The Willamette University Board of Trustees at its February 18, 1972 meeting approved a procedure whereby decisions of the Student Affairs Committee would be...."implemented after thirty (30) days unless during the time it is suspended by:

1. The President of the University
2. The Faculty by majority vote at a faculty meeting
3. The students by a majority vote at a meeting of either the Student Senate or Student Bar Association

If either faculty or students have no meeting scheduled during that thirty (30) day period, the time must be extended until such time as they have had a chance to meet. If they do not suspend at this meeting, the action may be implemented immediately.

Subsequently to such suspension, the Student Affairs Committee may withdraw, modify, or pass by 2/3 vote of its total membership the proposal which is being challenged.

Upon such approval the proposal then may be implemented within ten (10) days, unless upon recommendation of the President, the Board of Trustees were asked to consider appropriate disposition of the challenged proposal."

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The Student Affairs Committee has approved recently several changes in the areas of housing and amendments to the Standards of Conduct. These actions are attached for your information and will become effective within thirty (30) days unless there is a suspension under the procedure as outlined above.

1. Twenty-one year olds
2. Housing changes
3. Foreign Language
4. Card-Key Change

PRESENT POLICY

All full time, undergraduate students who do not live with their parents or spouse must room and board in University owned and operated residence halls, fraternities, or sorority houses, as space permits.

PROPOSED CHANGE

To release unmarried undergraduate students of senior status and/or 21 years of age from the University on-campus residency requirement.

REVISED POLICY

All full time, undergraduate students who are not of Senior status or who have not attained their 21st birthday on or before the first day of classes, fall semester, must sign a contract to room and board in University owned and operated residence halls, fraternities, or sororities, as space permits, unless living with parents or spouse.

PROPOSED CHANGE

- To reorganize Baxter Hall as a co-educational residence.
- To designate one section of Lausanne Hall (men) and York House (women) as "Intensive Study" areas, in which strict quiet hours would be observed.
- To designate one section of third floor, Lausanne Hall, as first preference to single male law students on a single room occupancy basis.
- To incorporate into the price structure for room and board a differentiation between single and multiple occupancy.
- To allow returning students first priority in all residences, with the exception of minority wing of Belknap Hall and law school section of Lausanne Hall.

All residences would be assigned on an upperclass first priority basis. Present students will be allowed to indicate their preferences and will receive confirmations upon submitting their housing contracts and advance payments prior to the close of spring semester.

Lausanne Hall and York House to have a floor or section (determined by number of requests) designated as an "Intensive Study Area." Extensive quiet hours to be observed with the exact ramifications to be determined by the residents.

Rooms 302 through 312, Lausanne Hall, designated for single occupancy with the established board option plans, with the first priority until July 1 being given to single male law students. First priority after July 1 would be to returning undergraduate students; second priority to new students.

A student assigned to a room on a double occupancy basis, whose roommate moves out during the semester may remain in that room on a single room basis at no additional charge until such time as another student is assigned to that room. At the beginning of the following semester, the student must either move into a double or triple occupancy arrangement or pay the single room charge.

PRESENT POLICY

The residence at 960 Mill Street, S.E., occupied by members of Chi Omega sorority.

PROPOSED CHANGE

To designate the present Chi Omega facility as the "Willamette International Studies House."

REVISED POLICY

Willamette International Studies House, a facility encouraging cultural involvement: surrounding the residents with art, music, artifices, information and language of the other countries.

- a.) Co-educational, students selected by the Department of Foreign Languages.
- b.) A faculty member in residence whose main function would be to provide the atmosphere in which the goals and objectives could be achieved.
- c.) A student head resident (senior) who is fluent in one or more languages and dedicated to cultural involvement and gifted to instill his dedication onto others.
- d.) A resident assistant (junior) who would speak that language well that is not spoken by the faculty in residence or the student head resident. His qualifications otherwise would be those of the head resident.
- e.) A living area that is:
 - 1.) Adequately decorated (posters, artifices, furniture)
 - 2.) Furnished with one or more music centers (phonograph, tape recorder) and that a record and tape library be developed for research and recreational purposes.
 - 3.) Furnished with games from foreign countries.
 - 4.) Provides magazines, daily papers, journals for browsing and study.
- f.) That attempts be made to furnish food, beverages and menu cards that are representative of the foreign countries.
- g.) To provide lunch tables (sack lunches) to be frequented also by non-resident language fans.
- h.) Foreign language faculty to be involved: e.g. guest nights,
social evenings
extra-curricular foreign
language projects
- i.) That WISH be established as the center for the International Studies area.

PRESENT POLICY

- a.) All women students who are not on disciplinary probation, are eligible to apply for the card-key privilege. Eligibility will be certified by the Associate Dean of Students.
- b.) The University will send an explanatory letter to the parents of freshman, sophomore and junior women students, under the age of 21, asking them to return a signed card indicating permission for their daughter to participate in the system.
- c.) Students who meet the qualifications in #1 and #2 above will be asked to sign a pledge card indicating that they have read the policies and wish the responsibility of a card-key.
- d.) The head resident of each living organization will issue cards to women verified as eligible by the Dean's Office. She will collect the cards before each vacation.
- e.) If a student loses her card she will be financially responsible for replacing all the cards for her living organization, and a new cartridge will be installed.
- f.) If a student uses her card to admit someone who is not eligible to use it, or loans it to someone not eligible for it, she will forfeit her card-key privilege immediately for the remainder of the school year, and a woman student who uses the system when she is not eligible forfeits the card-key privilege for the following academic year. (Non-University guests may be admitted when accompanied by a hostess with the card-key privilege.)

PROPOSED CHANGE

To eliminate parental permission in order for a student to obtain a card-key.

REVISED POLICY

- a.) All women students, who are not on disciplinary probation, are eligible to apply for the card-key privilege. Eligibility will be certified by the Associate Dean of Students.
- b.) Students who are declared eligible will be asked to sign a pledge card indicating that they have read the policies and wish the responsibility of a card-key.
- c.) The head resident of each living organization will issue cards to women verified as eligible by the Dean's Office. She will collect the cards before each vacation.
- d.) If a student loses her card she will be financially responsible for replacing all the cards for her living organization, and a new cartridge will be installed.

e.) If a student uses her card to admit someone who is not eligible for it, she will forfeit her card-key privilege immediately for the remainder of the school year, and a woman student who uses the system when she is not eligible forfeits the card-key privilege for the following academic year. (Non-University guests may be admitted when accompanied by a hostess with the card-key privilege.)
