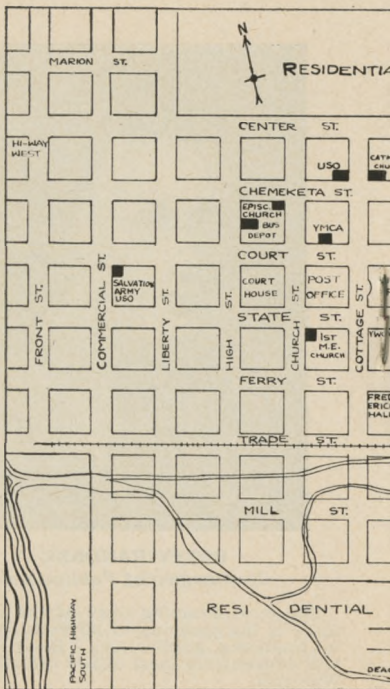
JANICE PATTERSON

Business management of the student publications is under the direction of two co-managers this year. Janice Patterson will devote her time chiefly to the Collegian.

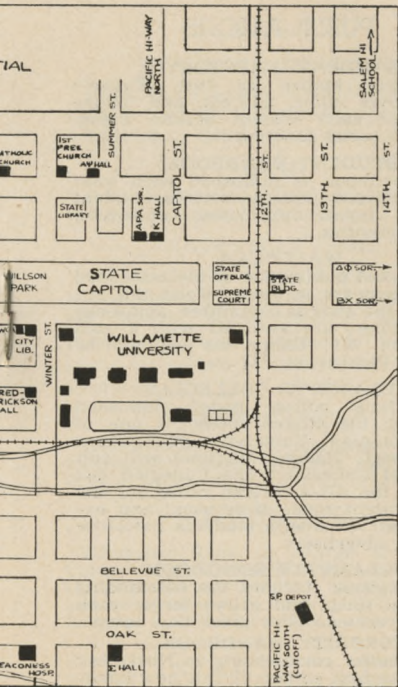


BETTY RANDALL

WALLULAH

This annual publication of the associated students appears in June. Upon the approval of the awards committee, ambitious staff members are awarded with a gold old English "W". Editor this year will be Margaret Pemberton.

WILLAMETTE COLLEGIAN

The official college paper, published weekly by the student body, is one of the outstanding University publications on the coast. Nadene Mathews will edit the 1943-44 Collegian. The Collegian last year won the All-American rating for the fourth straight time. It is usual and expected that Willamette students patronize Collegian advertisers.

WILLAMETTE SONGBOOK

The Songbook includes the outstanding Willamette songs and grows larger each year as Freshman Glee gives new songs.

SORORITY HANDBOOK

The semester commencing in November will see the first edition of this new handbook. It will be edited by the Inter-Sorority council for the purpose of acquainting new women with the sororities, their activities, and rules.

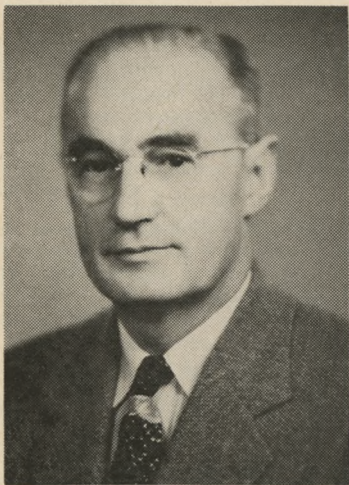
CARNEGIE LIBRARY

High school forensic tournament sponsored for last nine years. High school speakers with Willamette student judges. Debate, extempore, oratory, humorous and serious interpretation. Held in Waller Hall, Chresto Cottage, Eaton, Collins, Lausanne Hall and Library.

ATHLETICS

Athletics at Willamette is maintained under the supervision of the director of athletics and under the jurisdiction of the athletic board of control.

With the inauguration of a year-round school calendar the intercollegiate athletic program takes on a new aspect this year. Competition will get under way early in the summer semester with baseball in the first part and football in the second part. Games are to be scheduled with other colleges as well as with service teams and the teams of the war industries.

Since Navy regulations provide that V-12 men shall not be away from their base for more than 48 hours, and since the Willamette teams will be largely composed of V-12 men, athletic trips will be restricted in distance.

Willamette belongs to the Northwest Conference, composed of the following schools: Whitman College, College of Idaho, College of Puget Sound, Pacific University, Linfield College, and Willamette. The conference fosters as far as possible participation by all members in contests of football, basketball, baseball, tennis, and track. Under war-time conditions, however, some of the members will probably be unable to compete in one or more of the sports, Willamette will not lack in exciting competition from teams outside the conference.

Men's Living Accommodations

The S. S. Lausanne will be filled with 213 navy men who will report on the campus July 1. The YMCA billets the remaining 45. The V-12 unit at Willamette will bring 258 men to the campus and they will be assigned to either of these places. All of them will receive their meals in Lausanne.

SIGMA HALL

UNIVERSITY VESPERS

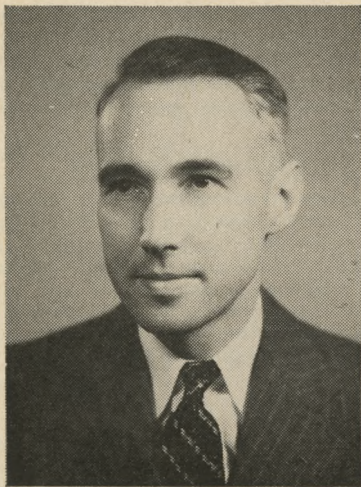

Supervises curriculum. Endeavors to guide student efforts where they will best be used. Heads mathematics department in addition to duties of dean.



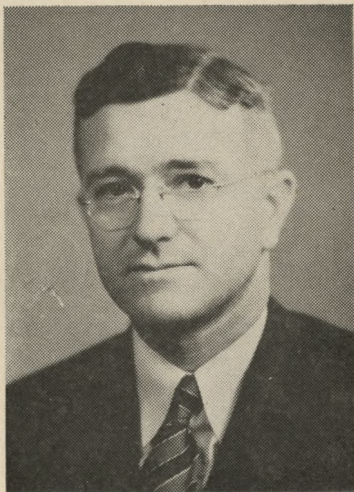

Dean of Women

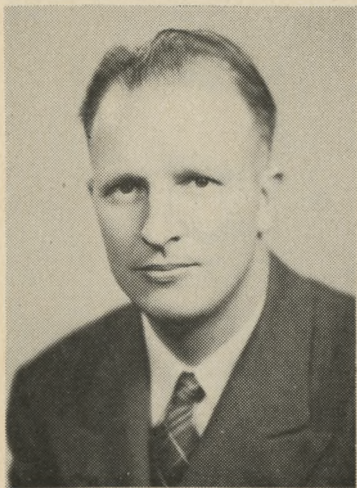
All women have a conference with the dean during the fall term. She advises inter-sorority council, helps in making up of social calendar, and is helpful in handling the employment problem of women.

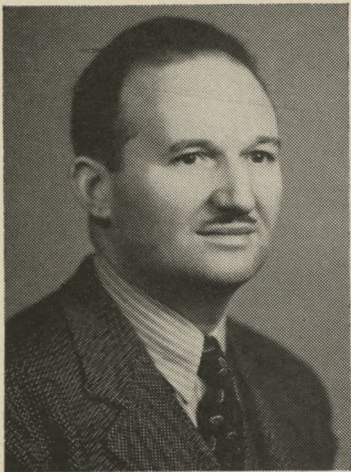
Dean of Freshman, Director of Admissions
